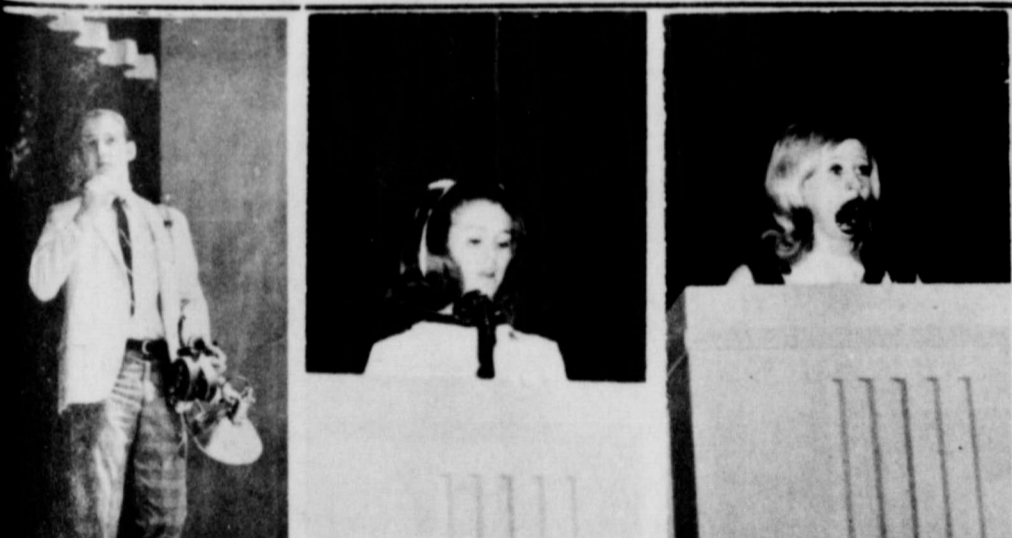

A Salute To War Heroes



Veterans Day in Spearman was observed with a special program presented by the Future Homemaking class and the student body of Spearman High School. The 10 a.m. assembly program was open to the public and many of the townspeople attended the very patriotic and solemn affair. Showing their unashamed love for America, many wiped tears as some 50 names were read--Hansford county men who have served their country fighting in Vietnam. The occasion saddened as taps were blown for those who gave their lives in the defense of freedom. Bill Walker, Chamber of Commerce manager, helped with the publicity on the program and was instrumental in obtaining KGNC-TV coverage. Jerry Webb covered the program for that TV station and announced that he had served one hitch in the service but would be going into the army again on December 7. The program was viewed at 6 p.m. Tuesday evening over channel 4. 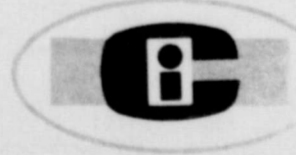

Let Me See
... by Sybil

Seems that more people have 'thought' about Veterans Day this year than in years past. For a while patriotism seemed to be dying on the vine, but we've noticed more of it lately. There is a push on for people to examine their hearts and brush the cobwebs off that hidden spark of feeling which seems to have become dormant--pride in America--pride in our grand Old Flag. I feel a stirring, a resurgence. It's about time. I attended a HD club meeting the other day when the program was a patriotic one given by 4 students from Spearman High School. Lynn Brack gave a very great reading which he concluded by asking the audience to stand and face the flag and sing America The Beautiful. Many in the audience wiped tears.

Mr. and Mrs. Sam Graves, owners of the Baker Hotel, flew an unusual flag Tuesday, Veterans Day. Sam was rummaging around in his basement and came across a flag wrapped in an old issue of the Spearman Reporter dated August 2, 1945. His uncle had stored the flag all neat and tidy and Sam found it stuck behind an old wardrobe. It had only 48 stars. The newspaper it was wrapped was a little tattered and yellow with age but the front page carried a picture of the Queen Mary bringing some 35,000 fighting men home from the war.

August, 1945 brought back many memories for me. Billy was home on furlough. He had been with the Marines stuck off on some island in the Pacific for nearly 2 years, and was he glad to be home. He

was stretched out in the floor and we were all listening to the radio reports of how things were going in Japan. The day was August 5 and the radio broadcast was interrupted with the bulletin that an atomic bomb had been dropped on Hiroshima. World War II ended. There have been others... and there is still Vietnam. Tuesday we honored all men who have fought, and died, in the defense of freedom... doing what they knew they had to do.

