Mr. Castleman Slowly Improves

Spearman friends of the C. A. Castleman family will be glad to hear that Mr. Castleman, injured last week in a tractor-plover accident, is slowly improving.

Mr. and Mrs. Castleman are former Spearman residents.

Mr. Castleman, 85, was severely injured in a farm accident some 10 days ago when he was thrown from a tractor and dragged 20 yards by a one-way plow. The accident occurred on his farm 2 miles north of Canyon. His son, Brad, was with him and witnessed the accident. Brad drove up to the field where his father was plowing just before the mishap. The elder Castleman saw him and stopped the tractor, and, somehow, must have engaged the clutch and was thrown backwards off the tractor in front of the plow. The son ran after the tractor and got it stopped. "I finally got my father out from under the plow but I could not lift him", Brad said. Two passing motorists saw the accident and stopped. One stayed with Brad while the other went for an ambulance.

Mr. Castleman was taken directly to Northwest Hospital by ambulance where he remains this week recuperating from a broken jaw bone, severe head lacerations, fracture of the left arm and severe injury of the left shoulder, fracture of seven ribs and lung injuries. The Castlemans have lived in Canyon since 1951, when they moved from Spearman.

Work On Feed Lots Progresses Rapidly

If you have noticed some strange faces in Spearman and Gruver lately, it's quite possible you've been seeing some of the people engaged in the construction of the two Caprock feed lots in Hansford County.

Caprock Industries--one of the largest beef producing firms in the entire Southwest--is progressing rapidly in the construction of a network of feedlots in Hansford County that will handle at least 90,000 head of cattle at one time.

There is little doubt that you will be seeing more and more strange faces as time goes on for this giant enterprise presently requires a lot of skilled workmen such as welders, sheet metal men, ditchers, bull dozer operators and many others. (See page ad in this issue.)

Soil Moisture Favorable

COLLEGE STATION--With an adequate supply of soil moisture in nearly all areas of the state, now is the time to be seeding rangelands to restore forage production, says Dan Rodgers, Extension range specialist at

Texas A&M University. The Trans-Pecos region is about the only area that is now short of soil moisture, he adds.

Seeding with native grasses following mechanical brush control is an effective means of achieving long-term reduction of brush density, said Rodgers. Texas county agricultural agents in 1968 conducted 2,000 result demonstrations throughout the state on 75,000 acres resulting in successful establishment on 76 percent of the demonstration areas, noted the specialist.

Yet this large acreage in seeding demonstrations represented only 10 percent of the acreage where brush was controlled mechanically as cooperative extension result demonstrations, he said.

Years of research plus the trial-and-error efforts of progressive ranchers show that all dense, brush-covered ranges without a natural seed source of better grasses must be artificially seeded to assure rapid restoration of forage production. Good

grazing management alone can make little progress without a seed source of good grasses. Thus, new seeds must be planted and the area deferred to assure seedling establishment, emphasized Rodgers.

The range specialist pointed out the importance of observing certain, well-established principles to assure successful grass seeding, following mechanical brush control.

He noted the use of good quality seed, planted at the proper time and depth, are among the most important considerations. Controlling competitive plants and planting on a weed-free firm seedbed also help improve the chances of a successful stand establishment.

Deferring grazing until seedlings are well established is important to insure restoration of the rangeland, he said.

Broadcasting of grass seed following rootplowing can be a successful method of seeding, especially if the land is dragged

Cong. Price Introduces Bill To Repeal Gun Control Act

Panhandle Congressman Bob Price introduced a bill today to repeal the Gun Control Act of 1968. He had previously sponsored another bill to eliminate ammunition registration.

"I opposed this legislation when it was enacted and still believe it violates the constitutional rights of the individual citizen to own and bear arms," Price said.

"I voted against the bill in its original form as it was passed by the House and again after it had been amended by the Senate and gutted by a House and Senate Conference Committee," Price said.

