### Authors & Publishers From Across Nation Meeting Here With Textbook Committee

Mr. Gene Barkowsky and his textbook committee of advisors who have been at work since last May selecting State textbooks for 1970-71, are in the final phase of their work.

Beginning Aug. 4, Mr. Barkowsky and his committee of advisors will meet each morning for 10 days with textbook publishers, authors, editors and consultants from across the nation.

Held in the Elementary school building in Spearman, the "Round Robin" is for the purpose of hearing publishers present their materials.

Come September 1, all advisors will have selected books they think best for Texas students. Gene Barkowsky will take these recommendations to the Texas Education Agency in Austin on Sept. 1 where he will meet with 14 other members to vote on books in all subject areas.

Barkowsky, who spoke to Spearman Lions club mem-

bers Tuesday noon, said this had been one of the busiest, educational, and most rewarding summers he had ever spent. "It is a tremendous responsibility," he said, "but I have worked with the greatest group of advisors and administrators in the State."

These teachers have been selecting books in the subject matter listed.

### Water Wins Big In Area

Approximately one-seventh of the qualified voters in Hansford County turned out to give their stamp of approval to five of the nine Constitutional Amendments in Tuesday's election. Only 306 persons voted.

The Texas Water plan got an overwhelming endorsement from County voters who approved it 237 - 77. Other amendments which voters approved were: Exempting property of non-profit water supply companies from taxation; Raising state welfare ceiling from \$60 million to \$80 million annually; extend survivor benefits for hazardous duty deaths; and assure continuance of student loan program.

Amendment No. 4, exempting non-profit water supply companies from taxation, carried in this county by only 3 votes, 153-150.

Voters turned down an appeal to amend obsolete sections of the Constitution. Other amendments Hansford County voters turned thumbs down to were: No. 3-Raising Legislative salaries; No. 6-a proposition which would allow for raised interest rates on bonds by removing constitutional limits; and No. 9-providing for Annual sessions of the Legislature.

**SOMETHING SPECIAL FOR A PICNIC**  
Cinnamon Frosted Raisin Bars - Moist and chewy raisin-filled oatmeal bars are so easy to make, easy to take for a picnic at home ... or in the park!

**CINNAMON FROSTED RAISIN BARS**  
1 cup margarine  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
3/4 cup sugar  
3 cups sifted regular all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup evaporated milk  
1-1/2 teaspoons vinegar  
3 cups uncooked rolled oats  
Raisin Filling  
Cinnamon Icing  
Cream margarine with vanilla in a medium size mixing bowl. Add sugar a little at a time and cream well. Sift flour together with soda and salt. Add vinegar to evaporated milk and stir to mix. Add flour mixture to sugar mixture alternately with evaporated milk, beginning and ending with flour. Stir in oats. Spread half of mixture in a thin layer in a greased 11-3/4 x 7 1/2 x 1-3/4 inch pan. Spread with cooled

**RAISIN FILLING.** Spoon remaining oat mixture over filling and spread carefully to cover. Bake in preheated hot oven (400 degrees F.) until lightly browned, about 25 minutes. Cut in pieces while hot. When cold, drizzle with Cinnamon Icing. Makes 12 to 16 bars.

2 cups raisins  
1 cup water

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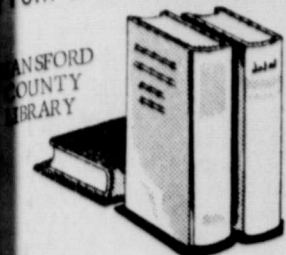

You've heard the old saying "right in your own back yard." ...

Look for repercussions from Tuesday's election. No. 1 on the ballot would repeal 52 sections of the Constitution as obsolete or superfluous. This seemed to be a good thing until the Attorney General expressed fear that some of the deletions would unsettle land titles (those backed up by old Spanish and Mexican titles, land grants to railroads, land certificates, etc.) It was not possible to leave those untouched; it was the "whole package or none."

