Church Building Program Underway

Ground-breaking ceremonies for a \$35,000 fellowship hall for the Sacred Heart Catholic Church were held last week. The 70x55 foot structure will be built just south of the present church plant.

Plains Steel Building Company of Amarillo is the contractor. Work is under way this week with a completion deadline, weather permitting, some 90 days hence.

The brick building, designed to match the church exterior, will feature a lava stone front and colorful glass windows. The new addition will house modern kitchen facilities, two classrooms, rest rooms and the main hall. The approximate cost of the project, when it is furnished, is estimated at \$50,000.00.

The church building committee is composed of Dr. R. L. Kleeberger, Gus Renner, Clarence Renner, Bob Farr, Jerry Morris, Carlos Lopez, Johnny Venneman, Charles O'Loughlin, Frank Carmody.

Father Donald P. Rusch, in making the announcement concerning this building program, said the church was also undergoing extensive redecoration at this time. The pastor said the exterior had been painted, recarpeted and soon would be the proud owner of some beautiful and ornate figures and mosaic art work. The figures are being imported from Italy and the Mosaic work is being done by a California artist.

The Golden Circle Development Co., Inc. has purchased 49 acres of land for a commercial and industrial development annex to the City of Spearman. The land was purchased from Mrs. John R. Collard Sr.

One 24-acre site for residential and commercial buildings will front highway 207 and includes all the land across from Excel Chevrolet, north to 7th street, east to Hackley Clinic, south to Gregg Clinic and includes 387 feet along Roland Street.

Another 25-acre plot of land designed for commercial and industrial development only, is pinpointed to begin at the Holiday Drive-In theatre, north to 7th street, east to highway 207 and includes all the land west of Horizon Oil and Garnett Animal Clinic plus all the

land surrounding Excel Chevrolet. This development fronts the county road.

The group of business men who make up the land development company, is now in the process of planning the 50-unit motel which will be constructed at the corner of 7th and highway 207, just across from the Simmons Chevrolet Station. The motel will be designed along the lines of the two story Villa-Inn motels and will house a restaurant, indoor swimming pool, meeting and conference rooms, etc.

Land is now available for business and commercial tenants, on either a "sell or lease" basis. Land will be sold out of either plot to private individuals or others interested in locating in Spearman.

