## Fiftieth Anniversary Services Scheduled at First Baptist Sunday

Baptists from across the state and surrounding communities will join First Baptist members Sunday, March 8 to celebrate the golden (50th) anniversary of First Baptist Church, Spearman.

Robert H. Lloyd, Chaplain for High Plains Baptist Hospital, Amarillo, will speak at the 11 a. m. worship hour.

Following the worship hour, dinner will be served in the fellowship hall at the church. After the meal, former members and visitors will be honored at a reception.

The 7 p. m. service Sunday will conclude the day's observance of the half-century mark for First Baptist Church.

Many, many people have labored and sacrificed down through the years and have made it possible for the local congregation to have the kind of church it has today. Many of these people, some still living, many gone on to their eternal reward, are named in a brief history of the First Baptist Church which was compiled and written by Marvin Jones, a deacon of the present church. The history follows:

The toll of many passing years has greatly obscured the beginning of the institution we now know as the First Baptist Church of Spearman.

From early records we can assume that if history had followed its logical course, the church would have been the First Baptist Church of Hansford, a town which had been established in 1887 about six miles west of the present city of Spearman.

However, the officials of the Santa Fe railroad tipped the scales by routing a railway east of Hansford in 1919. The residents of Hansford moved their homes and business buildings to the new site to form the city named Spearman in honor of Thomas E. Spearman, a Santa Fe official.

By 1920 the Baptists living in Spearman had sought out one another and decided that the time was right to form a church.

On March 14, 1920 the First Baptist Church, came into being with eleven members in-

cluding Mr. and Mrs. H. E. James, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Burrow, Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Barbour, Herman Barbour, Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Black, Mrs. Eva Wilbanks and Henry Waldrop. The church was organized under the declaration and covenant of Pendleton's Church Manual, and a petition was presented to the Trans-Canadian Association for membership. The first trustees named were H. E. James, E. H. Barbour, W. A. Burrow, and A. M. Black.

On July 4, 1920, Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Burran and Bernice Burran were received as members followed on July 25 by Mrs. Fred Brandt, Mrs. R. L. McClellan, Miss Ethel Deakin, Albert Burrow and Mrs. Tom Burgess, the new church's first candidate for baptism. The last members to join in 1920 were Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Raney, Laura Bell Raney and a Mrs. Turner. Thus the church concluded its first year with twenty three members.

In this same year, the Town-site company gave the church three lots with the provision that a building be erected in two years. The first of several structures that was to house the congregation was purchased for \$250.00 and erected. This was a crude, tar paper building called "The Shack" by the members. This building eventually fell into such disrepair that it was torn down and the material in it was incorporated into another building called "The Tabernacle," which in turn was destroyed by a windstorm. Following this, the church met with the Presbyterians, then in the school auditorium until a basement structure was completed in 1927. This structure was conceived to be the foundation of a subsequent building, but was found to be of inadequate size. Evangelist B. B. Crimm aroused some ire among the congregation when, during a revival here, he referred to their basement sanctuary as "a hole in the ground." The basement was used until 1947, when the present main building was constructed.

Until 1923 the church had no regular pastor, but was served from time to time by Bro. Tubbs and Bro. Younger. In 1923 the church called its first pastor, W. E. Hand, who agreed to serve half time at a salary of \$75 a month.

In 1926, Rev. A. W. Fetchner accepted the pastorate and served for about six months. Bro. J. H. Richards came to Spearman in 1927 to hold a revival and was subsequently called as pastor. During his first year as pastor a basement building was completed and Baptist moved into their own church. The first pulpit furniture for this basement church was secured by Mr. Fred J. Hoskins, who made arrangements to purchase some furnishings out of the County Court Room. During Rev. Richards' 5 1/2 year tenure the church grew from 42 to 300 members.

The church called Bro. A. F. Loftin as pastor, June 1, 1933, and he served for five years. Something of the hardships of the times is indicated in the church minutes that note that Bro. Loftin's salary was raised from \$65.00 to \$80.00 per month. The church was most fortunate to have the Loftins return to Spearman upon his retirement. He made many great contributions to the life of the church until his death in 1954. Mrs. Loftin is still very faithful in teaching the Fidelis Sunday School class.

