Funeral Rites Held Monday

Funeral services were held Monday morning December 1 at 10:00 in the First United Methodist Church in Dumas for Elvin M. Trexler 57, who died of a heart attack at his home north of Dumas Friday night. Mr. Trexler was the brother-in-law of Mr. Ned Turner of Spearman. Services were conducted by Rev. Jack Elzey, pastor, burial was in Northlawn Memorial Gardens under the direction of Boxwell-Morrison Funeral Directors.

Mr. Trexler, a member of the First United Methodist Church, was a World War II veteran. He was born in Hucklein, Kansas and had lived in the Dumas area 22 years, he was a farmer.

Survivors include his wife Della, sister of Mr. Ned Turner, three daughters, Sue Ann of the home and Mrs. Linda Flanagan of Fairfield, Calif. and Mrs. Mary Owens of Amarillo, three brothers Warren and Calvin of Wichita, Kansas and Carlton of Arkansas, Kansas, and one grandchild.

All Hansford County ranchers are invited to attend a meeting concerning the coyote problem in this area. The meeting will begin at 2:30 p.m. Monday, December 8 in the county courtroom in Spearman. County Agent Robert Adamson has called the meeting at the request of several ranchers who have been losing small calves to coyotes. Adamson said he had checked into the possibility of securing the services of a trapper. "It looks like there is no chance of getting one," Adamson said, "so we need to meet and discuss some other method to control the damage these coyotes have been doing in this county." The agent said those present would talk about using the poison tallow bait for control.

Several ranchers have reported seeing the animals running in packs of 6 to 8 coyotes and this hasn't been noted in this county in a long time. "Coyotes are definitely on the increase, and we must find some way of getting rid of them," Adamson said. Anyone interested is invited to attend the meeting.

RASPBERRY MERINGUE CAKE

- 1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
- 1/4 cup shortening
- 3 eggs, separated
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 cups enriched self-rising flour*
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- 1 jar (10 oz.) raspberry preserves
- 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 1/2 cup sugar

Cream together brown sugar and shortening until light and fluffy. Beat in egg yolks and vanilla. Blend flour into creamed mixture alternately with milk, beginning and ending with flour. Stir in nuts. Spread evenly in greased 9 x 13-inch baking pan. Bake in preheated 350° oven 15 minutes, spread with preserves. Beat egg whites with cream of tartar until frothy. Gradually add sugar, beating until stiff, glossy peaks form. Spread over preserves. Return to oven and bake 20 minutes longer, or until meringue is firm and golden. Cool before cutting.

*Spoon flour into dry measuring cup; level. Do not scoop.

"Taking the Fifth"

"Taking the Fifth" has already become part of the nation's slang. This is an unusual mark of distinction for what is, after all, a technical rule of evidence. What does the expression really mean?

Literally, it means claiming the protection of the Constitution's Fifth Amendment, which says that "no person shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself."

The theory of the Amendment is that it is unfair to force anybody to tattle on himself. But this does not mean he may keep silent in the



courtroom whenever he pleases. He may keep silent only if answering might tend to incriminate him.

Consider this situation: A witness in a gambling case refused to talk, even after being granted immunity from prosecution.

"Even though I cannot be prosecuted," he told the court, "it could still be mighty embarrassing for me if I tell what I know."

But the court ordered the witness to speak out. The judge said

the fear of embarrassment, alone, was not a weighty enough reason to invoke the constitutional privilege.

Furthermore, the privilege is strictly personal—only for the protection of the witness himself. Thus, a witness in an assault case was ordered to testify, despite his fear that he would be getting his cousin in trouble. The judge said stretching the Fifth Amendment to protect other people would unduly hamper the courts in getting the facts they need to do justice.

Still, the basic philosophy of the Fifth Amendment is deeply rooted in our legal system. In accordance with this philosophy, it is a general rule that the prosecuting attorney may not tell the jury that a witness who "takes the Fifth" must have a guilty conscience.

