Lee. These will be contenders in next year's Junior Bee while sixth graders winners will be eligible for the Senior Bee.

Lynx Golfers Win District

The Spearman Lynx golf team swept to the zone title in District 1-AA golf competition at the Huber Country Club in Borger Tuesday afternoon by downing teams from Phillips and Panhandle.

The Lynx A-team had a total score of 347 strokes. Phillips was second with 350 and Panhandle third with 364.

Coach Eddie Clemons said that his team will enter Regional competition at Lubbock April 19. If they could win there, the State play-offs at Austin would be next on the agenda the following week.

Junior Salinas, Lynx sophomore, won medalist honors for the best district score. He fired a 79 in the Tuesday match to lead all contestants.

Tony Harper, another sophomore, shot an 85 for third place medalist honors. Phil Windom, sophomore shot a 90, Pat Sloan, sophomore, a 93 and Jimmy Jackson, the only Junior on the team, shot 96. The four best scores were used.

The fourth best score Tuesday was a 91 shot by Freshman Art Lynch for his 18-hole match play. Art, a B-team player, is showing great improvement and Coach Clemons said he would probably get to play on the A-team in Regional competition.

Other B-team players, who entered singles competition were Fred Shield-knight with a 110 and Jay Holland with a 106.

VOTERS RETURN INCUMBENTS

Due to Easter vacation holidays, about half as many voters as usual turned out for Saturday's election to choose two Spearman School Board trustees, one County School Board trustee and three City Aldermen.

Only 235 people cast ballots in the City election. 311 votes were cast in the school trustee election.

Voters returned Jimmy Hicks, E. J. Callaway, Jr., and Bob Skinner to two-year terms on the City Council. They were all incumbents. Clarence Pettitt was the only contestant to file. Election results were: Hicks 194, Callaway 193, Skinner 179 and Pettitt 84.

In the race for school board trustees Hershel Jones, incumbent, and Bill Partridge were winners of the 5-man candidate list. They will serve three year terms. Partridge fills the post of Roy Lee McClellan whose term expired this year. He did not choose to run again.

Jones received 175 votes and Partridge 159. Dr. Wesley Garnett 136, Dr. H. B. Rinker 69 and Brad Beedy 67.

Over the county, three school trustees were named to the County Board. Dr. D. E. Hackley will serve for Precinct 1; Erlis Pittman for precinct four and Joe Walker for precinct 3.

All-Sports Banquet To Honor Athletes

Spearman High School Cheerleaders and sponsor Kay Bussard will stage the annual All Sports Banquet honoring all athletes of Spearman high school Saturday night. The banquet will be held at 8 p.m. in the high school cafeteria.

Guest speaker for the event will be Gene Wilson, a member of the Youth International organization. An outstanding basketball player, he was named to the all-state team for three years. Wilson, a Senior at the University of Texas at Arlington, is a ministerial student. He is a gifted speaker.

A number of awards will be given to outstanding athletes of Spearman high school this year who have finished an exceptional fine year with 7-3 record in football, as well as district, and bi-district winners in boy's basketball. In girl's basketball the school boasts district, bi-district, regional and state runner-up wins. The track, tennis and golf teams have won many honors and are expected to place well in the district meet this year.

Two Fighting Heart awards will be presented to outstanding athletes. These annual honors are bestowed by KBMF Radio station and the Spearman Jaycees.

Although the sports banquet is not open to the public, invitations have been issued and a full house is expected. The meal will be catered by Sutphens.

Cheerleaders have planned a "Highlights of '69" theme and will carry out this decor on banquet tables and throughout the entertaining rooms.

Entertainment will be provided by the high school Stage Band featuring Rosemary Burkhardt, soloist, and by the members of the Cheerleaders group.

Womble To Head County Golf Club

Only a small number of the total 115 members of Hansford Golf Club attended the annual meeting Monday night to choose new officers and directors for the coming year.

Anne Sanders presided in the absence of president Dr. D. E. Hackley and called for the nominating committee's report. Chairman Pete Fisher nominated Mack Mauldin, Charles Patton, Bus Simms and Granville Boyd as the slate from which two directors would be elected. Patton and Mauldin were elected to serve two year terms.

