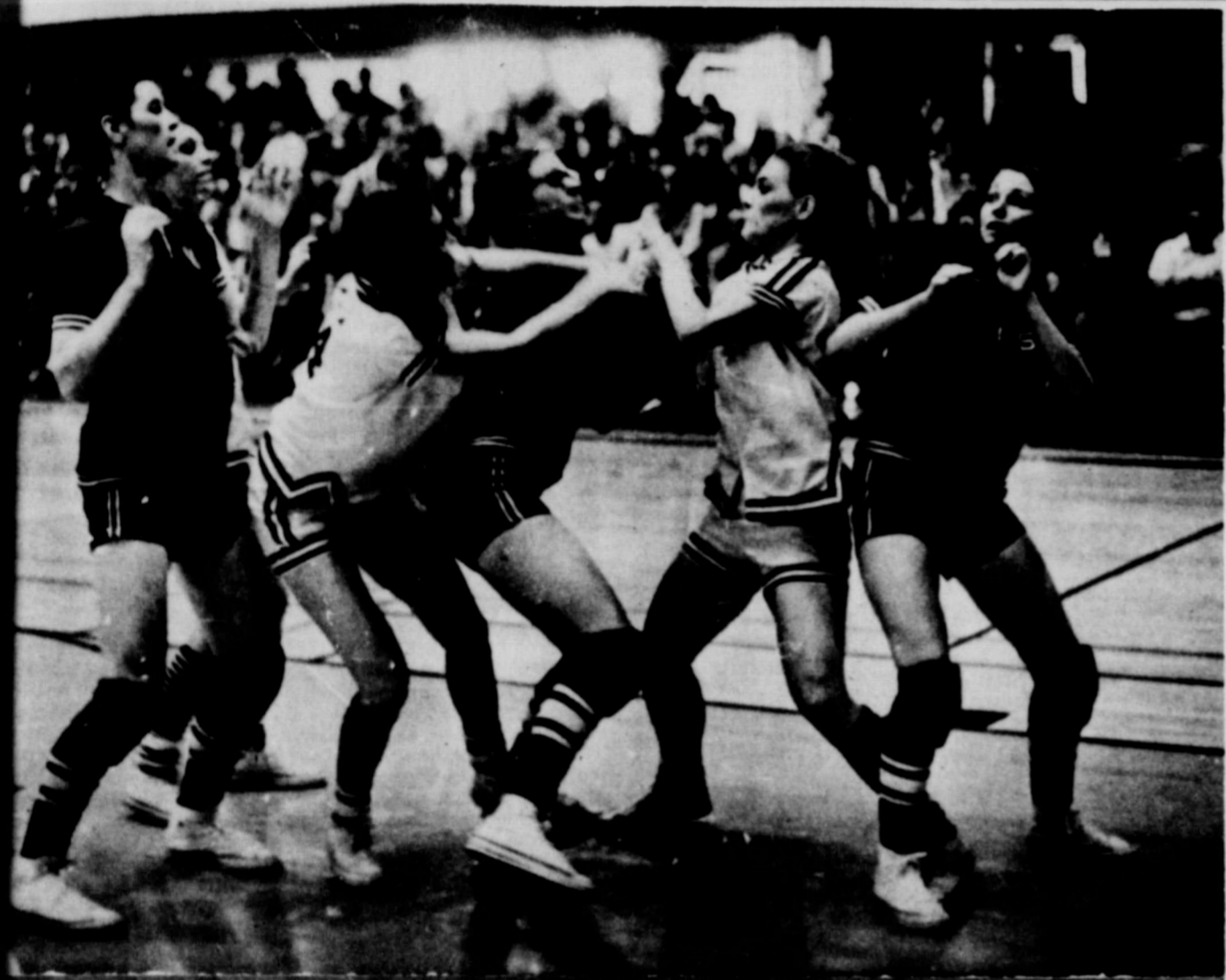

This is how the Spearman Lynxettes won the State Tournament. The Spearman guards struck with the fury of a Panhandle Blizzard, as they literally "attacked" the Robinson Forwards, during their stunning game Friday.