"A witness may have a reasonable fear of prosecution and yet be innocent," said the United States Supreme Court. "The privilege serves to protect the innocent who otherwise might be ensnared by ambiguous circumstances."

Used with a regular detergent was most effective in removing soil.

In the test, home economists applied soil similar to that accumulated in normal clothing wear to white cotton fabrics. They then washed the fabrics in hot water with heavy duty granular detergent and with liquid cold water detergent and repeated the procedures with cold water.

The four methods were compared for appearance, smoothness and softness. Fabrics washed in hot water all so tended to be smoother and softer, Mrs. Myers adds.

55 Whooping Cranes Winter On Coast

AUSTWELL, TEXAS There are now 55 wild whooping cranes wintering on the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge near this small town on the Texas Gulf Coast.

Regional Director William T. Krummes of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife announced that Aransas Refuge personnel had verified the

new high count by aerial flights today.

One of the rarest of all birds, the whoopers that winter on the Department of the Interior wildlife refuge had been as low as 15 birds in 1941. They have shown a slow, but highly encouraging, increase under complete protection and reached a modern-day high of 50 birds last year, Krummes noted.

This year's flight consisted of 47 adult birds and eight young of the year, according to refuge personnel. Not since 1964, when ten young birds made the 2,000 mile trip from Wood Buffalo National Park in Canada have more than eight young been added to the flock in any one year. Noting that it was still possible that one or two more adult birds might be lingering along the flyway, Krummes said that the high total was the best news in many years for the millions of Americans who have concerned themselves with the big birds' gallant fight for survival.