"The bill was the result of a wave of misguided emotionalism and a surrender to the bleeding hearts who believe that registering the guns of peaceful and law-abiding citizens will have any effect on the crime rate or act as a deterrent to any criminal who owns or wants to own and use a fire-

arm."

"There is no evidence that even suggests that the present requirements are making any significant contribution to the fight against the criminal use of firearms," Price said. "The new law has only subjected law-abiding citizens to harassment and inconvenience not to mention storekeepers and legitimate gun dealers who have been injured or put out of business."

"The Federal Firearms Act, which this bill would restore, had all of the safeguards of the Gun Control Act as far as deterrence of criminal ownership or use of firearms," Price said. "And, that is the only basis I can see for any firearms legislation."

The heel steals part of the limelight, as it continues to climb. It is chunky and most often between 1 1/2 and 2 inches high. Toelins are softer, concentrating on wide rounded shapes with an occasional clear-cut square look for tailored wear.

The spectator is spring and found in all-black patent leather with colored scallop and combinations of colors and leathers. Slings, two piece strap pumps, flats and backless mule shoes show the spectator influence.

This spring, color comes clean and clear in footwear. Soft pastels such as apricot whip, yellow, aqua and dawn pink have no haziness in them. TEXAS POLITICS

I'm writing this at the end of the week and it seems like Monday was about two weeks ago. We took up the House Appropriations bill and it wasn't really too bad a bill. However, there were a number of items in there that I didn't like and we tried to make some changes without success.

It's smaller than the Senate bill so now a Conference Committee of five members from each house will work out the differences. It will be real interesting to see just what comes out. I remember last session that they came up with about 30 million dollars more money and a bunch of things that were not in either of the bills.

We had a rough day Wednesday which included a 5-hour Revenue & Taxation Committee hearing on the proposed chemical tax. We had something like 34 people appear from all types of industry including a number of farmers. I think that this bill won't get anywhere either.

That's the funny thing---not really funny---that very few of the tax bills we have heard so far have much chance of passing as presented. But the fact still remains that we are going to have to figure out some way to come up with a bunch. Maybe next week I can have a little more to say about taxes and the teachers pay raise.

Now, let's talk about the amendment to allow Liquor-by-the-Drink on a local option basis. You may remember that I have given you quite a bit of information about this proposal and it has been a real difficult decision with lots of pressure. They needed 100 votes on final reading to pass it. Wednesday they got 95 votes and then with a lot of work they wound up with 101 votes Thursday.

The amendment will be voted on in November 1970. If it passes, which it probably will do, the Legislature will enact the regulations and then it will be legal only in those Counties that vote to have it. So, it will be about 2 years before it might become effective.

GMO'S ARREST 742 VIOLATORS

AUSTIN--Game management officers for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department cleared 742 violations during March, and the State's portion of the money received was \$14,971.

Hunting violations totaled 235. There were 199 fishing violations, 193 being for fishing without a license.

There were 28 commercial fishing violations, 68 water safety violations, and five trespassing violations. Disposition of cases include: convicted, 535; dismissed, 109; served time in jail, two; appealed to higher court, three; fine suspended, three; money retained by county, 7; not guilty, one; juvenile, 12; and void, six.

Helicopters To Aid State Police Units

AUSTIN--A new dimension in versatility for the Department of Public Safety will soon begin with the launching of five new helicopters which will join two others already in operation and be available for any type of emergency mission that might arise.

Col. Pat Speir, DPS director, said today that three of the new craft have been delivered and two others are expected to arrive in April. The federal government, as a result of its interest in law enforcement, has approved sharing with the state the cost of purchasing and operating them.

Speir said the DPS initially became interested in helicopters two years ago and leased a pair of two-place aircraft. After some experimentation with them, he said, they proved to be very valuable tools for various types of emergency work, and were purchased by the Department.