Does it strike you as being a little weird that satellite-borne "sensors" (powerful cameras and infrared sensing devices) are now operating miles high in space, and can pick out people walking on earth bound streets, spot specially marked automobiles on expressways, and even find pools of water 50 feet under-

ground? You can be sure SOMETHING up there is watching!

The following bit of exaggerated sermonizing has been around before, and perhaps you've already seen it. It is still amusing, especially for parents. The author, so far as we have been able to determine, wishes to remain anonymous---perhaps to preserve peace in his own family:

There's nothing sadder than a childless couple. It breaks your heart to see them stretched out, relaxing around swimming pools in Florida, sitting all suntanned and miserable on the decks of their yachts, trotting off to Europe like lonesome fools. It's an empty life with nothing but money and time.

The poor childless couple can't fight over a child's nauseous characteristics, and they miss all the fun of doing without for the child's sake. They go along from day to day, doing only what they want, buying only what they want, and liking only each other. It's a pretty pathetic picture.

Everyone should have children. No one should be allowed to escape the wonderful experiences attached to each stage of development of their young. Oh those happy memories! Wide-awake nights, coughing spells, dirty diapers, saturated mattresses, spilled food, tantrums, dippy baby sitters, debts, emergencies and frequent crises. Then comes the real fulfillment as the child starting as a little acorn, grows into a real nut. The wonder of watching your over-weight ballerina in a baggy leotard. The warm smile of the young lad with the sun glittering on \$500 worth of dental braces, just before he chomps into the peanut brittle.

How dimly vacant is the peaceful home without the constant childish problems which make for a well-rounded adult life and an early breakdown. Just think of those report cards giving proof that your progeny are among the most mentally retarded! And those evenings around the fireplace giving evidence that the family which roasts marshmallows together will stick together.

What a feeling of reward the first time you take the boy hunting. He didn't really mean to shoot you in the leg. He was excited.

Remember how he cried? Especially after you hit him? These are moments that a man treasures, captured forever in the heart--and limp--some-what akin to the feeling of pride you got when the son who seemed to be all bad arrived home early after getting two years off for good behavior.

What childless couple could ever share the stark drama of romantic adventure with no beautiful daughter to elope with the unwashed flower-child with a satchel full of LSD? Could a woman without children touch the strength and heroism of your wife as she tries to fling herself in front of a speeding truck? Only a father would have the stature to stand by, ready and resolute to jump after her.

Poor childless couples--- simply not realizing how engulfed they are with terrifying emptiness, with nothing to fill the void but golf, swimming, dinner and dancing, weekends in Acapulco, winters in Nassau, summers in Tahiti!

All you have to do is look at them to see what the years have done to them. He looks boyish, unlined and rested. She is slim, well groomed, and youthful. It just isn't natural. If they had kids they would look like the rest of us---tired, gray, wrinkled and sagging.