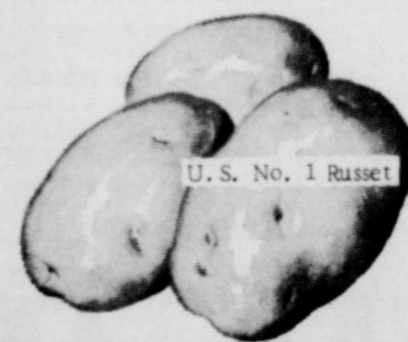

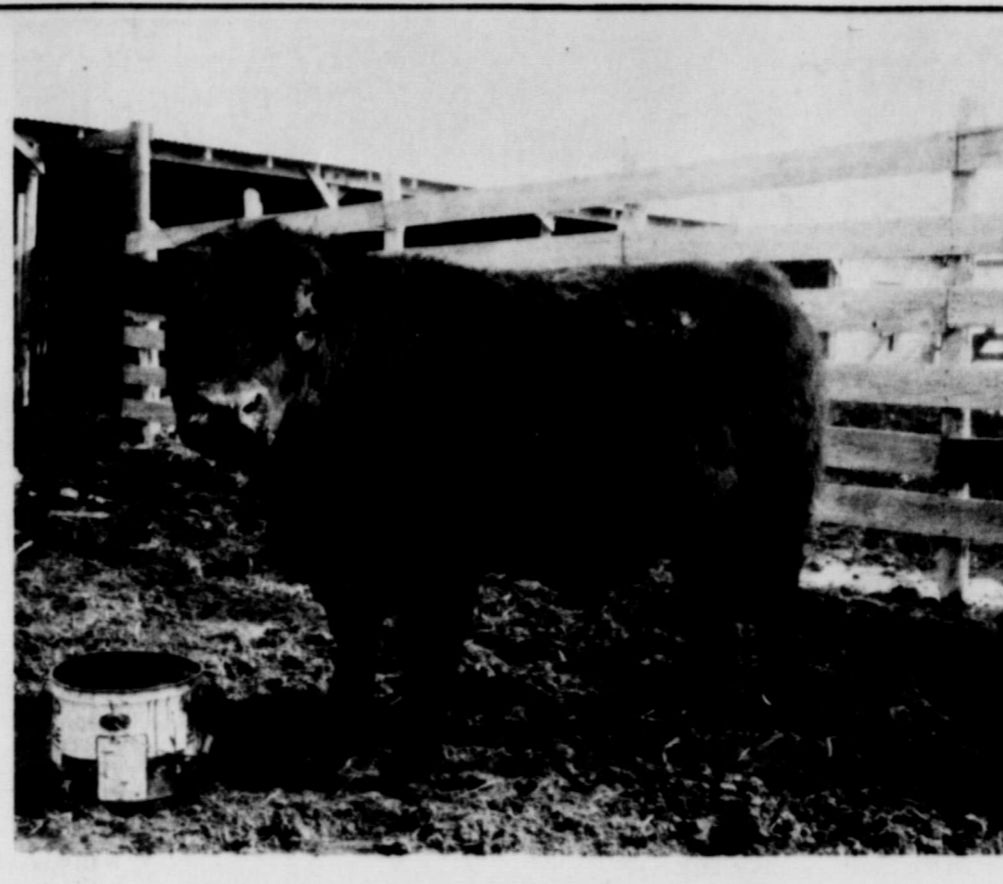

VIETNAM VIEW as reported by Marine Corps Combat Correspondents and edited by Sgt. Ed Mitschke

The rugged mountains and jungles of Vietnam not only hide an armed enemy, but are filled with other dangers that can knock out Marines just as effectively as a well-aimed enemy bullet.

No group of men know this better than the Navy hospital corpsmen who serve with the 3rd Marine Division, and whose job it is to protect Marines against the often unseen dangers of disease and insects. It is their job to see that as few Marines as possible succumb to the unpredictable dangers of operating in the mountainous jungles of Vietnam.

Hospital Corpsman 2nd Class Richard Hilton, 3201 Carol Ann Dr., Austin, Tex., is just one of hundreds of corpsmen serving with the 3rd Marine Division. Hilton is the senior corpsman with "E" Company, 2nd Battalion, 9th Marine Regiment. In addition to his usual duties of tending to the medical needs of the company, he has the responsibility of supervising six other corpsmen attached to his unit.

"If any of my corpsmen run short of medical supplies, it is my job to see that they get resupplied," said Hilton, "and if they encounter a problem and are unsure of the solution, they come to me for consultation."

The "Doc" is a vital part of any Marine operation. He keeps the Marines in the best possible health. This includes everything from the routine dispensing of malaria pills and salt tablets to the initial treatment of serious battle wounds.

"A large part of our job is what could be called preventive medicine," explained Hilton. "We take precautions to see that infirmaries are not hampered by such things as immersion foot, heat stroke or malaria."

To accomplish this mission the corpsman is virtually a walking hospital. Two large bags of medical equipment, along with an oversized pack, are his burden in the field.

Hilton enjoys working with Marines. It is his job to keep them healthy and to know and understand them.

"Marines, because of their endurance, can withstand physical discomfort and pain that would have an ordinary man flat on his back," said Hilton. For Hilton life with the Marines in the field is busy and varied and he seldom has time to consider the full burden of his responsibilities. He is there when he is needed, using his skills to assure that no Marine will be lost to the company for lack of medical care.

The Marines stared in amazement as approximately 100 South Vietnamese civilians came marching down the road toward them bearing axes, hoes and scythes.

The Marines and Vietnamese Peoples Self Defense Force (PSDF) soldiers of 4th Combined Action Group (CAG) were building of a new compound near several villages north of Quang Tri to offer the villagers security from the Viet Cong.

The villagers volunteered to help in building the new compound. "A Popular Force (PF) soldier told the village chief we were building a new compound and he asked the villagers if they wanted to help. They turned out in full force ready to work," said Sgt. Wilbur E. Sweet, Tucson, Ariz., a platoon leader of the Marine /PF unit.

As the Marines and PFs strung barbed wire and dug bunkers, the villagers chopped down brush and trees along the compound's perimeter.

"They cleared a 500-meter field of fire for us and carried all the brush away," said Sweet as he scanned the new compound. "It would have taken us a week to do the work they did in one day."

"There has been increased Viet Cong activity in this area and the civilians are helping us fight it. With this compound, the village will receive better protection and the people are anxious to help us," Sweet concluded.