And, this is how the Spearman forwards played "button-Button" whose got the button, with the basketball. A bewildered all-state guard from Robinson doesn't know who threw the ball, or who will catch it, as the Lynxettes jumped into a 19 point lead against the defending state champions.

The Purple Sextet from Spearman on their second state championship Saturday evening as they defeated an old foe, Buna, 52-47.

Spearman, led by fabulous junior forward Sheila Patterson and consistent shooter Anita Smith, out-duelled Buna in the hectic game. This gained revenge for a Lynxettes loss to this same team in the 1961 finals.

Spearman, claiming its second class state title in history, had their bleachers full, with the fired-up Buna crew, but the Lynxettes were just too tough for the Buna Babes.

Fighting off the throes of a let-down after Friday's rather easy win over Waco Robinson, the Lynxettes just couldn't get excited about the final game.

Spearman, which won the 1966 title, has taken 70 of its last 72 contests. It built its best mark ever (36-1) this season. And, they plan to make it two, seventy two. Two straight championships that is.

Miss Patterson, a 5-9 Junior, scored 32 points Saturday, to go with her sensational forty three point performance Friday. A cinch to repeat as all-time forward, Miss Patterson hit 11 of 17 field goal attempts and a near perfect 10 of 11 from the charity stripe.

The Lynxettes never trailed by more than two points in the first half, and Miss Patterson's 20 foot jumper with 10 seconds left on the clock knotted the battle 25-25 at halftime.

Spearman sagged all three guards on Buna's 5-10 post Darlene Singleton but she still amassed 33 points. The lead changed hands or was tied on 13 occasions until the Lynxettes took command by driving into a 48-41 advantage with 5: 56 left in the contest.

Buna erased a six point Lynxettes lead in the fourth period and was given an added boost when Spearman guard Liz Hohertz drew her fourth foul late in the third period. However, Miss Patterson, who tallied 31 points from the charity stripe in two games, sank four straight free throws and Miss Smith canned a 12 footer to put the game away. Miss Smith actually broke the backs of Buna, when she hit 6 straight points from the floor. The fine Spearman Senior, who is also basketball queen hit better than 80 percent from the floor in the game. She only shot 7 times, and hit 6 of them, with hapless Buna, unable to stop her.

Miss Shieldknight shot 4 times from the floor and hit 3, for a fantastic shooting percentage also.

EDITORS NOTE: Out of more than 100 pictures made of the Spearman team at Austin, these two are rated as the most illustrative of the many good pictures. The skill and determination of both the forwards and guards is shown in these two pictures and tells the entire story of why Spearman is the new state basketball champion.

The Spearman Lynxettes won their second state championship at Austin over the week-end, and they had been waiting a long time for this one. The Lynxettes won the state first place trophy in 1966, but they have been nothing but "Bride's-maids" since that one victory. But, Poppa Dean Weese took his girls to Austin this year, hoping that they wouldn't be left at the altar, and when the smoke cleared from Gregory gym Friday afternoon, the people of Spearman were already preparing for the wedding feast. And, it all came true.

In the early going the game was knotted three times, and the lead changed hands on 11 occasions, until Spearman gained the upperhand midway in the second quarter at 27-26.

Spearman out scored Robinson by eight points in the third quarter, then saw the defending titlists rally in the final stanza, only to fall short by 7 points.

Of course pandemonium broke out at Gregory gym,

after the Robinson game, as the Lynxette fans, still in a state of shock over their fabulous team, just couldn't believe what had taken place.

