FEEDLOTS MERGE WITH AMAREX FIRM

Jerome Johnson, recently named board chairman of an Amarillo-based firm Amarex, Inc., today announced a six million dollar stock acquisition of Caprock Industries, a highly mechanized Texas cattle feeding operation. Caprock, which will be operated as a wholly owned subsidiary of Amarex, has two 24,000-head feed lots nearing completion. Caprock's professional management team will continue to operate the business without interruption.

Others included in the stock transaction Monday include major stockholders in Caprock, D.G.C. Feeders, Inc., and Irwin Feeders, Inc., and O.A. Feeders, Inc.: J.D. Helms, Jimmy Linn, Ralph Blodgett, Effie Hackley, Bob Archer and Catherine Patterson, all of Spearman.

Joel Burns, consulting manager for Amarex, said the Amarillo firm recently acquired the franchise from four states: Texas, California, Oregon and Washington, to build nursing homes, child care centers and private hospitals.

Amarex is also engaged in oil and gas production and exploration in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas.

With its 68,000 head capacity plus sizable grain storage facilities, Amarex moves into this booming growth industry to meet the growing demand for quality beef. Amarex headquarters its operations in Amarillo, which is considered

to be the center of this new era of beef production.

With the acquisition of Caprock, Amarex has now developed substantial interests in three of America's most exciting growth industries: oil and gas production, beef production and health care. To further develop expertise in these areas, Amarex is in the process of a management reorganization which will involve the addition of nationally prominent businessmen to its board of directors.

The Caprock operations, along with D.G.C. Feeders, will continue with the same management and personnel as before.

This stock exchange puts Caprock holdings on the American Security Exchange, thereby allowing private individuals to buy shares in the Amarex Corporation.

According to reports, the Caprock stockholders now own controlling interest in the Amarex corporation.

The merger involved the exchange of 600,000 shares of Caprock stock valued at six million dollars.

Caprock Industries, Inc., was formed late last year by a group of farmers and cattle feeders on the North Plains to develop two lots, Caprock No. 1 is located 11 miles southwest of Gruver and Caprock No. 2 in under construction west of Spearman. The cattle feeders merged their plans for the feedlots earlier this year with a grain elevator operation in Spearman before any work started on the two lots.

New Forms On Way To Vehicle Owners



Hansford County Tax Assessor & Collector J.B. Cooke holds a sample form of the new License Plate Renewal Application which vehicle owners will begin receiving in the mail the last week in December. This is the new procedure for purchasing license plates and car & truck owners are urged to keep these forms handy until new plates go on sale February 1, 1970.

Sometime early in January, Hansford County vehicle owners will begin to receive through the mail their new 1970 license plate renewal application forms. One form for each vehicle will be mailed separately and owners are urged to keep these forms together so they can bring them by the County tax office for new license plates which go on sale February 1, 1970.

These forms are a part of the new automated 1970 vehicle registration renewal procedure which is to be initiated February 1.

The Highway Department's seven million vehicle records have been converted into an automated system with one of the major objectives being to reduce the long lines at the tax office during the registration renewal period (February and March each year.)

These converted records are now stored in the Texas Highway Department's computer in Austin and will be mailed the last week in December.

Since this 3-part form is in fact a verification of the latest registration and title information stored in the computer, it will not be necessary for the owner to present his certificate of title and the previous year's license receipt when renewing his registration.

Under the new system, it will not be necessary for the tax office to type license receipts for those persons having "License Plate Renewal Applications." This will greatly reduce the time required to

register an automobile and purchase license plates.

It is very important for each vehicle owner to keep his license plate renewal application where it will be readily available for use during February and March next year. Persons not having this application will, as in the past, be required to present their certificate of title and license receipt before purchasing new license plates.

Take the form by the Hansford County tax office so clerks may paste in the new license number. One form will be kept by the tax office, one will be sent to Austin and one will be presented to the vehicle owner along with the new license plates.

