Mrs. Frank Davis - "Woman Of The Year"



Mrs. Frank Davis proudly escorted her wife to the stage Monday night when she was named "Woman Of The Year." This honor was bestowed upon her from the citizens of this community.

Mrs. Frank Davis, though she has never lived within the limits of Spearman, has been one of the city's most minded persons for the 40 years. The Davis family moved to this county in 1931.

She has been an active member of the Home Demonstration Society since before Hansford was founded. Her home has always been a place where many of the children and young people of Spearman have found a home.

Her husband has worked tirelessly in 4-H work, the Dahlia Club, the Twentieth Century Club, the HD Council, and has acted as judge at the elementary school for many years. One time when she

was on her way to carry out this task, she fell and cracked her wrist, (she fell so hard it shook the pins out of her hair). But she went on to the school and judged the contest because there wasn't time to see the doctor first!

She has been the moving force behind the acquisition of the Hansford County Library building and all the improvements which have been made to it.

She is dearly loved by the Spanish speaking people and through her patience and private tutorage has helped them to secure drivers licenses, and aided their children in learning to speak better English.

In her club work she outdoes her co-workers. Those who have worked with her will tell

you she can tackle a job that anyone else would shun.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Davis were married in 1916 in Clarendon and subsequently moved to Spearman. They have been "outstanding citizens" of this community since.

Worley Smith, Master of Ceremonies, welcomed Spearmanites and visitors to the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet served Monday night in the High School cafeteria. Some 300 people were present.

The occasion marked the 50th anniversary of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce and honored all past presidents at a special reception prior to the banquet meal.

Scouts of Troop 51 presented the colors and led the audience in the pledge of allegiance. The Rev. Wesley Daniel gave the invocation. Special dinner music was provided by the SHS Swing Band directed by Mickey Owens.

Outgoing C-C president Kent Guthrie made his farewell remarks. His address was followed by Arlon L. Dedmon, incoming president who expressed his desire to serve the community and to help make Spearman a better place "in which to live and do business." The new president outlined a plan whereby this can be accomplished.

New officers, in addition to Mr. Dedmon, are Dan Desimone, vice president; Elizey Vanderburg, treasurer, and Charles Gilliam, director West Texas C-C.

Mr. Bruce Sheets - "Man Of The Year"

Bruce H. Sheets, recipient of the "Man Of The Year" award graduated in 1927 from the School of Pharmacy, University of Kansas.

His first post was in Shattuck, Okla. where he worked for a time for John Elder at Elder's Drug. When Mr. Elder passed away, Bruce went to work for Jesse Davis and was under his employ until in April of 1931 he moved to Perryton and worked with Mr. H.G. Sanford.

In April of 1933 Mr. Sanford opened a drug store in Spearman and moved Bruce to this city. Mr. Sheets had part interest in the store and in 1939 purchased the entire interest from Sanford.

Mr. and Mrs. Sheets lived in an apartment in back of the store for some time. But business got better and as time went on they enlarged the store, added more merchandise and hired extra help.

June 22, 1941 Jesse Davis

moved from Panhandle to Spearman and went to work as a pharmacist for Bruce Sheets. Mr. Sheets conceived the idea of "retiring" and in January of 1965 sold his drug store to Orvil Brummett.

But Bruce could not entirely forsake his profession and when he learned that his old friend Mr. H. C. Sanford was desperately in need of a pharmacist in his Perryton firm, he went back to work--full time. Bruce commuted daily to Perryton and back, and worked with Sanford for 2 years and 2 months until he was stricken with a serious heart attack. The illness finally led to heart surgery in Houston from which he is still recuperating.

The life of Bruce Sheets has touched nearly every individual in this community.

Perhaps one could name his many civic accomplishments, but his many charitable deeds could not be recorded.

When he was called forward Monday night to receive his

honor, many in the audience shed tears of gratitude for what he had done for them and their families.

