Spearman's fine Lynxette basketball team set a new bi-district scoring record at Pampa Tuesday night, when they jumped into a 35-9 half-time lead and coasted on to defeat the sky-rockets 62-29! The game was played before a record crowd of Lynxette fans who showed Coach Weese they were going to back him and his team despite the blizzard and snow warnings! The Spearman side of the big Pampa gym was full to capacity. Of course, the Lynxettes shocked the fans from both Wellington and Spearman with their devastating ball game.

So effective was the Lynxette defense, the Wellington girls only shot the ball 5 times the first nine minutes, and had only 3 points. The Lynxette team defense, was even sharper than their offense.

This victory boosted Spearman's season record to 31-6 and moved the Lynxettes into the regional tournament at Lubbock this Saturday morning. Spearman will play its initial game at 11:30 a. m. Saturday in the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum.

Marcia Shieldknight scored 32 points and Sandra Shufeldt added 17 in the Tuesday night game as Spearman took the lead, leading 19-3 after the initial eight minutes.

Mary Holton was high for Wellington with 23 points.

The largest crowd of fans in the schools history is expected to head for Lubbock this Saturday. The tournament bracket for class AA is inside the newspaper.

### BODY FOUND IN DEATH VALLEY Former City Woman Victim Of Flash Flood

Word was received by the Sheriff's office here Tuesday that the body of a former Spearman woman and her traveling companion had been uncovered in flood debris in the Death Valley desert of California.

Officials identified the body of Mrs. Marie Madden, long time Spearman resident. The 49-year old woman, who had worked for the past few years in the Palo Duro school lunch room, Amarillo, was enroute to Sacramento, California, according to her relatives here. Officials said evidently the automobile was caught in a flash flood and swept into a deep creek. The automobile was uncovered Tuesday March 4 by roadgrader crews while clearing away the flood debris. Both Mrs. Madden and her companion had been dead since approximately the 26th day of February, according to coroners, who ruled the cause of death as drowning.

Funeral services are tentatively scheduled for Friday afternoon March 7 in the Spearman Union Church. The time is pending, with Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home of Spearman.

The deceased, a long time Spearman school lunchroom employee, moved to Amarillo several years ago and worked with various school cafeterias

in that city. She recently made plans to move to California to make her home and was enroute to Sacramento when the accident happened.

She is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Haralson of Spearman; two sons, Billy Madden of Spearman and Wayne Madden of Jal, N. M.; one daughter, Mrs. Mary Miesner of Spearman; brothers, J. D. Haralson of Spokane, Wash., Carver Haralson of Cheyenne, Wyo., a sister, Alma, of Spokane and another sister Mrs. Isabelle Burk of Amarillo. Ten grandchildren also survive.

## SNOWFALL

The Panhandle of Texas became blanketed with the biggest snowfall of the season Sunday as a major storm moved through the region dumping 5 inches of snow in the Spearman-Gruver area.

The snow was one of the "wettest" on record, and melted out to .48 inches of liquid moisture.

Snow began falling in the Spearman area about 6:30 a. m. Sunday and by

noon the weather bureau was issuing hazardous driving conditions all across the Panhandle where drifting snow swirled across icy roads on gale-force winds. Some roads were virtually closed to traffic as drifts quickly began to accumulate.

More of the same is predicted by weather bureau officials. As this newspaper goes to press

Wednesday morning and by 9 a. m. several inches had accumulated already.

The snowfall, coming on the heels of the weekend moisture, brightened prospects for cattle grazing, provided moisture for winter wheat and established sub-soil wetness for early spring planting.

A total of 1.15 inches of moisture was recorded last month, making it the wettest February since 1964 when precipitation measured 1.14.

### Ambulance Service Now Available

Ambulance service here changed hands Saturday March 1 as Spearman and Hansford County governments took over the service formerly operated by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Directors.

The funeral home had announced plans to discontinue ambulance runs by March 1. The company donated the ambulance to the City.

The city and county will share expenses of operating the one-unit service. A charge of \$10.00 in town and 50¢ per mile one way outside the city limits will be charged users.

Fees for services will be billed through Hansford

Hospital.

City police officers and firemen will man the ambulance, with the fire department personnel in charge of operation.

The H and S Ambulance Service phone number to call is 3537 and Hansford County citizens are urged to jot this number down and keep it handy.

