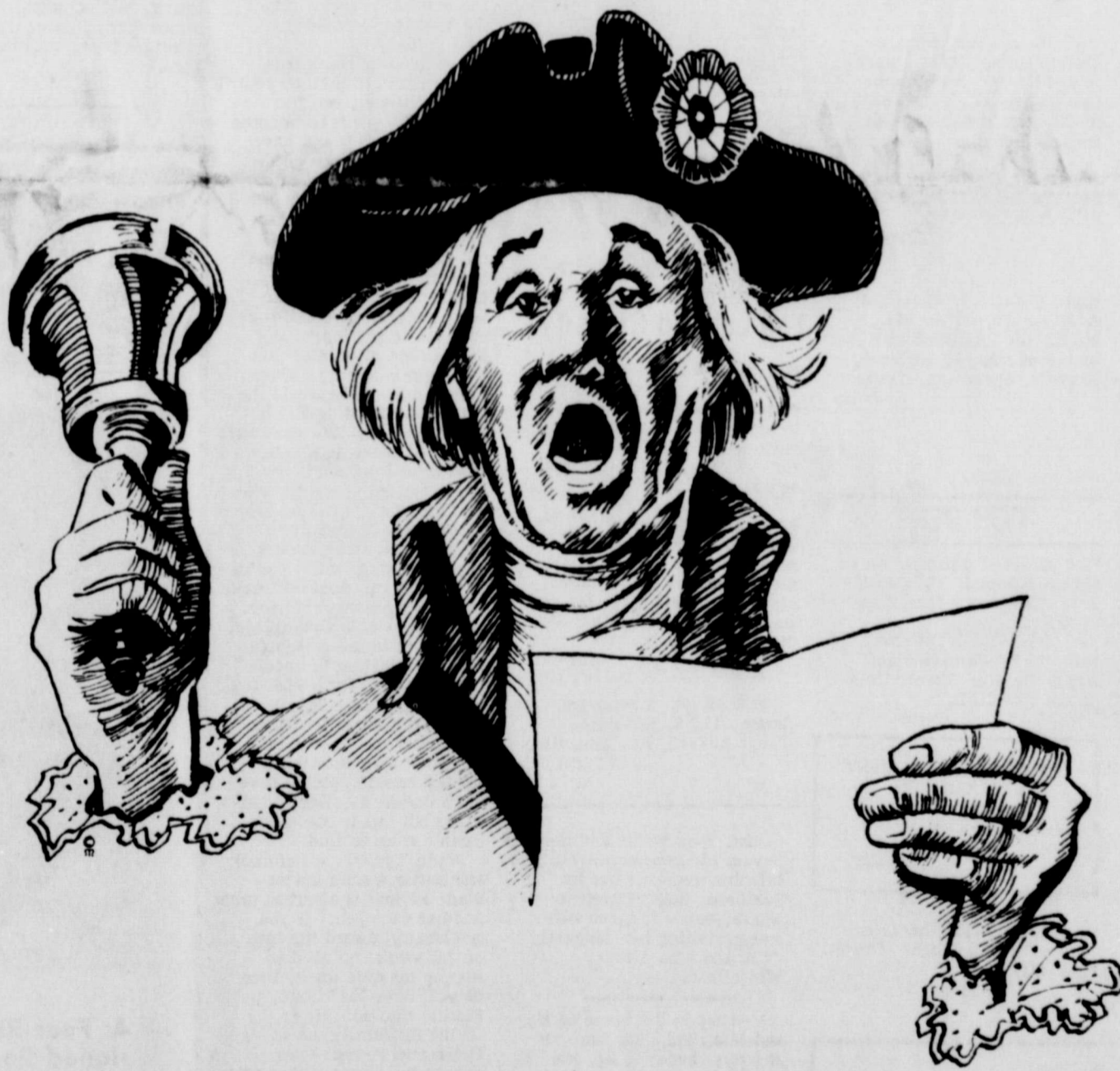

BUILDING PERMITS TOTAL \$162,161.00

Building permits in the Spearman area for the first six months of the year total \$162,161.00. Of this sum was \$44,301.00 for school and church buildings and business additions, \$11,660.00 for remodeling, \$14,200.00 for new dwellings, \$1,000.00 for a building permit for a garage addition at 18 S. Barkley, Ed Mundy builder, at a cost of \$2,000.00 and one at 115 S. Archer for \$700.00 took care of April's remodeling permits.