"The DPS is very desirous of expanding its services to the people of this state and to the city police departments and Sheriff's departments,"

Speir said. "We feel this is a splendid opportunity to provide them with better and more versatile service. It is seldom a day passes that we don't receive a request for assistance in an incident in which a helicopter can be very useful, such as looking for lost persons, rescue operations, and so forth. We plan to station these aircraft strategically over the state so they will be more readily available when needed."

The main thrust of the new program, Speir continued, is to increase the capabilities of the DPS in all phases of emergency and law enforcement work, particularly mercy missions such as the rapid transfer of injured persons, when feasible, from limited treatment centers to hospitals with more sophisticated facilities.

Gov. Proclaims Nursing Home Week

The Honorable Preston Smith, Governor of Texas, has proclaimed May 11-17, 1968, as Texas Nursing Home Week and urged citizens to visit a nursing home and acquaint themselves with the patients, the staff, the facilities, the services rendered, and the progress and potential for the future.

In the proclamation, he stated that nursing homes will have broadened their potential for service and have been on an increasing role in the health care of the chronically ill, the aged and the convalescent of all ages. Nursing homes today are not only medical, nursing and personal care, but also provide rehabilitation, recreation, occupational therapy, and spiritual programs designed to provide a "full life" for senior citizens.

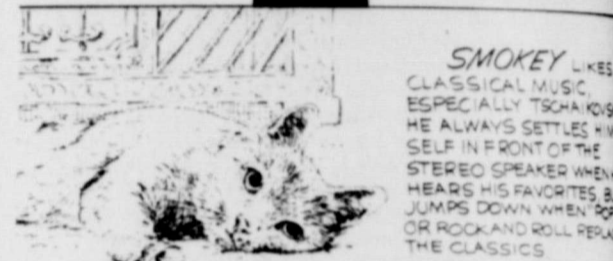

Lumber Leader Explains Prices

HOUSTON--What's behind the fluctuation in lumber and plywood prices?

"Federal indecision on lumber standards, the East Coast dock strike, federal policies on timber owned by government, a 1921 law called 'The Jones Act' said T. M. Orth, Houston lumber leader. He is Vice President and General Manager of Kirby Lumber Co. 'The Department of Commerce has delayed action on lumber standards for a couple of years, action which could mean more efficient use of lumber in construction,' Orth said.

'The East Coast dock strike has been settled, but for weeks it tied up some 200 million feet of lumber,' said Orth.

'The federal agencies own 60 percent of the softwood sawtimber in the nation,' Orth said. 'They won't sell near as much as their harvest-

ing policies permit. The harvesting of softwood sawtimber on federal lands is only nine-tenths of one percent of the inventory, whereas industry land yields 3.5 percent annually.'

Orth said the U. S. has a wealth of timber. 'We're growing 60 percent more than we're using,' he said. 'But not near enough of it is available to make into building and other forest products.'

U. S. Forest Service Chief Edward P. Cliff has testified that production from federal timberland can be increased substantially--through intensive land management policies, and sustained appropriations for the Forest Service in support of the policies.

The Jones Act forces U. S. firms to ship (if by boat) to U. S. points in U. S. ships. Our shipping rates are considerably higher than those for foreign ships, said Orth.

The weather on the West Coast has been miserable for months, hampering logging, production and shipping of lumber and plywood," Orth said. "The West Coast produces the majority of lumber and plywood in the U. S."

Orth said the forest industry, through 19 regional and national associations, has asked for better management of government forests, for amendment of the Jones Act and for quick action by the Department of Commerce on lumber standards.

'The forest industry owns just 17 percent of the softwood sawtimber in the nation,' Orth said. 'Yet, because the industry practices intensive use through scientific forestry, it harvests more than two and a half times as much from its lands as does the federal government. And the timber managed by industry has a better growth rate.'

The forest industry also manages its land for maximum production of wild-life, Orth said. 'More than 95 percent of the industry land is open for public recreation,' he said.