This was perfect team effort. The Spearman guards stopped Robinson, and the Spearman forwards "hit everything" that they shot at. Of course Sheila Patterson was the outstanding forward in the tournament, as far as the Lynxette fans are concerned. "The petite Junior forward, an all-stater when she was a sophomore, played her greatest game. She cried a long time after the game was over because her parents were home "hunting cattle" after the devastating blizzard that ravaged the county the week of the state tournament. But, Sheila had all kinds of help. The entire Lynxette team was much, much tougher than Robinson. As we said before, they had been bridesmaids to Robinson "long enough" and if Robinson was to win this game, it would be after the toughest battle of their career.

Once again, however, we must comment on those super guards, that Spearman has. Everyone from Spearman knew that we had the best three forwards in the state tournament. But, what about these guards, who had to be re-trained this year? What stopped them? They just stopped the No. 1 team in the state, dead in their tracks as the Lynxette forwards struck with the fury of a Panhandle Blizzard.

The Lynxettes turned in the best performance of any team in the tournament in beating this fine Robinson team. Of course, as usual, they had defeated every state champion in Texas, including Follett, Canyon, and Claude, and it was nothing but "right" that they be named the best girls basketball team in TEXAS.

The final game against Buna, was just naturally a let-down for the Lynxettes,

Spearman Upsets Rockettes In Class AA State Tourney

AUSTIN—Revenge stood out here Friday afternoon like a sore thumb as the Spearman Lynxettes upset top-ranked Robinson, 67-60, in the first game of the Class AA girls state basketball tournament in Gregory Gymnasium.

Spearman avenged a loss to the Rockettes in last year's state finals and an earlier loss in the Duncanville tourney.

The loss ended one of the longest winning streaks in the state, halting the skin at 47 which includes the last 11 games of last season. Going into the tourney, the Rockettes were 36-0 for the season while Spearman boasted a 34-1 mark.

For the Rockettes, all is silent until next year. Graduation won't hurt too bad and the Rockettes will probably be battling the Midway Pantherettes for another state tourney berth.

Robinson took command in the early moments, riding a scoring spree that went defunct for most of the game.

All-stars Suzie Snider and Sam McKinney provided the zip along with Linda Trimble as the Rockettes swept to an 8-4 lead with less than three minutes gone in the first quarter.

But the lead was a short and small one. Spearman's multi-talented forward Snella Patterson reeled off the first eight points, knotting the score at 8-8.

From then on, it was a new game with the lead changing

hands on three occasions in the early going. The Rockettes final lead came with 2:06 remaining in the first quarter on two free throws by Miss Trimble.

Sharalyn Schell pumped in two baskets to put the Lynxettes in the lead for the first time with 1:21 remaining in the quarter. The period ended with Spearman in front, 17-16.

Miss Patterson kept the Rockettes on edge with continuous outside shots. The lead changed hands eight times in the second quarter and Spearman went to the dressing room with a respectable 39-33 lead.

Miss Patterson tossed in 29 points in the first half in leading the Lynxettes.

Fouls took their toll early in the game with Sam McKinney, Mildred Lewis and Miss Trimble feeling the results. Miss McKinney fouled out early in the fourth period and finished with six points, well below her season average. Miss Trimble joined her on the bench later in the quarter with five fouls.

During the third quarter, the Lynxettes pulled away steadily on baskets by Miss Patterson, Leann Shieldknight and Anita Smith. Spearman took a 56-40 third period lead.

The first few minutes of the final quarter was a nightmare to coach William Bradley. Miss McKinney fouled out and the Lynxettes built the largest lead of the game at 19 with 5:25 left remaining.

Leigh Waldrop and Dieque Lucenay tried their hand at foul and flipped in four quick points as the Rockettes began their rally for the roses. They cut the lead to eight with a little more than a minute

to play and finally closed the gap at seven. But time had run out on the defending champs and their dream of a second consecutive state championship, a 48-game win streak and an undefeated season were all things of the past.

Miss Patterson put on a brilliant shooting exhibition, finishing with 43 points. The 5-9 junior hit 11 of 18 field goals and canned 21 of 24 free throws.