Beckwith Enterprises took out a building permit totaling \$3,500.00 for a moved-in dwelling located on North Brandt St.

The only home permit issued in April was for a \$42,000.00 residence listing Travis Davis buyer. The 3959 sq. ft. dwelling is located at 1100 S. Bernice St., Robert B. Knight, dba Knight Lbr. Co., builder.

May permits listed a \$150.00 storage building for 108 N. Hazelwood.

In June, Beckwith Enterprises moved in another home. The 1,000 sq. ft. dwelling, \$7,500.00, is located at 223 Brandt St.

W. B. Seitz, 900 S. Barkley St., applied for a permit to construct a \$750.00 storage house.

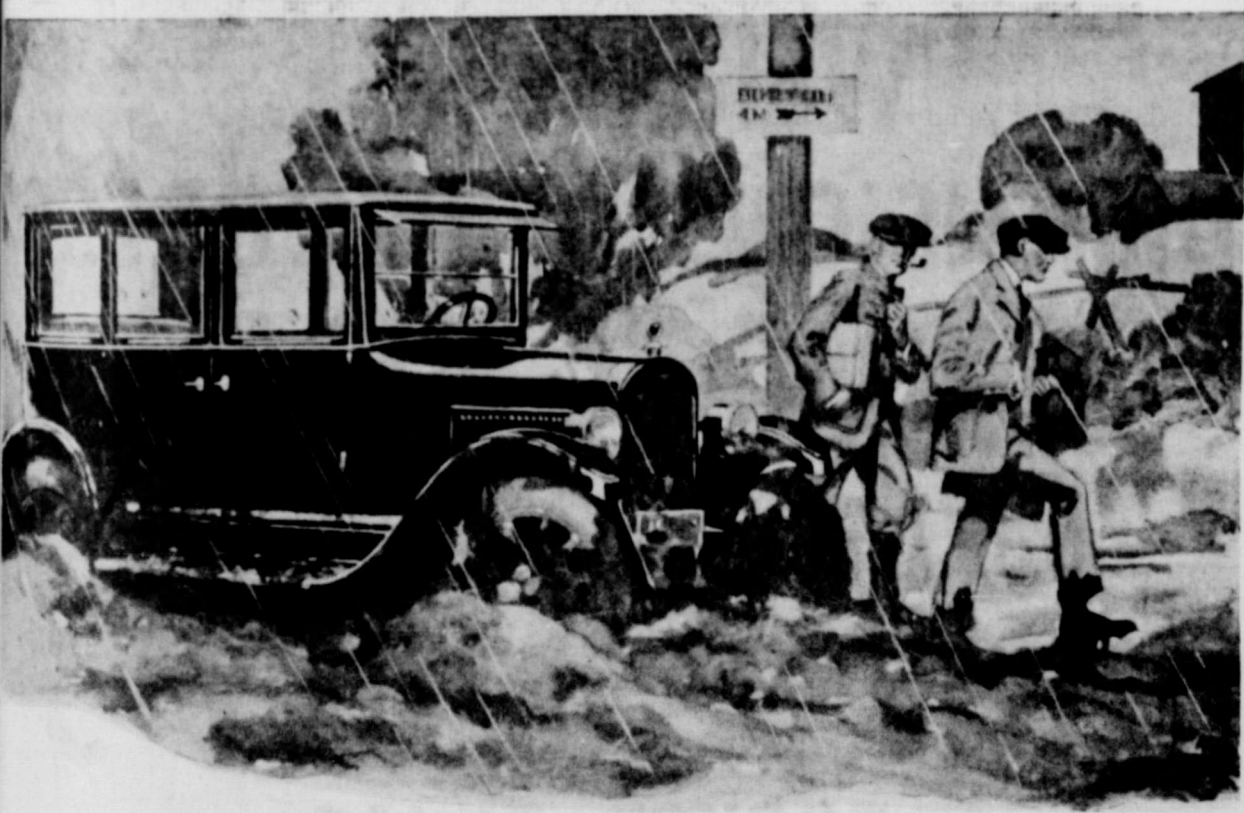
The victim is survived by his wife, a son, his parents, two brothers and a sister.

