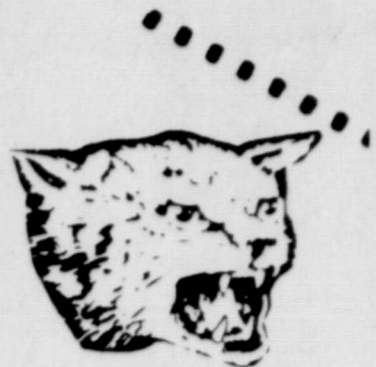

Lynx Meet Canyon At Buffalo Bowl Friday

Spearman's fine Lynx, still on cloud 9 over their impressive win against a good Sunray team, will meet the AAA Canyon Eagles, at Buffalo Bowl, Canyon, Texas this Friday night at 8 p. m.

The Canyon team lost, rather impressively, to a fine Clovis team 6-0, in their opener Friday night at Clovis. The Canyon team fumbled away a win on the 6 inch line, plus having several other penetrations, to almost upset the Clovis team.

Offensively, the Canyon team will start Poszany at left end weighing 173 lbs.; left tackle Hirt 183 lbs.; left guard, Byrd 185 lbs.; Center Garrett 185 lbs.; Right Guard Prichard 170 lbs.; Right End, Bedell 155 lbs.; Quarterback Swartzell 165 lbs.; Left Half Edmonson 150 lbs.; Fullback Wright 177 lbs.; Right Half Prichard 165 lbs. Canyon's offense will be about the same weight as Spearman's defense. The Canyon defense will be about the same size as Spearman's, depending on who starts.

Spearman's Lynx were very, very impressive on offense last week, with only a slight weak spot on their pass defense. The high flying Eagles are expected to attack the Lynx through the air, as no team has been able to penetrate the Lynx line for the last several games. In fact, this line held Dalhart scoreless for three quarters last year.

On offense, Pool carried the ball 10 times, and gained 44 yards last Friday against Sunray; Womble carried the ball four times, and gained 100 yards against Sunray; Lyon carried the ball 13 times; and gained 62 yards; Harper carried the ball 2 times, and gained 12 yards; Lemons carried

one time and gained 3 yards; Latham carried one time and gained 9 yards; Quarterback Beedy did not have a real chance at a running play during the entire game, but was real impressive for his first game. He had to replace Womble, when Womble was slightly injured during the game, and also finished out the game at quarterback.

Sophomore Randy Schell was real impressive on defense, making a fine tackle and intercepting the ball on the last play of the game for the Lynx.

Coach Anthony's Lynx are blocking better this year than ever. The Lynx just seemed to be several weeks ahead of most high school teams. They would run an offensive play, and their blocking assignments were so smooth, that never was the ball carrier in the secondary alone, he usually had an escort of from 2 to 3 blockers in front of him. This was very, very impressive and should give the fans a real thriller against the Eagles at Buffalo Bowl this Friday.

Fans are reminded that school will be dismissed at 2:30 Friday afternoon, so that everyone can attend the game. Band director Mickey Owens and Frank Porter will have their world champion Lynx band ready to perform. This game should be the game of the year for the fans.

The 7th, 8th and 8 team games will be played as follows: 7th grade plays Stinnett here Thursday, at 5 p. m. The 8th grade plays Stinnett here at 6:30 Thursday. The B team plays at Stinnett 7:00 p. m. Thursday.

The Gruver Greyhounds will clash with the Phillips Blackhawks, at Phillips this Friday night at 8 p. m.

Lions Club Broom Sale Sets New Record Here

The Spearman Lions Club set an all-time record here Monday, selling brooms. The total reached \$1611.32 for a new record. Boss Lion Allen Alford had a goal of \$1600.00 set for the Spearman club, and he was jubilant over the amount of sales. Boss Lion Alford says that in 1968 the Spearman club sold \$1148.10 worth of brooms. In 1969, they sold \$1287.52 worth of brooms. In 1970 (Monday) they reached the \$1611.32 figure. The Lions club will keep about 25% of the money from this sale, for use in Spearman, with most of the money going to the Lighthouse of the Blind.

Outstanding salesman of the day was named as Lion Roy Jones. He was awarded a toy broom for overseeing the sale, and spending several hours on duty during the entire sale.