One program which will mean more to forest growth in the South is development of breeds of "superior trees," Orth said. "These are products of forest genetics research on a cooperative basis by industry, the government agencies and the schools of forestry," he said. "There already are millions of super seedlings in production which will blanket the South with bigger and better trees in a few more years."

Another program, due to get underway soon, will follow recommendations of the "Southern Forest Resource Analysis." "Two years of research have gone into this program supported by Forest Farmers Assn., Southern Pine Assn.,' Orth said. "The recommendations based on the analysis will benefit the South's one million small forest owners."

Orth said the South's forest industries must get a majority of their timber from the non-government, non-forest industry owners. "These owners control 141 million acres of the 198 million acres of commercial timberland in the region," he said. "There is a pressing need for better management of most of this timber."

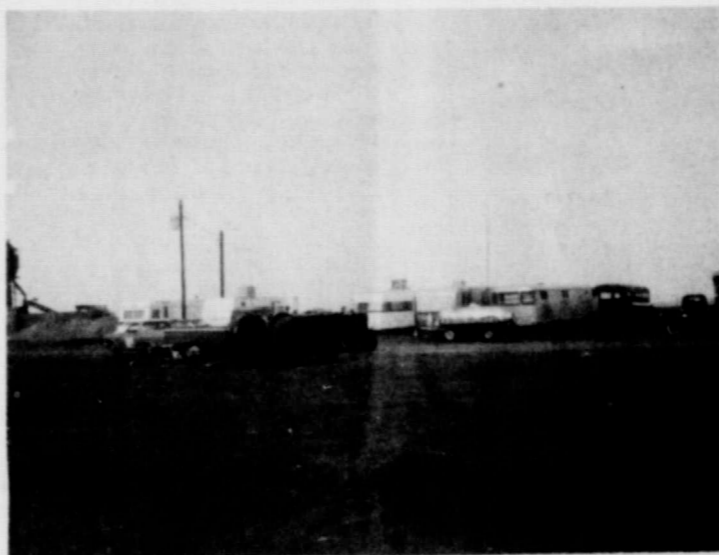

Accent on Health

Do you gamble with your life when you head out onto a city street or highway in your automobile?

You may be doing just that if you don't hook up your seat belt, says the Texas State Department of Health.

Prevention of accidents is a function of the Health Department through the Division of Civil Defense and Traffic Safety.

With summer vacations just ahead, now is the time to start thinking about safety and working toward good seat belt habits.

Traffic claimed 3,481 persons in Texas last year and the injury total was placed at 216,972.

Nationally, 53,100 persons were reported killed in traffic accidents in 1967, last full reporting year. Of these victims, 35,300 were drivers or passengers in automobiles. If all these persons had been using safety belts, the National Safety Council estimates that at least 8,000 to 10,000 of them would still be alive.

Some people feel they don't need safety belts for low speed, "neighborhood" driving. But studies show that nearly half of all fatal accidents occur at impact speeds of 40 miles per hour or less and that three-fourths of all traffic accidents happen within 25 miles of home.

The main advantage to wearing a safety belt is that it can help prevent the "second collision" when car occupants are thrown around inside the vehicle during an accident.

After the car stops suddenly, people without safety belts continue traveling in the direction the car was moving and ordinarily strike part of the interior. The driver moves forward in a seated position. His legs which are sometimes trapped under him may be turned, twisted and fractured. His abdomen and chest may strike the steering wheel and column. His head may hit the windshield or his face strike the steering wheel.

The right front seat passenger, who doesn't have the steering wheel before him, crashes into the windshield and instrument panel during a collision. Safety belts can minimize such collisions inside the car.

In a crash, safety belts can also keep you in your car, thus increasing your chance of survival by five times.

Along with the use of safe-

ty belts, the State Health Department advises the use of safe driving habits. Don't drive while drinking or while sleepy or tired. Obey all traffic laws and don't speed to reach your destination sooner. Be especially alert and slow down at night or in bad weather.