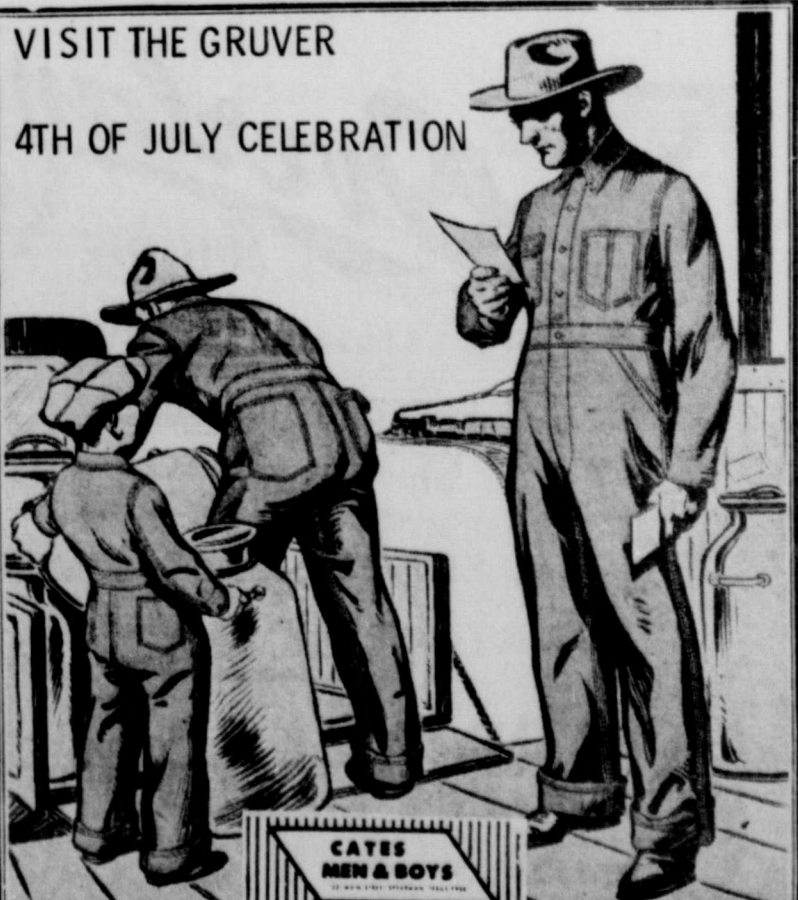

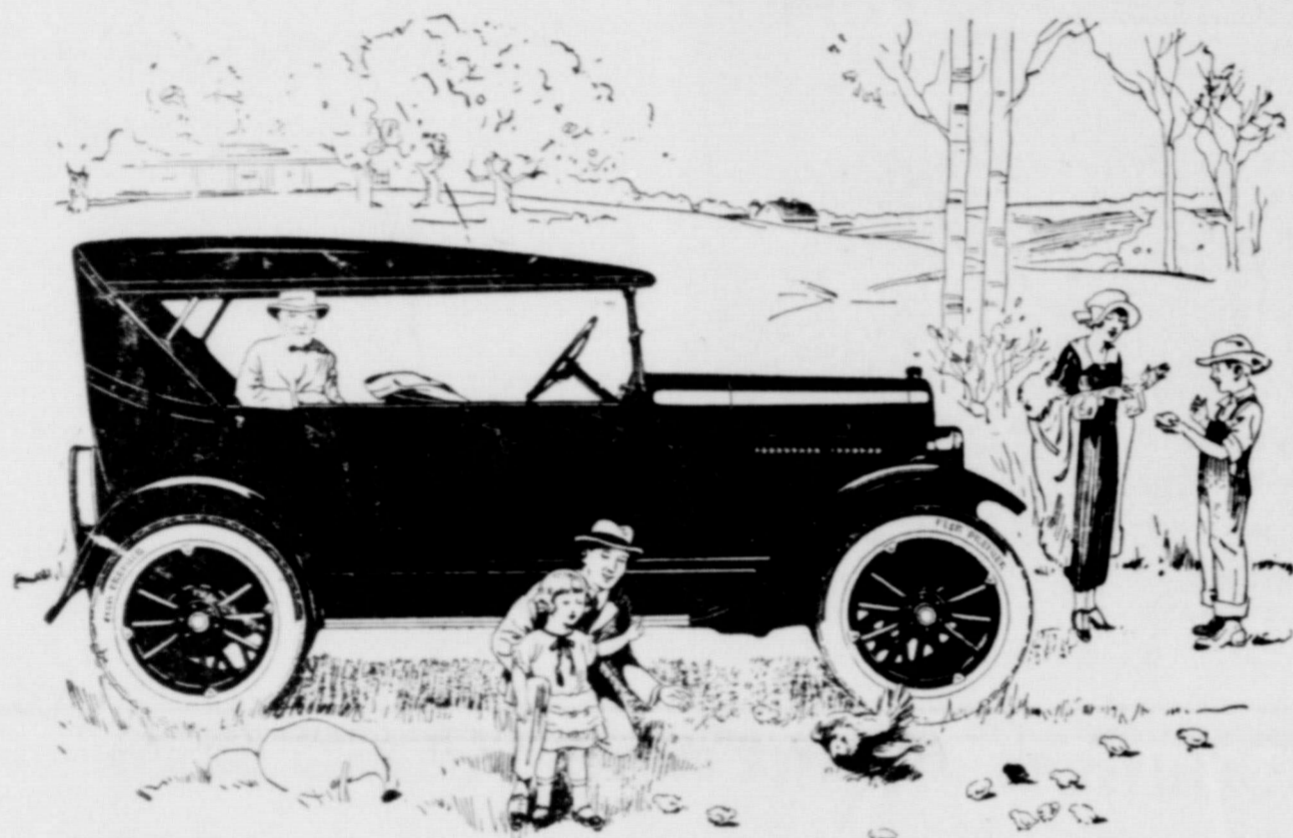

Harvest Complete

According to the final bulletin issued June 30 by the Wheat Harvest control office, harvest in the area should be completed by July 4.

In the Spearman and Perryton areas, custom crews have left the area and the few remaining fields will be completed by local combines.

The weather has been ideal for harvesting during the past 10 days with no shortage of men nor machines.

According to the bulletin, dryland wheat averaged 20 bushels and irrigated wheat over 40 bushels per acre in the Pampa, Wheeler, Miami and Canadian regions.

Yields were good in the Silvertown, Tulia and Plainview area also, with irrigated wheat averaging 40 bushels and dryland 16 bushels per acre.