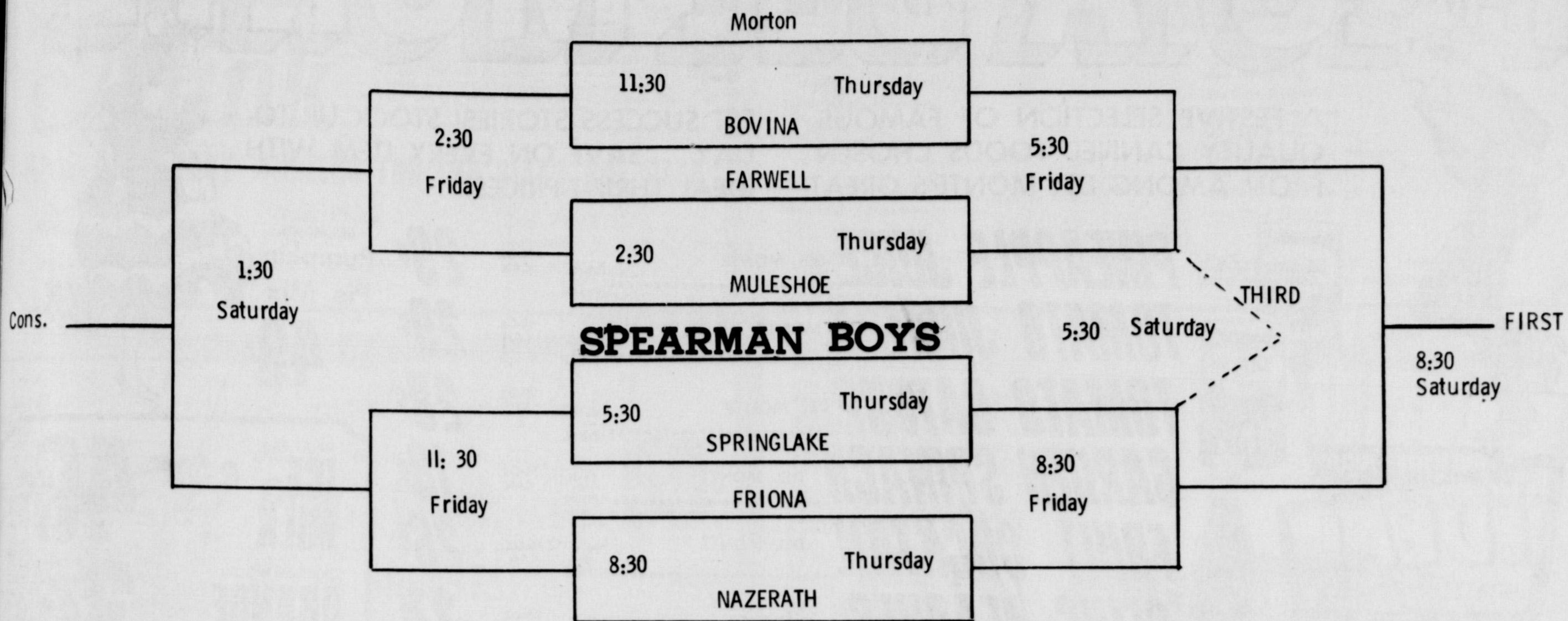
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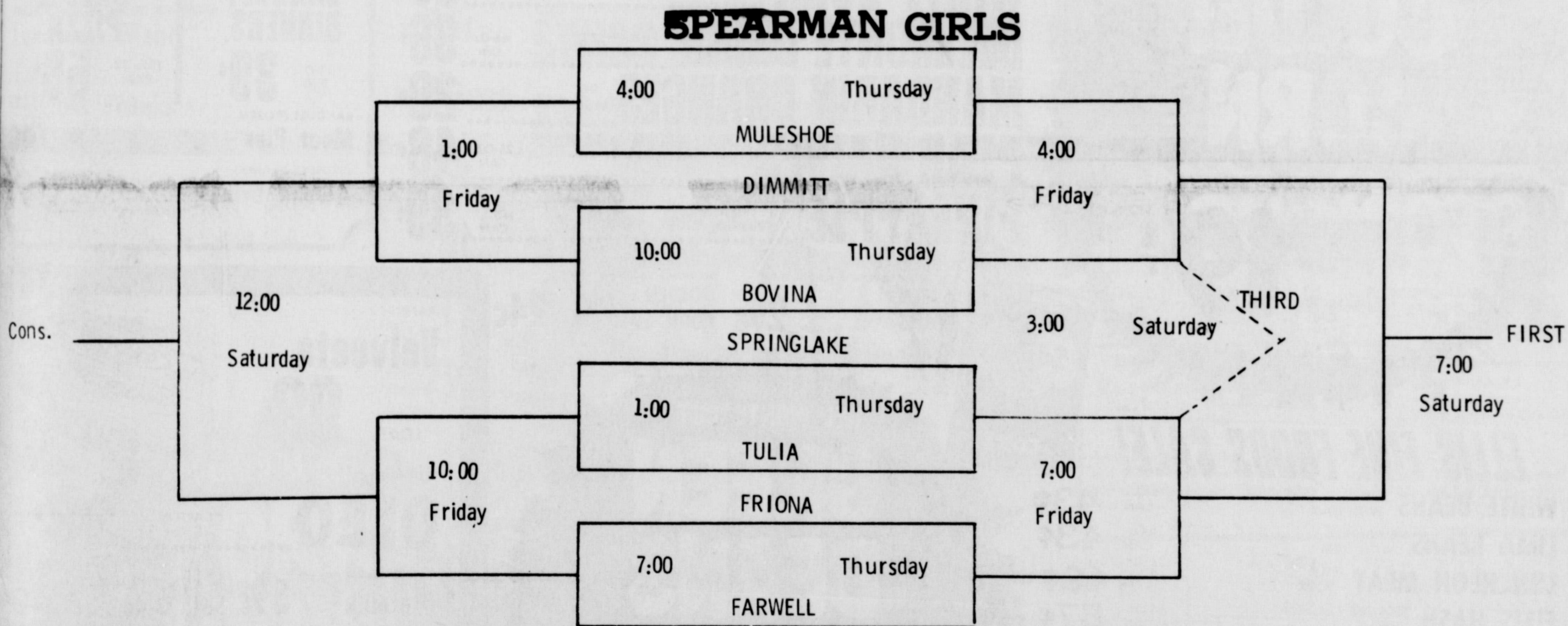

