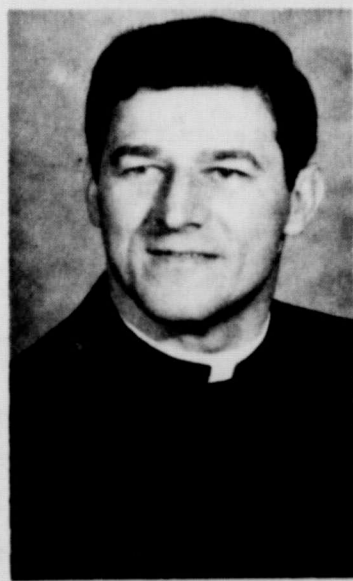
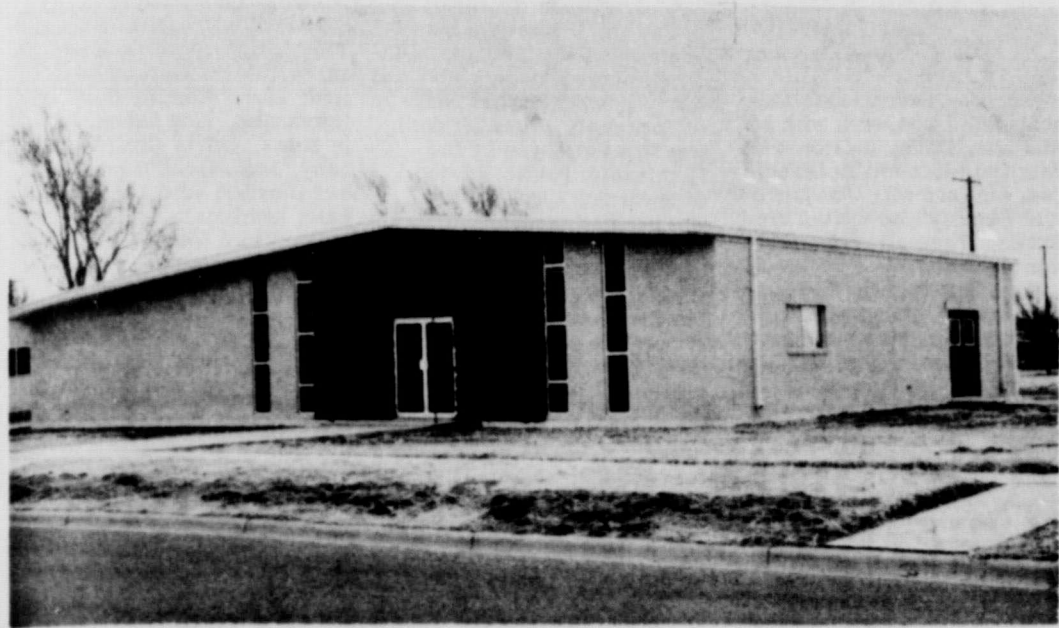


# Sacred Heart Church Plans Dedication Ceremony Sunday



Father Donald P. Rusch, pastor now, serves the congregation here. Sunday's Dedication will begin at 11 a.m. with the Divine Liturgy celebrated by Bishop DeFalco followed by the blessing of the Center then a reception and dinner in the hall. The Marian Choir of Amarillo under the direction of Mr. Joseph Martin will provide the entertainment after the dinner.

**SPEARMAN**-The Most Reverend Lawrence M. DeFalco, Bishop of Amarillo, will dedicate the new Catechetical Center (Parish Hall) of the Church of the Sacred Heart, located on 907 S. Roland Street, in Spearman, Texas at 11:30 p.m., March 22nd, 1970.

The parish, was established in 1949 to accommodate the residents of the area. On August 10, 1950, the late Rt. Reverend Laurence J. Fitz-Simon Bishop of Amarillo, Texas, dedicated the new Church.

The growth of the parish has necessitated a second expansion the new addition will serve as a Catechetical Center and Social Center, thus providing much needed facilities.