Hansford County harvested its best and in most cases the only dryland crop in some 10 years with the average holding at 25-30 bushels per acre, and irrigated averaging around 47 bushels.

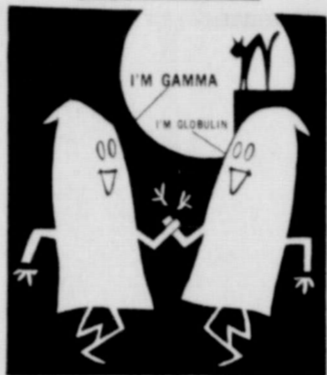

DISTINGUISHED STUDENTS AT TEXAS A & M

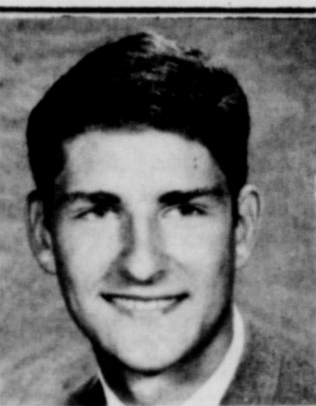
COLLEGE STATION--- Two Spearman youths have been named Distinguished Students at Texas A & M University, announced Dr. Horace R. Byers, academic vice president.

Copenhagen, Bonn, and Berlin.

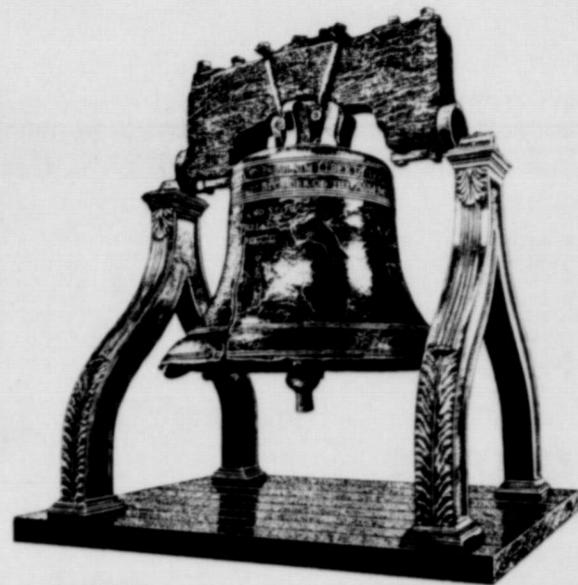
According to Joe, he will be available for agricultural meetings and service clubs following the completion of the tour.