in the "spirit" I might change my mind yet. With the candied fruits the price they are this year, I might try my hand at making my own...all except the candied maraschino cherries. It would be nice if you could make your own candied cherries since we use more of this fruit than any other. But, alas, you can't do this for maraschinos are made commercially from the white Royal Anne cherries when they are still underripe enough to be quite firm. Then they are cooked in a sugar syrup, artificially flavored and colored. So fruit cake cooks this year must just grit their teeth and bust the budget. A tip for those of you who use lots of Brazil nuts in cakes and candy and cannot stand that brown clingy skin. Cover these with cold water, slowly bring to a boil and simmer for about three minutes. That should do it. After they are cool, crack them and you will find they not only come out whole, but the brown skin clings to the shell instead of the nut. I have two large pumpkins I don't know what to do with and since I know I won't get around to cooking them, I will be glad to give them away. Call me if you are interested. These would make lots of pumpkin pies. It is nice to bake the things which freeze well and if you like pumpkin bread here is a recipe which is a little different and it is delicious.

1 cup butter, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 4 eggs, 2 cups canned pumpkin, 3 cups flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon baking soda, 1 package (8 ounces) diced dates, 1/2 cup raisins, 1 cup chopped pecans.

Cream butter & sugar, add eggs one at a time. Add pumpkin and mix well. Add dry ingredients, dates, raisins and nuts. Bake in two 5 x 9 inch loafs at 375 about 60 minutes or until pick inserted in center comes out clean. This freezes very well. You can also bake this re-

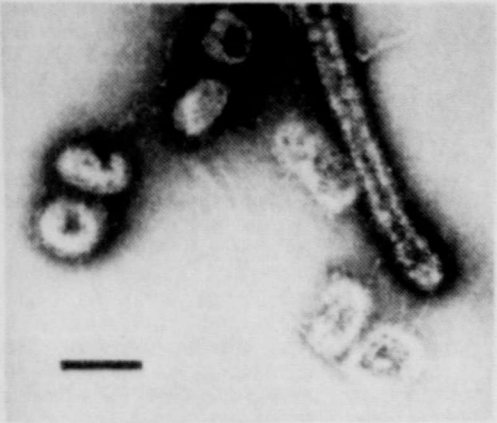

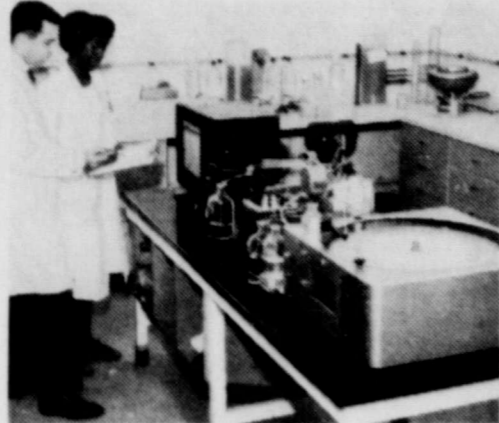

Hong Kong Flu Vaccine "Crash Program" Requires 64,000 Fertile Eggs Per Day

DETROIT — Parke, Davis & Company is operating a "crash program" to produce large quantities of vaccine to help protect the American people from an epidemic of Hong Kong influenza which medical authorities expect this winter.

"We are on a 'crash program' because we could not begin producing the vaccine until initial supplies of the Hong Kong virus arrived from the federal government," according to Dr. Joseph F. Sadusk, Jr., vice president for scientific and medical affairs.

most efficiently from white eggs which weigh 23 ounces per dozen, and which are less than a week old."

When the nest clean eggs arrive at the vaccine production facility, they are placed in an incubator for 11 days. From there, they are shifted to a darkened area for candling.

Next, the eggs go to the inoculation room, where they are sprayed with an antiseptic solution, injected with the Hong Kong influenza virus and put into a second incubator for two days.