For Robinson, Miss Snider was high with 25. Miss Trimble finished with 21 and Miss McKinney hit 6.

The girls from the Panhandle will meet Buna in the Class AA finals today at 3 p.m. Buna gained the berth with a 51-46 win over Corpus Christi Calallen.

City Lets Bids For New Trash System

City Church Women Unite For Prayer

A giant step to improve the "trashy appearance" of this city was taken last week when the City Council authorized the taking of bids for a containerized trash system.

Bids will be opened and accepted at 7:30 p.m. March 15 for the huge truck and packer body, plus some 430 containers.

Aldermen authorized the issuance of \$65,000 worth of time payment warrants to cover the cost of the new trash collecting system.

These containers will be a big improvement in reducing the amount of trash blown by the winds and scattered by dogs.

Plans call for one trash receptacle, 3 cubic yards in size, to serve four families in residential areas. Some blocks will need only two of these in the alley ways, while more populated blocks will have as many as seven per block. Some residents will find the container directly behind their house and others will have to walk only a short distance—but the walk to the trash container will not be any further from their property line than half the distance of their neighbor's lot.

Most trash containers in the business area will be the 4 cubic yard size.

City Manager Darce Foshee said the new trash system will reduce the trash pick-up in this city to a one man operation. The driver of the truck will never leave his vehicle, but simply drive up to each receptacle, release a giant lever arm which picks up the container, lifts it over the truck, dumps the trash and sets the container back on its base.

The city manager said he estimated the new trash system for Spearman would be in operation some six months after the bids are let. This would be sometime in September.

Other business on the agenda at the Feb. 24 meeting was the platting of some land owned by Tom Etter.

Mr. Etter, who resides at 4th & Endicott had never had the land just to the south of him platted. At this meeting the Council approved the Etter sub-division which was platted into lots.

Contract Awarded For New Bridge

Fairer Brothers, a construction firm from Seymour, Texas, this week was awarded the contract to build the new bridge across the Palo Duro creek just north of Spearman.

Hansford County Judge Johnnie C. Lee said the firm's bid of \$48,429.36 was the lowest of three bids submitted to the Commissioners Court.

Judge Lee said the contract stated that work must begin within 30 days, or sooner, and that the project would be completed within 120 days.

Judge Lee said engineers would build a "skew" bridge; with bridge piling running parallel with the stream and the structure parallel with the road surface.

The county will do quite a bit of road work in precinct two. The curve approaching the bridge will be straightened and the road improved in general to give persons in county precinct two a safer and more dependable highway.

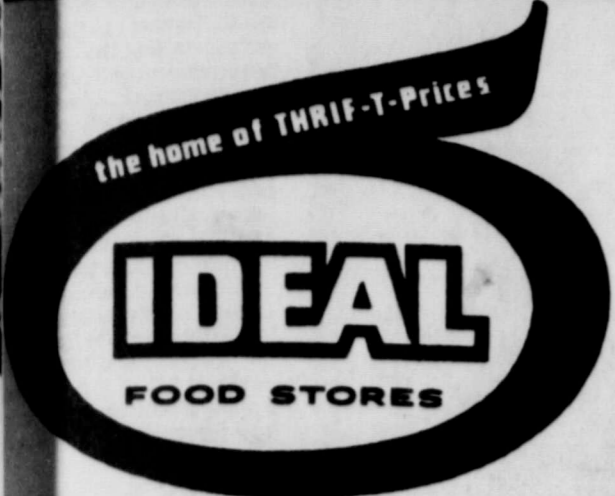

"YOU NAME IT" by Billy Miller

I think that most of my readers will enjoy reading about my trip to Austin last week. I boarded the Silver Eagle Continental Trailways bus at 3 p.m. Thursday night, along with some 35 other basketball fans, and we headed for Austin. The bus went around by Canadian, so that we could pick up Mrs. Weese, Coach Weese's mother, and consequently we got to go by several deep snowdrifts, but I had more snow in my back-yard in Spearman, than they got at Canadian. It seemed, we picked up Mrs. Weese at Miller's Cafe in Canadian, and the jubilant troop of fans, headed by Al Tucker and Jimmie Davis, all went to sleep, and the next thing I remember they woke me up for a coffee break at Childress. We all got out at Childress, stretched