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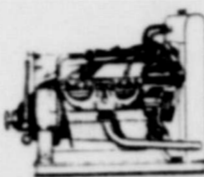
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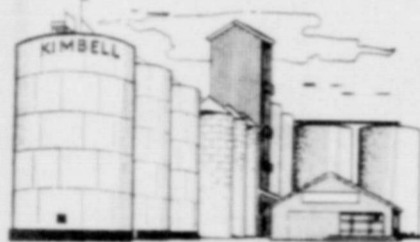

Everyone is invited to the July 4 celebration which will be staged at the City Park.

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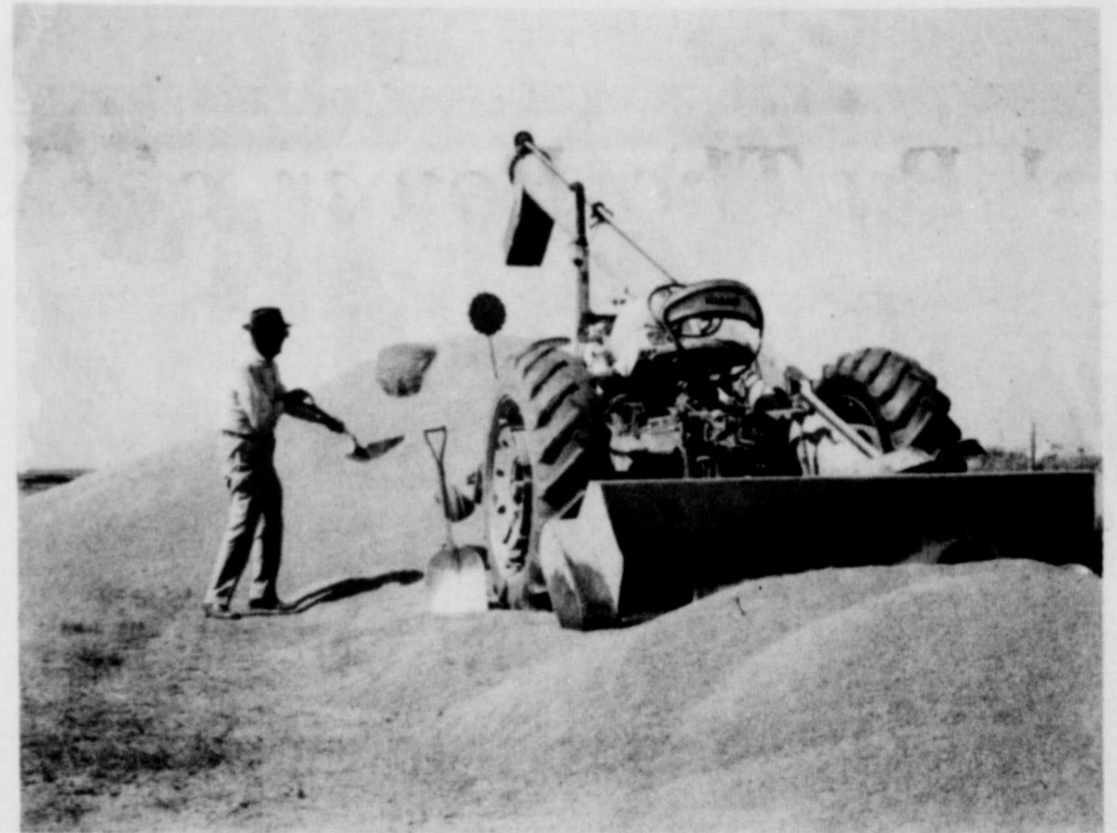

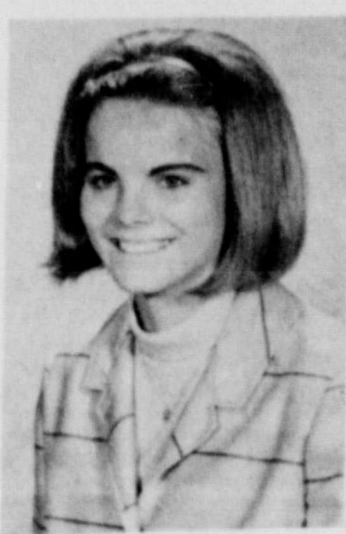

4th Of July Traffic Toll To Be Heavy

AUSTIN--Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today the DPS Statistical Services Bureau estimates that 34 persons will be fatally injured in traffic accidents in Texas during

the 78-hour July 4 holiday period.