The building was erected by Plains Steel Building Co., Inc. of Amarillo, it is constructed of steel framework, cinder block faced with brick to cor-

respond with the Church. The front of the building is enhanced with four amber glass windows and Volcanic Mount Capulin lava stone surrounds the glass entrance doors. It has a modern kitchen, class rooms and a dining and recreation area. The hall is equipped with central heating and air conditioning, suspended acoustical ceiling and recessed light. The floors covered with vinyl acetos tile.



The Church of the Sacred Heart at Spearman has taken on a brand new look recently. The interior of the Church shown in this picture has been completely redecorated. A multi-colored mosaic piece of art adorns the wall behind the altar of sacrifice. Mr. Citor C. Casados of Los Angeles, Calif. erected the piece of art on dark paneling. The new Stations of the Cross are imports from Oberammergau (in Bavaria 65 Miles south of Munich) handcarved and surrounded by the same mosaic material. The two wall plaques are truly works of art-handcarved of lindenwood and imported from the Tyrol area of Italy. The sanctuary is furnished with all new modern furniture and the church is carpeted throughout with a bronze colored crown tuft carpet. Primary electrical service being available, the church is heated and cooled electrically. Indeed, the church has pleasant intimate atmosphere and is very conducive for community worship.

# COUNTY SHOW IS MONDAY

The Hansford County Junior Livestock show is scheduled to get underway at 10 a.m. Monday, March 23 at the community building in Spearman.

Animals will be placed in sale order for the annual sale in the evening at 6:30 p.m. Businessmen and individuals traditionally have given a strong support to this facet of the program.

Gruver and Spearman chapters of Future Farmers of America and Hansford County 4-H boys and girls will be exhibiting some 85 Barrows, 35 lambs and about 50 steers. Robert Adamson is in charge of the 4-H exhibitions. Herman Boone & Bert Williams will oversee Spearman FFA exhibits and Oran Burton, FFA instructor from Gruver will be in charge of FFA

entries from that city. Boone said today that the show this year will display the best quality animals ever shown here. Some of the animals to be exhibited are class winners in the State. This has not been true for past shows.

Sheep & Swine Judge for the show will be L. M. Hargrove, head of the Agriculture Education Department of Texas Tech. Steer Judge will be Nathan Allen of Graham, Texas. ## THE MOSAIC IN THE CHURCH OF THE SACRED HEART • SPEARMAN

The design for the wall behind the Altar of sacrifice, in Sacred Heart Church, Spearman, Texas, was created in the mosaic technique, one of the most ancient of Media used for the creation of Art. This technique dates back to the pre-Christian time and was used by many civilizations including the Egyptians, Greeks, Romans and the pre-Columbian Indians of Mexico and South America.

Christians have used Mosaics to decorate their churches, since the beginning of Christianity. The technique is one of the most durable ever conceived. Most of the Ancient Mosaics are in good repair today.

Mosaics can be composed of many different materials including glass (Byzantine or Venetian) sea shells, pieces of marble - rock as in the famous mosaics of the University of Mexico, and ceramic tile.

The mosaic for the church of the Sacred Heart is composed of ceramic tile, especially produced for this particular piece. All of the colors are to the artists specifications and incidentally the gold you see in this mosaic is real gold leaf.

The design is composed entirely of Catholic symbolism. Primarily, the design is in the shape of a sunburst. The sun symbol means GOD the Father. Secondly, it is in the shape of a Monstrance. (The vessel that is used to expose the Blessed Sacrament in the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

Within the sun there is a large CROSS that is within a circle - (The circle being the sun.) This is the symbol for the consecrated Church. Through the center of the design, going from top to bottom is the DOVE symbol

for the Holy Spirit. It also stands for peace. Just below the Holy Spirit is the Sacred Heart of Jesus which symbolizes LOVE and of course is the name of this church.

Below the Sacred Heart is the Chi-Rho sign, a very early Greek letter symbol for Christ. There is a semi-circle of blue at the top of the sun which stands for Heaven, the green semi-circle at the bottom means the Earth and the light blue area in between is space. The symbols for the Holy Spirit, Sacred Heart, and Chi-Rho, are all linked up from Heaven to Earth like a bridge.