our legs, had some coffee, planned our game strategy against Robinson, and then headed down on the beautiful Silver Eagle, and headed for Abilene. Someone woke me up at Abilene, the home of the "prettiest girls I've ever seen" and we all got out and had another snack. Jimmie Davis and I ate some eggs and hot biscuits, and everyone either ate, or drank some coffee. We arrived in Austin at 6 a.m. having made the trip in a record time of 10 hours. And, this bus was the best way to travel I have ever found.

Most of the fans on the bus were staying at the Sheraton Crest in Austin. So, we parked at the Crest, and all agreed to have the bus driver pick up the fans at 9:30 a.m. and take them to the gym. I called Danny Ray Robertson, my "fantastic" Austin nephew, and he arranged to pick me up at the gym at 5 p.m. that evening. The bus driver had to take some of the fans over to the Rodeway Inn, No. 2,

so I jumped aboard, and rode with him. We came back by Rodeway Inn No. 1, which is where I always stay, and I jumped out, telling the bus driver that I could walk to the gym, as I knew the way. It was about a mile to the gym, and I have been to Austin so many times, I didn't have to ask how to get to the gym but two or three times.

I made it in plenty of time to get to the opening game, and as I had to get my press pass to cover the tourney, I dashed up to Mr. Little's office to make arrangements for my pass, and he wasn't in his office, so I ambled down a couple of offices, and found some rather nice looking young men, and asked them where Mr. Little was. They said come on in and we will pour you a cup of coffee, and they immediately began to introduce themselves. They were all of Darrell Royal's staff and I noticed several gold footballs, and the beautiful MacArthur Bowl, that they are sharing with Ohio State. The coaches were extremely proud of this bowl, and they will get to keep it 6 months and then send it to Ohio State for 6 months. These coaches were about the finest bunch of boys I have ever met, and they asked me all about the Lynxettes. And, I told them that we were just like the University of Texas, just didn't have any material. Just good coaching. They immediately poured me two more cups of coffee, and we talked about the Panhandle, etc. Mr. Little showed up and I received a tournament media pass, and then attended the morning session of the tournament. Follett lost in an over-time, and I hated this so much, and the Follett coach and team is such a fine group. But I visited with the coach, and he said he would make it O.K. But Spearman has been in his same shoes so many times, I felt really sorry for him, but he really was doing fine and just got beat in an over-time, and that is the story of the morning session at Gregory Gym.

After the morning session, I ran into several Spearman boys, Little Tucker, Archer, Brummett, and a couple of other youngsters, and we headed up the avenue to Alfie's where we ate some fish-n-chips. Then all of us decided that we would like to go to the top of the Texas Tower, and we dashed over there and took the elevator to the top of the 27 story building, and enjoyed the view of Austin from the top of Texas tallest tower.

We ambled over to the gym, as the Lynxettes were going to meet Robinson at 1 p.m., and as the game drew closer, I began to go into my usual trauma. That is, I went into the gym, checked my lighting, and made sure that I was using the exact setting on the cameras, and I had both cameras loaded, and ready for the game. I was walking up

the stairs after I left the gym floor, and ran right into Dean Weese, who also was just walking around in a "state of shock." We talked a bit, and I apologized for not recognizing him, but he understood, as the pressure on him was on me. We both agreed that although we hadn't lost the game as yet, it was a shame that the loser couldn't play another game for third place. After all, 1200 miles is a long way to drive for one game. Of course, this is part of his strategy, and I decided that I just wouldn't bet on the game at all. I had already given Robinson and 16 points, just for a fun bet.