The holiday period is considered to run from 6 p. m. Thursday, July 3, to midnight Sunday, July 6. During this time, the Department of Public Safety will activate a special "Operation Motorcade" and will place all available uniformed patrolmen on duty to enforce traffic laws in an effort to reduce accidents and assist motorists.

Speir urged all Texans to plan their holiday trips so as to allow ample time to drive without speeding or driving too fast for conditions. He also cautioned motorists to watch out for pedestrians, especially on beaches and parks, during the holiday period.

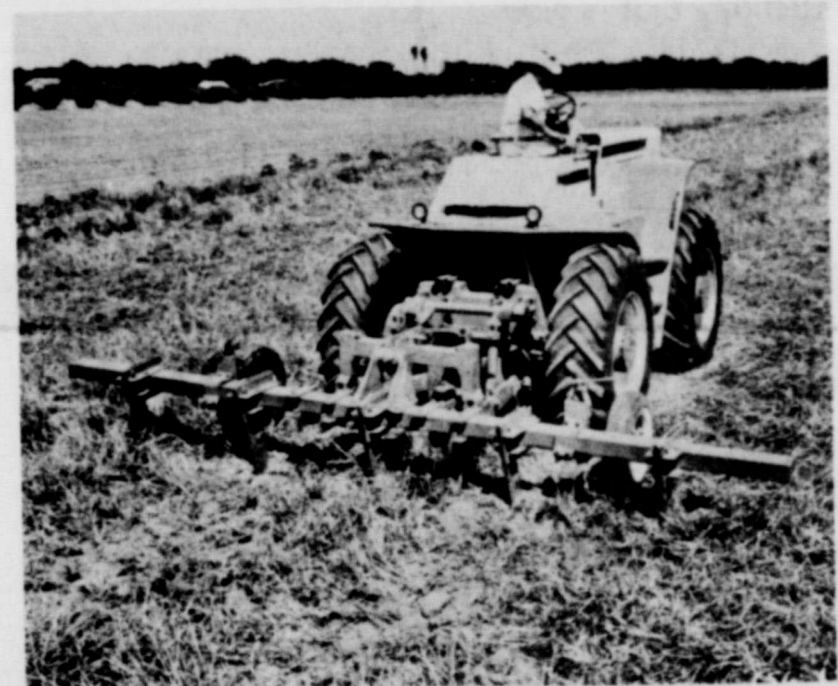
The DPS director also warned that the department will vigorously enforce state laws relating to driving while intoxicated.

