Art Sale Nov 15

The Hansford Library board is planning a gigantic art and handcraft sale Sunday, November 15 and is urging all area artists to contribute.

Artists are asked to price their pictures, or handcraft items, hand painted china, tile ware, etc. All art forms will be accepted, but those bringing handcraft items (such as china, etc.) which cannot be hung are requested to bring their own tables or stands. Items should be brought to the Hansford County Library on Friday, November 13. Art work sold will be on a "first come, first served" basis. The sale will open to the public at noon, Sunday, November 15. The Library will charge the customary 20% commission on all items sold. Work should be priced accordingly.

The purpose of the sale is to help raise badly needed funds for the Library. The building has been paid off and this has completely depleted the Library's bank account. A mortgage burning ceremony will be held at 2:30 p. m. on the afternoon of Sunday, November 15 and the public is cordially invited to attend. Some artists will want to exhibit pictures which will not be for sale. In this case, these items will need to be marked NFS (not for sale.) The Spearman Lynx will meet the Dalhart Wolves, at Lynx stadium, Friday night at 7:30 p. m. The Wolves are un-defeated, and ranked high in the state. However, Spearman's fine Lynx team is rated as the top contender, or challenger of the Wolves and the game is rated as a toss-up.

Spearman's fine young running backs have shown great improvement in their past few games, but the line, especially the offensive line, will probably determine the outcome of the game. The Lynx defense, has been solid all season, and only the blocking and running has been weak.

Should the Lynx defeat the Wolves, they will have a good chance at the district title. Dalhart's fine running backs are all expected to be ready for the game Friday night. Coach Anthony's Lynx have improved so much in their past few games, that local fans do not know really what to expect. The Lynx seemed to "jell" at Stinnett. With the exception of James Ray Lyon, the Lynx team will be in fair shape for the game Friday night.

The fine Spearman band will perform at half-time Friday night. Due to the bad weather Tuesday of this week, the UIL concert has been postponed until next Tuesday.

Snow Stops Harvest

A cold front invaded the Panhandle Monday about noon bringing with it cloudy skies and strong northerly winds. By 8 p. m. Monday rumbles of thunder sounded across the skies and by 9:30 snow was falling for the second time this month. Spearman citizens awoke Tuesday morning to find the ground covered and snow continued to fall until mid-morning.

Milo farmers were casting worried eyes toward the skies, hoping for clouds to clear away and bring the much needed sunshine so they could get on with the maize harvest.

The harvesting of milo grain got underway about the middle of last week and one elevator man said Sunday and Monday were peak days so far as volume was concerned. By late Monday, however, damp, windy weather brought combines to a halt.

Milo delivered to local elevators the past weekend reveals this year's maize to be much better grain than that cut last year. Fifty-six pounds per bushel is the standard weight for milo and grain delivered to elevators Sunday and Monday was testing from 59 to 60 lbs.

This of course means much better yields this year than the milo harvest last fall produced.

This forecast hinges altogether on the weather however. Wet weather won't hurt the grain other than keep combines out of the fields. What would spell disaster is an accumulation of ice on stalks and heads or strong gusting winds.

There's a lot of maize to be cut in this county, and everyone is praying for clear, dry weather so the harvest can be reaped.

Halloween Special Planned October 31

Saturday will be a "special event" day in Spearman. Capitalizing on the Halloween theme, all businesses will have a "Monster of a sale" and will be offering outstanding merchandise marked down to bargain prices.

Stores and store windows will be decorated and clerks will be dressed in Halloween costumes for the occasion. A prize will be awarded by the Chamber of Commerce for the individual voted by the public to have the best costume. Voting boxes will be prominently displayed in each store and ballots provided so customers can vote.

The city's special event sale is being sponsored by the retail trade committee of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce.