Bro. Matthew Doyle assumed pastoral duties on August 1, 1938. By this time the church was aware of a keen need to launch a building program and by February, 1943 the records show that \$2,375 had been raised and \$1,100 in bonds had been purchased.

The actual building program remained to be carried out under the leadership of Bro. Sam Malone who accepted the church's call December 10, 1944. On January 14, 1945 W. M. Glover, Carl E. Hutchison and Ed Hutton were appointed to draw up building plans. A finance committee composed of Rex Sanders, Joe Hatton, Fred Hoskins, Wesley Garnett, Everett Vanderburg, Ray Moore, C. A. Castleman and T. R. Shirley was named. The church purchased the three lots joining the older property and the architectural firm of Ritenberry and Son were contracted. A ground breaking ceremony was held in the fall of 1945. By 1947 all the brick work was completed, and August 1, 1947 a homecoming and corner stone laying service was held. Finally, in May, 1948 the congregation moved from the old basement building into its new quarters. The first service held was the Baccalaureate for the graduating class of 1948.

Following this very fruitful ministry, Bro. Malone resigned September 1, 1948. Bro. A. F. Loftin was invited to serve as interim pastor.

Bro. Ray Stevens was preferred a call September 19, 1948 and served as pastor for two years. During this time the entire indebtedness of the church was retired, and a note burning ceremony was held November 26, 1950 during Bro. Stevens' last service here. Bro. Stevens resigned to re-enter military service as a Chaplain. He sacrificed his life several months later in an attempt to save a soldier from

drowning.

The next pastor to come to the church was W. B. Greene, who served from January 21, 1951 to November 28, 1951. Bro. O. L. Bryant was extended a call January 20, 1952. Under his leadership, the church prospered and experienced a growth that led to the construction of the two story air conditioned educational unit now in use. This building was put to use October 4, 1959. Bro. Bryant resigned May 1961 and moved to a church in Houston, where he is still serving.

Bro. Luther Berry moved on the field as pastor August, 1961. He resigned November, 1966 to move to his present work in Derby, Kansas.

The church called Bro. B. T. Shoemaker pastor, 1967 and he has served as pastor to the present time.

The early roster of deacons is somewhat uncertain but the following men apparently served at various times up to 1943: Charles Collard, 1922; Harvey Wilcox, 1923; Fred Hoskins, 1926; Otis Parker, 1926; Melvin Jackson, 1927; Dwight Holland, 1928; Ed Read, 1928; Ed Howerton, 1928; L. W. Austin, 1930; Carl Hutchison, 1934; C. A. Castleman, 1943. At one time, only Carl Hutchison, Fred Hoskins and Ed Reid were serving.

August 4, 1946, Joe Hatton, Denzel Jackson, Chester Evans, Everett Vanderburg and Ray Moore were ordained under the ministry of Bro. Sam Malone.

While Bro. Bryant was pastor, Marvin Jones was ordained in 1952. T. A. Blanton and Oliver Levertone were accepted as deacons in 1953. In 1957, Paul Hazelwood, Bill Russell, Joe Novak and Woodville Jarvis were ordained. In 1957, Glenn Hiller and Glenn Day were ordained and Fred Fewin was made an active deacon. Doug Connelly, Marshall Benton and Jim Burks were made active deacons in 1968.

Understandably, the dish is a favorite with her husband, David, a petroleum landman, and her children, Amy 9, Greg 8, Laurie 5 and Michael 2.

Mrs. Jordan, a Spearman native, learned to cook from her mother, a home economics teacher. Ever since, she's been cooking up a storm. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. D. Sansing of Spearman.

"I just love recipe books," she said. "I sit down and read them and clip out recipes from papers."

When she is not cooking, Mrs. Jordan, who has a degree in business and education, enjoys craft-type things like papier mache and decoupage and walking on the beach with her family.