Marines in Vietnam have been attacked by tigers, pythons, water buffalo and rock apes, but Lance Cpl. Raymond R. Caballero, 26, 201 W. 3rd St., Antioch, Calif., believes he is the first to be wounded by a four-point buck.

Caballero was on a platoon-sized patrol during Operation Taylor Common when he heard a rustling in the brush on the mountainside. Thinking it was an enemy soldier, the Marine and squad leader shouted at the intruder to surrender. Not understanding Caballero's broken Vietnamese, the 400-pound deer crashed through the foliage and charged--right over the astonished Marine.

Caballero was able to side-step just enough to evade the full brunt of the attack, but was cut slightly on the right hand and arm.

He had his wounds treated and returned to duty. The buck escaped unharmed.

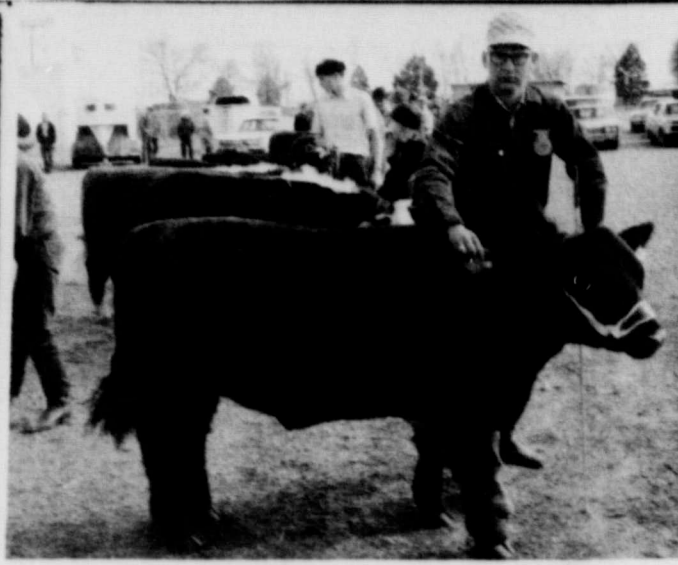

Helpful Hints From Me To Thee

By Vivian Warminski

In Czechoslovakian, its Babovka; in Russian, Koulich and in Polish, Babka. Whatever you call it, in any language, Easter just wouldn't be Easter without a light textured yeast cake or bread.

Being Polish, I believe that the embodiment of all the many European coffee cakes is the Babka. Baked in a round, fluted bundt pan, it gets its name from its distinctive shape. The word Babka in Polish means old woman, the little lady who wears wide, flowing skirts.

EASTER BAKKA
1/2 cup strong coffee
1/2 cup evaporated milk
1/2 cup soft butter or marg.
1/2 cup sugar
4 egg yolks
1 package active dry yeast
1 cup warm water 105-115°
Grated peel, 1 lemon
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
4 to 5 cups all purpose flour (approx.)
1 cup golden raisins
topping*

Combine coffee and evaporated milk; heat to scalding point; cool to lukewarm. Cream butter and sugar. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon-colored; stir into creamed mixture. Soften yeast in warm water; add with lemon peel, salt and cinnamon. Mix well. Add baking soda to lukewarm coffee mixture; add alternately with flour to make a soft dough. Stir in raisins. Knead on lightly floured board or canvas until dough no longer sticks to hands. Place in well-greased bowl. Turn dough to bring greased side on top. Cover; let rise in warm place until doubled in size (about 2 hours). Punch down. Grease 12-cup bundt pan thoroughly. Place dough in pan, shaping to fit. Cover; let rise until doubl-

ed. Brush top with egg yolk mixture (see topping). Scatter almonds over surface. Bake at 350° for 50 to 60 minutes or until cake tester comes out clean and top is deep golden brown. (Cake should sound hollow when tapped).

TOPPING
1 egg yolk. 1 tablespoon water. 1/4 cup blanched almonds.

Beat egg slightly with water; brush over surface of bakka; scatter almonds over surface.

Recently, the Hollands received word that he was in a safe place and not in much danger; it seems as if things have changed at Dau Tieng where he is stationed with the 25th Infantry Division.