Members then elected L. M. Womble president, Anne Sanders secretary and Freeman Barkley as treasurer. These officers will serve one-year terms. Dr. Hackley, retiring president will serve as ex-officio member of the board.

Womble, having one more year to serve as a director, cannot serve both offices so members nominated Granville Boyd to fill his one-year unexpired term on the board. The other hold-over director is Don Smith.

Other business to come before the chair pertained to "play" on the course and members moved that the following two rules be enforced at once:

1. On weekends and holidays, no more than four players in one group will be allowed so that play would move faster.
2. Youngsters 12 years old and under will not be allowed to play on weekends and holidays unless accompanied by an adult.

The question arose concerning the proposed new Country Club and J. L. Brock, a member of the Board of Directors, reported that the land had been purchased and plans for the Club House and swimming pool were now in the hands of the architect.

Pete Fisher, reporting for absent treasurer Freeman Barkley, gave an itemized financial statement for the past year. Fisher reported a total of 115 members in the club with a bank balance of just over \$1,000. The club showed the year's income to be near \$21,000 with disbursements totaling near \$19,000.

A Spearman woman, Mrs. Gwenfred Lackey, has been chosen to reign over celebration festivities as Guymon's Pioneer Queen.

Wagons making the trip will come from Mobeetie, Borger, Perryton, Gruver, Spearman, as well as Fargo, Slap Out and Binger Oklahoma.

Mrs. Tom Etter, his aunt, and his grandmother Mrs. Gladys Richardson will attend the ceremonies.

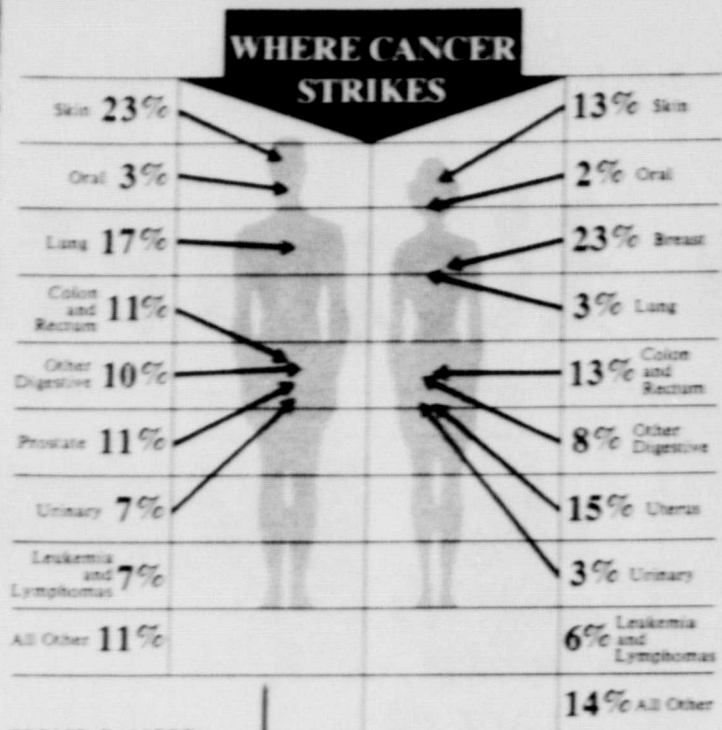


City Clean-up Week April 11-18

Mr. Talman was upset, she said, because he'd read that some professional actors were turning down assignments to make anti-smoking television spots for the Society lest they lose out on more lucrative tobacco commercials. "My husband has always been proud of being an actor," she said. "And now he's beginning to feel ashamed of the profession. He wants to do what he can to offset this situation."

Mr. Talman then got on the telephone to explain the impulsive nature of the call. "I've got lung cancer," he said, "and I don't know how much longer I've got to live."

A three-pack-a-day smoker for all of his adult life, he had the idea he might tell his personal story for television use as a warning to others. "Before I die," he explained, "I want to do what I can to leave a world free of cancer for my six children."

The result is a highly personal statement, in the form of a 60-second television "commercial," from a man thoroughly familiar to millions of Americans as a tough fighter who didn't quit easily.