The Spearman School Board was treated to a report from the Science department at their regular board breakfast Tuesday morning at 6:30 a. m. Mr. Gene Barkowsky and Frank Butcher displayed several units of their science department, and gave a report on the progress of the science students of Spearman High School. The report was so impressive it was almost unbelievable. Spearman science students are above the national level and they are boosting their science program. Frank Butcher has bumper stickers for his physics class, which read "Support your local Physics Department" and "Physics Is Fun." As an incentive Butcher guarantees all of his Physics student a minimum grade of 80, when they enroll in his Physics class. This is a pretty good offer, and many students are expected to capitalize on this offer.

The courses offered at SHS by the Science Department, are as follows: 9th grade, Introductory Physical Science; 10th grade, Biology I, or Chemistry; 11th grade, Chemistry; Biology II; Physics-12th grade, Biology II, and Physics. The science class enrollment is as follows: IPS-91; Biology 1-91; Chemistry-40; Biology II-10; Physics-18. Total 250.

An interesting side note on our science department is the Achievement Test Results. The

following scores were taken from tests given to the Junior Class in October 1969. These students are seniors this year. The reader should remember that these students had just had one month of Junior science, when the tests were given:

NATURAL SCIENCE: National Average 15.2-Spearman Average 17.3 (Equivalent to a college freshman in his 7th month)

READING IN NATURAL SCIENCE: National Average 15.2-Spearman Average 17.3 (Equivalent to a college freshman in his 3rd month)

According to Mrs. Greenwood, the Spearman High science averages were well above the average reported in the Governor's Committee report which was published a short time ago. How well have the Spearman Science students fared in competition with all other science students? The Spearman Science Dept. has entered in the Panhandle State College, Goodwell, Okla., Amarillo Science Fair and the local Science Fair. Also, in International Science Fair, the following students have participated-Rebecca Hutchison, Vicki Rosenbaum (twice), Kandy Vaughn, Devorah Jackson (twice), and Mark Massie. AWARDS: The list of awards for our science students is really something to be proud of. Rebecca Hutchison, Vicki Rosenbaum, Kandy Vaughn, and Devorah Jackson received

awards from the Amarillo Rotary two weeks institute; junior engineer's and Scientist's Summer Institute. The Navy Cruiser award has been presented to James Lemons, Devorah Jackson, Rebecca Hutchison and Mark Massie.

Devorah won a paid trip to the Texas Medical Association Convention, Vicki Rosenbaum received honorable mention in the Texas Veterinary Science Fair, Rebecca Hutchison won the following National Science Fair Awards: USDA Certificate of Merit, AMA Certificate of Merit, National Pest Control Association Top Award, Mark Massie, Atomic Energy Commission, runner up.

In the University Interscholastic League Science Contest, Spring of 1970, Spearman had the following District winners: Mark Massie 3rd, Monte Pond 2nd; and Mike Cox 1st; Mike Cox won the regional 1st place. Mike also won the \$4,000 Welch Science Scholarship (Texas A & M). David McClellan is also in this category at the University of Texas. James Lemons was awarded a six week Summer Institute at Colorado School of Mines.

Although there are only a few students enrolled in Junior and Senior science courses in Spearman, Barkowsky and Butcher are not discouraged. They know that the classes will get bigger and better. Many

students and especially their parents are scared of Chemistry and Physics. This is a hold-over from the old days when teachers did make these subjects hard, and only a few honor students were able to take the course. Not so now, says Mr. Butcher. The way we teach it, the students will enjoy the class and learn some much needed basic science information. And, with the national tests showing the Spearman students scoring so high, they are doing a real fine job.

Needless to say, the Spearman school board and Supt. Cunningham are proud of their science department. Mr. Butcher did say that they were needing some storage space, and Mr. Barkowsky said they were needing some electric plugs in their science room. And, you can bet that the school board will be interested in meeting these needs. And, this newspaper wants to thank the school board and especially James Cunningham for inviting us to the meeting Tuesday morning. We didn't realize what a fine job that our school was doing in our science department. We were impressed, with both of these fine science teachers, and we like their methods of teaching. Who knows, some of their students might some day discover a cure for cancer, or "build a better mouse trap."