Then, of course, we have to produce the vaccine under scientifically controlled production and testing methods — all of which take time — but we are confident we can have a safe, potent vaccine ready by early December."

In meeting this emergency, the firm processes 64,000 large white fertile eggs daily in its race against time to get a vaccine to the public before the flu attacks.

"Because the vaccine is grown in chick embryos, we are one of Michigan's largest egg buyers," Dr. Sadusk commented, "and we probably are the only buyer who demands huge numbers of fertile eggs of one certain size."

"Our research has shown that we can produce the vaccine

portant," Dr. Sadusk added. "When a new strain of virus like this occurs — one against which existing vaccines cannot protect — it is possible that the virus can change as it passes from one person to another and become much more serious, or produce complications in certain people."

"The aged, very young, and people suffering chronic diseases are the ones who likely will suffer most from this flu," Dr. Sadusk added.

PRICE OPPOSES USDA ACTION ON CCC MILO

The following is the text of a statement by Congressman Bob Price following United States Department of Agriculture announcement that commercially stored grain sorghum from the 1967 and 1968 crops must be redeemed by January 18, 1970.

"I am very disappointed that the Department of Agriculture has picked such an inopportune time to dispose of commodity crop corporation milo stocks.

"I have advised the Secretary that this action has had a very detrimental effect on the orderly marketing of the 1969 grain sorghum crop in our District because this year's crop is now being harvested.

"I recognize that CCC cannot hold these stocks in elevators forever, but they could have selected a more opportune time to make this action. Our foreign markets should

not be the only criteria by which a decision like this is made. The domestic effect is of primary importance in this decision.

"The producer must have confidence in the market and I hope this action by the U. S. D. A. will not cause a rush by the producers to market their grain which depresses the market even further.

"I have expressed to the Secretary my disapproval of this action and have urged him to reconsider the decision."

Washington Report

From Congressman BOB PRICE, 11TH DISTRICT, TEXAS



"All available information indicates that the U. S. Post Office is in serious trouble, but its troubles cannot necessarily be blamed entirely upon the postal system itself. As now constituted, it would appear that the Post Office Department does not have the means to do the job it has been assigned. Indeed, it cannot be expected to continue to let alone to exceed the present level of postal services in the face of the tremendous increased mail volume. I would like to take a few minutes to look at some of the recent postal legislation and then to see what the future may hold in store for postal reform and progress.

"On May 27, 1969, President Nixon sent a message to Congress proposing specific reforms to the Nation's postal system. The following day Congressman Udall introduced H. R. 11750, designated as the Postal Service Act of 1969, to implement the recommendations of President Nixon's message.

"The Postal Service Act would take the Post Office Department out of the President's Cabinet and establish a government-owned postal system to be known as the United States Postal Service.

"The Postal Service would be run by a nine-member board of directors selected without regard to politics. Seven members of the board would be appointed by the President with the advice and consent of the Senate for rotating 7 year terms. The President would designate one of the seven to serve as Chairman and serve in this capacity at the pleasure of the President. The seven would then select an eighth member to serve as chief executive officer of the Postal Service and the eighth would select the ninth member to serve as chief operating officer.

"It is hoped that this new Postal Service would become entirely self-supporting, within perhaps five years, except for subsidies for which Congress chooses to appropriate funds on behalf of specified public-service groups.

"The other bill I want to discuss is Congressman Dulski's bill, H. R. 4, the Postal Reform Act of 1969, which provides for reorganization within the framework of the Post Office Department. As you know, Congressman Dulski is Chair-

man of the House Committee on Post Office and Civil Service.

"Basically H. R. 4 proposes three changes in the Post Office Department: (1) to give to top management the authority it needs to operate consistent with its responsibilities; (2) to modernize employee-management relations to fit today's operations; and (3) to provide the Department with updated business-type financing."

Motor Vehicle Infant Deaths On Increase

COLLEGE STATION--Child seating devices in automobiles could reduce the growing number of car accident deaths in children.