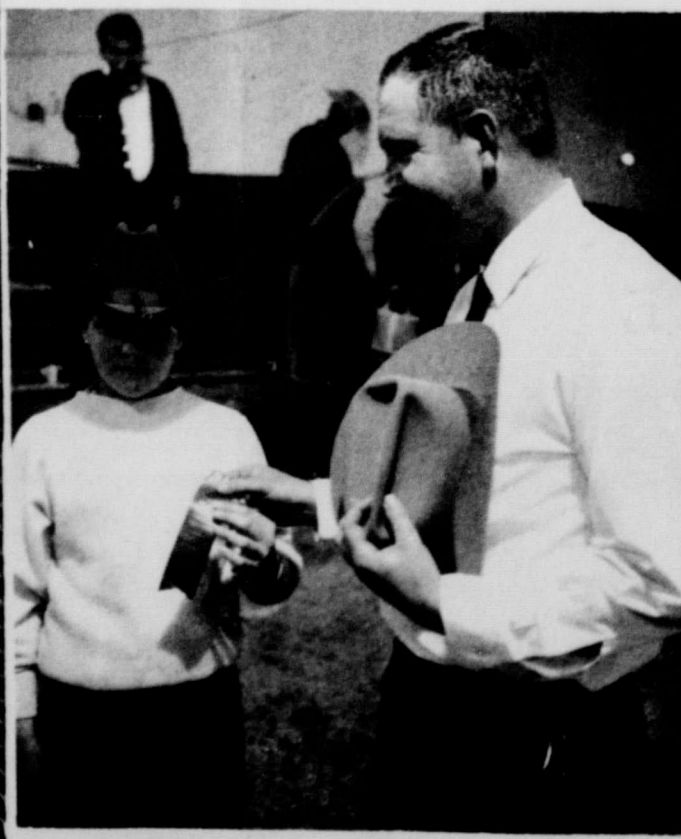
"On the first day of the VC offensive, Sgt. Holland said he was rudely awakened by CKS bullet projectiles ripping through his hut, splintering wood, zipping through canvas tents and causing holes to be made in everything in their path. Incidentally, one of the bullets came within a foot of me and almost caused me to win my second Purple Heart, and this was just a warm-up. The last two weeks we have averaged being attacked with mortar and rocket fire every other day. Maybe if people knew all the fun I'm having over here they might write me and ask me to tell them some war stories I am full of. By the way, I am not sleeping in my hut now. I usually go out to the bunker line away from the rockets because if Charlie hits with a ground attack, I can fight it, but there's no way for me to fight incoming rockets in my hut. We are expected to be hit tonight or in the near future. We have been having red alerts every night so we will be ready for him the next time he tries anything, and believe me if he does, it will be suicide for him".

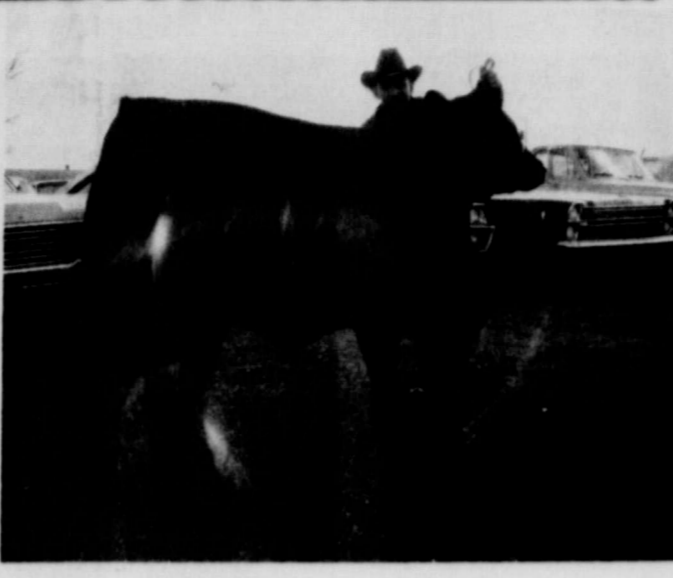
A little girl, Starla Hinton, sells her big pig! Auctioneer Mike Garnett pleads for the top dollar.

Salmon For Lent Season

COLLEGE STATION-- Salmon, a Lenten favorite, is found in several varieties at the grocery store. Mrs. Gwendolynne Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist, says the most expensive is red or Sockeye salmon. It has deep red meat, a considerable amount of oil and a firm texture.

For salads, sandwiches or scalloped dishes, the Texas A&M specialist recommends Chinook or King salmon. It has a very soft texture, is rich

in oil and separates into large flakes.