How does her husband feel about this contest hubbub? "He called recently pretending he was Mr. Pillsbury," Tynelle said. He also said if she won this year he would enter next year. He jokes that he is a better cook than his wife.

From March 14-18 Mrs. Jordan will be in San Diego and her husband hopes to go with her. She will be entertained and will gather any special ingredients she wants until the day of the bake-off. The 100 cooks will have seven hours and enough ingredients for four recipes. They will prepare them at Hotel Del Coronado and when the winners are announced by Bob Baker of television's "Truth or Consequences" show it will be televised.

Mrs. Jordan will be required to bake two cakes: One to taste and one to photograph. She's taking along her own bundt pan. The judges will grade on top baking quality and also will look for creative recipes with shortcuts that appeal to busy homemakers.

Mrs. Jordan already knows she'll be "terribly nervous and excited." If she wins, she would like to use the money to refurbish her living room, give some "to the Lord's work" and invest the rest for her children's education.

Her husband has confidence

in her victory. "I think she has a good chance of winning, baking is her specialty, especially sweet goody things."

Below is a recipe for one of her "sweet goody things." The fruit pound cake must remain a secret until the bake-off winners are announced, when it likely will appear in cookbooks across the nation.

Chocolate Sheet Cake Boil in pan just till it bubbles: 1 stick butter, 1/2 cup shortening, 4 TBL spoons cocoa, 1 cup water, sift into bowl: 2 cups sugar, 2 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Pour hot mixture into flour mixture and stir well. Add: 2 eggs, 1/2 cup buttermilk, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 teaspoon cinnamon.

Cake should be baked in large (12 x 18) pan, bake at 400 degrees 25 minutes.

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## School Board Renews Principal's Contracts

The Spearman School board, meeting in regular session Monday night, gave all three school principals two year contracts through June 30, 1972. This renews contracts for Kenneth McKay, High School; Eddie Clemmons, Jr. High and Allen Alford, Elementary.

Alford has been with the Spearman school system 12 years. Clemmons is serving his first year as Jr. High principal and McKay is completing his 4th year in this position.

Teachers contracts will be considered at the April meeting. The school calendar for next year was approved by the board. Pre-school work shops for teachers will be August 18 with the first day for students set for August 21. The last day of school will be May 28.

Two resignations were

accepted, effective the end of this school term, from Judy King, 2nd grade teacher, and Tommy Fanbrough, 7th grade coach and PE teacher.

The board also approved the text book committee's selections for textbooks to be used next year, and reviewed the census report. Last year 1130 students were listed on the roll. This year the count was 1211, an increase of 81 students.

There will be a District TSTA meeting Friday in Amarillo and since all teachers will be attending, this will be a holiday for Spearman school students.

## ABSENTEE BALLOTING BEGINS MON.

The Spearman Independent School District has set April 4 as the date for the annual School Board election which will be held in the Junior High School.

The two placed to be filled are those now held by board president Max Bagerly and board secretary Joel Lackey.

Mr. Bagerly, who is completing his 2nd term did not file for re-election. Mr. Lackey is completing his first term on the board and has filed for re-election.

Three others have filed. They are: James F. Greene, Cloyd (Sonny) Windom, and Ray J. Martin. All four candidates are graduates of Spearman High School and all are farm-ranch business men. These are three year terms to be filled.

Absentee balloting for both the school board election and the City election to name councilmen and mayor will begin Monday, March 16.

Absentee votes may be cast at the City Hall and at the business office, Spearman high school.

The City election will be held in conjunction with the School board election on April 4 at the Junior High school.

### ELECTION ORDER & NOTICE THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF HANSFORD

On this the 9th day of February, 1970, the Board of Trustees of Spearman Independent School District convened in regular session, open to the public, with the following members present, to-wit: Max Baggerly, President; Joel Lackey, Ira Harbour, Marvin Jones, Hershel Jones, Chalmers Porter, Bill Partridge constituting a quorum and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:

WHEREAS, the term of office of Max Baggerly and Joel Lackey members of the Board of Trustees of this School District will expire on the first Saturday in April, 1970, said first Saturday being April 4, 1970, and on said date a trustee election will be held in said School District.