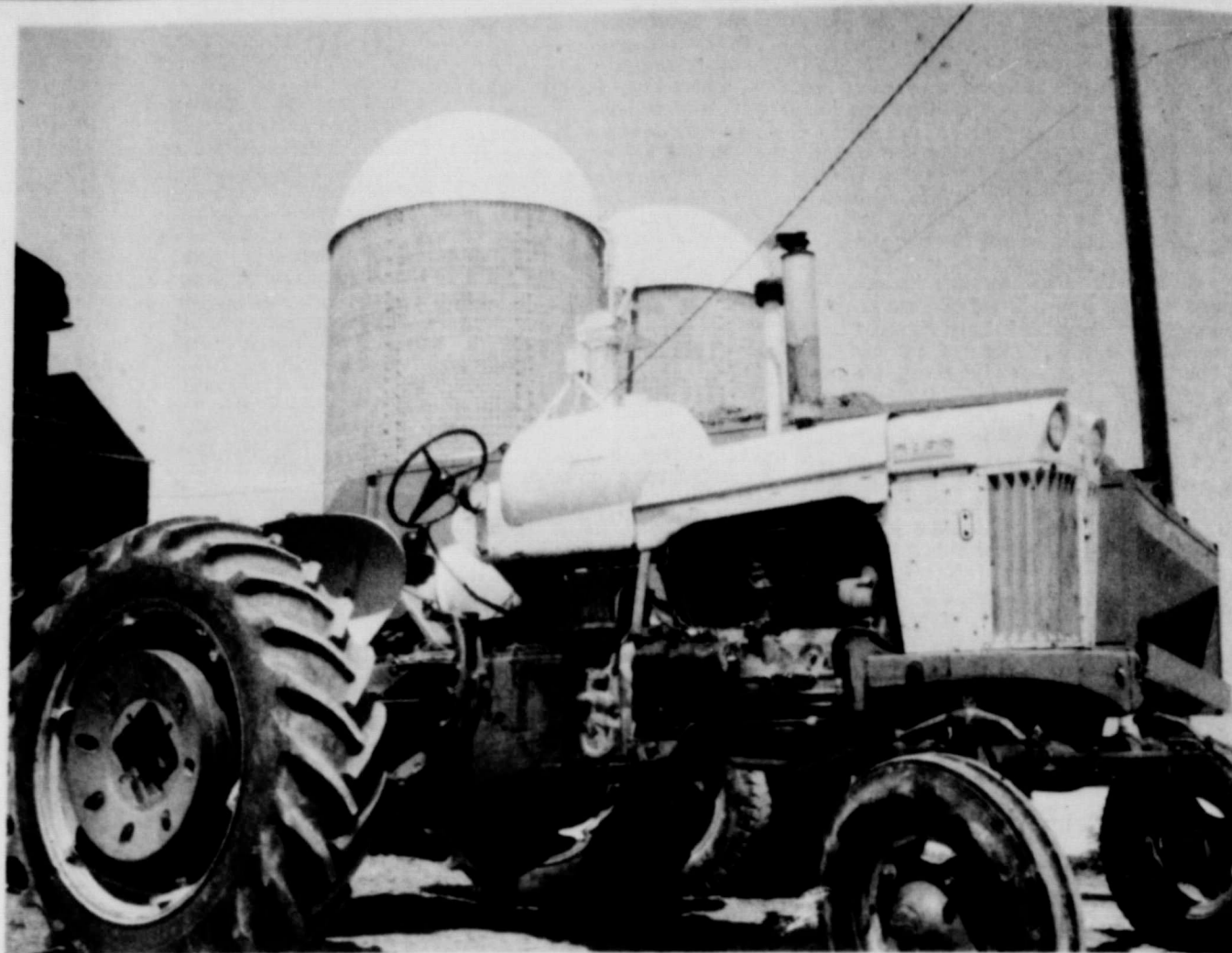

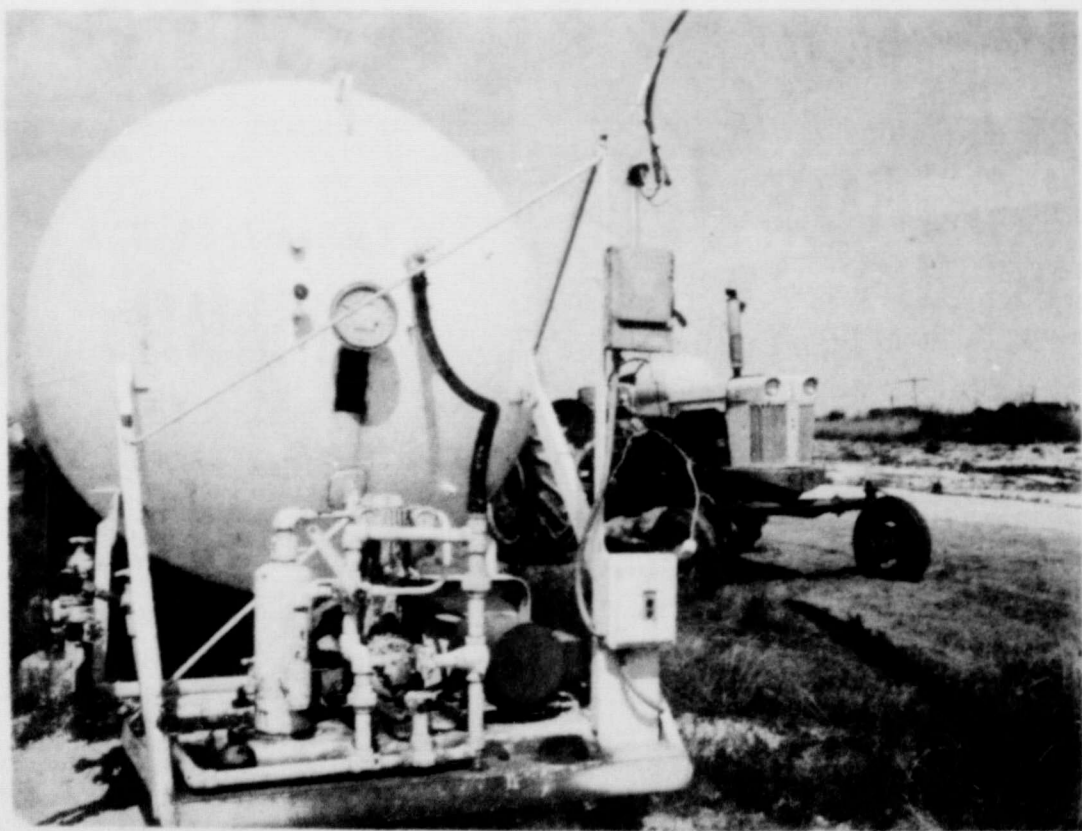

She also expressed gratitude to her parents for their contributions, both financial