The ambulance, housed at the Spearman Fire Department, is now operating on 24-hour service.

### Not Much Interest In Local Races

There were not many aspiring local politicians interested enough in the school board and/or city council race to toss their hats in the ring.

Both of the elections will be held Saturday April 5 in the Junior High School.

Deadline for filing in either race was Wednesday midnight March 5, when this newspaper went to press (Wed. noon) the following persons had filed.

Candidates for school trustee, two places to be filled: are Bill Partridge, who announced earlier, and Herschel Jones. Jones, incumbent, filed for re-election Tuesday of this week.

R. L. McClellan, a school trustee for 6 years, announced that he would not be a candidate for re-election.

School board members will be elected to 3-year terms.

Candidates for City Council, three places to be filled: E. J. Callaway, James K. Hicks and Bob Skinner. All three incumbents filed for re-election for 2 year terms.

Absentee voting for school trustees will begin March 13 through April 1 in the office of County Judge Johnnie C. Lee.

Absentee voting for City Aldermen begins March 17 through April 1 at the City Hall during regular office hours.

Spearman's fine Lynx team brought down the rafters at the Coliseum in Lubbock Saturday morning, as they came from behind 15 points, to within one point of victory over Cranes Golden Cranes. And, as all of the Spearman fans knew, the only way that one of Coach Simpson's teams would lose, was for a very unusual thing to happen, and it did! In the heat of the battle, and with only 17 seconds left in the game, Spearman called time-out, and it was the 6th time out for the Lynx, who had the Crane team all but beaten! And, the officials had to walk over to Coach Simpson, and his fine team and say, "Coach, I have some bad news, you have called too many time outs!" Spearman was trailing by one point at this time, and Crane made their free throw, and also got the ball on the technical time out call!

Crane went ahead to win the game 61-57, but the game was finished under protest, as Spearman's Super Superintendent vaulted a 9-foot retaining wall, and charged the score-keeper with the mistake of not telling the team's captain that he had already used up his time outs!

With only 29 seconds left in the game, a Crane player had slammed the ball down on the court in one of the officials face, and Coach Simpson and Spearman fans felt that the Lynx should be shooting the technical, and Coach Simpson was signaling to the referee asking him for the technical, when the players became confused and thought he was calling a time out! Most fans thought that the Crane coach had called the time out, as he was on the side lines in shock along with everyone else!

But, whatever fans thought, the Lynx did themselves right proud, but almost defeating one of the finest basketball teams that ever played in the coliseum. And, as far as the Spearman Reporter is concerned, they really won the game, as it isn't possible to beat these boys this year!

For those of you who weren't there, the team just played magnificently! The Golden Cranes, held a 15 point lead in the final

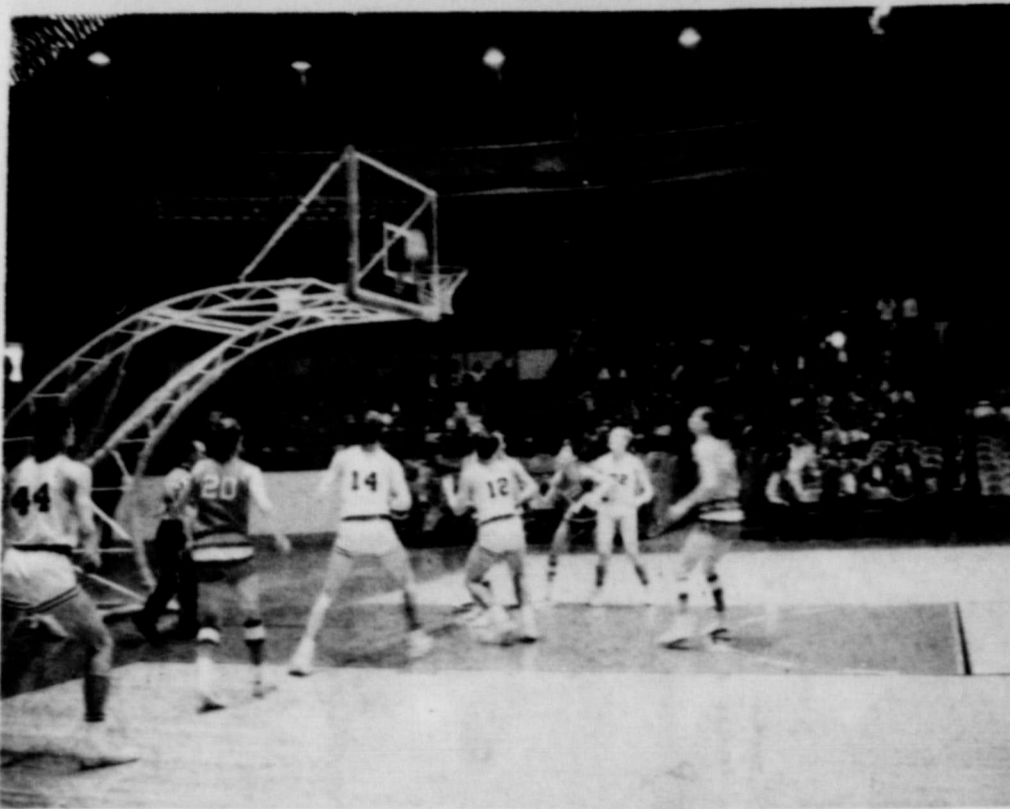
stanza, and only managed to hold this lead on a technical foul call in the final 17 seconds.

