

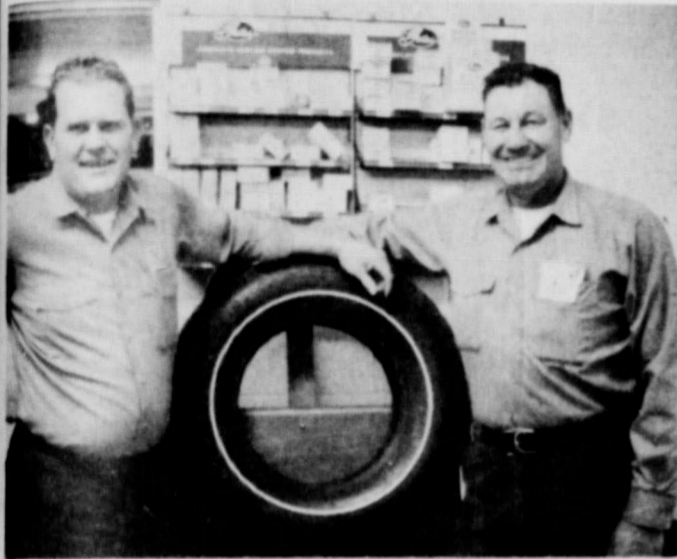

## Car Tag Time Nears

The Hansford County tax Assessor-Collectors office has received its consignment of more than 6,000 of the 1970 blue-on-white Texas license plates. License renewal period again will run from February 1 through April 1. The blue letters and numbers on a white background is the first color change in 22 years and the plates are again reflectorized.

Simpler renewal procedures this year will eliminate long lines and a late rush, say spokesmen of the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway department. License renewal applications will be mailed out to all owners of vehicles during the last week in December. These must be presented to the county tax office during February or March. ## High Draft Lottery Number Not Safe

Young men in this area who are counting upon their high draft lottery number keeping them out of service had better take another look.

Mrs. Don Shockley, clerk of local Selective Service Board 99, said that there is no assurance that a high number registrant will not be called. On the contrary, it appears that this local board might go completely into the 300's in order to fill calls in 1970.

The draft calls are made through local boards all over the United States and each local board is given a quota to fill with young men. The local boards also have the responsibility for classifying their registrants, although the regulations are such that the local board does not actually pick and choose who will go and who will not go.

Each local board will fill their quota with the men available and this may drop down the number list quite a ways.

The local board in Perryton, for example, will pick No. 21 for the first choice because they do not have available men with the first 20 numbers. After ten men are picked, then the number drops down to 139 for the 11th man. At this rate it won't take too long to get through all the numbers.

The local board has only 27 men who have been examined and are acceptable, ready for delivery to the armed forces.

Mrs. Shockley said that a Selective Service supervisor was in Perryton Monday to go over the new regulations with her and that, basically, the only thing the national lottery has changed on the local level is the order of selection. Whereas until the lottery the oldest was called first, now the lowest number is called first.

Mrs. Shockley said the local board had received its January quota for two men for induction and fifteen men for physicals. She said the two for induction would probably be those who had already been called but had, for one reason or another, received "postponements." These postponements are now terminat-

ed, so these men will be called.

"Of the fifteen to be called for physicals, we might have to go clear through number 100 for these," Mrs. Shockley said.

Prior to the national lottery, the files at the local board were set up according to birthdays and ages. Now the files have all been changed according to "random selection number."

Mrs. Shockley said the selection would definitely be made according to numbers, using lowest numbers first. "We will use up numbers fast," the clerk said, "because we do not have many available men and we go right on down the list until we fill our assigned quota."

All draft boards are required to send in lists of available men each month, and quotas are assigned accordingly. Larger boards are then called upon to furnish more men, smaller boards are assigned smaller quotas. Percentage wise, this makes draft quotas equal over the nation.

Members serving on the Selective Service Board No. 99 include Henry Owens of Canadian, chairman; Eddie Willey of Follett; Ted Voiles and Frank Shaffer of Perryton.

There is a vacancy on the board from Hansford County since Woodrow Gibner of Spearman resigned a few months ago. County Judge Johnnie C. Lee heads a committee which has been trying to fill this vacancy. The job is a thankless one and it is hard to find a man who is willing to serve in this capacity. "But Hansford County needs to be represented on this board," Judge Lee said. The draft board has been authorized to go ahead and select another man from Perryton to serve if a Hansford County man can not be found. "This would give Perryton three men on the board, and this is not fair representation," Mrs. Don Shockley said.

## Charged With Burglary Counts

Jose A. Olivearez, 22, of Spearman is in Hansford County jail in lieu of \$6,000 bond awaiting Grand Jury appearance.

Olivearez was charged with burglary of the Playhouse, local recreation center, and the trailer house behind the pool hall. He was arrested about 2 a. m. Saturday by City Policeman Bill Martin.