He has served on the school board, is a member of the Masonic Lodge, through the war years served as Red Cross finance chairman for the county. He served many years as probation officer for this county. Has been Mayor of Spearman, a member of the board of directors for the Chamber of Commerce, has been president of the Lions Club at least twice, etc., etc.

Much could be said of this man, but perhaps it could best be summed up by saying he has spent his life in service to others.

His sister and husband, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Sloan of Pampa, were present for the award ceremony. So were Mr. and Mrs. Del Taylor and two daughters from Lakin, Kansas, Mrs. Rex Sheets of Woodward and Mr. and Mrs. J.P. Sheets of Enid, Okla.

The Spearman Rotarians and the Spearman Lions Club held a joint meeting Monday. The Rotarians and Lions heard a very interesting and informative program on drugs. The program chairman Coy Palmer was responsible for the program.

Brought by two young men named Bill, who were drug ad-

dicts for seven years, the program consisted of a short talk by each and then a question and answer period on narcotics.

Many strange facts were revealed by these two former addicts. First, the boys said that drug addicts are about 4 years old, emotionally. Most all of the addicts just are not stable as far as their emotions are concerned. They also think that the world owes them a living! It seems that rehabilitation by the organization called Synanon, tries to build individual character and teach these addicts some responsibility.

Can any addict be cured? No, only those who can "cold turkey" off of the habit can be cured by the Synanon organization, and this requires patients to spend at least 3 1/2 years at the Synanon organization headquarters in California. And, the addict must want help. No psychotics, or physically violent people can be handled by this organization.

In discussing their role in Synanon, these two young men stated that they are responsible for the meat for their organization. They will contact feedyards, and meat suppliers concerning the meat supply. All of their meat is furnished on a donation basis.

The former addicts stated that parents and adults should be honest with their children. Adults should not tell kids not to do something then turn around and do it themselves! Also, the addicts stated that drug education is the answer to the program, such as that now started by our Texas Public School system.

Little is known about the Synanon organization in this area, but if you have a drug problem or have a friend who needs help, contact any of the Rotarians or Lions and they will help contact the Synanon organization for you.