The spot was released September 18, and within a month had been shown over all major TV networks. More than 500 prints had been ordered by ACS Divisions for distribution to local independent stations throughout the country. It has become the fastest-moving of any ACS anti-smoking spot--an overnight "hit" that its central figure never lived long enough to see.

The 53-year-old actor who had learned a year earlier that he had a large inoperable tumor in his right lung, died August 30 in West Valley Community Hospital at Encino. At his side were his wife and their four eldest children.

The commercial that he did was filmed at the Talman residence on July 17. There, without a written script, speaking his own thoughts and feelings, speaking from the heart, Mr. Talman in one day, made two films for the Society. One was a 60-second spot against smoking which has since received national publicity.

The actor first introduces Peggy and his children. The scene then shifts to Mr. Talman sitting next to a picture of Raymond Burr, who played Perry Mason. Mr. Tal-

man complains that Mr. Burr "used to beat my brains out on TV every week for about 10 years."

"You know, I didn't really mind losing those courtroom battles," the actor says, sitting on the arm of a black leather couch in front of the fireplace of his living room. "But I'm in a battle right now I don't want to lose at all because if I lose it, it means losing my wife and those kids you just met. I've got lung cancer."

"So take some advice about smoking and losing from someone who's been doing both for years," he adds. "If you haven't smoked--don't start. If you do smoke--quit. Don't be a loser."

Obviously in pain, Mr. Talman manages to smile once during the film session. The actor was under heavy sedation during the filming. During the morning while an ACS camera crew was filming the Talman family, the actor was at the hospital getting cobalt treatment.

Mr. Talman volunteered to make the commercial after reading newspaper accounts in July that the Society had experienced difficulty getting actors to appear in anti-smoking TV messages. The actors feared that cigarette sponsors would not consider them for commercials.

The production of such messages and their use by broadcasters have greatly in-

creased since June, 1967, when the Federal Communications Commission ruled that under the so-called "fairness doctrine," all broadcasters who carry cigarette advertising must also carry announcements and programs telling of the possible perils of smoking.

Between February 1964 and June 6, 1967, the Society distributed a total of 982 smoking spots. From June 6, 1967 until September 30, 1968, the number jumped to 8,864.

Mr. Talman also made a special short film to be shown to American Cancer Society volunteers for the April 1969 crusade. He tells them, "When I was a kid, eight or nine, my dad offered me \$1,000 and a gold watch if I would get to the age of 21 without smoking a cigarette. I lost that case before I was 12. Of all the cases in my whole life, that I've lost, of all the bets I've lost, of all the chances I've blown, that one I regret the most today."

Noting that his life was then being sustained by medical advances "made possible because 20 or 30 years ago people whose names I'll never know contributed money to the American Cancer Society..." he says, "Let me join you in spirit, in prayer, even if I'm gone when you see me speak these words to you. Let me join you in this Crusade and let's make this world a world that is cancer free."