Ed Mundy received a whisk broom as the No. 1 salesman. Lion Alton Ellsworth shared No. 1 honors with Ed Mundy and received a toy mop. James Cunningham was awarded a sponge, for second place selling. Lion Clay Gibner was awarded a dust rag for being the outstanding chauffeur during the broom sale.

Cold Drizzle

Cool weather and drizzle which the area has experienced the past several days has provided very little usable moisture for the thirsty crops. Most places have reported moisture totals around the quarter-inch level. Spearman received .29 in the official weather gauge.

Mercury readings have fluctuated the past eight days all the way from a high of 100 degrees on the 7th of September to a low of 66 for day time temperatures. The high for Sunday was a chilly 66 and the early morning low was a 48.

With August's total rainfall of 3.89 inches, the moisture recorded for the year is 13.64 inches. This leaves about three and one-half months during which time we must receive over eight inches if the year's average rainfall total of 21.53 is to be achieved.

MRS. BILL SHELBY ATTENDED STATE CONFERENCE ON "STATUS OF WOMEN"

Mrs. Bill Shelby of Waka recently attended the First annual Governor's Conference on the Status of Women in Austin. This meeting had nothing to do with women's liberation movement.

Mrs. Shelby represented the Perryton branch of American Association of University Women and also the Ochiltree County Teachers Association. She is president of the AAUW and chairman of the Teacher Education and Professional Standards committee of OCTA.

The keynote address was delivered by Gov. Preston Smith who conferred honorary Texas citizenship to Bonnie Angelo, Time magazine's special correspondent to the

White House, and to Martha W. Griffiths, U. S. Congresswoman from Detroit.

Miss Angelo spoke on "The Changing Image of the American Woman." The delegation gave her a standing ovation.

Congresswoman Griffiths was the luncheon speaker. She made one especially cogent statement: "self-dignity is the individual's best weapon against ridicule."

Gov. Smith outlined an act to create a Commission on the Status of Women which called for one hundred thousand dollars to be appropriated from the General Fund in the State Treasury to the Commission to be expended during the years of 1971-72.

"The prime function of the commission shall be to encourage women's organizations and other groups to institute local self-help activities designed to meet women's educational, employment, and related needs. The commission shall report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature together with drafts of legislation necessary to carry its recommendations into effect during the first week of each legislative session", Smith said.

More than 1400 delegates attended the conference, the largest ever to be held in Austin.

Mrs. Shelby participated in the legislative workshop conducted by Judge Sarah T. Hughes.

Mrs. A. F. Loftin has been teaching music for 46 years. In this many years she has logged more hours at the piano than most mothers do at child care or the task of house-keeping.

Next Sunday, September 20 between the hours of 3-4:30 p.m., the past presidents of Spearman Music Club will honor Mrs. Loftin at a reception to be held in the Bank Room. The public is invited.

Mrs. Loftin needs no introduction to the public. She has been a resident of Spearman since 1933 when her late husband was called here to take over the pastorate of the First Baptist Church. She has taught piano to area students since that time.

But her teaching career goes back farther than that. When Mrs. Loftin saw that she was going to be the wife of a Baptist minister, she

knew that it was imperative that she play piano. They married in 1910 and after her children were all in school, she herself entered the Southwestern Baptist Seminary at Fort Worth and graduated in 1924 with a degree in music. When she entered the Seminary her daughter, the now Mrs. Fred Holt, was four years old. In 1924 she took on her first piano pupils.

There has never been a time since then that she has been without music students. At present she has 15 pupils and teaches every day of the week after school.

Mrs. Loftin would certainly not hazard a guess as to how many pupils have been tutored by her, but she does know that she has taught several second-generation pupils.

Some of her first piano students at Spearman were Rosa Lee Clement Butt, Rubyjo Simmons Wilbanks and Fran-

ces Hoskins Kilgore. She later taught both of Frances' daughters.

Back in the 1930s Mrs. Loftin was president of the Spearman Music Club which had an active choral group. Mrs. A. H. Word directed the choral club and when she moved from Spearman, Mrs. Loftin took over these duties. Mrs. R. E. Lee sang with the group Mrs. Loftin remembers. "We were very active and loved to sing," she said. The singing ladies presented programs to any club which would ask them.