The 'silent majority' is waking up. It's never too late. God is not dead. He is still able to deliver our great country.

Glenn Day furnished me with this article. It merits reprinting:

"Just for the record--and without apology--I am a reactionary!" I re-act to sin and sadism, riots and revolution, gutlessness and Godlessness. I re-act to Hedonism and humanism; to philosophies and sophistries which seek to destroy those values which made this country great; which fashioned the fabric of civilized mankind. I re-act to dancing to the permissive polka with those wh'd whirl me all the way to hell while whispering that God is dead and the Devil a myth; to those ministers who'd convert my house of worship into a hootenanny hall or political forum.

I re-act to the emasculatation of my Faith in the name of humanistic togetherness; to my love for the Holy Bible, my loyalty to the flag and my esteem for the police.

I re-act to being scourged with the last of collective guilt--as if I personally poured liquor down the alcoholic's throat, peddled the heroin, mugged the little old lady, created the slum and invented The Bomb!

I re-act to the glorification of welfareism over work; Pot over pink lemonade; the Pill over purity; demonstration over dedication; desire over discipline, nihilism over nobility, selfishness over sacrifice, hauteur over humility, 'rights' over right.

I re-act to the portrayal of my American friends as "Fascist beasts"... to those who consider love as nothing more than the sex act; who preach "peace" to promote surrender. I re-act to student radicals who are so enamored of their own worth that they must destroy all other worths--who are FOR nothing except their 'right'

to be against everything. I re-act to the stupefying sentimentality of amateur do-gooders who, like carved wooden monkeys, see no evil, speak no evil and hear no evil--even when it runs riot with a shotgun; who would rewrite Little Red Riding Hood to have her 'rehabilitate' the wolf while screaming 'hate monger' at the rescuing woodsman!

"You'd better believe I'm a reactionary. In my book its time all responsible adults began reacting instead of suffering the insults, inconveniences and intimidations of a noisy minority who would sacrifice their own freedom and ours on the altar of atheistic materialism.

If we did, the kooks and creeps would soon crawl back under their rocks and this tired old world would have time to bind its wounds and regain its sense of humor."

SOMETHING SPECIAL FOR THANKSGIVING-Pumpkin pie is an easy dessert to make for your family. The filling for this pumpkin pie is very rich and smooth. To make Pumpkin Pie a very special treat for Thanksgiving... add a crunchy "Praline Topping".

Pumpkin Pie with Praline Topping
9 inch unbaked pie shell
2 eggs
p can (1 lb.) pumpkin
3/4 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice
1 tall can evaporated milk (1 2/3 cups)

Praline Topping (recipe below)
In a medium size mixing bowl beat eggs slightly. Stir in pumpkin, brown sugar, salt, spice and evaporated milk, mixing well. Pour most of filling into pastry shell, then place pie on oven rack. Pour in rest of filling--this helps to keep from spilling. Bake in preheated hot oven (425 degree F.) 15 minutes; turn oven temperature down to moderate (350 degrees F.) and continue baking 45 minutes longer, or until filling is done

when tested. Cool pie slightly, then refrigerate until serving time. When ready to serve, make Praline Topping and sprinkle evenly over pie. Place pie under broiler heat until topping is bubbly, about 1 minute, watching carefully so mixture does not burn. Serve at once. Makes 9-inch pie (6 to 8 servings).

PRALINE TOPPING
2 tsp. margarine
1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
1/3 cup chopped pecans (peanuts or walnuts may be used in place of pecans)

In a small sauce pan, melt margarine. Remove from heat, stir in brown sugar and pecans. Pumpkin Pie Spice is a blend of spices already put together for convenient use. If you have separate spices on hand, you may wish to use them instead. If you do not have a favorite combination you like to use for pumpkin pie, these measurements give a good spicy flavor: 3/4 tsp. ground cinnamon, 1/8 tsp. ground nutmeg, 1/8 tsp. ginger and 1/8 tsp. ground cloves.