Officer Martin discovered the burglary when he was on his routine check of businesses on main street. He noticed machines inside the pool hall had been broken into. Martin went around the building, discovered Olivearez inside the trailer house and placed him under arrest. Chief of Police Leland Wood and Officer Martin placed the man in jail.

Olivearez was arraigned Monday before Justice of the Peace Johnny P. Vernon and charged with two counts, burglary of a business and burglary of a private residence at night. Vernon set bonds of \$3,000.00 on each count.

Investigating officers said Olivearez took all the cigarettes from the machine and the money from the coke machine. The inside of the trailer was badly damaged. A telephone was thrown through a window and everything had been broken up.

Entry into the pool hall was made through the back door. The glass of the door and a window was broken at the rear entrance.

Hansford County NFO delegates and members returned home from Louisville, Kentucky, this week following the largest and most successful national convention in the history of the National Farmers Organization.

A record 14,000 voting delegates attended two days of meetings, which charted the future of agriculture and strengthened the position of the family type farm in Rural America.

It was the largest farm convention in American history. Delegates heard fact-backed reports from various commodity department heads, calling attention to price increases being received by NFO members for their products through the NFO collective bargaining program.

For the first time in the history of agriculture, a co-ordinated bargaining program in all 48 states of the continental United States is operating or has the capability of operation, which makes the NFO structure a total collective bargaining structure.

President Oren Lee Staley told members in his State of Affairs message.

Delegates were warned that the first two years of the 70's will decide whether the family type farms or corporate ventures will supply the nation's foods.

The NFO announced a "gigantic" organizational drive this winter, designed to contact every farmer who is not a member of the NFO and ask him to join.

Staley pointed out that rural business men also have a large stake in the battle for rural America survival.

In a corporate agriculture structure, small business men will go down the drain along with the farmer.

Delegates were told that stepped-up bargaining efforts will be designed to secure more contracts and to improve the contracts the NFO already has in operation, and to secure added block bargaining.

The NFO still regards its holding actions of various farm commodities as a major factor in winning goals. Spot holding actions will be used as needed and now are in use on such products as grain

sorghum, durum wheat and some other feed grains in various areas.

Staley of Rea, Missouri, was re-elected national president and Erhard Pfingsten, Sergeant Bluff, Iowa, was renamed vice-president.

Attending from Hansford County as delegates were Jim McLain, Ronnie Williams, Lewis Henderson and Val Winger.

**New 1040 Form Offers Better Tax Benefits**

Each of the 18 million taxpayers in the United States who filed the now discontinued card 1040A Form last year, have either received a post card or will receive a post card within the next few days explaining the changes to the consolidated Form 1040, the Internal Revenue Service announced today.

This year all taxpayers will receive a larger, complete tax package that includes the one-page basis 1040 and additional pages or schedules, which may or may not be used according

to the taxpayer's needs.

In the past, taxpayers who used the 1040A could not take advantage of certain tax credits or exclusions and could not itemize their deductions. A principal reason for making the change to the new form is to enable taxpayers to take full advantage of the tax benefits the law provides, the post card says.

Most taxpayers should receive their individual tax forms and instructions by mail the first week of January.

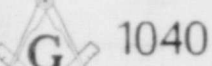

fresh by molding it into firkins,  
placing these in a wooden  
cask and then covering them  
with wine strong enough to  
float an egg. This not only  
kept the butter fresh, but guar-  
anteed a flavor not found in  
dairy products today!

Santa Claus is very popular  
this time of year, but he  
would be even more popular  
if he could figure out how to  
recover oil from one of Texas'  
richest fields. It's the Camp  
Hill field, discovered in  
1935 southeast of Palestine in  
East Texas. It is so rich that  
the blue-black liquid gold lit-  
erally melts and runs out when  
a sample of the sand is laid in  
the hot summer sun. And geolo-  
gists know that only 450  
feet below the ground is an  
estimated 50 million barrels  
of some of the best-grade  
oil ever found anywhere. In  
33 years, however, the Camp  
Hill field hasn't made any-  
body rich. The oil is so thick  
and heavy that it doesn't gush  
out of the ground. It oozes.  
And thus far, nobody has been  
able to devise a pump or any  
other system that can success-  
fully get the oil to the sur-  
face in large enough quanti-  
ties to make marketing it  
very profitable.

Oh well, this is just Texas  
for you! We used to be the  
biggest, best, etc, until  
Alaska came along.

Texas' first recorded Christ-  
mas celebration goes back  
286 years ago--to the time of  
Spanish exploration. It was  
held on a hilltop along the Rio  
Grande, near where Presidio  
now stands. The ceremony  
was ordered by Juan Dominguez  
de Mendoza, comman-

der of a detachment of sold-  
iers "going to the discovery  
of the East and the kingdom  
of Texas" under orders of  
the King of Spain. The date  
was December 25, 1683.

**Poinsettia  
Plant Care**

COLLEGE STATION-Poinsettias  
can stay colorful and attractive  
throughout the Christmas sea-  
son with a little help.