SMALL CRAFTS LIMITED

A boat should be used for the purpose it was built. Pleasure, racing and fishing crafts are all constructed differently, each having its limitations. PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows:

"Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and be in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law.

(b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the

Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto.

(c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b.

(d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution.

(e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

Automated Patient Care

While medicine is making stirring efforts to save lives through heart transplants, a dramatic advance has been made toward day by day patient care through the use of unique dictating equipment developed by Nye Systems of Seattle, Washington.

With the need to make reports at almost any time of the day or night by doctors, nurses and administrators, which required transcription for both present and future reference, information on patients was frequently unavoidably delayed. Too, often, because of the need to transport dictating discs, tapes and belts, reports were actually lost.

The Nye System, already installed in 1,000 hospitals throughout the country, is the first unit ever to provide the facility of simultaneous dictation and transcription. The system contains a sealed unit which automatically records the reports and erases them after they are transcribed. When the doctor is ready to dictate, he simply picks up a handset, presses a button and starts talking. At the same time, an "alert" flashes on at a Transcriber Station, and transcribing can start immediately, with the typist keeping within seconds of the speaker. As long as the light stays on, there's work to be done. When it goes off, everything is transcribed. (NP Features)

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR4)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR31)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legis-

lature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

(3) Needy blind persons;

(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate.

The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws

making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments only out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year.

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes.

"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to

the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of the Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer or to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting "FOR" or "AGAINST" the proposition: "The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy disabled, and the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be paid per year from state funds for assistance only; allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care."

CAN SAVE TAX DOLLARS

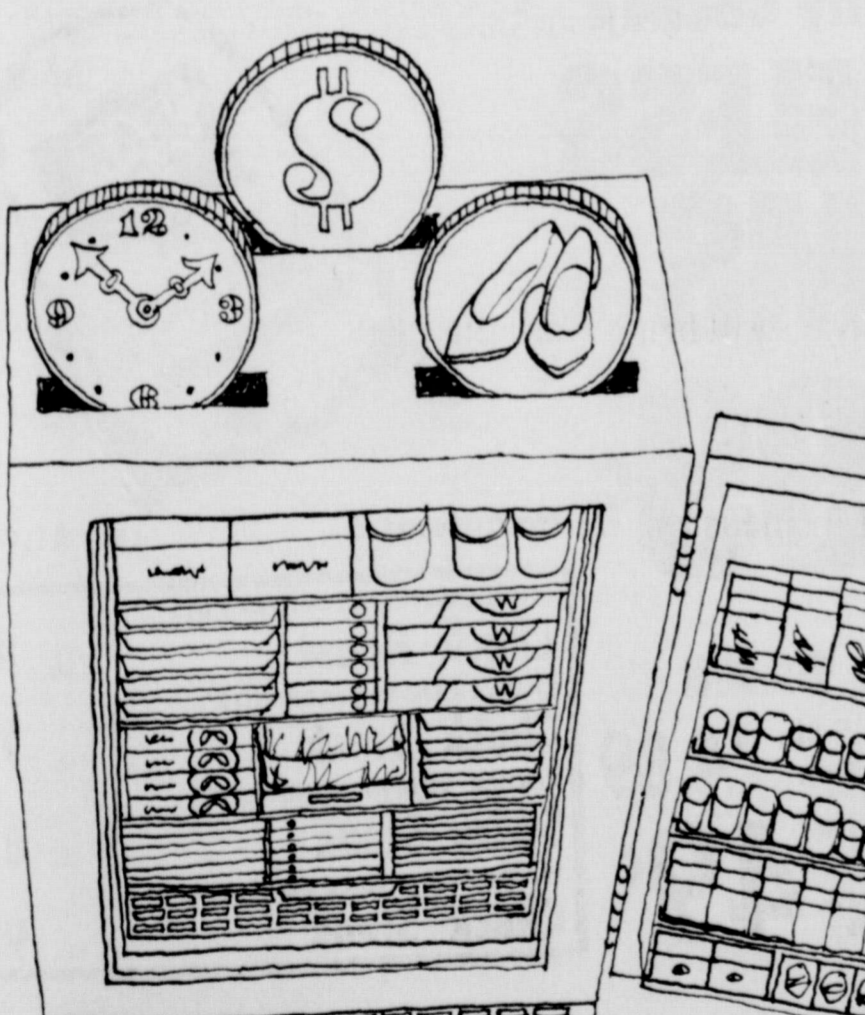
(Dallas, Texas)--Taxpayers can save themselves tax dollars at income tax filing time by keeping good records throughout the year.