Choo or Silver salmon is large flaked red salmon best for salads and open-face sandwiches.

The least expensive pink salmon, light to deep pink in color, is best for soups or scalloped dishes.

Weekly Food Market Buys

COLLEGE STATION-- Pennies add up to savings when you take advantage of weekend food specials. Here are some marketing tips from Gwendolynne Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing information specialist with Texas A&M.

Fresh asparagus is found in many stores now but prices remain relatively high, according to Mrs. Clyatt. Green cabbage prices vary but generally are in moderate price bracket as are broccoli, squash, eggplant and head lettuce.

Carrots, turnips, celery potatoes, dry onions and sweet potatoes are among the more economical choices.

Grapefruit is still in ample supply, the specialist says. Oranges, apples which come from controlled atmosphere storage pineapples and bananas are other fruit choices.

Pork featured in some markets this weekend includes Boston butt roasts, shoulder steaks, end cut loin roasts and chops. Semi-boneless whole, butt portion, shank portion and canned hams may vary a few cents lower than a week ago.

In the grocery department Mrs. Clyatt points out good values on canned tomatoes and tomato products, canned and frozen corn and cut green beans. At most frozen food cabinets some brands of pot pies, frozen dinners and fish sticks are offered at lower than usual prices.

Gas Co. Will Launch Project

Natural Gas Pipeline Company of America, Chicago, in April will launch an \$83,865,000 construction project which will increase its peak day delivery capacity during the 1969-70 winter heating season by 384.8 million cubic feet of natural gas; 280.9 million from transmission plus 104 million of storage gas. The new daily deliverability total--4.7 billion cubic feet of natural gas--is nearly a nine per cent increase over the system's present capacity.

In its application for the project, which was approved March 18 by the Federal Power Commission, NGPL outlined plans to increase transmission facilities by building four new compressor stations with a total of 26,300 horsepower; three in Texas and one in Kansas. Compressor facilities will be increased by 126,960 horsepower at fifteen existing stations in Texas, Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, and Illinois.

In addition, 242 miles of pipeline--mostly 30" and 36" mainline looping--will be constructed in the following states: New Mexico, 33 miles; Texas, 89 miles; Arkansas, 29 miles; Missouri, 9 miles; and Illinois, 82 miles.

The Company's storage facilities in Illinois and Iowa will be expanded by the drilling of twelve injection-withdrawal wells and three observation wells; the addition of 6,000 horsepower at stations in two storage fields; and the construction of appurtenant facilities at five storage

fields. Natural Gas Pipeline Company of America, a subsidiary of Peoples Gas Company, Chicago, operates about 10,000 miles of pipeline along two routes: the Amarillo Line transmits natural gas to Chicago from West Texas, New Mexico, the Panhandle and Oklahoma; the Gulf Coast Line connects the production fields of the Texas and Louisiana Gulf Coast area with Chicago.

Proposed new facilities in Hutchinson county will be a new 9,100 horsepower compressor station, 191, near Pringle and addition of 2,080 compressor horsepower at Station 111 near Fritch.

Too Many Vitamins Unhealthy

COLLEGE STATION-- Is a vitamin a day insurance of good health? Not necessarily.

Vitamins are needed for good health, but excessive amounts can be dangerous. When daily food intake is adequate, Frances Reasonover, Extension nutritionist, says you don't need to take vitamin pills.

Individuals differ in the amounts and types of vitamins needed and a doctor can prescribe the type to suit individual needs. The Texas A&M University specialist advises seeing a physician if you feel you need vitamins.

Excess amounts of Vitamins B and C are easily disposed of by the body without harm. However, too much Vitamins A and D can be dangerous because the body has no way of getting rid of excess.

Good food sources of Vitamin A are liver, egg yolk, dark green and yellow vegetables, deep yellow fruits, whole milk cheddar-type cheese and ice cream. Miss Reasonover notes that most people do not get enough Vitamin A.

Symptoms of excessive intakes of Vitamin A include fatigue, abdominal discomfort, bone and joint pain, loss of body hair, headaches and yellowing of skin.

Excessive Vitamin D leads to nausea, frequent urination and diarrhea. It can also cause weakness and depression, explains Miss Reasonover.

Foods high in Vitamin D are fish liver oils, egg yolks, liver and milk fortified with Vitamin D.

A well-balanced diet is the best insurance for good health, emphasizes the Extension specialist.