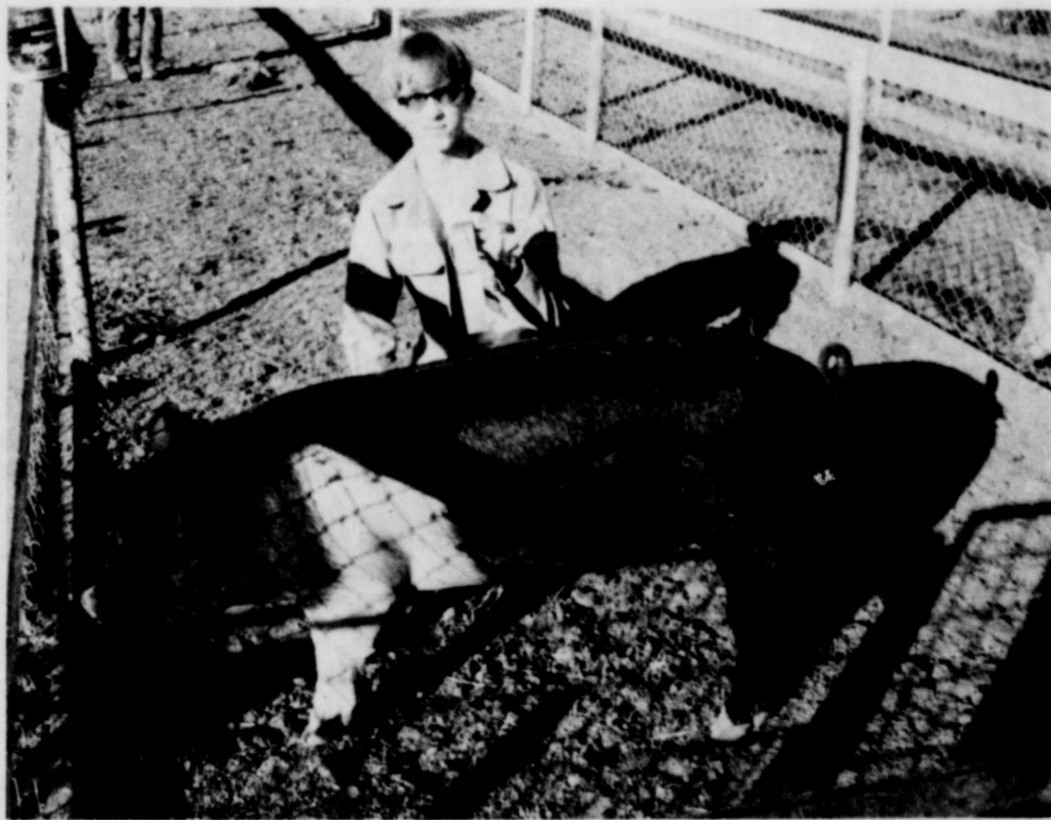

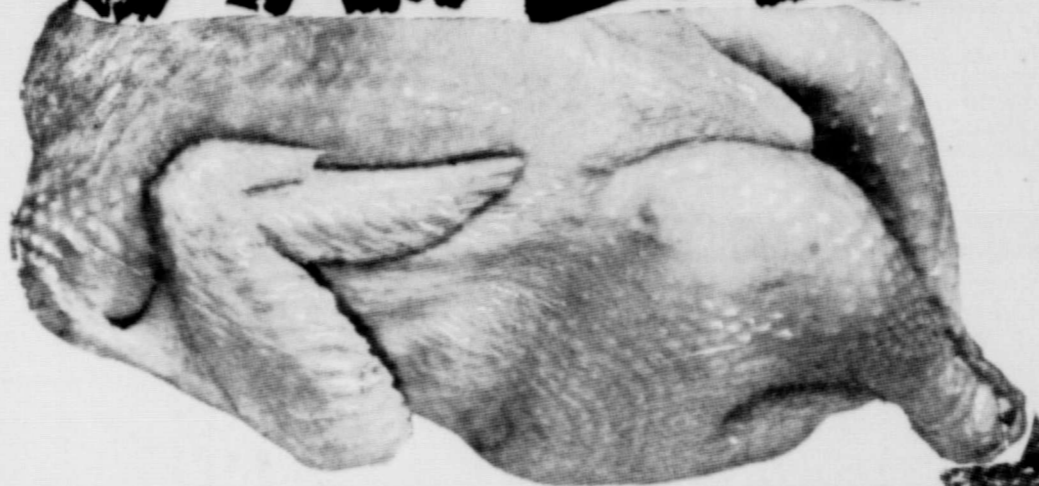

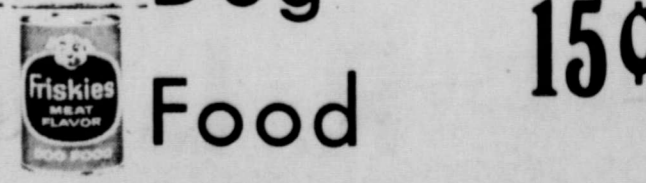

For those of you who never knew Ike Sollers, He was the town's demented little elf of a man, and loved by all. Ike was totally unqualified for anything. Devoid of any way to earn a living, Bruce gave him a job. Twice a day Ike came through the soda foun-

tain picking up all the empty ice cream cans to carry out back of the store. He loved Bruce Sheets with all the mind he had. We all did.

It's easy to love a man who is gifted with the capacity to love the unloveables.. the down-and-outers. He made it his business to care for the ones who couldn't care for themselves. He operated a one-man benevolent agency. If a person needed financial aid, he certainly didn't turn them over to the county to care for... he did it himself.

He put a trailer house behind his drug store once so two old men, who had drifted into Spearman, could have a home. The public at large thought of these two old relics as "dirty old men." Bruce didn't. He loved with "deeds."