At one time Mrs. Loftin and a Mrs. Boykin had music studios at the school and Mrs. Loftin also directed the high school chorus. This group won a blue ribbon prize at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo. She remembers that Elsie Ruth Porter was a member of this singing group. Miss Porter is now Professor of Music at West Texas State University.

Music has played a great part in Mrs. Loftin's life. She began playing for the church at the age of 12. "I played for all the revivals my husband preached," she said, "and my many piano pupils helped to finance the college education of my daughter, Wren."

Now, she continues to teach because "I'd be lost without it, and my pupils keep me young" she said laughingly. Mrs. Loftin will celebrate her 80th birthday come June.

"I don't know how to play this new, modern music-just can't seem to get that beat, so I stick with the tried-and-true Old Masters' compositions" Mrs. Loftin. She lets her pupils play the modern music if they want to, and also instructs church hymn playing to the pupils who request it.

When asked how much longer she planned to teach piano she replied "as long as anyone wants my instruction."

Mrs. Loftin leads a very active life even without her 15 piano pupils. She teaches the Fidelis Sunday School class and serves as secretary-treasurer of the Women's Missionary Union of the First Baptist Church. She is also president of the local Dahlia Flower Club.

Because of her outstanding contribution to music in the life of this community, Mrs. Loftin will be honored at a public reception Sunday afternoon.

He employed the screw, the sandpaper, the saw, the hammer, the plane, and all the other tools. After the day's work was over and the pulpit was finished, Brother Saw arose and said, 'Brethren, I perceive that all of us are laborers together with God.' O, how many Christians are just like those tools, fussing at each other because we think someone does not do things just the way he should. There was not an accusation made against any one of the tools but that was absolutely true; yet the Carpenter used every one of them, and there was not a place where He employed them that one of the others could have served as well."

Let us be careful not to find fault with any of God's chosen tools, for all of us are "laborers together" in the holy task He has assigned. -H. G. B.

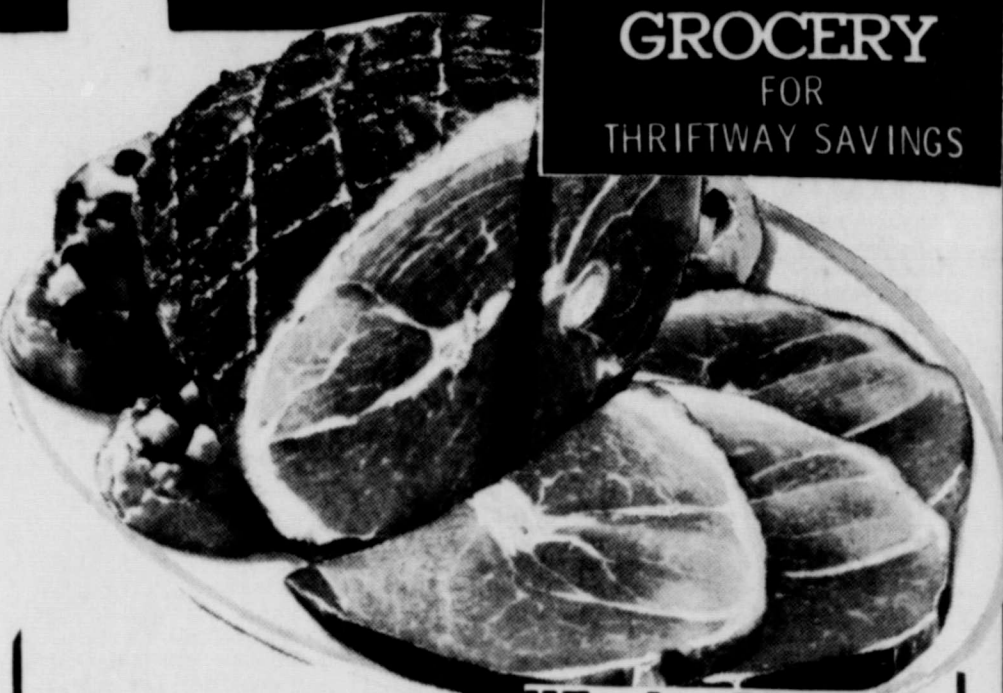