The sun, God the Father - the DOVE, - the Holy Spirit and Chi-Rho, - GOD the Son, form the Blessed Trinity. The artist, Victor Gabriel Casados, who created this attractive and meaningful mosaic came to Spearman all the way, from Los Angeles, Calif., so that he could install it in its present setting in the sanctuary in the Church of the Sacred Heart.

When interviewed he said, "I hope that all of the parishioners of this lovely church will enjoy this mosaic for it contains much love."

Mr. Victor Gabriel Casados, was educated at Zakersfield College and has an associate of Arts degree. Also attended the Art Center College of Design, there receiving a bachelor of Professional Arts Degree, studying too, at the Otis Art Institute of Los Angeles County, there being rewarded with a Bachelor of Fine Arts and Master of Fine Arts Degrees.

He has spent 8 years in the professional field, both as a free lance artist and art studio employee, creating both commercial and fine art. And now an art instructor at Orange Coast College, Westminster, Calif.

**Let Me See ... by Sybil**

For the past two weekends a special TV program on NBC has been very interesting--to me--it concerns a very new club called the Fraydi-Cats. The club is made up exclusively of people scared to death to fly. The first pictured news release showed all the fraidy cats boarding a plane. They strapped on their seat belts and just taxied around over the runways. They became acquainted with the plane's interior, etc. and experienced only the motion of the plane. This prepared them for a flight to Bermuda I think it was and the past weekend televiewers got to watch them actually in flight. They cried, some got hysterical, all were frightened to death. But they all comforted one another. Later in the flight some of them quieted down some, but I imagine it was because by this time they had consumed enough booze to forget what they were scared of. Anyway it was funny and I sympathized with each and every one. They were all in the same boat!

Reminded me of the airplane joke I heard this week. This man was taking his first plane ride and he was so scared that while in flight he promised God half of all his great riches if He would only let him land safely. A minister aboard the plane heard the man's promise to God so when the plane landed safely the minister walked up to the man and asked him for some of the riches he has promised to God. The frightened man replied "You didn't let me make that last promise. I promised God ALL of what I had if I ever got back on one of those airplanes."

WE HAD a very nice crowd at the Baptist Church Sunday in observance of the 50th anniversary of the institution, Rev. Matthew Doyle didn't get to make it so no former pastor was present. Two former pastor's wives were there: Mrs. A. F. Loftin who lives here and is still very active in the church, and Mrs. J. H. Richards. Mrs. Richards' husband was pastor here from 1927 until 1933. She came all the way from Fort Worth with her granddaughter Vida Cooke, to be here for Sunday's celebration. She is a remarkable person. At 83, she still looks and acts as she did many years ago.

Another out-of-town visitor was Mrs. Bessie Main. Mrs. Main told me she was 80 years old but she too, deceives her age. She still lives in Amarillo.

We've received scads of literature from the U. S. Department of Commerce concerning the 1970 census which begins in April. Much of this is very interesting and compares the 1970 census with the 1970 one 00th the first ever taken. In 1970 New York was the largest city, with the count of 33,131 people. The four other major cities were Philadelphia, Boston, Charleston, S. C. and Baltimore. Not only were cities in 1970 small, but the idea of a complex urban society as it is today was unknown. The reason is simply that most of the 1970 population lived in rural areas. The proportion living in the seven major cities of 8,000 or more was only 3.3 percent of the U. S. population in 1970. In contrast, the U. S. population in 1960 was 70 percent. By 1990, for example, there were more cities and towns with a population of 8,000 and above in Rhode Island (the smallest State) than there had been in all of the U. S. in 1970.

