A total of 533 barrows were sold following the judging which took place in Dallas last Saturday.

Spearman FFA boys and their instructors returned Saturday night from showing livestock at the State Fair in Dallas. The group made a very successful showing. James Kunselman brought home many trophies including Reserve Grand Champion pig, a 6-month old medium weight Hampshire bred by Tom Smith of Rule, Texas. James

also won second prize in the Showmanship contest. Others placing livestock in the show included: Richard Sasser won 10th and James Kunselman 11th place in the light Crossbred class, Richard Sasser won 4th and Ronnie Sasser 14th in the heavy Crossbred class. Ronnie Head won 14th and Ronnie Sasser 18th place in

the light Duroc class, James Kunselman won 10th and Ronnie Head 25th place in the medium Duroc class, Richard Sasser placed 9th in the heavy class Duroc show. In the medium Hampshire class, Kunselman won 1st place while Ronnie Head placed 9th and Seth Ralston placed 19th. Two Spearman girls placed

well in the Heavy Hampshire class, Kim Boone, Hansford County 4-H club member, won 10th and Karen Kunselman, showing for Spearman FFA, won 19th. 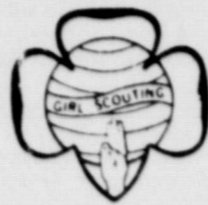
WSCS HOSTS DISTRICT MEET