Place the plant in a sunny  
location away from drafts, heat  
vents or open doors which  
cause sudden temperature  
changes, says Everett Janne,  
Extension landscape horticul-  
turist.

Night temperatures should  
not drop below 60 degrees F.

Proper watering will prolong  
the Poinsettia's life. Because of  
low humidity in most homes  
and large leaf surfaces on the  
plant, it often requires fre-  
quent watering. If soil gets too  
dry, leaves will wilt.

On the other hand, says  
Janne, too much water cuts off  
oxygen to the roots.

Check for a drainage hole  
in the bottom of the pot. It  
may be stopped with decorator  
foam. If the hole is covered,  
the excess moisture can not  
drain out and the soil remains  
waterlogged.

About three weeks after the  
plant has been received, fer-  
tilize with a complete fertili-  
zer such as a 5-10-5 using one  
level teaspoon per six inch  
pot. Apply the fertilizer over  
the surface of the soil and wa-  
ter thoroughly.

Application may be repeat-  
ed at three week intervals until  
the colored bracts fade and  
drop, Janne says.

The poinsettia plant will go  
into a rest period sometime in  
mid-January and shed its col-  
ored bracts. When this oc-  
curs, gradually reduce the  
amount of water and move the  
plant to a cool location  
where the temperature will  
remain between 45 degrees F.  
to 55 degrees F.

Do not allow the plant to  
become too dry; however, ex-  
cessive moisture should be  
avoided.

The Texas A&M University  
specialist says the plant may  
be re-potted or placed directly  
in the yard.

If repotted, cut the plant  
back to three to six inches in  
height, shake the old soil  
from the roots, and re-pot  
in a fertile well-drained soil,  
having a pH of 6.0 to 7.0.  
After potting place the plant  
in the shade for a few days and  
water well.

To produce a compact bushy  
plant, pinch out the tips of the  
new growth when it reaches  
four to six inches in length.  
Repeat this procedure until the  
middle of August.

The Poinsettia is a short  
day plant and will not set  
flower buds and produce the  
colorful bracts until the short  
days of fall arrive. Flower  
buds will not form in a room  
where electric lights are used  
at night.

Beginning the first week in  
October, the plant should not  
receive over eight hours of  
daylight in order to hasten  
flower formation. Place the  
plant in a dark room at five  
o'clock in the afternoon and  
bring it back into the sunlight  
at eight o'clock in the morn-  
ing. After the bracts begin to  
show color, this short day  
treatment may be discontinued.  
Using this system the plants  
should show color by Thanksgiv-  
ing time and be in full bloom  
by Christmas.

Poinsettias are very suscepti-  
ble to damage by mealy  
bugs, aphids, or other sucking  
insects, Janne warns. Spraying  
with Malathion at the recom-  
mended rates will control  
these insects.

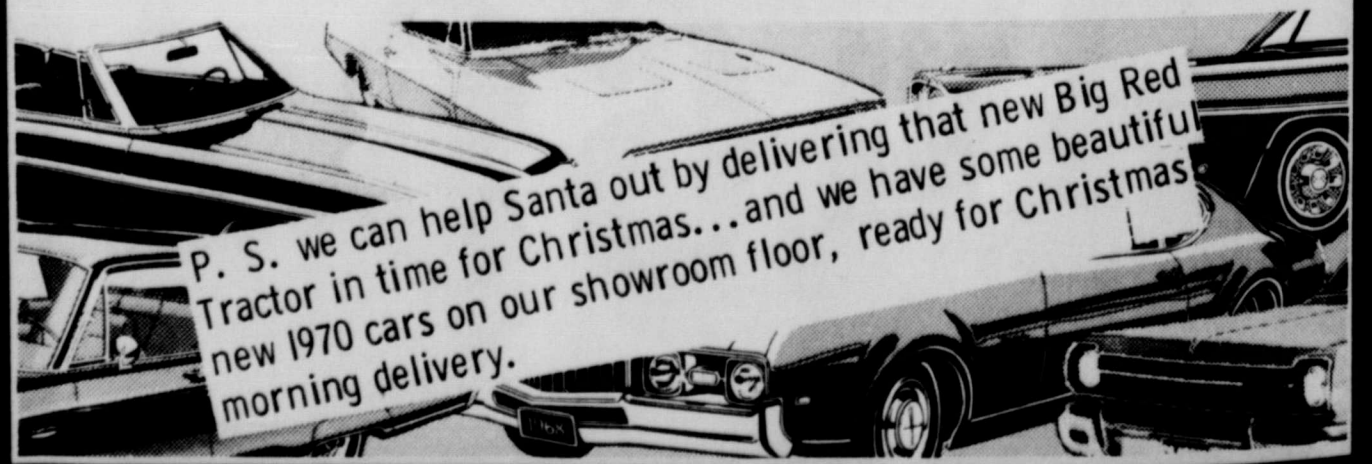

The committee will make its report, including findings and recommendations and drafts of any legislation concerning the Texas Election Code to the 62nd Legislature when it convenes in January, 1971.