Consumer Debt \$1,700 Per Family Locally

To what extent are Hansford County residents making use of the installment credit available to them? How much does the average local family owe on purchases of cars, dishwashers, clothes dryers, hi-fi sets, furniture and other articles? More than it did a year ago, according to the latest figures. That has been the normal pattern. However, the increase in the debt load was less than in most other years. A principal reason is that, locally and in most other parts of the country, consumers appear to have been budgeting themselves rather carefully, cutting down somewhat on their expenditures for non-essential goods and services. At the same time, they have been paying their installment debt at a faster clip than usual. Because of this self-control on the part of most consumers and because of steadily rising incomes, credit men feel that the public has the situation well in hand and has not over-extended itself.

In Hansford County, installment debt at midyear came to an estimated \$1,700 per family, based upon average earnings and expenditures locally and upon national debt studies. That is the overall average. Some families owe considerably more than this and others owe little or nothing. For the local population as a whole, installment debt totaled approximately \$4,074,000 at the end of the fiscal year, it is estimated. This takes into account loans for automobile purchases, credit for the purchase of other consumer goods, personal loans and loans for home repair and modernization. Not included are mortgage debt, charge account and single payment loans. According to the national studies, made by the Federal Reserve Board, the University of Michigan's Survey Research Center and others, among all families that have installment debt, the average amount owed is \$1,540 per family. It adds up to \$98.7 billion

nationally, as compared with \$93.1 billion the year before. Thus, of every \$6 of income that Americans have left after paying their taxes, about \$1 must go to pay their installment debt. In Hansford County, it amounts to \$142 per month per family, on average.

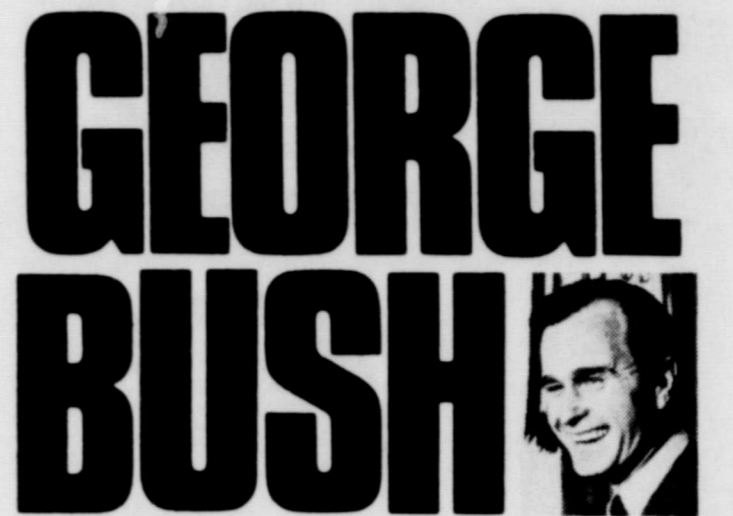



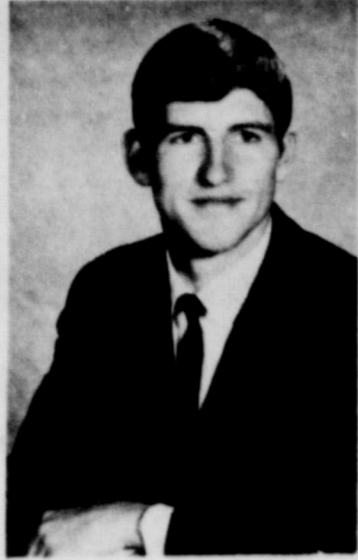

During the past few weeks three forged checks for \$80.00 each were passed at M & M Grocery, Cut Rate Grocery and Cates Mens store in Spearman. The name of Max Clawson was used, drawn on the Gruver State Bank.

