SCHOOL ENROLLMENT TOTALS 1129

More Students Expected

News from principals' Tuesday morning indicated Spearman Public School will probably set an enrollment record, with 1,129 students registered for school and preliminary records show they expect another 20 students to enter school this week. When the records are complete, enrollment will top the 1,132 figure. This is the number of students enrolled in classes at the end of the school year. The total enrollment in 1968 was 1,071. Elementary Principal Allen reported 114 first graders, 94 second graders, 94 third graders and 86 fourth graders. This compares enrollment figures in 1967: 120 in the first, 92 in the second, 82 in the third and 86 in the fourth. Three hundred and eight pupils are enrolled in the elementary grades, Spearman High School Principal Clemmons reported 356 students this year compared to 365 last year. Ninety-two registered in the eighth, 89 in the seventh and 81 in the eighth. Last year students in the fifth through eighth grades totaled 100, 88, 77 and 70. Six special education students are enrolled in high school this year, which is the total grade school enrollment to 362. With a 20-pupil gain in elementary school and a student loss in junior high school grades shows the number of students in the history of the school. This is a 47 student gain last year's enrollment.

Principal, shows 109 sophomores, 82 sophomores, 84 seniors, compares with a 1968 enrollment of 81 freshmen, 86 sophomores, 96 juniors and 84 seniors. The first day of regular school work was Tuesday, August 26. Following Labor Day weekend, students will return to class on Wednesday, September 2. Fall scale start of the school term. Thanksgiving holidays are observed on the school calendar for Nov. 27-28. Christmas holidays are Dec. 20-21.

Lynx Preparing For Bobcats

The Spearman Lynx have been preparing for their opening game with the Sunray Bobcats since Monday August 18th. This fine group of kids has been working through extreme heat, rain, and every type of element that the Panhandle weather man can produce. And, they are shaping up. They will be known as the team that will be trying to get off to a good start in the Fighting Lynx from Spearman. The Lynx began work-out last Monday Aug. 18 with two-a-days and is almost ready for the Season opener against Sunray Sept. 12 in Sunray. The Lynx will have eleven varsity lettermen back this year with sixteen B-Team lettermen coming up to help fill the vacancies. Three other boys who didn't play last year will also render their aid to the Lynx.

The Lynx have four boys who have played varsity ball for the past two years. Coming back for his third year is Donlane Whitefield a 5'6" 158 lb. Sr. He plays Fullback on offense and Line-Backer on Defense. Also coming back for his third year is All-District tackle from last year Ronnie Lusby a 6'1" 200 lb. Jr. Ronnie plays tackle on both offense and defense. Another is Jimmy Jackson a 5'9" 163 lb. Sr. Jimmy plays Guard and tackle on offense and Line-Backer on defense. Another backfield man is Joe Bill Cochran a 5'10"

146 lb. Sr. Joe Bill plays Wingback on offense and a Corner-back on defense. These four will be followed by seven varsity boys back for their second season. They are Henry Flores, a 5'4" 111 lb. Jr. plays Half-back on both offense and defense. Bobby Brown a 5'9" 156 lb. Sr. plays guard on both offense and defense. Edgar Womble a 5'9" 169 lb. Jr. will be the Quarter Back for the Lynx this year and he will play half-back on defense. Tommy Loveday a 5'7" 167 lb. Jr. will play tackle on offense and Linebacker on defense. Alan VanBuskirk a 5'9" 152 lb. Sr. plays End on both offense and defense. Thomas Collier a 5'8" 159 lb. Sr. plays Center on offense and Linebacker on defense. Robert Archer a 5'11" 156 lb. Jr. plays End on both offense and defense.

McClellan Attends Milwaukee Congress

RACINE, WISCONSIN... A completely new line of farm tractors for the 70's and a new corporate symbol were unveiled this week in Milwaukee by J.I. Case Company during a mammoth North American Dealer Congress August 18-21 attended by more than 1,700 Case dealers.

Participating in the event from Spearman was Roy McClellan of R.L. McClellan & Sons.