"We need effective restraints for car passengers 5 to 12 years old," says Jane Fleischer, Extension family life specialist at Texas A&M University.

Although not ideal, use of adult safety belts for this age group does give some protection, she adds.

Children weighing less than 50 pounds should be kept in specially constructed devices as long as possible; other children should use adult safety belts.

Motor vehicle deaths for infants less than one year old rose 35 per cent between 1961 and 1966. Deaths for those one to four years old jumped 45 per cent.

President Signs 10 Year Extension For Conservation

President Nixon has signed into law a 10 year extension of the Great Plains Conservation Program.

The final bill—introduced by Senator Milton R. Young and Rep. Thomas S. Kleppe (ND) is a vote of confidence in the effectiveness of this system of conserving resources through use of long-term, cost-sharing contracts for land treatment.

The new legislation, clearly stating the responsibility of Soil & Water Conservation Districts in the program, authorized another \$150 million (exclusive of administrative costs) for the extension of the program from December 31, 1971 to December 31, 1981. It also modifies the existing program to:

1. give the Secretary of Agriculture additional latitude in determining adequacy of control of operating units for the contract period. This makes possible contracts on operating units where customary control is through annual leasing agreements.

2. authorize the Sect. of Ag. to enter into contracts on units not generally considered farms or ranches but where erosion is so serious as to make such contracts necessary for the protection of agricultural lands.

3. Provide for assistance on agriculture-related pollution problems in keeping with overall objectives of the program.

4. Permits modification of contracts to help make the provisions of the program more complementary with other conservation, land use, commodity program.

The act specifies that "approved conservation plans developed in cooperation with the soil & water conservation districts in which their lands are situated shall form a basis for contracts."

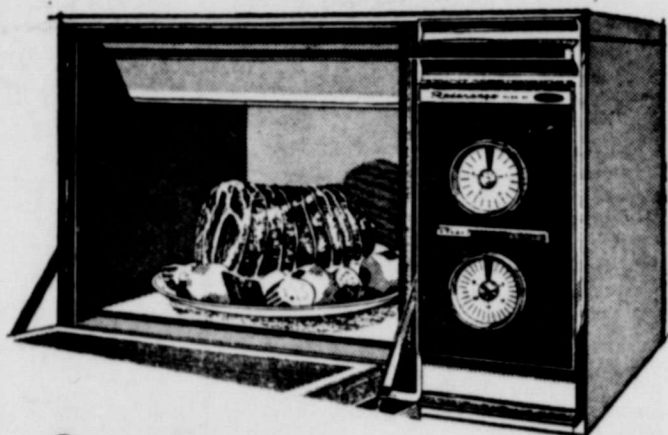

Ultrasonic Appliance Cleans All

COLLEGE STATION--Cleaning with sound. It's the newest innovation in home appliances. The new ultrasonic cleaner washes knives or dentures or figurines.

It will remove dirt, grease, rust, tarnish, stains and loosely adhering coatings from almost any hard-surfaced or semihard-surfaced item, says Extension Home Management Specialist Linda Jacobsen, Texas A&M University.

Just place the item in the cleaner's two quart tank, turn on the electricity and wait a minute. It comes out clean and gleaming!

Ultrasonic energy cleans the item. Miss Jacobsen explains that energy, vibrating at such high frequencies that it cannot be seen, heard or felt, moves through the liquid in the tank. Millions of tiny fast moving bubbles form and collapse.

The cleaner, which resembles a blender or small canister vacuum cleaner, is filled with warm water and a few drops of detergent or other cleaning agent.

They have several limitations, she adds. They won't clean fabrics, severely worn silver plate or objects held together with any kind of glue or cement such as costume jewelry; or remove fingernail polish or paints that require special solvents.

But it will clean things from coins, combs, electric cords, rusty pliers, an opener cutting wheels and even bicycle parts--as long as the items fit into the cleaning tank.

Man power, a brush and the proper cleaning agent will do the job but the cleaner does it faster and with less effort. It also drives the cleaning agents into difficult to reach parts.