Two checks were passed, forging the signature of D. V. Bayless of Gruver. Two more checks, drawn on the Gruver bank, used the name of Dorsey Shadd. These were for \$90.00 each and were passed at M&M Grocery and Westerfields, Gruver business firms.

Cut Rate Grocery and M & M Grocery each accepted checks in the amount of \$150.00 each on G. C. Brillhart. These forged checks were drawn on the First National Bank at Perryton. The bank evidently was in doubt about these checks, for they were stamped "Signature Irregular". The bank paid them however.

Sheriff Cooke said Cooley was involved only in the one forgery, and that each of the other forgeries were by different men.

The Sheriff warned all business firms to be alert for people presenting checks to be cashed, especially two-party labor checks which must be endorsed.

Sheriff Cooke said many of these forgeries were attempted on weekends or after banking hours when it is impossible to secure the proper identification.

Kim Keip took the 11th place spot with his Chester White in the 190-205 lb. division and 27th place with his Hampshire Barrow.

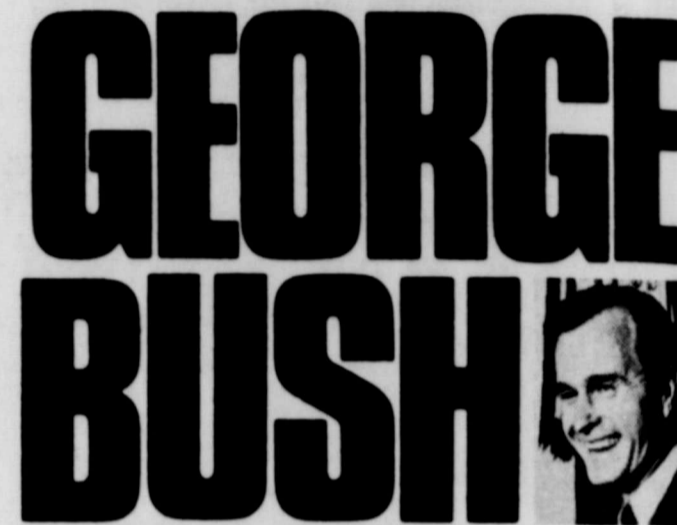
Joe Bob Jones' 210-lb. Hampshire placed 16th and he took a first place award on his Hampshire which was classed in the 221-240 lb. group.