At a public ceremony such as the awards presentation Monday night, there is simply no way of telling how many alcoholics Bruce sent away to be dried out, how many widows he helped by giving of his own money, how many kids he helped to get a college education, how many medical accounts he marked off his books for those unable to pay. For years Spearman was without a doctor and Bruce aided them as best he could and saw to it they got medical help somewhere.

The great thing about it, he had a wife who heartily concurred with all his charitable deeds.

If the world was populated

with men like Bruce Sheets, it would certainly be heaven on earth.

When the entire community was so mournful and anxious that Bruce would have to undergo such a serious heart surgery a few weeks ago... somehow I didn't worry about his recovery. I trusted God to make him well and send him back to us, because we needed him so much. God did!

The world is sadly short on men like Bruce Sheets.

Certainly there is no one like him around these parts.

All the citizens of this community seem to think so. They all voted him "Man of the Year."

COUNTY AGENT'S REPORT by Robert Adamson

AGRICULTURE IN THE 1970's TO BE DISCUSSED

"Panhandle Agriculture in the 1970's" is the theme of an upcoming conference in Amarillo which should be of interest to all agricultural producers and agribusinessmen in Hansford County, announces County Agricultural Agent Robert Adamson.

The conference will be held on February 5, 1971, at the Quality Motel, Interstate 40 East, and will begin at 9:30 a. m.

W. B. Griffin of Bonner, chairman of the Agricultural Industry Task Force of the Panhandle Economic Program (PEP), will chair the program. The conference is being sponsored by PEP and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Following a welcome by Leo Forrest of Hereford, PEP chairman, a top-level administrator with the USDA Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service will discuss "The Latest, Straight from Washington."

A panel made up of representatives of various lending institutions will then discuss "Money for Agriculture in the 1970's." On the panel will be Ed McLeroy, Dimmitt banker; Erbin Crowell, Federal Inter-

mediate Credit Bank, Canadian; Harold Stevens, Federal Land Bank, Dimmitt; and Lynn Futch, Farmers Home Administration, Temple.

Speaking after the noon luncheon will be Hal Mayfield of Amarillo, account executive with the Rosenwald Agency. His topic will be "What People Think (About Agriculture)."

The afternoon session will begin with a farmer's viewpoint of agriculture in this decade. Martin Gossett of Dumas will discuss "As the Farmer Sees It."

A panel discussion on "Statistics and Your Market" will wind up the day-long program. Dr. Allen O. Johnson with the American Meat Institute, Chicago, will talk about livestock. Dr. Donald A. Seaborg, Economic Research Service, Washington, will give his view of the big picture while John J. Seibert, Extension grain marketing specialist, will discuss feed grains on the national level and in the Panhandle area.

According to Mr. Adamson, the overall program is designed to present the "grassroots" approach to adjustments and changes agricultural producers in the 25-county PEP area will be facing in the 1970's.

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Federal Land Bank Lowers Interest

J. E. Gunn, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Spearman, received word today that The Federal Land Bank of Houston has reduced the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 8%.

"This reduction affects more than 90 million dollars of variable rate loans to more than 2800 farmers and ranchers throughout Texas," Gunn stated.

The variable rate loan plan which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July 1969 lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money markets. In large measure, therefore, the rate in any specific year will reflect the changes in prices which the Bank must pay for the money it makes available for farm mortgage loans. Mr. Gunn pointed out that this action is in line with the Bank's policy in providing farmers and ranchers credit at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound business practices.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans on farm and ranch lands throughout Texas. On January 1 of this year, the Bank had over \$529 million in volume of loans outstanding.