Who were the founders of the Republic? The signers of the Declaration of Independence, of course. Men like John Hancock, Samuel Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson, etc. Those names that sing out the early history of the Nation. We know their names because they were also counted in the first U. S. census--that of 1790. There were other names, too, some plain, sometimes quaint, and occasionally downright odd. This first count was practically a roster of the families that founded the Republic. In that 1790 census, the names of all family heads were recorded and posted in a prominent place in their community, to help make certain of a complete count. The practice of posting names has long since disappeared. In fact, today it is a violation to do this.

Some of the names posted in the 1790 census were: Joseph Scolds, Thomas Simmers, Truelove Sparks, Sermon Coffin, Mercy Pepper, Boston Frog, Booze Still, Over Jordan, and such families as Pockepines, the Drips, the Fryovers, the Hungerpealers... In all, 27,337 different families reported. Brown was second with 3,358. The other top family names tank-

ed in order behind Brown were Johnson, Davis, Jones, Clark, Williams, Miller and Wilson. These nine names accounted for about 4 percent of the white population in 1790.

Smith is still a leader in popularity. A recent look at the files of the Veterans Administration showed that Smith was the most popular last name among U. S. veterans in the Armed Forces. There were 310,000 Smiths in the VA's master index file in 1969.

It will be interesting to compare some of these figures when the 1970 census is completed.

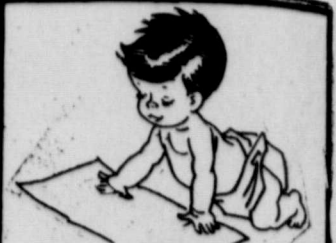

From March 1, 1969 thru February 28, 1970 a group of local men have very quietly carried out a mission of great importance to Spearman and Hansford County.

These are the men who make up the H & S Ambulance Corps. These are the men who serve in operating the ambulance service: Raymond

Gilley, Clarence Mitchell, Robert Ragsdale, Darce Foshie, James Brown, James Riley, Robert Cochran, Tommy Owens, Jim Mosley and Larry Sexton.

It might be well to note that each of these men is a volunteer fireman in the Spearman fire department. Working on a rotating basis, two men are on call from 6

p.m. Friday evening through 6 p.m. the following Friday. A look at the past years activity shows a total of 116 runs made by the Ambulance Corps. They drove a total of 7,858 miles in making these runs. The general breakdown shows 76 local, 35 Amarillo, 1 Perryton, 2 Borger, 1 Canadian and 1 Wellington run.

In January of this year, a new 1970 model ambulance was acquired through a joint city-county purchase. At that time, the older ambulance was transferred to Gruver to be used as a backup system.

During the past year, the Ambulance Corps put in a total of approximately 453 man hours of dedicated work for this community and county. 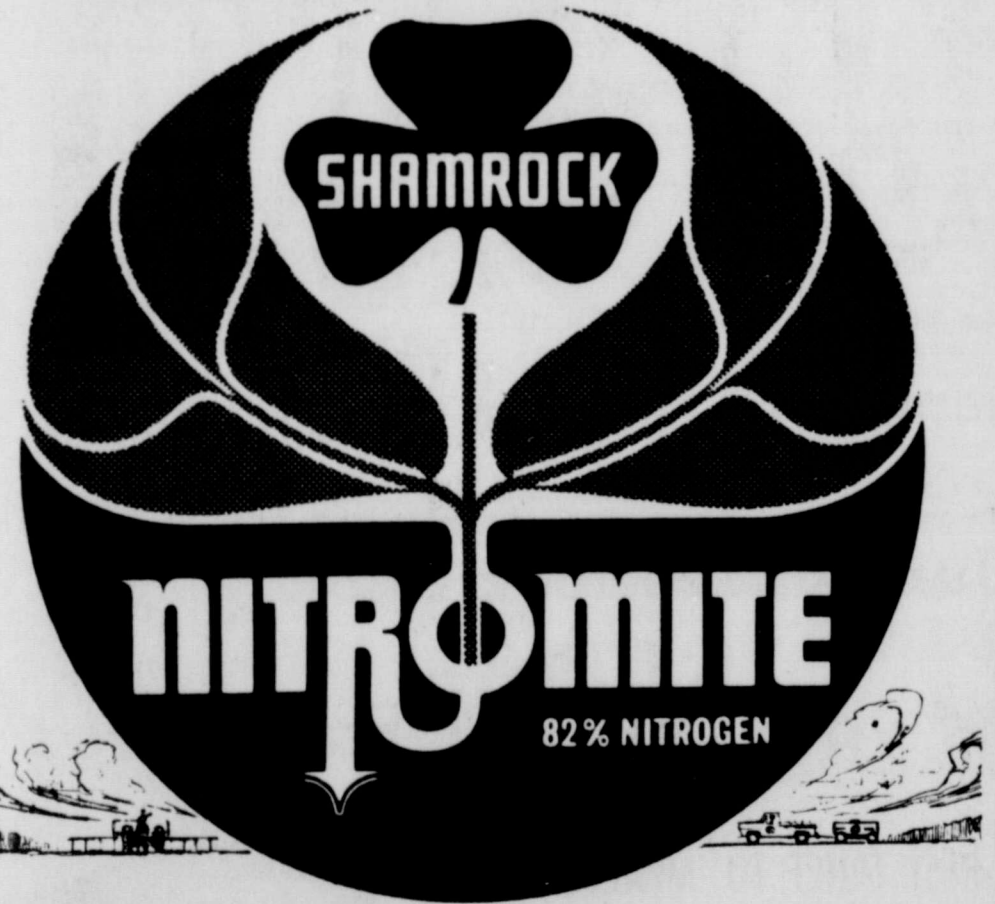