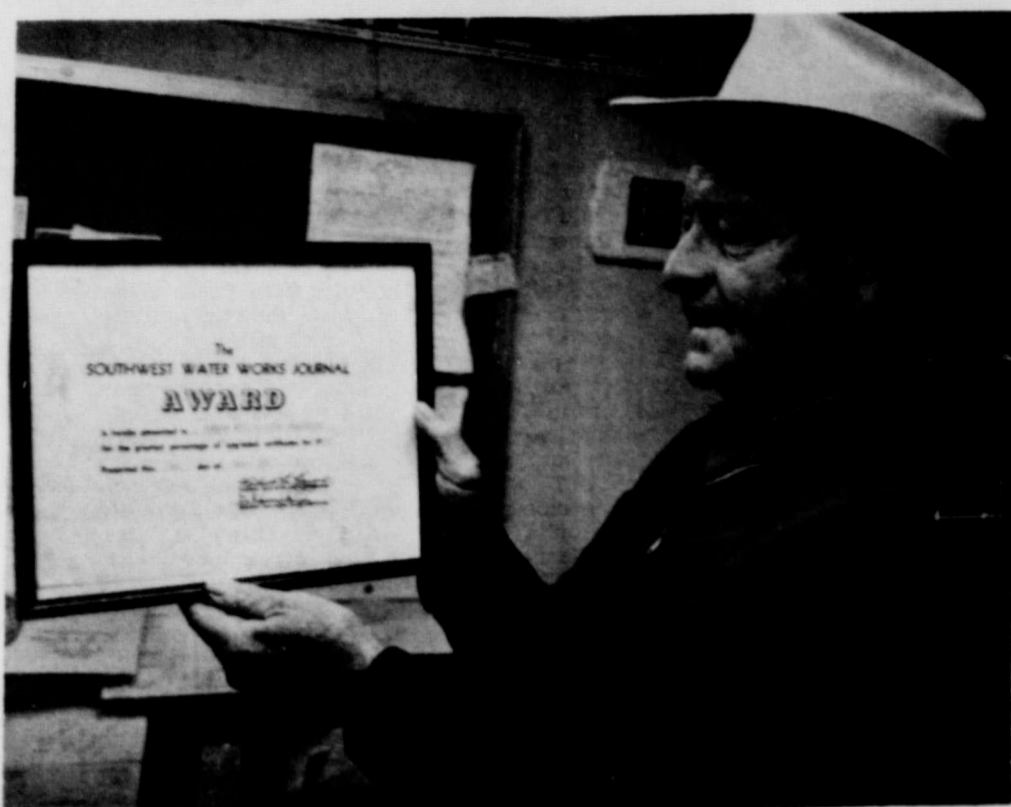
Allen Alford, Elementary school principal, asks all parents of pre-schoolers to meet with school personnel at 12:30 in the All-purpose room.

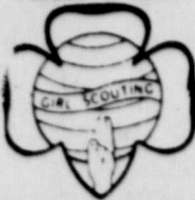

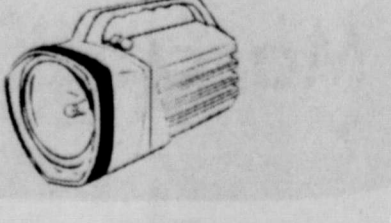

Washington Report

A recent farm newsletter I received began with a reminder that without the electoral votes of the midwestern farm states, Richard M. Nixon would not be President. Although Texas failed to award Nixon its electoral votes, the Panhandle area did almost solidly support him.

The letter is headed NIXON'S NO. 2 PROBLEM LOW FARM PRICES and continues:

The economic situation of the American farmers is the worst since the "great depression" and instead of improving, it is worsening. Farm prices are depressed and farm debt is high. Next to ending the war in Vietnam, the most important problem confronting President Nixon is that of extending to farmers and the residents of farm communities the same degree of prosperity as is now enjoyed by people in business and industry, government and the professions. The first step toward carrying out such a program is the inauguration of an honest and comprehensive study of the entire farm situation; a study that will answer three questions: (1) how bad is the farm problem, (2) how did it get that way and (3) what is required to remedy it.