During the four-day Congress, Case displayed and exhibited more than \$3 million in farm and construction machinery on a 950 acre site at the former Song Air Force Base in Southeastern Wisconsin. The exhibit included 22 all-new products - four models of the new Agri King 70 tractors and 18 other new

Case products.

The parade of equipment at the Song site included 80 different units representing all Case plants in the U. S. producing agricultural and utility equipment. In addition to the new tractor line, the 18 all-new products included two new windrowers, a new combine and corn head, new compact tractors and other utility equipment.

The Case Congress, one of the biggest meetings Case has ever scheduled, involved a Broadway-type, specially produced, musical stage revue in Milwaukee, tours of Case plants in Racine and various meetings to instruct dealers and inform them of plans for the '70s. Over 800 acres of wheat, oats and corn were planted by Case on the Song site and harvested during the four-day Congress.

The four all-new Agri King tractors range from 56 to 100 plus horsepower and are powered by new four and six cylinder open-chamber inline engines that have been under development by Case engineers for the past five years. They have been designed for high performance, smooth quick response and low fuel consumption.

The new tractors also have a new Case-designed power-shift transmission that has 12 speeds in four job ranges and dozens of features for operator comfort and convenience.

The first official test of one of the engines in the new tractor series - a 504 cu. in. 145 HP diesel - established a new, all-time fuel economy record for all tractors over 39 HP with a rating of .389 lb. of diesel fuel consumed per horsepower hour.