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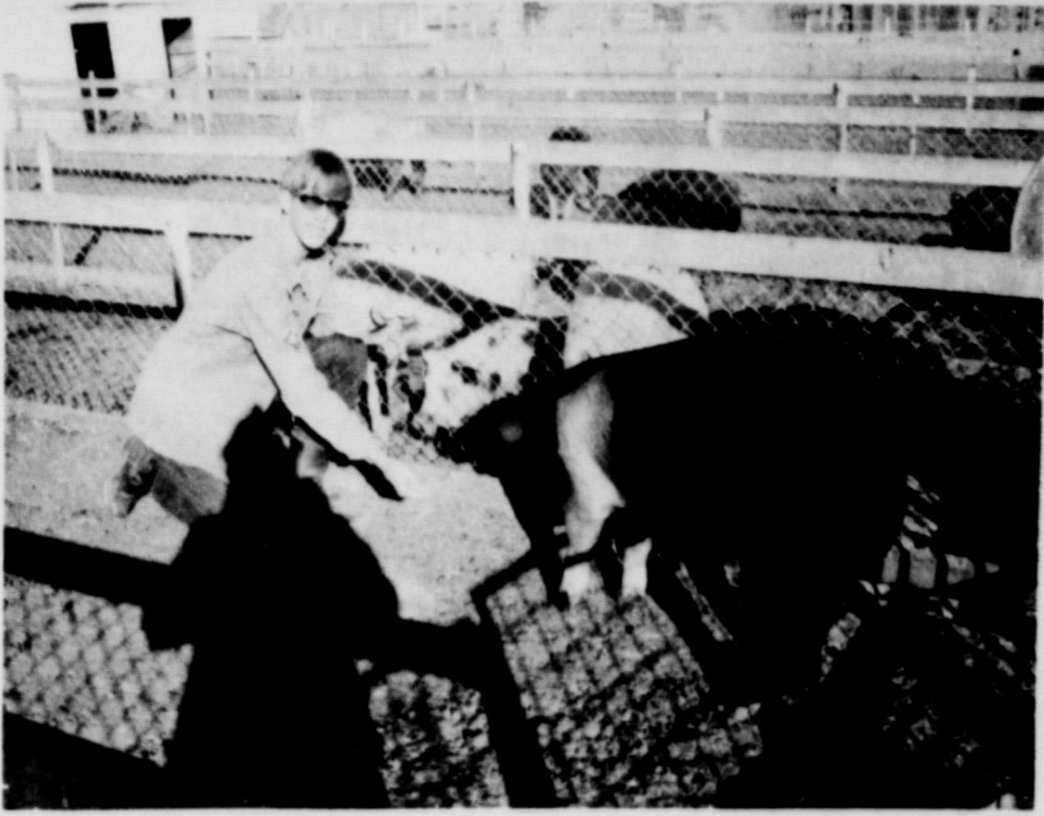

Voter Registration Ends January 30

Regardless of the fact that a three-man panel of federal judges have declared Texas voter registration laws unconstitutional, current rules will remain in effect this year until the state legislation has time to make changes.

Consequently, voter registration in Texas in 1971 comes to a close January 30.

The Hansford county tax office will be open until 5 p.m. Saturday, January 30 for those people who have not registered to vote.

Everyone in Texas who wants to be able to vote must have a valid registration receipt to be presented at the polls during the coming year at election time. There are no exemptions. Everyone who votes must be registered.

Important local elections coming up include the selection of new city councilmen and school trustees.

A new group has been added in voter registrations this year. Under the Voting Rights Act of 1970, 18, 19, and 20 year olds may register to vote

in federal elections only. Although there are no scheduled federal elections this year, there always exists the possibility of a special election to fill a vacancy in a federal office.

All persons who are now 18, 19, or 20 years old, must also register before the January 30 deadline.

The county tax office is open daily until 5 p.m.

