Funeral Rites Held Wednesday For Gruver Man

Funeral services for Claud J. Sloan, 54, who died Monday night in Hansford Hospital, were conducted Wednesday at 3:30 p. m. in the Gruver Church of Christ.

Bill Osborne, Spearman church minister, and Mr. Sloan's brother, Clyde Sloan, officiated. Burial was in Gruver Cemetery by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home of Spearman.

A farmer, Mr. Sloan had lived in the Gruver area since moving from Elmer, Okla. in 1937. He was a native of Hollis, Okla., and a member of the Gruver Church of Christ. Survivors include his wife, Kate; a son, Wayne of Dalhart; two daughters, Mrs. June Bates of Belle Chasse La.; and Mrs. Peggy Boy Gruver; two sisters and his parents Mr. and Mrs. D. E. Sloan of Altus; and seven grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Gene Fletcher, Bill Moore, Harley Boyd, Marvin States, Oscar Foreman and Bill Barnes.

Voters stayed away from the polls in droves Saturday. Well under half of the qualified voters in Hansford County did not attend the primary elections. This was true all over the area and Saturday's primary election was the smallest in the history as per number of votes cast.

Most of the balloting was done in Democratic races with 749 voting this ballot in Hansford County. 152 voted in the Republican primary. A total of 901 votes were cast here, out of a possible 2,517.

The only contested races in Hansford County were for the office of County and District Clerk, Norma Jean Stowe gained the victory over Faye Womble Lynch by a small margin 384 to 342.

Opponents in the race for County Commissioner, Precinct No. 4 were Leon Hobbs and George C. Lowe, both of Gruver. Lowe won the race 171 to 67.

In other contested races, Hansford County democrats picked Benson over Yarborough 515 to 180 for US Senator; Martin over Brown 504 to 170 for Attorney General; Sadler over Armstrong and Williams for Com. General Land office. Sadler polled 306, Armstrong 296 and Fred Wil-

For Railroad Commissioner, Ben Ramsey 562, Connie Lawson 117. For Supreme Court of Texas, Place 3: James G. Denton 339, Matt Davis 185 and Hawthorne Phillips 82.

For Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Truman Roberts 327, Earl W. Smith 269.

Voters chose Jack Hazelwood for State Senator, 31st District with 299 votes with Max Sherman running a close second with 205. These two men will have an area wide run-off and the winner will meet Malouf "Oofie" Abraham, Republican opponent, in the general election. Walter Knapp polled 138 votes in this race and Mrs. Nancy Moyer barely scratched with 68.

For State Representative 79th district, Gruver resident W. H. Willoughby won here with 329 to Ray Trosper 198, Jim Graves 114 and Phil Gates 52. Trosper and Gates were area winners and will have a run-off election.

County Judge Johnnie Lee polled 661 votes, County Treasurer Selma Reneau 674; County Surveyor, Charles L. Cox, 655, Justice of the Peace, Johny P. Vernon, 375.

J. E. Vernon, with no opponent, Commissioner of Precinct 2, polled 24 votes.

County Democratic chairman is Carl Archer with 618 votes, Named chairman of Precinct 10 was J. L. Brock with 240; Emmett Sanders, precinct 1 with 145; W. L. Johnson, for precinct 4 with 14 votes and Willard McCloy for precinct no. 9 with 4 votes. 152 persons voted in the Republican primaries and marked their ballots as follows:

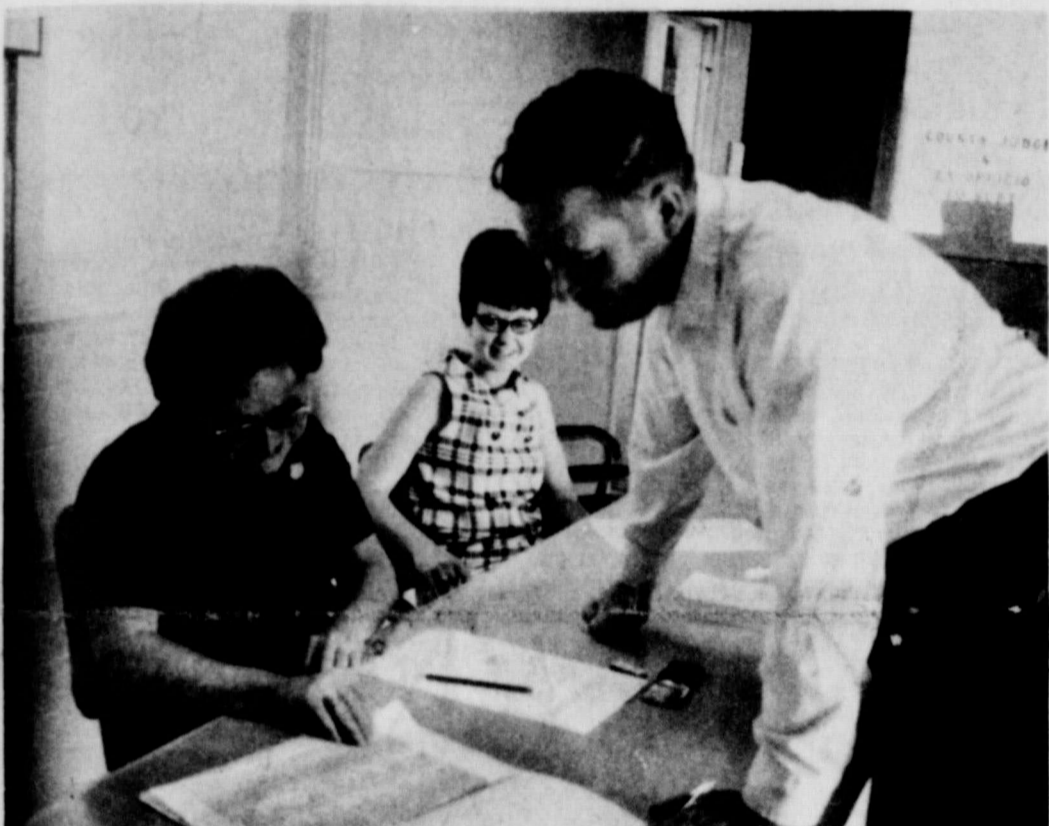

Out of 2,517 registered voters in Hansford County, around 700 of them voted in the Democratic primary. As near as the county clerk could ascertain, there were 58. This was the highest number of votes for one of the Republican candidates. Republican judges failed to fill in this part of the election returns.

What I am getting at is APATHY. There are 939 persons qualified to vote at the school house in Spearman. 261 voted Saturday. I have never seen such a poor turnout for any primary election. It was like this all over the state. Never in the history of our city, county, State and nation have people been so dissatisfied with the way elected officials are running these governments. Yet people do not turn out to vote.

One thing for sure---those who did vote proved they wanted a change. This should mean something important to everyone who is holding down an elective position on any one of these levels--from the city on up. Better watch out, if John Doe decides to run against you, he'll probably win. Whether they are capable is not the question, it is just that people are ready for a CHANGE. People are itchy. I wouldn't be surprised at any time to see a petition circulated to impeach the President of the United States. We all hear so much now days of the government running the people... this does not have to be so, in fact is not so. The people run the government. But we can't if we don't vote! America seems to be following the well-worn road to oblivion taken by former civilizations.

Sunday we had just over 200 in Sunday school. Recently the congregation of the Baptist church were notified to come to a business meeting and vote on a remodeling job which would cost over \$100,000 dollars. There might have been 50 people there.

We see apathy in our younger generation. "No body else cares, why should we?" Today, the United States is plagued by all the ingredients that destroyed Rome. Must we repeat history?

The answer depends entirely upon the character and strength of the American people. If you CARE about what goes on, express your opinion at the polls. This is your ONLY way of helping the general situation.