WHEREAS, it is necessary for this Board to pass an order establishing the procedure for filing for and conducting said trustee election;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SPEARMAN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held in said School District on April 4, 1970, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Trustees of said School District Two Trustees.

That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and signed by the candidate and filed with the secretary of the Board of Trustees at the superintendent's office not later than 30 days prior to the date of said election.

All candidates shall file with said application the loyalty affidavit required by Art. 6, 02 of the Election Code.

The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall post on the bulletin board in the building where the Board of Trustees meets the names of all candidates that have filed their applications in accordance with the terms and provisions of Art. 13, 32 of the Election

Code.  
3. That said election shall be held at the following place and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

At Junior High Building in Spearman, Texas, in said School District, with J.L. Brock as Presiding Judge, and Sally Desimone and Colleen Shaeffer Clerks.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 8:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

4. Orville Latham is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Jo Cochran and June Day are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at School Business Office, 403 East 11th Ave., Spearman, Texas within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

5. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as near as may be, by the Election Code of this State, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

6. Immediately after said election has been held, the officials holding the same shall return to the president of the Board of Trustees in a sealed envelope a copy of the returns, poll list and tally sheet for said election, and this set of election returns shall be used by the Board of Trustees in canvassing said election.

## Former Pastor Dies In Pampa

Rev. Robert Girouard, former pastor of the Spearman Apostolic Faith Church and the former pastor of the Apostolic Faith Church of Pampa and Full Gospel Church of Perryton died suddenly Wednesday, March 4. He was working in his garden at their home at 2206 Chestnut in Pampa when he took ill at 11 a. m. He died within the hour.

He was born in Raywood, Texas November 3, 1896. He was educated in Tucumcari, N. M., and in the Draughton's Business College. He served overseas in the army during World War I. After the war he came to the Panhandle. He was converted in a revival conducted by Dr. Nelson and the Morton Sisters in Spearman. He immediately embraced the Apostolic Faith Full Gospel and soon entered the preaching ministry at the age of 25.

Robert Girouard married Joe Blanche Thompson of Hansford County on August 4, 1929. Ro-

bert and Joe became the parents of one son and two daughters.

Rev. Girouard conducted many revivals. He was an outstanding Bible teacher. Within the last two years of his life he published a serious book on prophetic and doctrinal subjects. His book is entitled: "Selected Bible Studies". He took humble pride in this book and would give copies to people that wanted it if they did not have the money to pay for it.

Although Rev. Girouard was not a pastor of any certain church at the time of his death he was still very active in preaching and teaching. He preached for the Spearman Church a week before his death and preached twice in the Dumas church the Sunday before he died.

He taught Evangelism, Bible Doctrine, and Prophecy classes several terms in the Apostolic Faith Bible School in Bax-

ter Springs, Kansas. He served as superintendent of this school two terms in 1959 and 1960.

Over the years of his ministry he served as pastor in Booker, Perryton, Katy, Center Point, Pampa, Spearman, Texas; Webb City, Missouri; Cheney, Kansas, Wichita, Kansas, Morning Star, Oklahoma; Kings Mill, Texas; Baxter Springs, Kansas.

Funeral services were conducted in the Full Gospel Church, Perryton, Saturday, March 7. Burial was in Pampa. All the pallbearers and honorary pallbearers were fellow preachers of Rev. Girouard. Officiating ministers were Rev. Jack Barker, Rev. Gail Schultz and Rev. Jacob C. Regier. Musical numbers were rendered by the Adain family of Canyon and Mrs. Donna Barker of Katy.

Survivors are his wife, Pampa; his son, Robert Wayne of Angel's Camp, California; daughters, Mrs. Donna Joe Berry, Pampa; Mrs. Patricia Angelyn Boren, Albuquerque, N. M., and six grandchildren.

### When God Was On Trial

It seems incredible that God's own beloved Son, who lived a perfect life, would find Himself on trial for His life.