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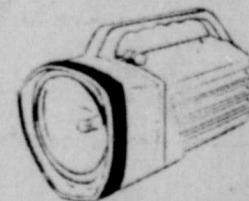

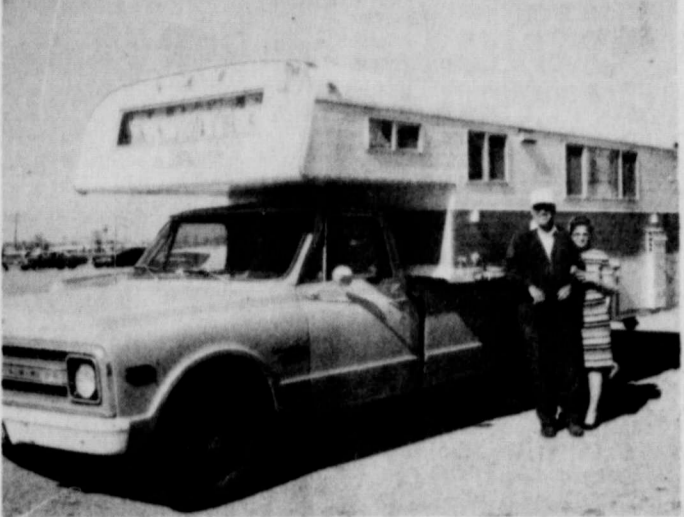

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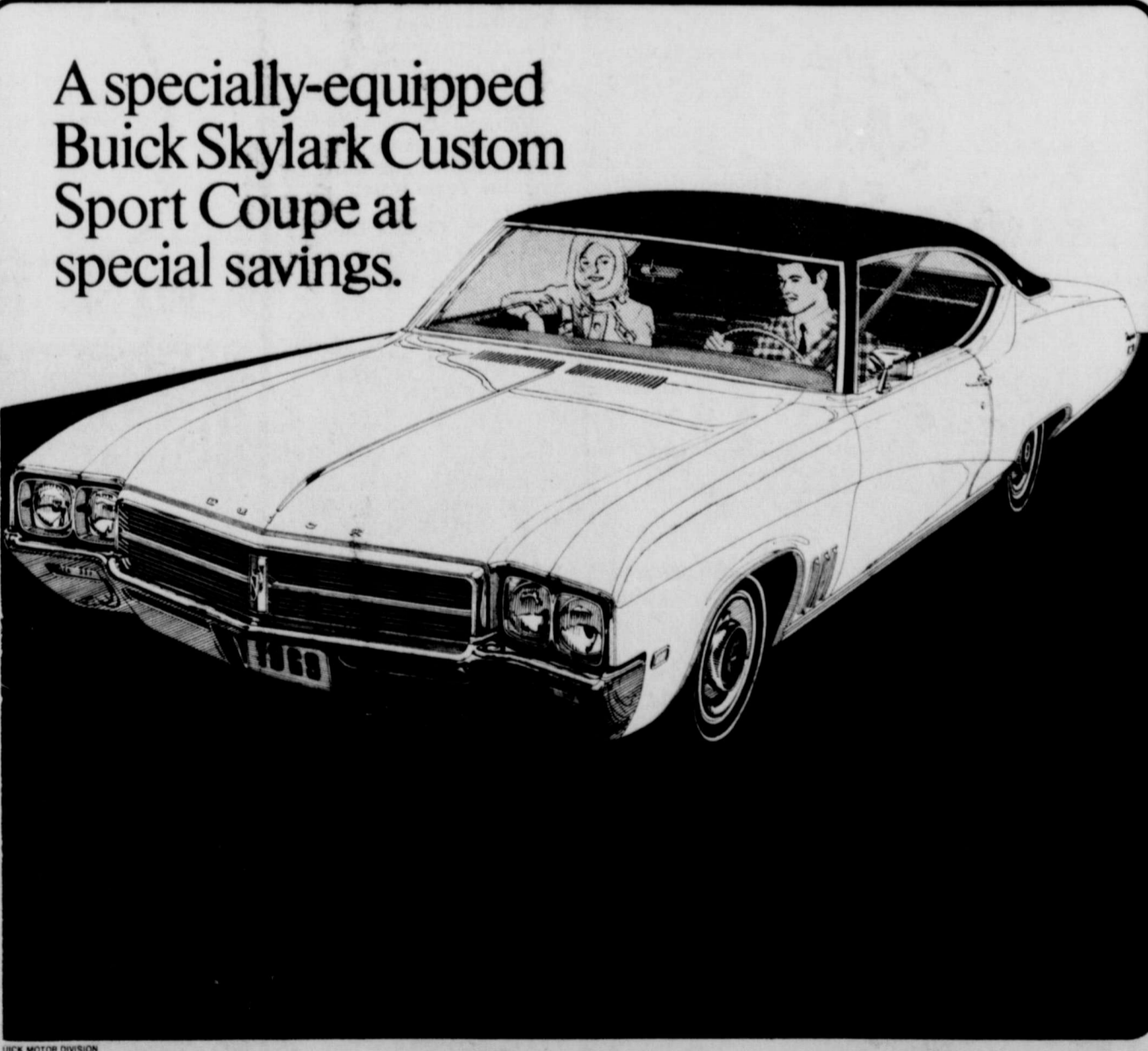

**PUBLIC NOTICE OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR RECORDATION AND LIMITATION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS.**

Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1911, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1965 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1965 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies. Instructions and forms for recording claims may be obtained without cost from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P.O. Box 12296, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