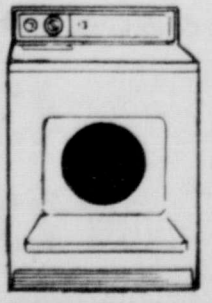

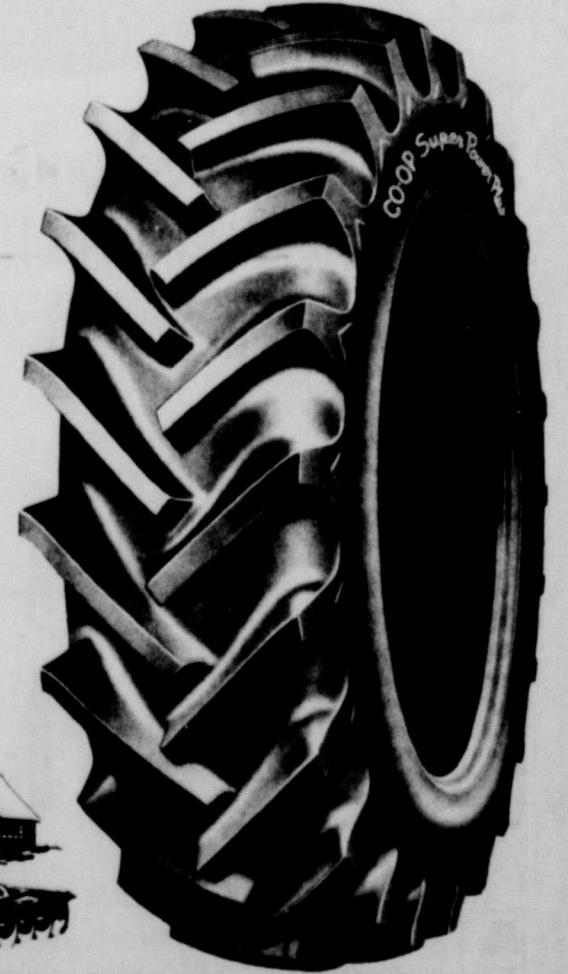

Under the IRS system, which has a different processing cycle for each type of return, the entire payment could be credited to one tax and a bill issued for the other. Taxpayers should put their Social Security number on all checks or money orders sent to IRS, to make sure the payment is properly credited. Business taxpayers should put their Employer Identification number on the check.