In conducting the study there are several avenues of investigation which should be pursued. It should be determined if the Kennedy-Johnson team of "new economists" utilized every possible means of depressing farm prices for the purpose of keeping food costs low while inflating wages and profits in business and industry to create prosperity. For example, did the government repeatedly sell wheat domestically for the purpose of depressing wheat prices? Did the government curtail wheat sales to foreign nations and grants in aid to needy peoples in order

to keep government held wheat surpluses at high levels? Did it allow increased imports of beef from New Zealand, Australia, and Argentina for the purpose of depressing beef prices in this country? Did it permit increased imports of dairy products from European countries in order to depress dairy farm prices in the U.S.?

Another avenue of the investigation should be devoted to a study of the policies, practices and present financial condition of Farmers Home Administration. Among other items, it should be determined if the policy of Farmers Home Administration has been to grant low cost loans only to those farmers who are unable, on account of their poor financial status, to obtain loans from cooperative or commercial banking agencies. If such is the case, was the policy adopted for the purpose of keeping inefficient and incompetent farmers on the farms to produce price depressing farm surpluses? Former Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman in a farewell interview with the press stated that loans granted by Farmers Home Administration increased from around 300 million dollars a year to almost one and a half billion in 1968. One phase of the study should be to determine how the billions of government funds loaned out were spent and how much of the total loaned is recoverable.

What action the new government takes in connection with the farm problem is up to President Nixon. He can attack the problem with all of the facilities at his command to attain sound and lasting solutions, or he can gloss it over as did his predecessors. If he should follow the latter course, he is apt to awaken on the morning of election day, 1972, with a message from the farmers of the nation, "Thou art weighed in the balances, and art found wanting."

I believe both the President and Secretary of Agriculture understand the urgent and vital need of a substantial increase in farm income and that agriculture must be restored to a sound economic basis.

Members of the House Agriculture Committee, on which I serve, are also acutely aware of the need for a solution to this critical problem. Achieving adequate farm income is the first necessary step in solving not only our rural problems but in a large way can contribute to the solution of the crisis in the cities.

Texas Politics by Rep. Malouf Abraham

We had a most inspiring ceremony this past week in a joint session. It was called to honor S/5 Clarence Sasser from Brazoria County. This young 21 year old Negro soldier is the first of his race from Texas to receive the Congressional Medal of Honor which President Nixon presented him earlier this month.

He was an unarmed medic and went to the rescue of a large group of wounded men although he was also shot through the legs. This young man was an inspiration to all of us. His brief speech was just right and you could hear all the people in the House trying to swallow the lumps in their throats.

Governor Smith came back again to propose some other sources of revenue to replace the Cavness plan. The tax on chemicals and cigarettes sounds fine to everyone except the industries involved. His proposal to increase moving traffic violations by \$10 has considerable opposition. We are now about half-way through this session-time-wise we are only about 15% work-wise. The Governor's Committee Education Bill will be heard in Committee this week--all 368 pages of it. This will take a lot of hours and the old saying about the mind being only able to absorb as much as the seat can stand will hold true with this hearing which will probably last 6 hours or more. We are still in good shape as far as the forced consolidation matter goes.

You don't have any idea how fortunate we are to live up where we do. When you hear all of these problems that other people in Texas have that we don't, you want to sigh with relief. Nearly every time I pick up a paper down here I see where they are either arresting or trying young people on dope charges--I mean down to kids as young as 15. There have been 22 soldiers from Fort Hood killed this year in traffic accidents. Hold-ups and shootings are too numerous to notice.

The season officially begins Monday, April 28.

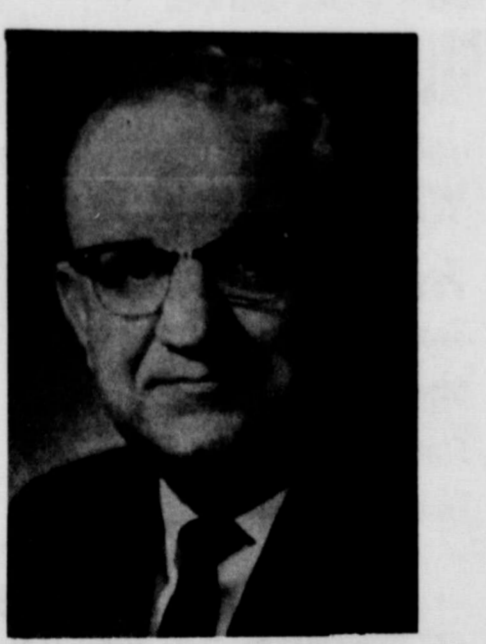