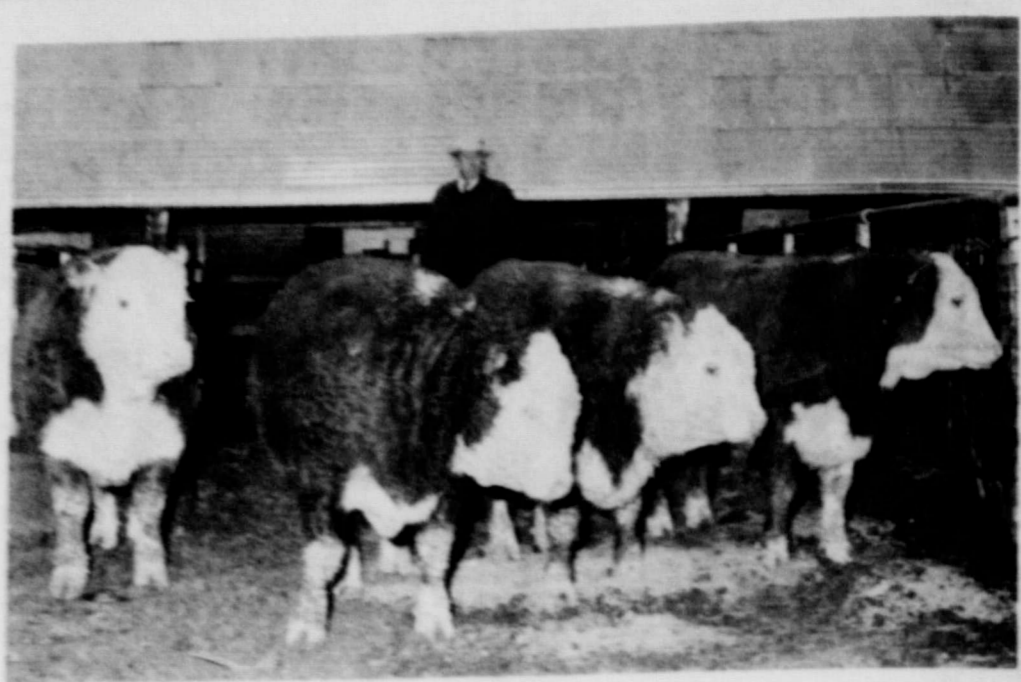

Eighty-five bulls have qualified for the 17th annual Panhandle State College performance tested bull sale to be held Saturday, March 8th. The sale will start at 1:00 p.m. at the college farm in Goodwell, Oklahoma.

Every bull qualifying for certificate with Performance Registry International will make that an all-time P22 sale during the 17 year history of the station. Catalogs about the bulls are available by writing or calling Mr. M. W. England at Panhandle State College.

The 100 bulls on test, finished the 140 day period with a 3.30 ADG. The highest on record at Panhandle State. Ten bulls gained 500 lbs. or more during this period. The top gaining senior bull, a hereford consigned by Ralph Crall of Weatherford, Oklahoma. The bull gained 541 lbs. and an average daily gain of 3.66 lbs. This bull ranked 4th high during the 17 year test program. The size of this senior bull was the 1966 high indexing bull that gained 505 lbs. as a junior bull. The other top ten consignees are: 1. The remaining 96 delegates will be composed of eight representatives from each of the 12 Extension Districts in Texas. During the three-day meeting, leaders will be

exchanging ideas, aims and leadership pointers. Miss Dorothy Emerson, consultant for the National 4-H Foundation in Washington, D. C., will address leaders in a number of forum sessions giving hints on better leadership for 4-H programs. Governor Preston Smith, Lt. Gov. Sen Barnes, and speaker of the House of Representatives Gus Mutscher have been invited to address the 4-H leaders at a breakfast with state legislators the final day, Schlutt said. John E. Hutchinson, director of the Texas

Agricultural Extension Service will also speak to the 4-H leaders at the legislative breakfast. A tour of the state capitol will follow the breakfast. 4-H adult leaders will have an opportunity to visit with their senators or representatives and to see leadership and government in action, Schlutt reported.

All local people should support the wildlife conservation programs of the Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District.