The appliances have been used in business, medicine and science since the early fifties, says the specialist. Home models sell for about \$40.

Miss Jacobsen predicts that other ultrasonic appliances may follow. Carving knives, shavers, drills and welders for the homeworkshop, floor and wall cleaners and cleaners for swimming pools are possibilities.

VA WIDOWS DUE BIGGER CHECKS

Bigger checks for approximately 168,000 widows are due in January, Donald E. Johnson, Administrator of Veterans Affairs, announced today.

Signed by the President on October 27, 1969, a new law (PL 91-96) authorizes increases for most widows of servicemen and veterans who are eligible for dependency and indemnity compensation.

These payments, Johnson explained, are authorized for widows of servicemen and veterans who died on or after January 1, 1957, of service-connected causes.

The new legislation does not affect payments to survivors receiving compensation under laws that preceded the program.

New dependency and indemnity compensation rates provide \$167 monthly for

the widow of the lowest ranking enlisted man compared to a minimum of \$135 at present. Similar increases are provided for eligible widows of other enlisted men and officers. Effective December 1, the increase will show up first in checks received in January. This increase is automatic and no application is needed.

Widows with minor children will get an extra \$20 per month per child under the legislation. With few exceptions, they get nothing extra now. Forms for making application for children's allowances will be mailed to all widows automatically, Johnson said.

Recipients who are patients in nursing homes, or who are helpless or blind to the point that they need regular aid and attendance of another person, may receive an extra \$50 per month under the law.

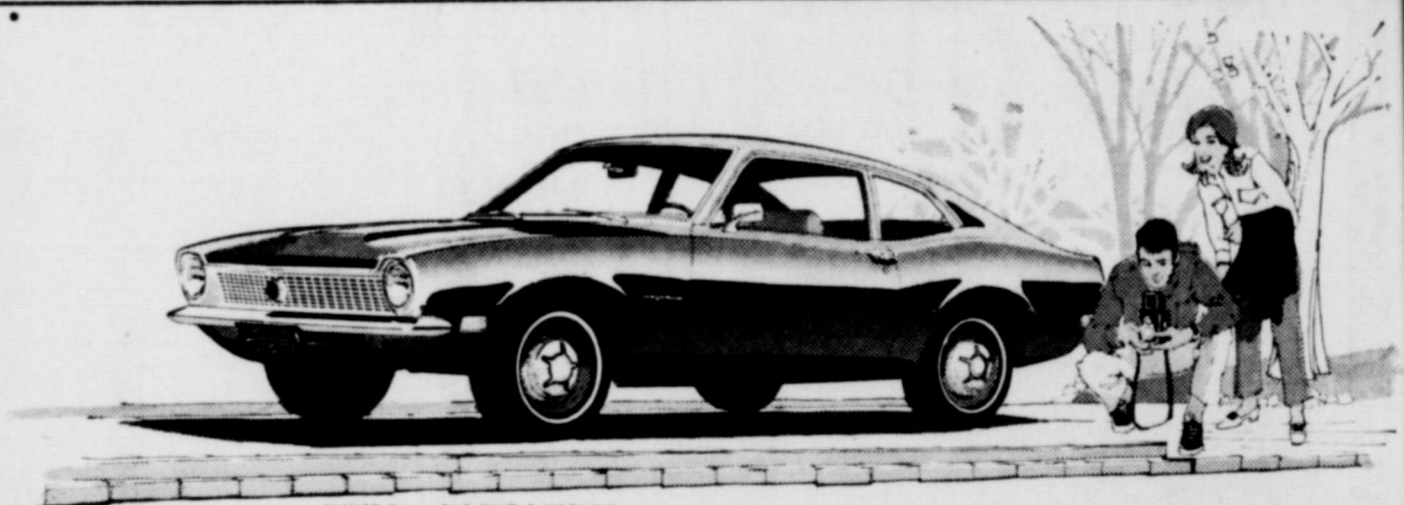
