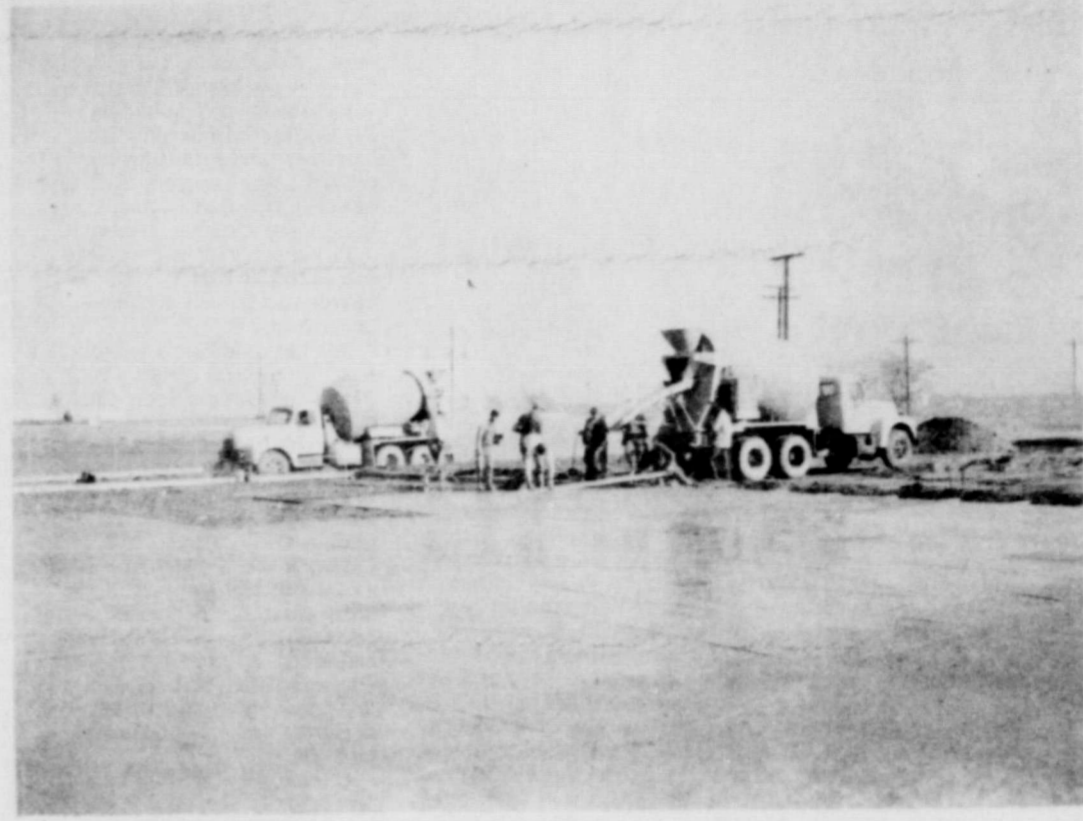

New Home For Hansford Impl.

Construction work began this week on the future new home for Hansford Implement Company, John Deere Dealers. Estimated cost on the building will be in the \$130,000 price range. Gene Cudd said the steel building will feature a front made from green Utah rock. "It is near a John Deere green," he said. The 17,000 square foot construction will house new offices, a shop, plus parts and display rooms. The projected completion date is 90 days from the time the steel frame goes up. Located on south highway 207, it is just south of the drive-in theatre. As soon as this building is completed, Cudd said workmen will begin on another building next door which will house a separate shop that will be used to set up machinery.

A Day to Rub Out Rubella

On February 11, a massive, one-day attack will be launched in Spearman. The enemy will be rubella—more commonly known as German or three-day measles—the disease that cripples and kills unborn children. Using vaccine licensed only last July, teams of doctors and nurses and volunteers hope to inoculate all the children ages 1 through 10 years who live in the Spearman and Morse school districts. The clinics will be held in the Spearman Elementary School on Wednesday, February 11. School children will receive their vaccine from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. Pre-school children may be brought to the clinic from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon. The Texas State Health Department states it is vital that all children be vaccinated to prevent an outbreak this spring. The reason for immediate concern is because rubella has a cycle of about every seven years. Unfortunately, it's about that time again. Doctors anticipate another epidemic in the spring of either 1970 or 1971. Rubella actually has little effect on those who contract it. But if a mother catches it during the first three months of pregnancy, the virus can be transmitted to her developing fetus through the placenta of her womb. It can affect either the unborn child's nervous, circulatory or skeletal systems or all of these. It can cause blindness, deafness, serious heart disease, mental retardation and growth failure. Pregnant women cannot be given the vaccination. This is too dangerous. The goal of stamping out the dread disease is being approached by inoculating children. Eventually, this way, the disease will die out from sheer "disuse." The last great rubella epidemic, only a few years ago, killed 30,000 babies and crippled at least as many more. Now the means to prevent it—a safe, effective vaccine—is available. The inoculation is FREE. See that your child gets it!

Zack Jagers and Mrs. Sheets attended the funeral services in Hattisburg.

Spearman In Path Of Low Flying Bombers

552 bombers on low-level bombing mission practices will bring these stratofortresses over Spearman in the very near future. Originating this week at Offutt Air Force Base, Neb., the project is designed to inject realism into Strategic Air Command training. The planes will not carry bombs, but radar bomb scoring equipment at nearby Air Force facilities will measure the accuracy of the simulated bomb drops. Spots near Thomas and Seminole, Okla. will be the simulated targets. Flying at subsonic speeds, the bombers will begin at a point northwest of Guyton, Okla. and proceed southeast toward Spearman. They will pass near Clinton, Okla. and veer south around Oklahoma City toward Seminole. Tests will continue for several months. The planes will fly along the centerline of a 10-mile wide corridor at 800 to 1,300 feet above the ground, according to the information office at Offutt. An Air Force spokesman said all target and route selections have been coordinated with the Federal Aviation Agency. Areas of population and heaviest air traffic have been avoided whenever possible, he said. Johnny Holland, son of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Holland of Spearman, arrived back in the U.S. this month following his second tour of duty in Vietnam. Johnny was discharged from the Army in California and is settling in Sacramento where he intends to make his home.