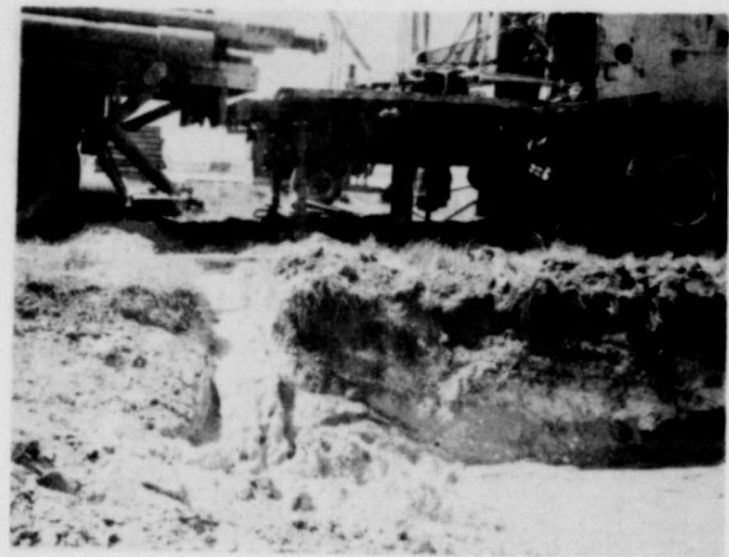

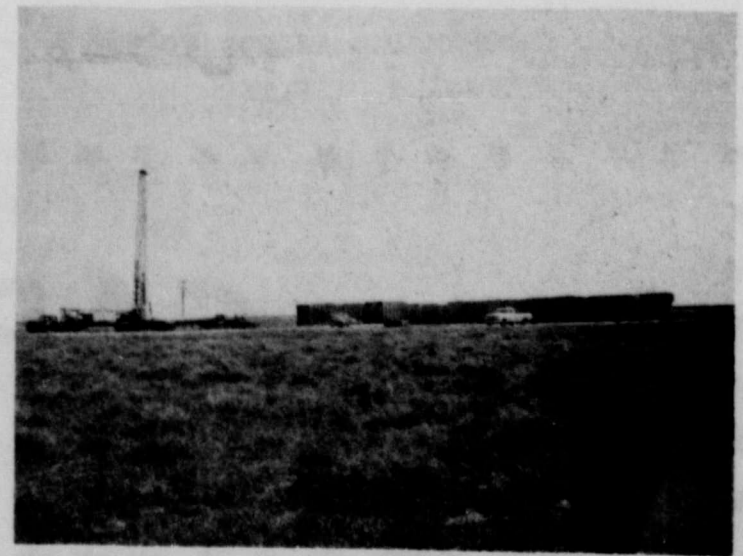

Foundation being readied for one of the largest feed mills in Texas at Hansford Feedyards.

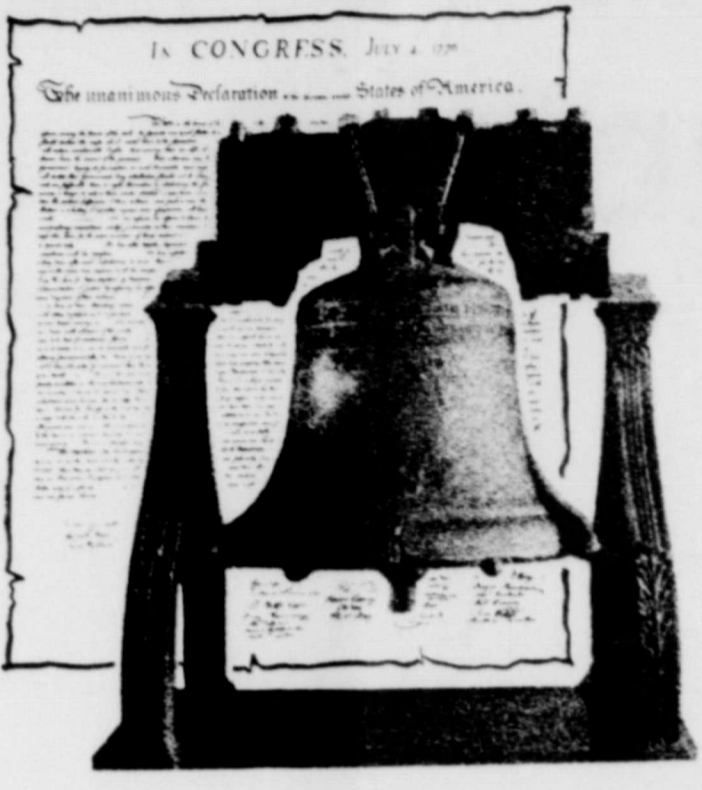


Like a dinosaur of the deep, a mechanical shovel prepares the foundation for 14 bunker feed mill at Hansford Feedyards, near Spearman.