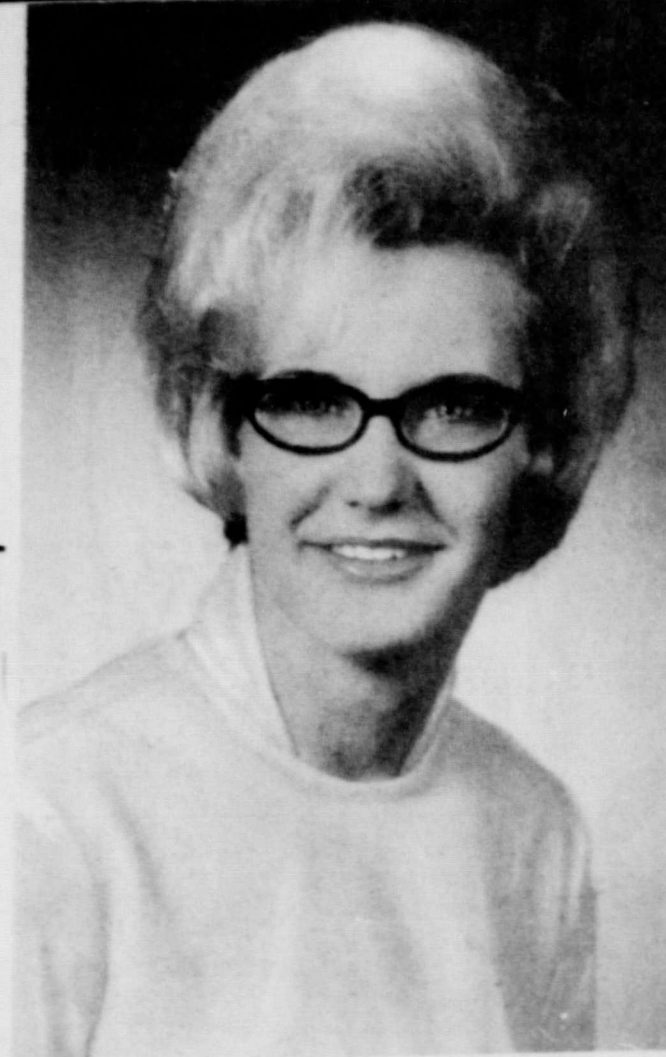

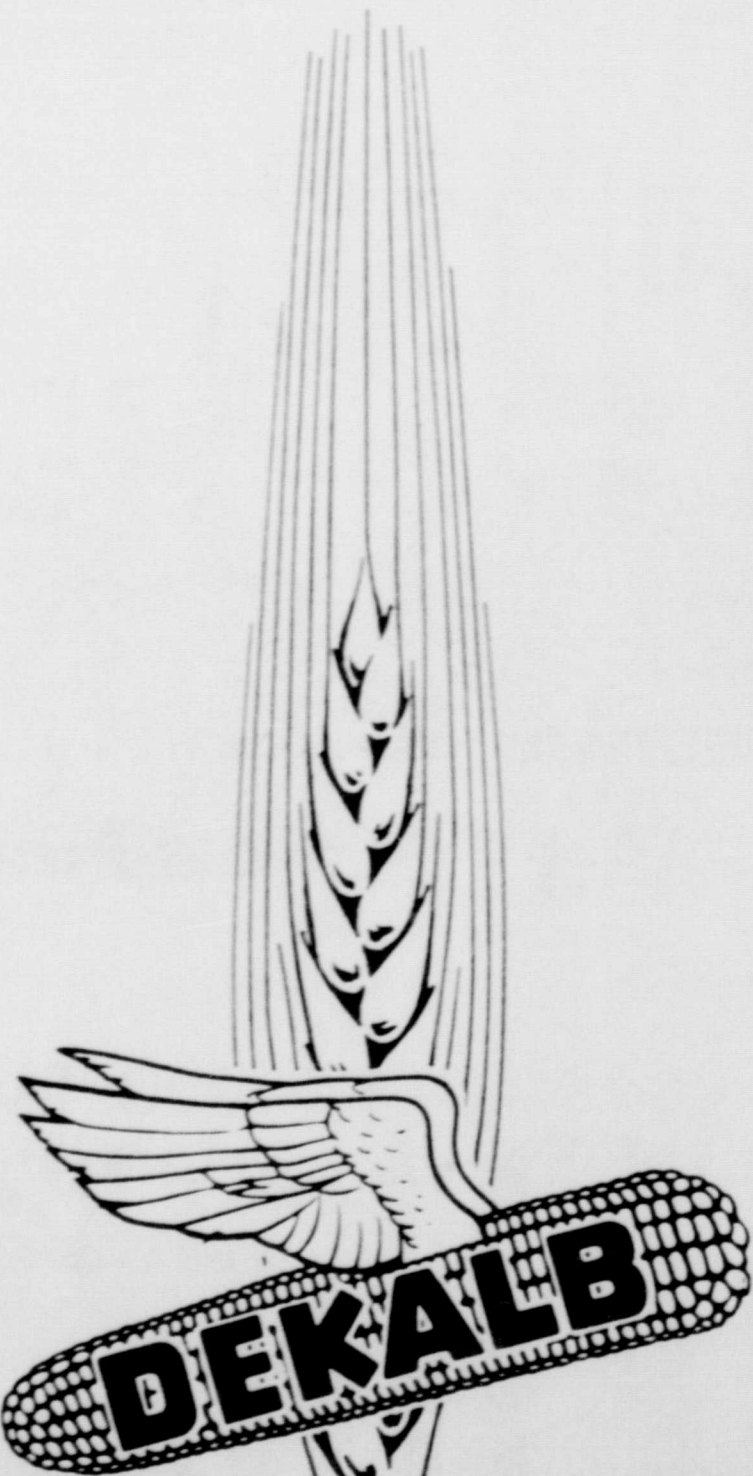

A week or so ago I made a plea via this column for the Spearman Barbers to donate their services to the men patients at Pioneer Manor Rest Home. I just thought it would be a nice, neighborly thing to do, especially since most of the

men can't get to town, and many of them don't even have the money for hair cuts. I have heard from two barbers... Buella Burger & her son Billy Burger say they are anxious to "take our turn".