Tips on Pie Making: Pastry Shell: When you roll out the pastry for the pie shell, leave it big enough so that you can make an edge that stands about 1/2 inch above the rim of the pie pan. This keeps the filling from bubbling over in the baking.
Filling the Pie Shell: For liquid mixtures such as this pumpkin pie filling, it is usually easier to pour only about half the filling in the pie shell before placing in the oven. Then, pull the oven rack out a little way, then pour in the remainder of the filling. This helps to prevent spilling. Testing the Filling to see if it is done: For custard mixtures, it is usual to insert a silver knife (a table knife) in the filling about halfway between the edge and the center. If the knife comes out clean, the filling is done. Another pie test is to shake the pie gently. If the filling is not quite firm in the center, it is okay to take it out of the oven, for the heat in the pie will continue to cook the filling done.

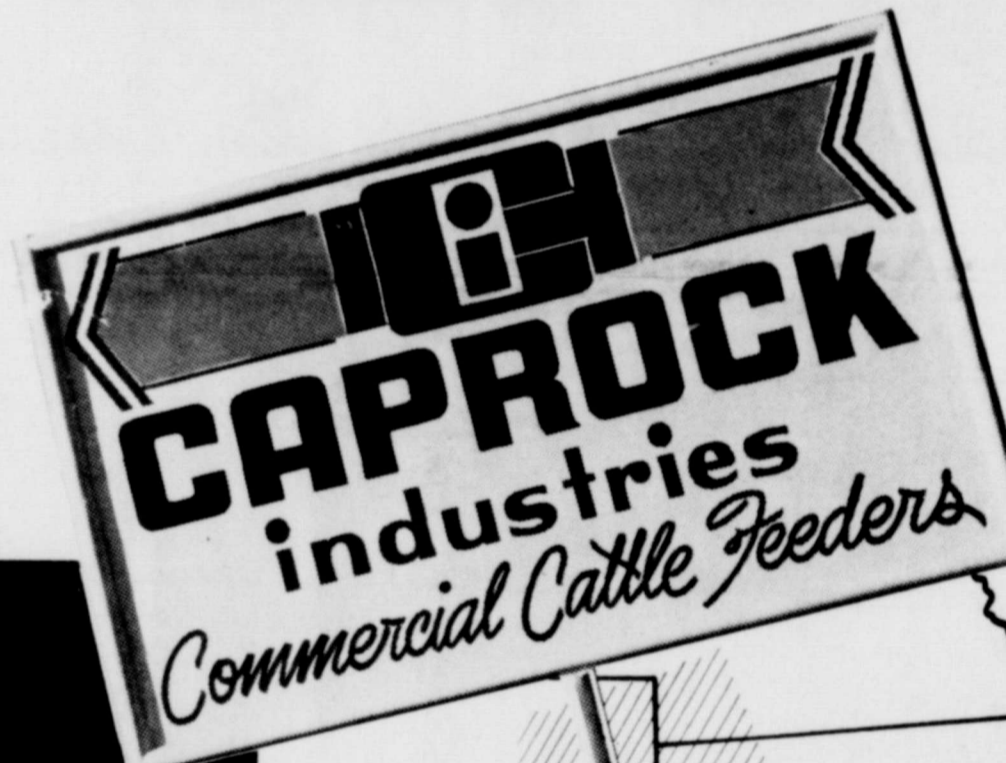

"This is deliberate," Enloe added. "The intermittent bunk lines allow easy water passage, thus keeping our pens drier during rainy weather."

Four 6-inch wells and 55 miles of water and drain line make up the continuous water flow systems at the lots. There are two 70,000-gallon storage tanks at the lots also. Fourteen-foot metal water troughs are located on concrete pads in the pens.

"The continuous flow water systems are looped with cut-offs at the end of each set of pens so if necessary, we could isolate pens or by-pass our storage tanks."

Either of the two wells at each lot can water the entire lot if problems should develop.

