

DIPHTHERIA CLINIC SET FOR FRIDAY

The Hansford County Medical Society in conjunction with the State Health Department is staging a diphtheria immunization clinic in the county, Friday, December 11.

There will be no charge for the shots and County medical personnel urge everyone, men, women and children to take the vaccine.

This clinic is being staged as a preventive measure against diphtheria which is raging in other sections of the State, and in some area cities.

In Spearman the clinic will be set up in the Elementary school building and all school students can receive the air-gun shots between the hours of 9 a. m. and 12 noon. All Spearman adults and pre-school children can be vaccinated between the hours of 6 p. m. and 8:30 p. m.

Morse school students and adults are expected at the Spearman clinic, however Morse residents may take advantage of the Gruver clinic which will be underway between 2:00 p. m. and 4:30 p. m. in Gruver.

The only persons who should NOT receive the vaccine are those who are allergic and those with infection.

Those who SHOULD receive diphtheria vaccine are:

- 1-Everyone, especially under 21 years of age.
- 2-Should repeat series if none in past 5 years.
- 3-Should receive booster if none in past year.
- 4-DPT shots for children UNDER 10 years of age (diphtheria-whooping cough-tetanus)
- 5-D, T, for all over age 10 (diphtheria-tetanus.)

County Health officer Dr. Damon Gregg, school nurse Dickie Robinson and officials from the Texas State Health Department, division of communicable disease plus other county medical officials will be working at the Spearman and Gruver clinics.

Dr. Damon Gregg, county health officer, said there are two classes of people who should be immunized against diphtheria, and youngsters who have not had the diphtheria series or who now need a booster.

A complete series of DPT vaccine consists of four doses; three doses taken at least a month apart and the fourth dose taken about a year after

the third dose. Parents should bring their children to all 3 Spearman clinics to obtain the basic series, and see their physician for the fourth dose a year later.

The second Hansford County clinic has been scheduled for January 8, and dates for the third clinic will be released later.

Immunization vaccine will be administered with the new jet injectors, often called "space guns" which do not use a needle and inject the vaccine almost painlessly through the skin.

A reported case of diphtheria in Sunray has alerted doctors of this area to stage such a clinic because of a danger of an epidemic.

Authorization for shots must be given by the parents of school age children. Forms were distributed Monday in Spearman schools and additional forms will be available at the clinic.

"Mail"

William L. Crawford, Director Dallas Postal Region today urged immediate mailing of all Christmas cards, parcels and other holiday mail as a safeguard in the event of a national railroad strike.

Mr. Crawford, who directs the management operations of 2,133 post offices in Texas and Louisiana, said he had been advised today by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount to step up Christmas mailing.

"Early mailing of Christmas cards, letters and parcels," Mr. Crawford said, "will give customers added assurance of delivery in time for the holidays."

The nationwide announcement to accelerate Christmas mailing came from the Postmaster General in view of a pending nationwide rail strike tentatively scheduled to begin shortly after midnight December 10.

The main concern by officials is the fear of food supply to the cities. How much baby food and medical supplies is available now and how long would it last if the strike were to be as long as the GM strike?