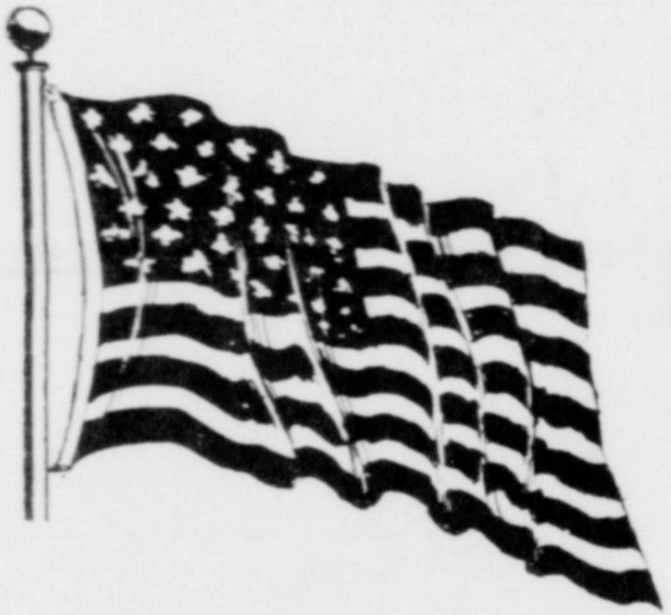

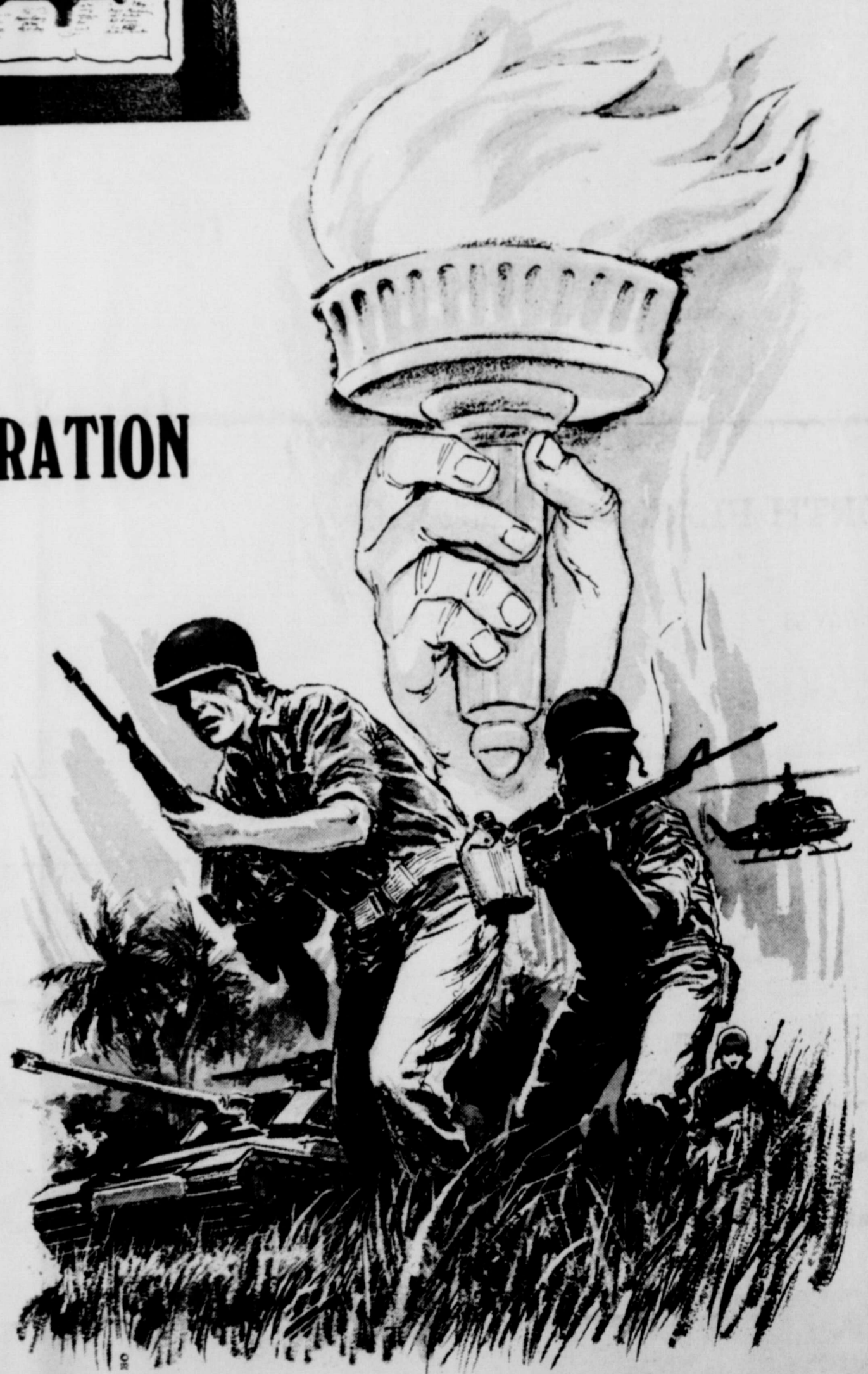