One of the more unique features of the Caprock No. 1 lot is a horseshoe-shaped trench silo. The silo is currently holding more than 60,000 tons of top quality corn silage. The silo is 150 feet wide and 20 feet deep. Hospital pens are located at the end of every working

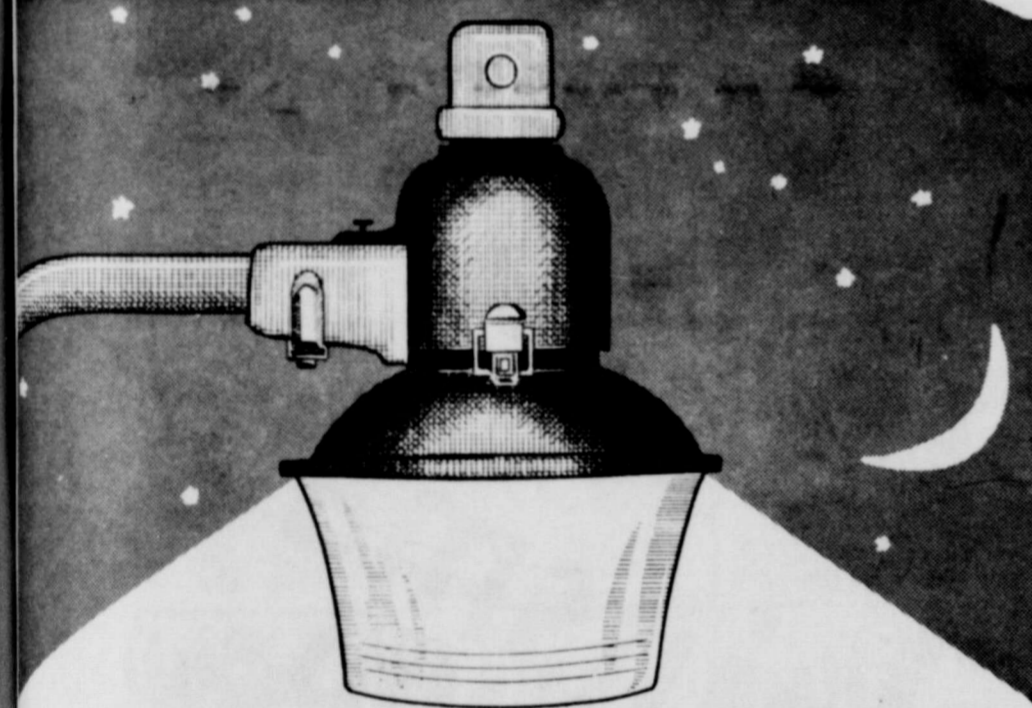
CROP REPORT RETURN URGED

The Hansford County TAP is made up of representatives from the Soil Conservation Service, ASCS, Extension Service, Vocational Agriculture and Texas Employment Commission.

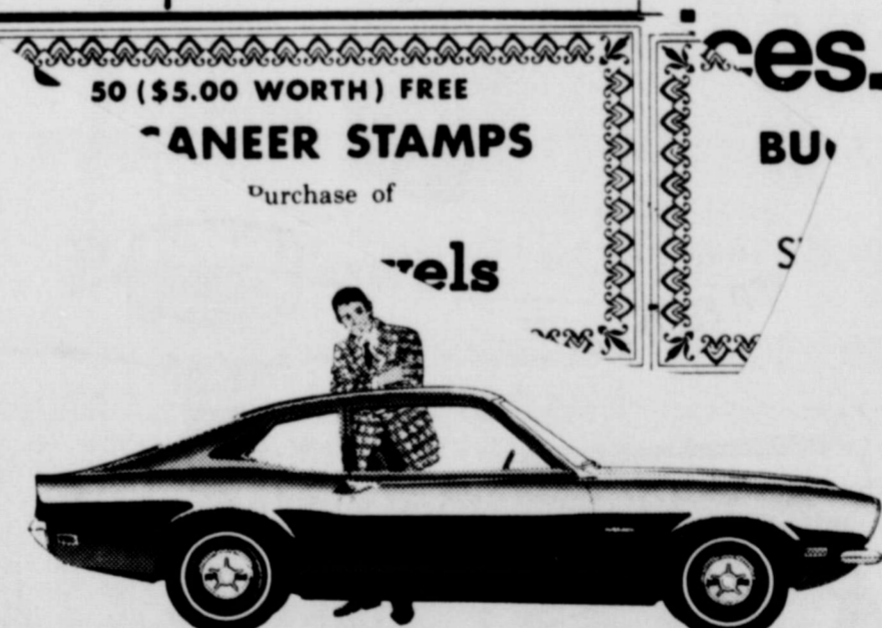