Douglas McCloy On Dean's List

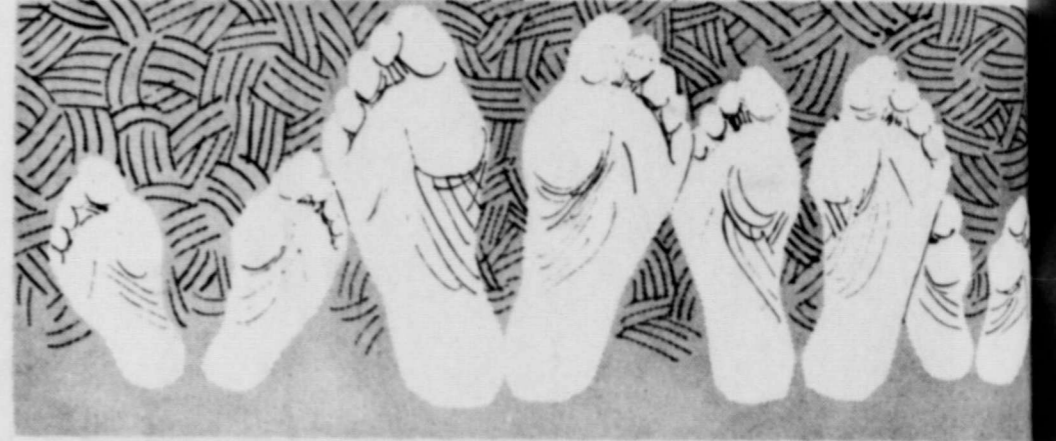

Enrollment during the semester passed the 20,000 mark for the first time in Texas Tech was founded in the mid-twenties.

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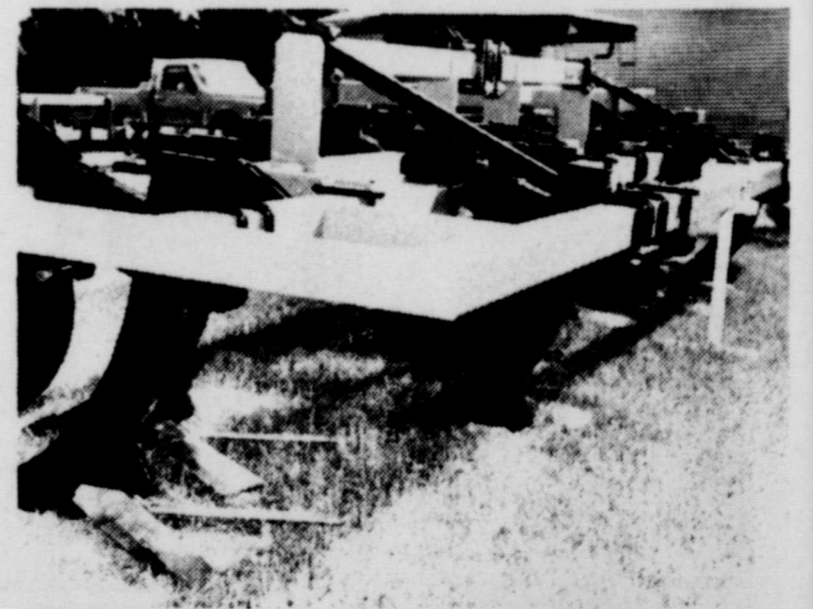

88% Of Tax Rolls Has Been Collected

School, city and county taxpayers are reminded they have until January 31 to remit their 1970 taxes. After that date penalty and interest will be charged on delinquent taxes.

Most city and county taxpayers took advantage of the 3, 2 and 1% discount by paying before the December 31 deadline. School taxpayers this year were offered a 2% discount for September payments, with no other discount allowed.

A check with Orville Latham, school tax assessor-collector, 96% of the tax roll has been collected. Taxpayers have remitted \$789,710.28 of the \$870,883.71 tax roll.

Assistant City Mgr. Robert Ragsdale said today that city taxpayers have remitted \$94,179.85, or 88% of the \$111,366.80 tax roll. At the county tax office, J. B. Cooke revealed that \$288,178.32 has been collected thus far. This amounts to 87% of the \$331,324.15 total tax roll.

These figures are for the 1970 tax year.