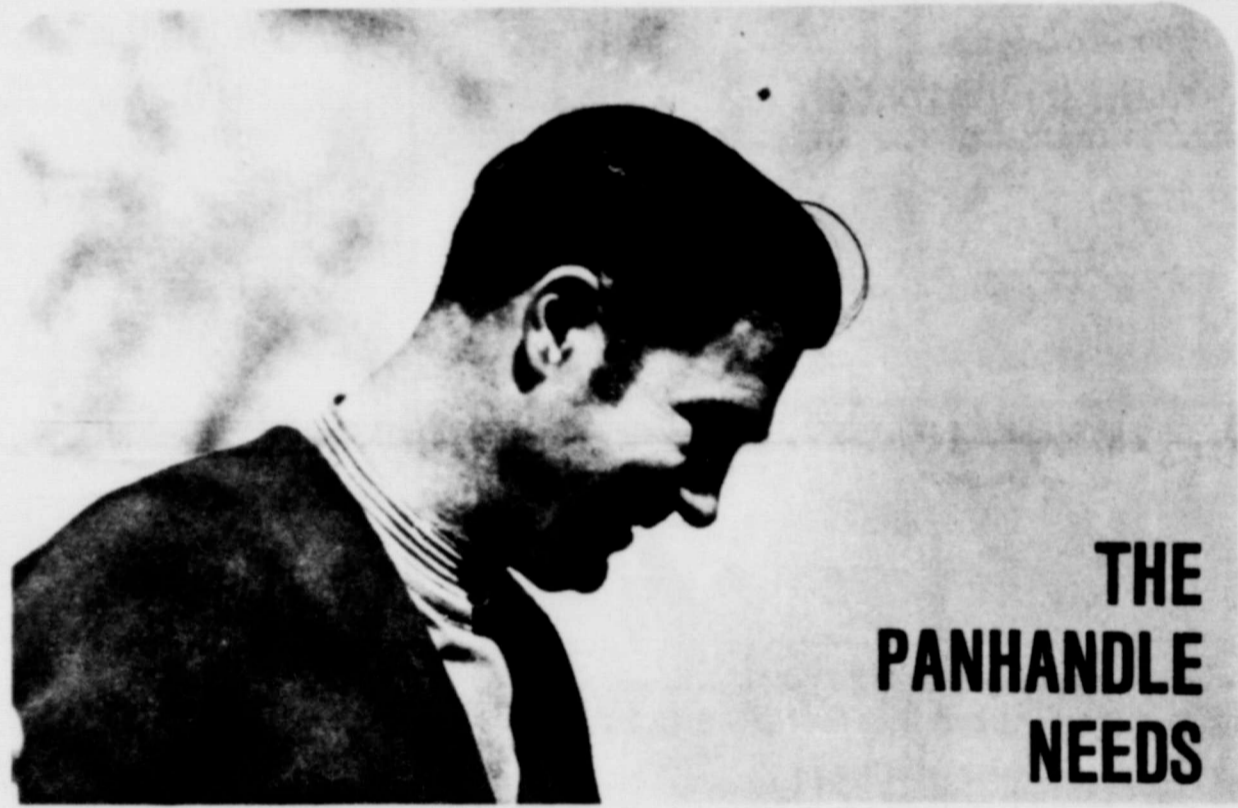

This proposal would authorize the Legislature to provide by special statute for consolidation of government offices and functions of government within any county in the State. It would allow a special law to be tailored to the requests and desires of the people of any one county.

It would also allow a county government, or any political subdivision within the county, to contract one with another for performance of any governmental functions either required or authorized by the Constitution or laws of Texas under such terms and conditions which the Legislature may prescribe. The term "governmental functions" is defined to include all duties, activities, or operations of statewide importance in which the county acts for the State, as well as functions of local importance.

An amendment was adopted in 1933 providing for county home rule charters. It is long and detailed and has never been used. In 1966 a constitutional provision very similar to this proposal was approved, applicable only to Harris County. In 1968 an amendment applicable to El Paso and Tarrant Counties was adopted. Neither of these has been used, but the last one is the basis of the present proposal which would make its procedures available to all counties.

The impact of this amendment, if adopted, would in a large part depend on the extent to which the Legislature implemented it with legislation. Should the implementation be broad, it might produce economies in some counties that would set a statewide pattern for the combining of many of the functions of local government either by contract or by actual consolidations. It is a fertile field for experiment.

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ELECTION DAY

During the last voter registration period, the State of Texas staged an all-out drive that resulted in a record number of registered voters--4,150,645.

Yet, in last spring's combined Democratic and Republican primary elections, fewer than 40 percent of these registered Texas voters went to the polls.

There are many important issues to be decided November 3 in the General Election, and if voters stay away from the polls in record numbers as they did in the primaries, Texans will find themselves in a very grave condition.

The 61st Legislature, which convened in January, 1969, proposed a total of 16 amendments to the Texas Constitution, 9 of which were voted on August 5, 1969, with the remaining 7 to be considered by the Texas electorate on November 3, 1970.

Unless well informed, voters run the risk of being taken in by some sneaky wording in some of these amendments. Voters should do a lot of studying in order to cast an intelligent vote on these amendments.

The proposed amendments, discussed below, are listed in order in which they will appear on the official ballot. It is not the purpose of these analyses to indicate how anyone should vote but to present facts which will be helpful in determining whether these amendments are desirable--and for the best interests of our people as a whole.