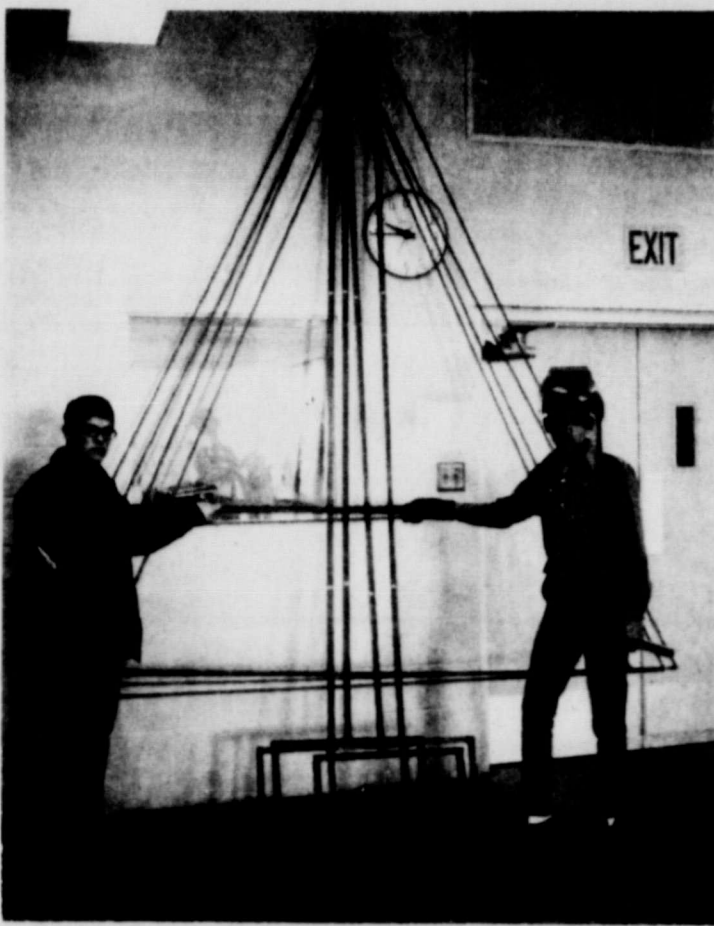

Threshing Bee? Maybe in the spring, if we can find some oats, says Richard Shedeck as he and R.L. McClellan look over this 1938 model, 32 inch separator, or thresher. Plains where corn is becoming an increasingly important cash crop, corn blight was identified in late September in Bailey and Deaf Smith counties. So, producers should be on the look out when the new crop season rolls around.

"High Plains producers can do two things to protect against losses from the disease," points out Dr. Robert Berry, area plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "First of all, stubble management is important. Stubble should be turned under so that it will not be brought back up by land preparation or cultivation. Secondly, producers should

plant as early as possible. Early Planting Is Important

Early planted corn seemed to sustain less damage throughout infected areas this past season, explains the plant pathologist. If the crop matures before large numbers of spores are produced by the disease-causing fungus, losses can be reduced substantially.

Planting blight resistant seed is also a possibility. Such seed will be available in limited quantities in 1971 and will be selling at a premium. Since there is only a slight chance that the disease will invade the area, planting good quality seed that is not-resistant will be more economical as well as a "good risk," adds Berry.

What About The High Plains?
What are the prospects for the disease epidemic to spread to corn fields in this area of the state?

"Southern corn leaf blight will probably reach into the High Plains again next year," says Berry. "However, chances are good that the infection will only be slight. The disease will have to enter a field from spores carried by the wind from infected areas. Also, warm wet weather hastens infection and these conditions are usually rare on the High Plains. We expect most disease to develop late in the season due to rainy weather in September."

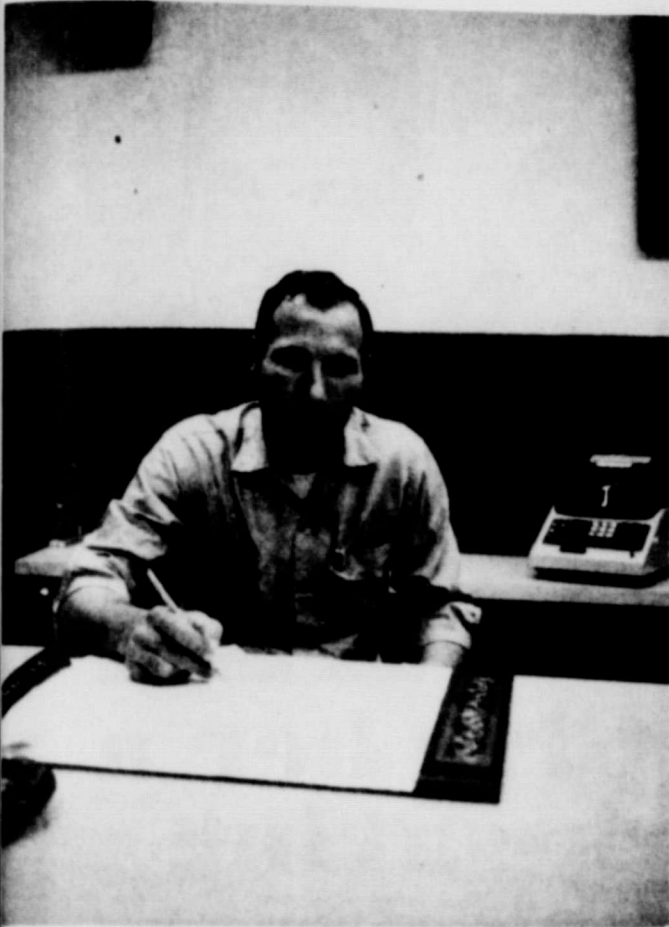
Disease Symptoms Cited
In describing the symptoms of the disease, the plant pathologist explains that oblong lesions with tan centers and dark brown, reddish borders will appear on the plant leaves. A yellow halo often forms just outside the border. Leaf spots are one-half to three-fourths inch long and about one-fourth inch wide.