At about 12:39 the Lynxettes and Robinson came out on the gym floor for their warm-ups. The Lynx fans, and this wonderful Lynxette pep squad tried to out-yell the entire town of Waco, but Waco is only 60 miles from Spearman, so it was up to the Lynxettes to carry the banner for the blizzard struck town of Spearman. Just before the game, my chief assistant Harold Larson showed up to help me. Harold has helped me every game since 1961, and he went through Baylor with Bill Bradley, the coach at Robinson. But Harold yells for the Lynxettes, and he told me before the game, that Bill had told him "nobody can beat Robinson." Harold said that he enjoyed reading the write-up on the regional game about LeeAnn Shieldknight (kidd-folks), and I almost had a run-away, I asked him if he told Bill Bradley about that story, and he said, why certainly not.

I ran over to coach Weese and coach Bradley before the game started, and told them I wanted a picture of them before the game started. Bill smiled real big, as he seemed so sure of himself, and Dean managed to smile, pretty well, but I know how he felt. The game started, and the whole game is history now. The Lynxettes won the game on pure skill, talent, and physical playing. They were tougher, more accurate with their shooting, and played like they are capable of playing.

We watched the CalAllen-Buna game, after the Lynxette's won, and by the time this game was over, we were all "kinda" settled down. None of us cared who won the game, we knew we had the best girls team in the state this year, and it just didn't matter who won, CalAllen, or Buna, Buna beat them some 5 or 6 points, and it was quite a battle.

The afternoon session was over, and I grabbed a ride with Chalmers and Betty Porter, and we grabbed us a cup of coffee, and he had to run me back out to Gregory Gym to meet Danny Ray. We almost ran out of gas on the way but managed to creep into a station near the gym. Then, in order to save time, Chalmers turned up an alley to cut across to Gregory. We ended up in a line of cars that was going to a drive-in bank, and this delayed us another 20

minutes. But, finally we did arrive at Gregory Gym, and sure enough there was Danny's little green Mustang car, parked right in front of the library, which faces the gym. I immediately climbed into the Mustang, turned on my little portable radio, began peering around for Danny Ray. After about 30 minutes, I realized that Danny must be up in the gym, or the library, or somewhere. I walked over to the gym, and it was locked. Then I went back to the car, and relaxed. About the time I leaned back, here came the best looking co-ed you ever saw, and was heading right for me and the green Mustang. I asked her if this was her car, and she said "not exactly." I borrowed it from a friend. Oh, I said, then it is Danny Ray's. She said "no." And I asked her again, if she was sure she didn't know Danny Ray. She was so very nice, and assured me that she didn't know Danny, and of course with my pleasing personality, I explained to her that I was trying to get to 200 North Loop, and she said I don't know where that is, but if I did know I sure would take you over there. I said, well, lady, I sure do thank you, and I am awfully sorry that there are more than two green Mustangs in Austin. She was real considerate, and I am sure that she knew that I was from the country, and was telling her the truth.

I dashed up to a phone booth, and called Danny, and after he got over the shock of recent turn of events, he picked me up at the gym.

We dashed by to see his girl, Donna Freelin, and met her folks. They were having a garage sale and of course I enjoyed visiting with them, and Mrs. Freelin poured me a cup of the best coffee I have ever had, and for the first time in 36 hours I set down and relaxed.

Danny took me out to his apartment and he just waited on me "hand and foot" for the next two days. I took a shower, and dressed up for the evening banquet. My wife had said me out three sets of clothes, all matched up, with instructions on how to dress. So, I dressed up, and we went out to the Little Barn in Austin. And, I believe that this is one of the finest, if not the finest places that I have ever eaten. We ordered steaks, and they brought us all of the salad we could eat, a loaf of hot bread, and 25 lbs. of cheese that they set on the table for us to nibble on. After we ate our steaks (it was 9 P.M.), I suddenly felt like I was going to have to get some sleep, so Danny and Donna took me to the apartment and by 9:30 I was asleep.