Jesus Christ was all-divine as well as all-human. Therefore, we view a point in history when mere human beings placed God, Himself, on trial.

Equally incredible is the timing of the trial in the life of Christ — at the prime of life and soon after the beginning of a mighty ministry.

Yet, after only three active years of service, Jesus found Himself facing not one, but a series of trials.

Jesus could have escaped all of this, but He chose to be obedient to the Father. In keeping with the fore-ordained purpose of God, He was subjected to a mocking trial as a basis for condemnation to death.

#### Determined to Kill

The Jewish religious leaders were determined to kill Jesus and these trials provided legal justification for their designs.

This mockery began at midnight on Thursday and ended at daylight on Friday morning. And so, in a few dark hours, the death sentence fell heavy on the shoulders of an innocent Man.

Many witnesses committed perjury.

The Sanhedrin could have had plenty of evidence, which they did not want. Man after man could have testified, "I was a leper and He cleansed me"; "I was blind and He made me see"; "I was deaf and He made me hear"; "I was lame and He made me walk"; "My life had no meaning and He showed me life full of meaning and eternal."

Jesus was arrested without a formal charge. He was put on

oath to condemn Himself. There was no discussion of the charge of blasphemy.

The time of the ecclesiastical trials — before dawn — was illegal. And those who pronounced the death sentence had no authority to do so.

Jesus was then taken before the governor of the province of Judea, Pontius Pilate, who found no fault with Him.

The next trial found Jesus standing before Herod Antipas. This was not a serious trial, but only another step in the disgraceful treatment of an innocent man.

#### No Fault

Finally, Pilate examined Jesus again and found no fault with Him. He wished to release Him.

At the time of the feast, tradition called for the governor to release a prisoner. Confronted with the choice between Jesus, the Christ, and Barabbas, a murderer, the mob chose Barabbas.

In this choice, the mob chose lawlessness instead of law, violence instead of peace, hatred instead of love.

When Pilate asked, "What then, shall I do with Him whom ye call King of the Jews?" they cried, "Crucify Him."

The entire proceedings constitute one of the most disgraceful legal incidents in all history.

Who was responsible? Pilate, Annas, Caiaphas, the people? Pilate's question is every man's question. Each person faces the question, "What shall I do with Jesus who is called the Christ?" And each person makes a response.

Many respond with hatred and rejection. Others decide by indecision. Many admire Him and put Him off. A few accept Him. What will you do with Jesus? Who is called the Christ?



### WHAT 100 NEW FACTORY WORKERS BRING TO A TOWN



### WEDNESDAY, APRIL 1, 1970, WILL BE CENSUS DAY FOR THE NINETEENTH DECENNIAL CENSUS OF THE UNITED STATES

#### WHY IS THE CENSUS TAKEN?

The 1970 census is being taken in accordance with Article I of the Constitution, which requires that an "actual enumeration of the people" be taken within "every subsequent term of ten years" following the first enumeration, which was taken in 1790.

#### WHO WILL BE COUNTED?

Every American alive on April 1, Persons who die and babies born on that day are counted. Foreign nationals studying, working in the United States on that day are counted. American temporarily abroad on vacations, business trips, etc., are counted.

Members of the Armed Forces and their dependents living on military bases both in the United States and abroad, as well as Navy personnel at sea, will be counted by means of special procedures worked out in cooperation with the Department of Defense. Crews of merchant vessels at sea will be counted through the cooperation of the U. S. Maritime Administration.

The Department of State, through its embassies and consulates around the world, will assist in the enumeration of American civilians living abroad.

Also counted will be the inhabitants of Puerto Rico, Guam, Virgin Islands of the United States, American Samoa, Canal Zone, and other outlying areas of U. S. sovereignty or jurisdiction.

#### HOW MANY QUESTIONS?

For four households in five there are seven questions relating to each individual, three to make sure everyone is counted, and 13 relating to the house. For one household in five there are additional questions. The largest number is for one household in 20, for whom the total could be 89, which would include questions for the house, but not all questions apply to every family. Answering most of the questions involves selecting one of several answers listed and marking it. The average household takes no more than 15 minutes to answer the questionnaire that goes to four out of five households; if the household is in the sample (one out of five), about 30 minutes more is required.