PROPOSITION 1 REMOVAL, RETIREMENT OR CENSURE OF JUSTICES, JUDGES AND JUSTICES OF THE PEACE

At the election you will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: Constitutional Amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of the Peace under prescribed circumstances.

In 1965 Texas voters adopted a constitutional provision setting a mandatory retirement date for district and appellate judges and creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission which would make a continuing study of judicial conduct and disabilities.

The Commission was instructed to recommend to the Supreme Court of Texas removal from office of a judge, before retirement age, for willful or persistent conduct which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his duties, or casts public discredit on the judiciary or administration of justice.

It was further authorized to recommend involuntary retirement for disability seriously interfering with the performance of a judge's duties which is, or likely to become, permanent in nature.

The proposed amendment of Article 5, Sec. 1-A would extend the Commission's duties to include: "Any county judge, any judge of a county court at law, a court of domestic relations, a juvenile court, a probate court, or a corporation or municipal court, and any judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Sec. 1, Article V" of our State Constitution.

It would add two new lesser forms of penalty: (1) A private reprimand from the Commission, and (2) Public censure from either the Commission or the State Supreme Court.

Under this proposed amendment any of these members of the judiciary could be removed from office or censured in lieu of removal, for willful or persistent conduct which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his duties or which casts public discredit upon the judiciary or the administration of justice.

For a permanent disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, or a disability likely to become permanent, a person could be removed from office. If he is eligible for benefits under state laws for judicial retirement, such removal would take the form of involuntary retirement.

No judges have been removed from office since the current constitutional provisions were adopted in 1965, but it is generally believed that the availability of a procedure for removal from office has had a beneficial effect on the administration of justice. The opportunity for reprimand and public censure would add further pressure that should be highly effective, especially as long as we have an elective judiciary.

PROPOSITION 2 LOCAL OPTION MIXED DRINKS

You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Sec. 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

The Legislature would have the power under this proposed amendment to enact a mixed beverage law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option basis.

There has been a long time debate on whether or not the constitutional prohibition against "open saloons" would permit any sort of a "mixed drink" condition.

The last Regular Session of the Legislature resolved the debate by submitting that decision to the State voters. The Legislature has broad powers to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a state monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors.

These powers are also subject to local option elections. When our State Constitution was adopted in 1876, it provided for submitting to the people of any locality the question of whether they would license or prohibit saloons. During World War I both the nation and the state adopted prohibition. The Federal Constitutional Amendment was repealed in 1933. The present provisions of our State Constitution allowing sale of liquor on local option basis were adopted in 1935.

This Amendment would apply to only Subsection (a) of Sec. 20, Article XVI, which prohibits the "open saloon", but it would still require local election permission to adopt any new law providing for mixed drinks.

Under local option there are 129 counties in Texas which allow the sale of distilled liquor by the bottle in part or all of the county. In 31 of these, sales are legal throughout the county. Texas is one of the six states which prohibit liquor by the drink in saloons open to the public. The arguments for and against sale of liquor by the drink are too well known to require listing here.

The major issues in most discussions are concerned with which method is most enforceable and most likely to result in temperance and respect for law.

PROPOSITION 3 SPECIAL TAX PROVISIONS FOR RANCH, FARM AND FOREST LANDS

You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The Constitutional Amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method or assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

Four years ago a Constitutional Amendment was adopted which provided that land designated by its owner for agricultural use shall be assessed for tax purposes on the basis of its agricultural use only, though it might be more valuable for other purposes. This means that land near a city, for example, can continue to be taxed on its value as ranch or farm land so long as the owner wants to use it that way, regardless of its worth for present or future development as residential or industrial property.

To get this lower assessment, a number of provisions must be met. The land must be owned by natural persons. Products of the soil must be grown under natural conditions, and as a business venture for profit. This must be the primary occupation and source of income of the owner. The requirements for eligibility, filing, etc., are lengthy and detailed.