and otherwise, that made her work in 4-H possible.

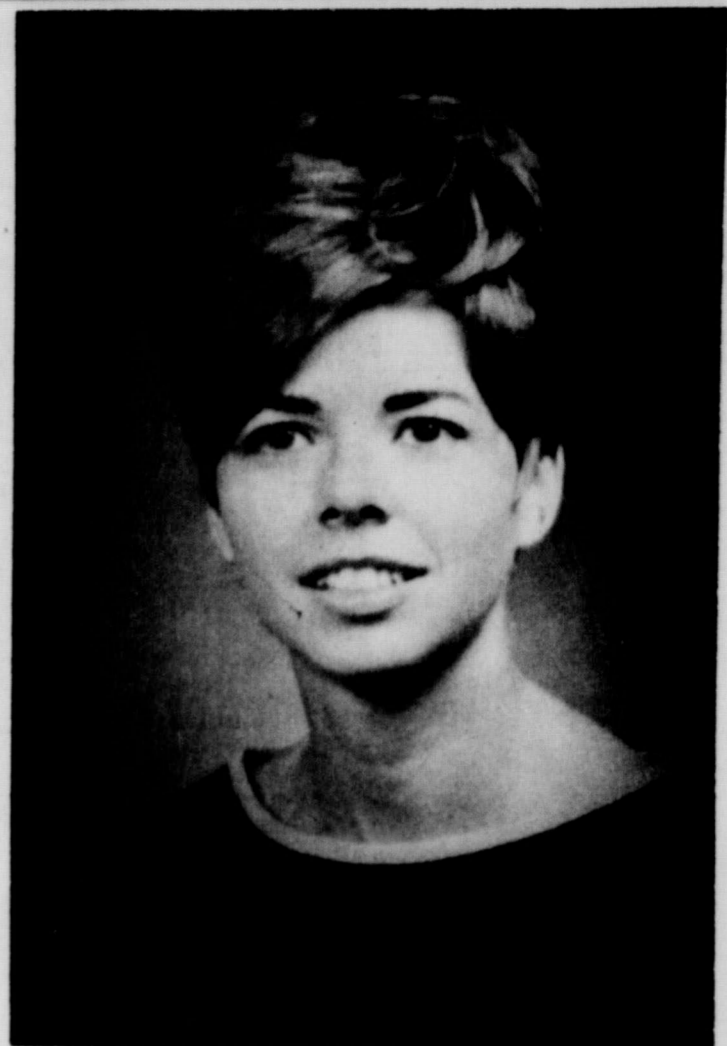
The Rotarians were appropriately impressed by her interesting talk.