#### WHY A SAMPLE?

Most of the information collected in Census '70 will be from a sample of the people. The selection of the sample is done entirely impersonally in accordance with scientific sampling procedures. Every household and every person has an equal chance of being included. Using a sample reduces costs and makes it easier for most of the public.

#### NEW QUESTIONS?

The questions for 1970 are essentially the same as those that were asked in 1960. Most of them were included also in 1950 and earlier censuses. New questions will be asked about vocational training in addition to formal schooling, whether the person has a health condition or disability that limits the kind or amount of work he can do, and whether the family has a "second" or "vacation" home.

#### WHY NOT JUST A HEAD COUNT?

Ever since 1790 the census, by law, has been a means of providing essential information about conditions in the country for the use of government and the public. The subjects included have changed as the needs for information have changed. Since 1930, the law providing for the census has called for a Census of Population, Unemployment, and Housing (including utilities and equipment).

#### HOW WERE THE QUESTIONS CHOSEN?

Census questions are chosen after consultation with many Federal, State, and local government agencies, with appropriate committees of the Congress, and with advisory groups representing many public interests. Every question in Census '70 is asked because the information is needed by some agency of the government, Federal, State, or local, to guide important programs in the public interest, such as improving education, employment, or housing. The fact that many of the statistics are also useful to others is an added benefit.

#### MUST THE CENSUS QUESTIONS BE ANSWERED?

Yes, the law requires that census questions be answered truthfully and to the best of one's knowledge. This has been so for every census since 1790. The public has always cooperated with the census, and very few people have ever been fined by the courts for failure to cooperate. No one has ever been jailed.

#### WHY MUST THE QUESTIONS BE ANSWERED?

The requirement that questions be answered emphasizes the importance of everyone's participation, and assures the individual that the obligation is shared by all. It also gives assurance that statistics from the census will be accurate for very small areas, such as neighborhoods within a city, as well as for every city, county and State. Voluntary surveys, such as those conducted by the Census Bureau and by private polling organizations, can produce estimates for the Nation or a State, but are not suitable for providing statistics for many small areas.

#### PRIVACY?

In a census the Government asks the public to provide certain information in order to prepare the statistical data which are needed by the Government, and not for any other purpose. The Census law (Title 13 U. S. Code) guarantees that all information given will be held in confidence and only statistical totals will be published. No one outside the Census Bureau can see the information for any individual. It cannot be given to any other Government agency, local officials, nor to anyone else. All census employees, including temporary workers, are subject to severe penalties if they violate their oath not to reveal any information about persons or household.

#### HOW WILL CENSUS '70 BE TAKEN?

Two methods are being used to take the census: one-way mail and two-way mail. The attached maps show the areas in which the two methods will be used, as well as the cities in which the district offices are located. For the purpose of administering the census locally, the country has been divided into 393 geographic districts, ranging in area from a few blocks, such as those in New York City, to an entire State, such as Wyoming. Census work in each district will be directed by a district manager, most of whom are hired locally. They, in turn work under the general direction of the Census Bureau's permanent regional field directors.

#### Here are the basic steps in the one-way mail method:

1. Local post offices will be supplied copies of the short census form and instruction sheets. The forms will bear no addresses. On Saturday, March 28, letter carriers will leave one at each residential mailbox on their routes.
2. Householders are to fill out the forms and have them ready for a census taker to pick up. At every fifth household, the census taker will fill out the longer form by interview. Census takers in the one-way mail areas will begin their house-to-house canvass April 1.
3. When all census takers have completed their work in a district, which is expected to take from three to five weeks, and the forms reviewed, they will be shipped to the Census Bureau for processing.