Those who maintain good records are less likely to overlook deductions to which they are entitled, Mr. Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue in Northern Texas, said.

A good system for keeping records is to get a supply of large envelopes or folders, label them according to the types of income and deductions you have, and accumulate the information, Mr. Campbell said.

Taxpayers who itemize their deductions on Form 1040 must have available cancelled checks, receipts, statements and other data to support the claimed deductions.

Mr. Campbell said that, in addition to saving tax dollars, good record keeping makes preparation of the tax return a much easier task.

Who Pays For What In Automobile Accidents

DALLAS--The question of who pays for what in highway accidents has faced motorists since the days when horseless carriages brought drivers and owners of frightened livestock into violent confrontations.

In recent years, society has decreed that individuals had better be able to pay for damage they cause to others on the highways or lose their driving privileges. Every state now has regulations which make it very prudent for motorists to carry some sort of liability insurance or be able to prove they can pay in some other way for the damage they cause.

Texas is about average in its financial responsibility requirements. It is among the 40 states in the U. S. which require that every driver be responsible for up to \$10,000 for bodily injury he causes to one person, up to \$20,000 for bodily injury he causes to more than one per-

son in the same accident, and up to \$5,000 for property damage he may cause in each auto accident. These financial responsibility requirements are usually abbreviated in the following way: While these are the basic limits in Texas, the Insurance Information Institute points out that motorists may purchase liability coverage up to 100/300/50 for an additional premium.

Texas is among the leaders requiring a new development in automobile insurance that provides further protection for the liability insurance buyer, the Institute said. He must be offered what is called uninsured motorists coverage.

This coverage enables the buyer to collect from his own insurance company if he or his family suffer damages legally attributed to an irresponsible driver who cannot pay. This also protects him if he is injured by an auto-

mobile when he is walking or riding a bicycle or if he is injured by a hit-and-run driver. He is protected just as if he were injured by someone who did have basic limits of liability insurance.

While this coverage must be offered the insurance buyer in Texas, the Institute said, any policyholder may refuse by written notice.

Most drivers also carry collision and comprehensive insurance. These coverages protect the motorist from losses resulting from damage to his own car. Such damage may be caused by collision--running into a tree for instance--or fire, theft, vandalism, floods and many other perils.

Another widely used insurance protection provides medical coverage for the driver and his passengers, up to the limits stated in the policy.

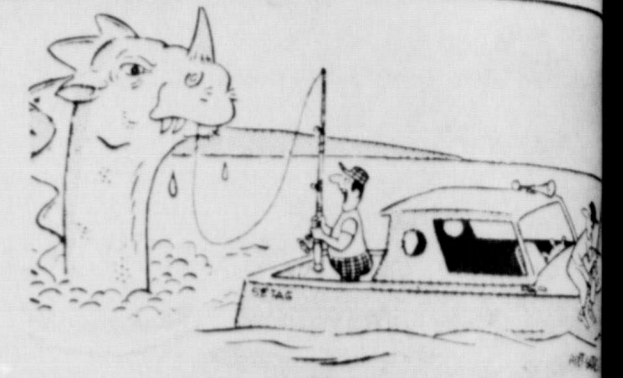