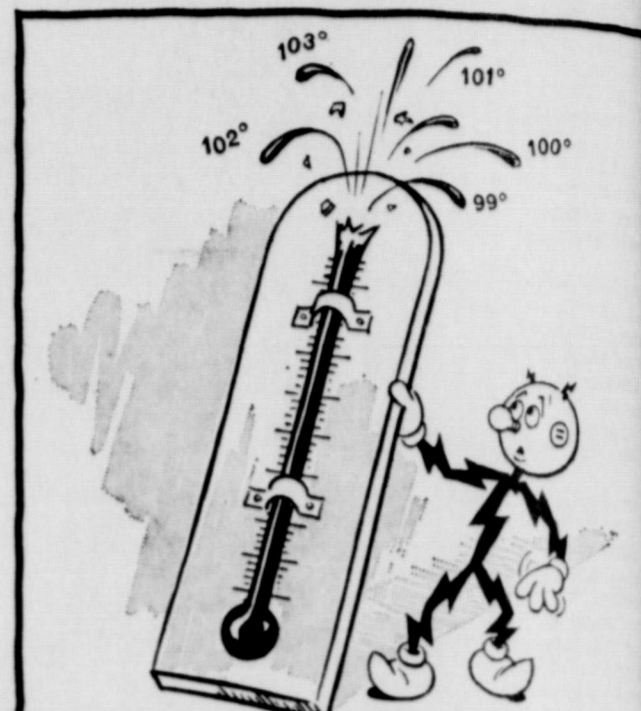

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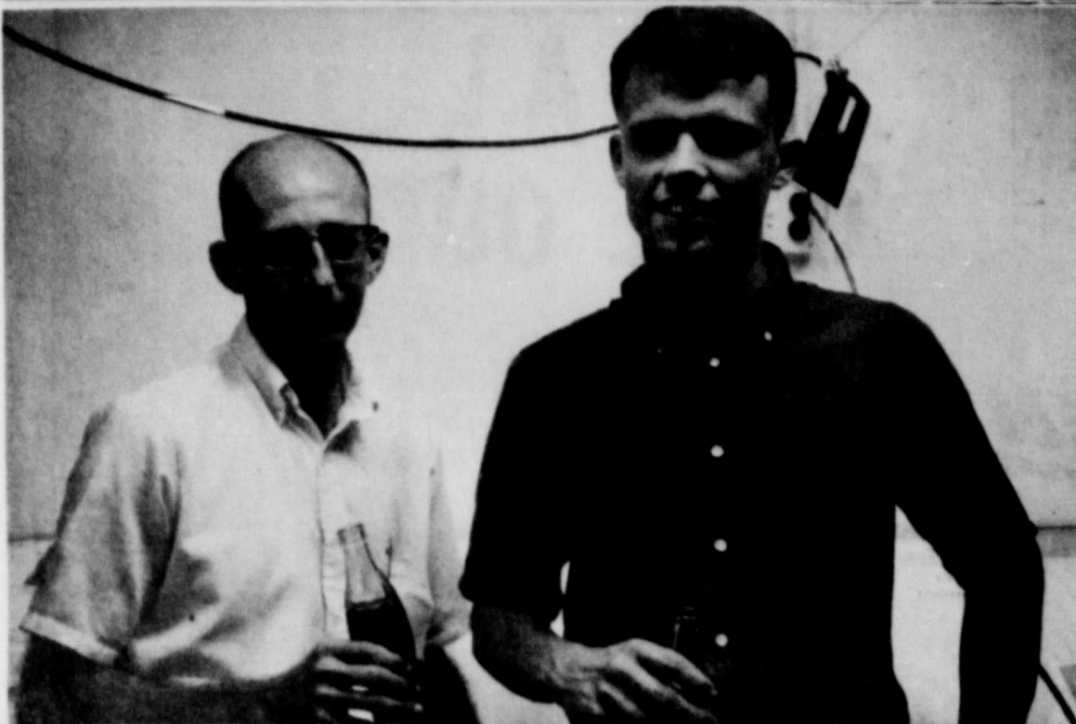

tin who lives north of the city.

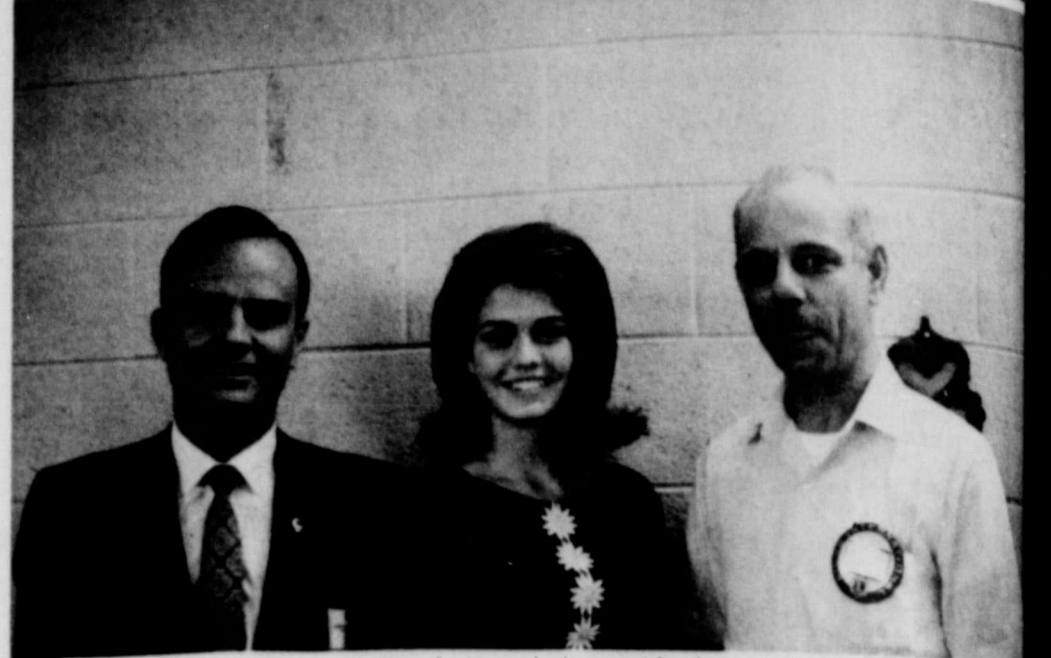
Amounts were lighter in portions of the county to the south. Garland Head reported 1 1/4 inches.