#### Here are the basic steps in the two-way mail method:

1. On March 28, letter carriers will deliver at each residence an envelope con-

- taining the census form addressed to that household together with a "yellow instruction sheet and a brown, post-paid return envelope. The address will bear no name. Four out of every five households will receive the short census form, and the fifth household will receive the longer form.
2. All forms are to be filled out and mailed in the return envelope on Wednesday, April 1.
3. The returned forms will be checked for legibility and completeness.
4. Incomplete or illegible forms will be followed up by telephone, if the information can be obtained that way, or by personal interview, if not.
5. Census workers will check addresses of returned forms against the master address list and will make personal visits to those addresses from which no forms are returned. Follow-up work will begin about two weeks after Census Day.
6. When all addresses have been accounted for and all forms completed and returned, they will be shipped to the Census Bureau where processing of the data will begin.

#### WHY THE MAIL METHOD?

Census Bureau officials have found as a result of the test censuses taken since 1960 that the mail method will improve the quality of census statistics. The statistics will be more accurate for these reasons:

1. The census workers in each area will have a list of addresses where people live, a list which has been triple checked for accuracy by the letter carriers of the Post Office.
2. Each family or household will have its census form for several days before it is to be mailed. This permits each person to provide information about himself and to look up records if this is necessary.
3. In the area of two-way mailing, most census forms will be answered and mailed on April 1 or soon afterward, so information about who was actually in the household on that date probably will be more accurate than if the information is given to a census taker a month later.

Filling out the form should be a family project, with husband and wife or other family members double checking one another in providing answers to the questions. After the names of all household members are listed, answers to most other questions will be made by blacking in small circles with a common lead pencil. These strategically placed black dots, rather than customary script, are the "writing" that can be read by the Census Bureau's electronic scanning machines. These devices scan microfilm copies of the forms and transfer information about each person to computer tape. Computers then convert the census information into statistical tables in which no individual, no family, no house can be identified.

#### WHY THE TWO MAIL METHODS?

The two-way mail method will be used generally in the large cities and their suburbs. In most rural areas and small urban communities the one-way mail method will be used because adequate mailing lists are not available.

#### HOW MUCH WILL IT COST?

The total cost of the 1970 census is estimated at \$210,000,000. This figure includes planning and preparation, the collection of data, tabulation of data by electronic computer, and printing the statistical reports.

About 98,000,000 census questionnaires have been printed, 90,000,000 envelopes, 45,300,000 yellow instruction sheets.

The census will require the services of 185,000 field workers; 13,000 to staff district offices, 12,000 crew leaders, 160,000 census takers.

For the crew leaders and census takers' use, the Bureau has ordered 314,000 pencils, 196,000 pocket type pencil sharpeners, 172,000 identification cards, 172,000 portfolios, 160,000 enumerator's manuals.

#### WHEN WILL RESULTS BE AVAILABLE?

A preliminary, unofficial count for counties, places of 10,000 or more population, and some smaller places will be announced beginning in early May either by individual district managers or regional field directors. In the fall, the Census Bureau will commence to publish official figures for States, counties, cities, towns and villages. As required by law, the final total population figures for each State must be transmitted by the Secretary of Commerce to the President no later than December 1, together with a tabulation of the number of seats in the House of Representatives of the Congress assigned to each of the 50 States in accordance with the Apportionment Act.

This will be followed by the compilation and publication of detailed reports for the United States, its major regions and geographic divisions, the 50 States, metropolitan and urbanized areas, counties, cities, towns, and villages, and outlying areas including Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands of the U. S., Canal Zone, and Guam.

### TELEPHONE RECORDINGS TO AID DRs.

A medical information service created by the University of Texas M. D. Anderson and Tumor Institute at Houston will be available March 1 to physicians in all communities in the state. The "Dial Access" system consists of 100 pre-recorded medical lecture-consultations on various treatments, drugs and techniques used to help the cancer patient. Recordings which range up to seven minutes in length are transmitted via telephone. Long distance calls for Texas physicians are toll-free. "Dial Access serves as a consultative aid and is not intended to replace the intensive personal care of the attending physician," said Dr. Robert C. Hickey, executive vice president and

director. Presentations were recorded by physicians and medical investigators at the university cancer hospital, as well as other eminent Texas scientists. Recordings will be upgraded and expanded periodically as new information evolves and new subjects are requested. The Dial Access program operates as an extension of Anderson's Research Medical Library. Dial Access was initiated after an extensive survey was made under the auspices of the Regional Medical Program of Texas. This survey

### Certificates Awarded Reflects Growth In Adult Education

AUSTIN--The number of Texans awarded high school equivalency certificates each year nearly tripled from 1963 to 1969, according to a report presented Monday (March 2) to the State Board of Education.