### Notice To Tax Payers

Anyone planning to pay two Federal taxes at the same time should use separate checks or money orders to avoid possible billing errors, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for North Texas, said today.

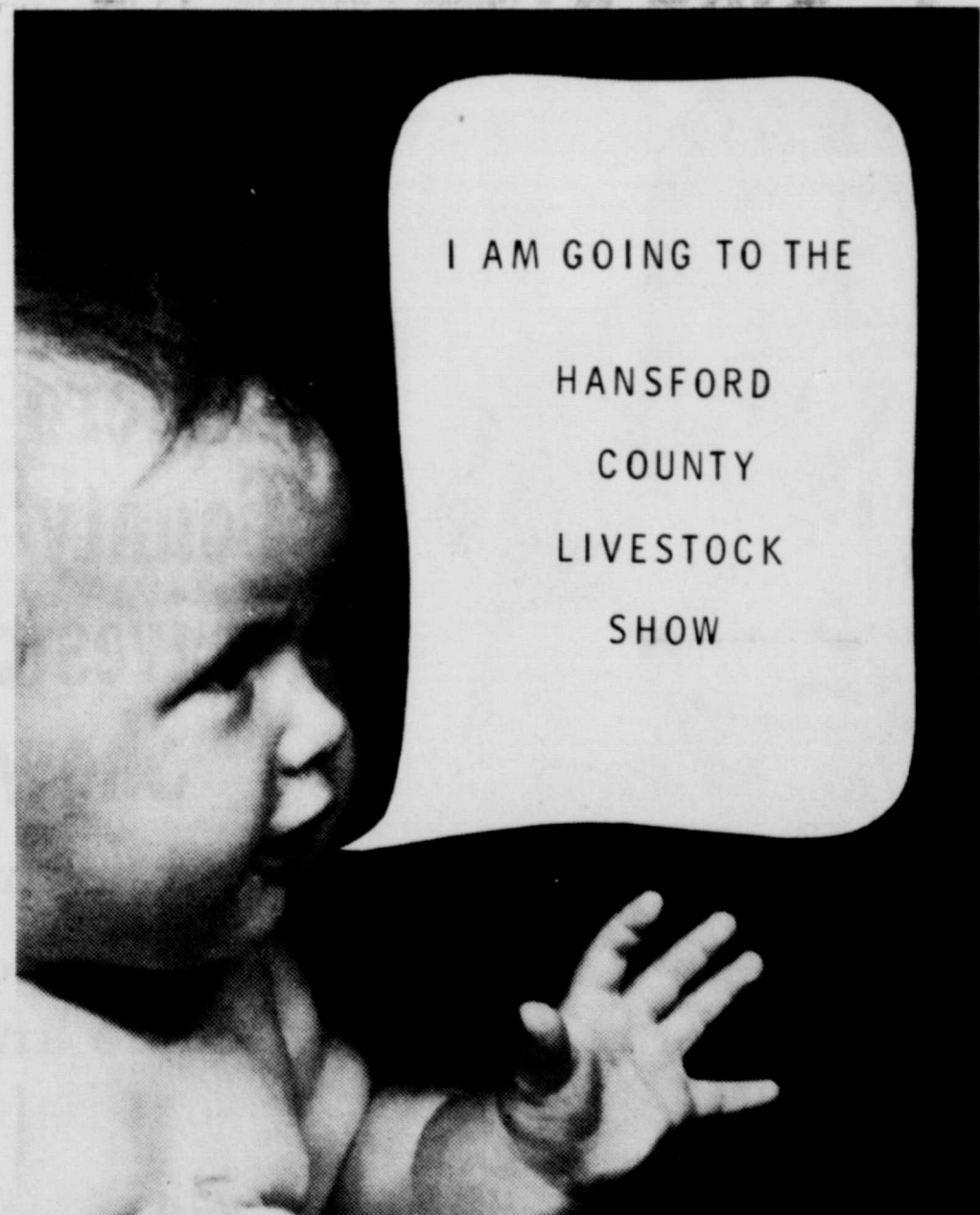