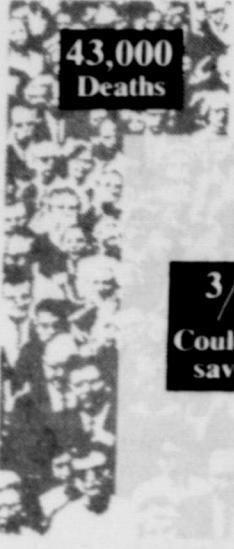

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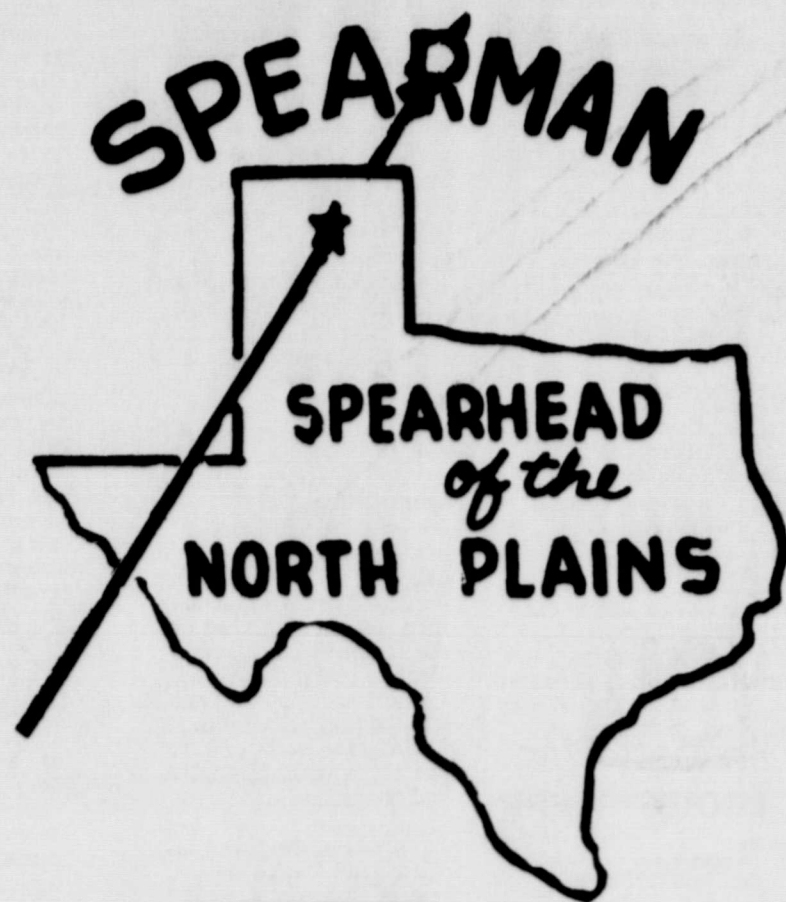

CANCER DRIVE IS SUNDAY

April is Cancer Control Month by Presidential proclamation. During the month of April the American Cancer Society conducts its annual educational and fund-raising Crusade.

There are 1,500,000 people in the United States who are alive and have been cured of cancer. The Hansford County Farm Bureau has set April 29 as the date for its annual beauty contest. The 8 P. M. show will be held in the High School Auditorium.

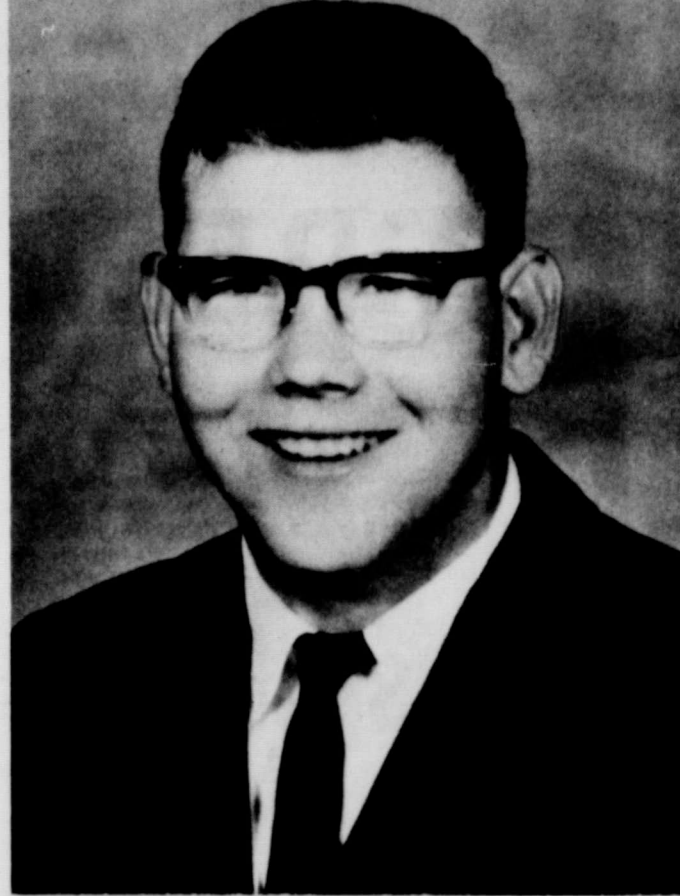
The winner of the local beauty contest will represent Hansford County at the District show.