Under the proposed amendment, the Legislature could do by law what the present wording of this section guarantees expressly and minutely. However, it would change the impact from the owner applying for a different consideration to requiring the taxing authority to establish a uniform assessment on land meeting the statutory definitions.

The purpose of the amendment is to recognize the problems in inequities under the present assessing practices, particularly as applied to crops which take longer than one year to mature. Its term are so broad, however, the Legislature may find it difficult to define and limit their application. Capability is capacity of being used or developed. It is having the ability or qualities necessary for a purpose, in this instance for raising livestock or producing crops. The full out-

entail of a piece of land, and of neighboring property, might be affected by crops grown, or the breed of livestock raised.

The Legislature apparently could define what constitutes farm or forest land. It might find such a definition necessary in order to distinguish property near enough a city, or an oil well, or other development which it determines should be assessed on its speculative value.

While the amendment would allow the Legislature to adopt a new assessment method, it does require it. If the amendment passes, and the Legislature does not act, assessing the policies will revert to those in effect prior to November, 1966. If and when it does adopt legislation, the method of assessment will have to be uniform, apparently in all cases and throughout the State. If the Legislature should feel it was necessary, this could include consolidation or assessing authorities within certain areas, or some sort of state agency to insure uniform statewide application of the law, or both. If either approach is reasonably successful and accepted, pressure may be generated for uniform methods of assessing all other ad valorem taxes.

The powers are broad enough and the problems are big enough to spur some new thinking and some new approaches to tax problems, and to other relations between local governments and the State.

PROPOSITION 4 RECONSTITUTING STATE BUILDING COMMISSION

At the election you will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The Constitutional Amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."

This is a proposal to change the membership of the State Building Commission from state officials, ex-officio, to three citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. At present the Commission is composed of the Governor, the Attorney General and either the Chairman or another official designated by the Legislature.

If adopted, the first appointment will be a member named for a two-year term, one for four years and one for six years. Thereafter the Governor will appoint a new member every two years, for a six-year term. He will designate one member as Chairman and also fill the vacancy of any unexpired term.

This section of the Constitution creating a State Building Commission was adopted in November, 1954. The Commission was authorized to acquire property and construct and equip buildings for state purposes. The first structure was required to be the State Supreme Court Building. Land has been acquired and several buildings constructed in the development of a capitol complex stretching northward from the main capitol building.

The Commission has had available the revenue remaining and unused each year from a two-cent ad valorem tax for confederate pensions. A 1968 Constitutional Amendment prohibits levy of this tax after 1976. The proposed amendment would not change the financing provisions. After 1976 the Commission would have available to it only the money the Legislature appropriates from the General Revenue Fund. The Amendment would be self-enacting.

PROPOSITION 5 COUNTY ROAD BONDS ON MAJORITY VOTE

You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The Constitutional Amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property tax paying electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county."

Section 52, Article III of our Constitution allows counties, cities and other political subdivisions of the State to issue bonds for roads and turnpikes, and certain other public improvements, when authorized by two-thirds majority vote of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors.

The total bonds issued may not exceed one-fourth of the assessed value of real property of the issuing authority. The proposed amendment would rewrite this section to allow any county in the State to issue bonds for roads and turnpikes on the approval of a simple majority of those voting in an election, rather than the two-thirds majority presently required. The election would still be restricted to qualified electors who are resident property taxpayers.

In 1968 a new Section 52e applying only to Dallas County was adopted. It will not be affected by this proposed amendment. The '68 amendment allows road bonds to be

issued by Dallas County without being subject to the debt limit prescribed in Section 52, and on the approval of a simple majority of the qualified voters taking part in the election.

The proposal to be voted on in November does not go this far. It would make only the one change, allowing county bonds for construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads or turnpikes to be adopted by a vote of a simple majority, rather than the two-thirds now required. The amendment would be self-enacting.