The number of certificates awarded by the Texas Education Agency jumped from 8,464 in 1963 to 21,946 in 1969.

"Public interest in the General Educational Development (GED) testing program is so great that we now receive about 1,000 inquiries a month," Dr. L. Harlan Ford, Agency assistant commissioner for teacher education and instructional services, reports. Dr. Ford, who serves as state administrator for the program, says the increase in Texas certificates reflects a nationwide growth in upgrading the education of adults.

A second Agency unit, the division of adult basic education, has designed a special refresher course to help Texans 19 years old and older to pass the battery of tests.

The Agency supervises 125 testing centers, including 73 high schools, 33 junior colleges, and 19 senior colleges. The Agency has also established a testing center at the Huntsville State Prison to serve inmates of the system.

Texas centers also use special editions of the tests for the visually handicapped, large type for the partially sighted and tape recordings for the legally blind.

AUSTIN--Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game management officers cleared 1,709 cases from the books in January and obtained 1,321 convictions.


Hunting violations drew the most citations with 1,075, and fishing violations brought 153 citations.

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### CONGRESSMAN PRICE SAYS EXCHANGE CHICAGO 7 FOR AMERICAN PRISONERS

Congressman Bob Price (R-Tex.) has proposed that the Chicago 7 and their attorneys be exchanged for a specified number of American prisoners of war who are being held captive by the North Vietnamese.

Price got the idea, he reported, when "The North Vietnamese spokesman at the Paris Peace Talks, with his usual reckless disregard for truth, charged the Nixon Administration with 'fascist repression' in the handling of the Chicago Conspiracy Trial, and demanded the full release of the convicted defendants and their attorneys."

This announcement reminded Price of the fact that earlier, the Communists implied that the seven defendants in the Chicago Trial were being treated as political prisoners of war because they oppose U. S. involvement in Vietnam. "As usual," Price said, "the Communists could not have been further from the truth,"

Price decided, however, that the two declarations taken together raised an intriguing possibility. He declared, "I think our negotiators in Paris should explore with the North Vietnamese, the possibility of exchanging the Chicago 7 and their attorneys for a specified number of our American prisoners of war who are being inhumanely held captive by the Reds."

"Despite the fact that the Chicago 7 and their attorneys have been convicted of breaking the laws of the land, I think the exchange would be well worth it," he said. "I do not think the price to be too high; if by paying the price, the release and freedom of some of our imprisoned servicemen could be assured," he stated. "Besides," he added "since the Chicago radicals parade their contempt for the American system of government, perhaps everyone would be better off if the whole rat pack left this country and

went to North Vietnam."

Price, a former jet fighter pilot, has introduced legislation calling for the humane treatment and immediate release of all American POWs. Four friends Price flew combat with in Korea are known to be Communist prisoners, and two others are listed as missing in action over North Vietnam.

Price is also the author of a bill to prohibit anti-war demonstrators from using the names of war dead without first obtaining written permission from the deceased soldier's next of kin.

There are 180 other census districts throughout the country where this method of enumeration will be used. The Census Bureau estimates that about 40 percent of the U. S. population live in these districts.

There are 212 other census districts in which the remaining 60 percent of the population live. These districts, for the most part, include the large cities and their suburbs. Households in these districts will also receive census questionnaires in the mail to fill out, but they will be asked to mail them back to the census office in a postage-free envelope that will accompany the questionnaire. No census taker will call at these households from which completely filled out questionnaires are returned.