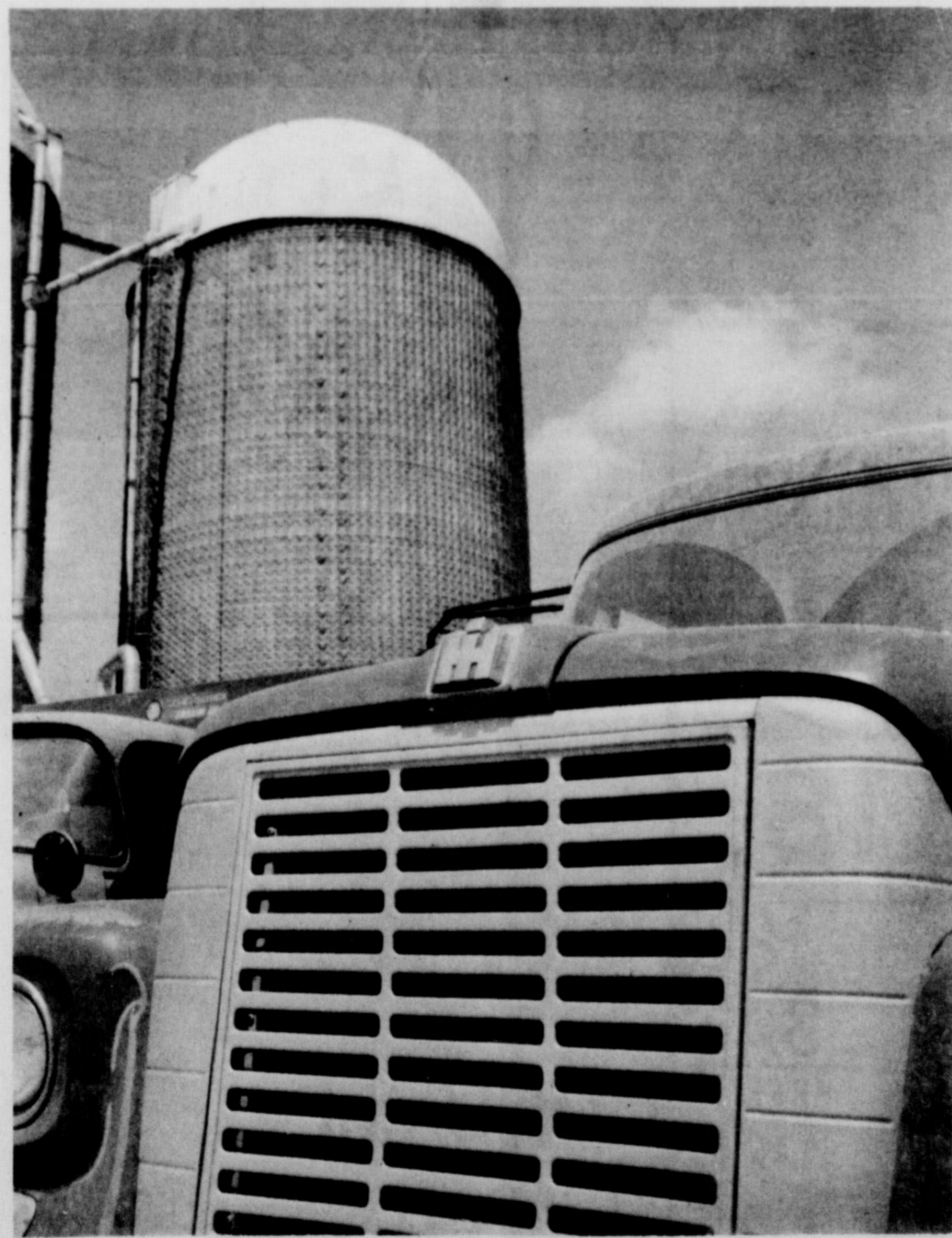
**Mrs. Edwards Speaks On Nassau Trip**