PROPOSITION 6 RAISING HOMESTEAD EX- EMPTION FROM \$5000 TO \$10,000

You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The Constitutional Amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from \$5000 to \$10,000. This limit applies to the value of the real property without reference to any improvements on it. It applies to value at the time the property was designated a homestead, regardless of later increases in value. A homestead must be used for the purposes of a home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of the family. The rural homestead not in a town or city would remain at 200 acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, and includes the improvements on

the land. The homestead exemption originated in Texas. While governed by a Spanish Colonial law, Texas became familiar with exemptions for family clothing, a minimum amount of furniture and the implements of the breadwinner, none of which could be taken for forced payment of debts. In an agricultural community it was natural that this concept should be extended to the family home and land.

The earliest homestead exemption law was adopted by the Republic of Texas in 1839. It was written into the Constitution when Texas became a State in 1845. Originally, the dollar value exemption for

urban lots was \$2000. It was increased to \$5000 in the Constitution of 1869. The Constitution of 1876, which is our present Constitution, continued the same exemption in its Article XVI, Sec. 51, which this proposal would amend.

The increase in the dollar amount of the exemption is urged as recognition of changing economic conditions and increased land costs. Without going back to 1876, the lot which could be bought several years ago for \$5000, and which may be still exempt as a homestead, could not in most instances be purchased today for the \$10,000 proposed as the new maximum. However, the exemption oper-

ates only as a floor under the welfare and fortunes of a family, and the question is whether the floor should be raised.

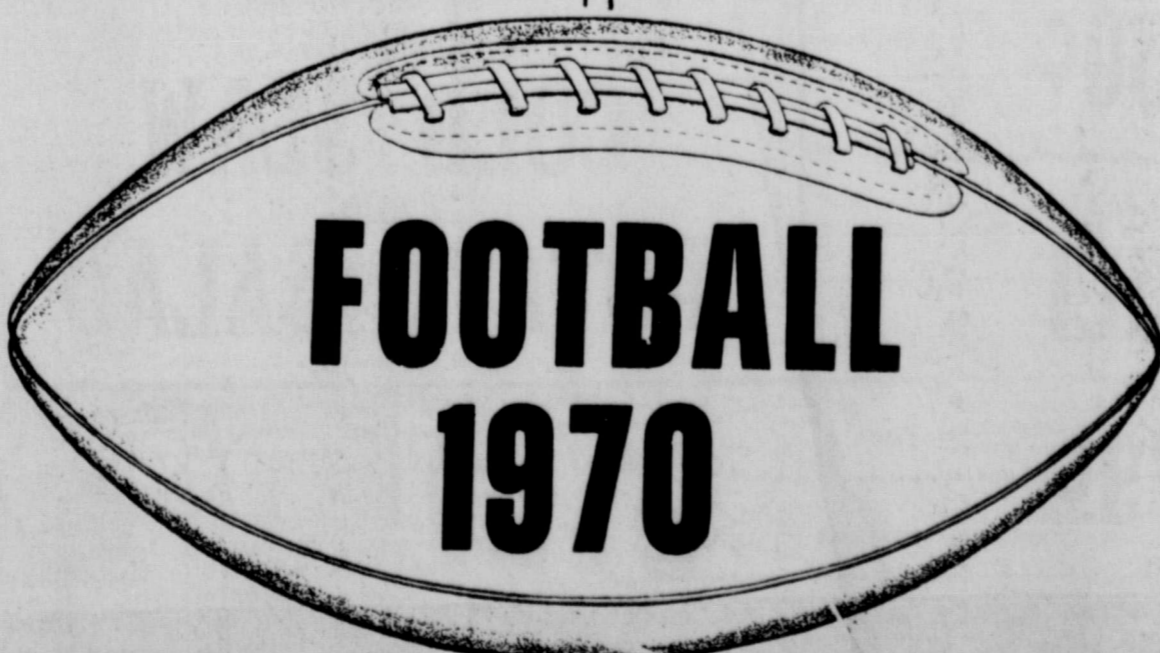