Texas Minimum Wage Law Explained

COLLEGE STATION--The first Texas minimum wage law will go into effect the first of next February, according to James L. Mallett, Extension farm management specialist at Texas A&M University.

The new law will cover those employees not covered by the federal minimum wage law but does not supersede the federal statute. The agriculture section of the state law is designed to keep pace with future federal wage standards with the provision that the state minimum wage will not be less than 20 cents below the federal level. At the 1970 federal level of \$1.30 per hour, the Texas minimum wage will be \$1.10 per hour. Non-agricultural employees will receive \$1.25 per hour until Feb. 1, 1971. At that time, the minimum wage will be increased to \$1.40 per hour.

Wage rates for piece work will become effective on Feb. 1 of 1971 and will be established by the end of 1970 by the Commissioner of Agriculture. The new law provides that the piece rate will be equivalent to the hourly minimum wage for workers of average ability and diligence in harvesting. Mallett added that the piece rate workers will be covered by the hourly wage scale until the Commissioner of Agriculture establishes the regulations and procedures for administration of the piece rate work sometime next year. Piece rates will also apply to contract labor.

He pointed out that non-agricultural businesses, regardless of size, will be affected by the state law if they are not currently subject to the federal statute. According to Mallett, the agriculture portion of the state law differs from the federal statute in three basic ways. First, the state law says that the new minimum wage will not apply to employers who did not use more than 300 man-days of labor during any calendar quarter of the preceding calendar year.

This figure of 300 man-days becomes significant when the second basic difference is considered. Under the federal law, a man-day is defined as a person working at least one hour a day. The state law says that a man-day is any day during which an employee performs agricultural labor for at least four hours for wages.

The third difference is the exemptions for persons working with livestock. Under the new law, employees working with dairy operations and production of livestock are exempt from the law. A notable exception, however, is that workers in feedlots are not exempt. The federal law exempts workers in range production of livestock where hours are hard to calculate. Agricultural employees living on the premises in quarters furnished by the employer must receive at least \$30 weekly in cash. The new law also says that any person whose earnings or productive capacity are impaired by age, injury or mental or physical deficiency may work at wages not less than 60 percent of the minimum wage.

In the case of this reduced pay rate, the employer must secure a medical certificate from a physician. However, this provision does not apply to persons employed in agriculture as piece rate workers. Issuing false earnings statements by employers is a misdemeanor and can draw a fine of not less than \$100 or more than \$500 or between five and 30 days in county jail or both. Failure to pay the applicable minimum wage will make the employer liable for twice the unpaid wages plus attorneys' fees and costs of action.

Mallett emphasized that the new state law does not interfere with the right of employees to bargain collectively for wages that are higher than the minimum established in the law. The state law lists several exemptions that differ from the federal statute. Information on the state law can be obtained from the local county agent or from the Texas Department of Agriculture in Austin.

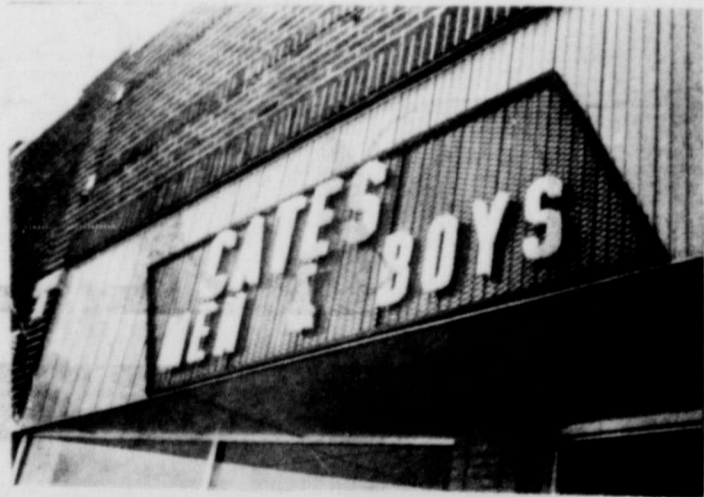