Similar spots also occur on husks, leaf sheaths and stalks. Infections may penetrate husk layers until the fungus reaches the kernels, thus destroying the quality of the grain. Ear shanks may also become infected and weakened so that ears fall from the plant. When this occurs, penetration continues up through the cob. Infected cobs become limp and break into several parts when squeezed or dropped. This complicates harvesting.

Stalk rots also occur when the fungus penetrates the surface. Under severe conditions, stalks may break and create a lodging problem.

Fungicides Available
"Several fungicides are cleared for use on corn which serve as protectants from the disease," points out Berry. "However, treatment costs are high, from three to four dollars per acre, and several applications are required to give satisfactory control. So, fungicide control should be considered only as a last resort on fields with high yield potentials when a damaging disease is occurring in the area."

Producers on the High Plains may also be concerned about the disease possibly infecting grain sorghum. Says Berry, "There are no reports of the disease occurring on grain sorghum. We will continue to observe sorghum fields for all diseases, but we do not expect to find the corn blight fungus there."

**Gifts For A Friend
With Everything**

COLLEGE STATION--Still wondering about a Christmas gift for a friend who has everything? Consider a tree or shrub for the garden, or a houseplant, recommends Everett Janne, Extension landscape horticulturist at Texas A & M University.

New homeowners would especially welcome a tree or shrub gift. Select a plant that can be used in the home landscape design. It should also be native or adapted to the area.

Some of the ornamental plants that would make a good gift include the many varieties of holly, deodar cedar, pyracantha, elaeagnus, magnolia and pine, Janne says. The local nurseryman or florist can help you in the final selection.

If you are considering a house plant gift, Janne suggests such foliage plants as philodendron, English ivy, Christmas cactus, or even a potted azalea or camellia. Other plants popular for indoor landscaping, particularly during the holiday season are poinsettia, Jerusalem cherry, Christmas pepper and chrysanthemum.

You can easily make an attractive package from a house plant or tree. Just wrap the base of the plant with Christmas paper and tie with a bright colored bow.

While you are plant shopping, Janne adds you may want to select a living Christmas present for your own family. A balled and burlapped, or container-grown evergreen can be used as the family Christmas tree. If care is taken to prevent the ball of soil from drying out, it can be placed in the home landscape

If I had known what the change in the printing and newspaper field was going to be in the last three years, I am sure I would have entered. Each year, the changes have come so fast, it is fantastic. I was always kinda stupid, and I made several chances without having any old-fashioned ideas. I knew that there had to be a better way to print a paper than the way we did it for

about 90 years here, and I like the new and modern way of printing. Except, it does cost about 10 times more than I thought it would. Back to Big Al, he came back praising the entire Spearman elementary system, and thinks we are way out in front, especially in our science dept. The only thing we might need, is a foreign language, starting in the 4th grade. Spearman does not start foreign languages until students reach high school. There will be sweeping changes in our schools, as the 25 year olds take over. The only problem that I can see about them taking over, is they ain't got no money, but in many cases their ideas can save money instead of wasting it. I'm mighty thankful for dedicated teachers like Allen Alford and his elementary staff. They are doing a good job on our children. Stay with them and back your school and town to the limit.

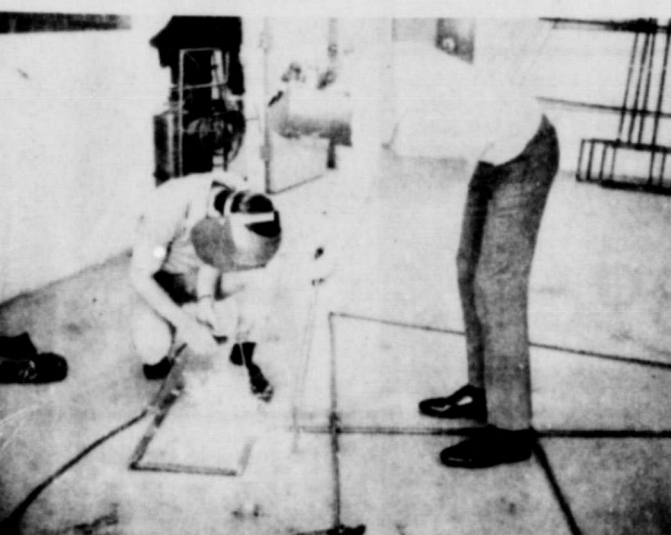