Danny carried me out to the early session of the tourney, and I watched some morning games, and I had called my cousin at Bridgeport, Texas, and my Uncle Joe in Austin to see if they could make it to the championship game at 3 p.m. Saturday. Uncle Joe and Aunt Lena made it, and they both look real fine. Uncle Joe is daddy's baby brother, and he and Jimmy Davis had a real fine visit at the game. About the last trip that my dad ever made was to Austin in 1961, and he really enjoyed it.

The Spearman-Buna game is also history, but as everyone knows, we had our hands full with this fine team, and we did play good ball, but Buna also, like Robinson, played good ball, and as everyone knows, the Lynxettes were crowned State Champions. After the game, I made many, many pictures, and I handed a couple of rolls to one of my many helpers at the game and if you will be kind enough please mail these pictures to me. I can't remember who I gave them to, but we do need the pictures for our records.

A party was held for the Lynxettes after they had won the state championship and was enjoyed by all at the Villa Inn.

I wound up my trip in Austin by eating at Christi's Saturday night, and taking in a movie with Danny and Donna.

We all agreed to leave at 6 a.m. Sunday morning so that we could get home by the time the Lynxettes arrived, so we could be at the big welcoming party, but we just missed this party by 15 minutes.

Thanks, to the Lynxettes for such a fine trip. And, lets make it 2, in '72. That is 2 straight championships.

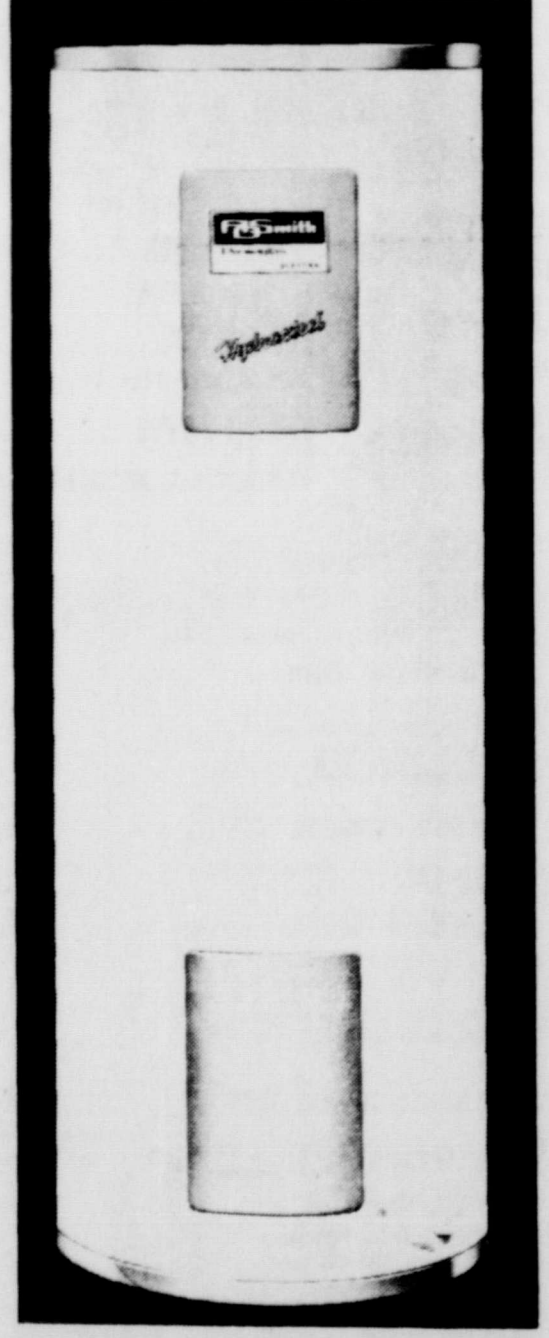

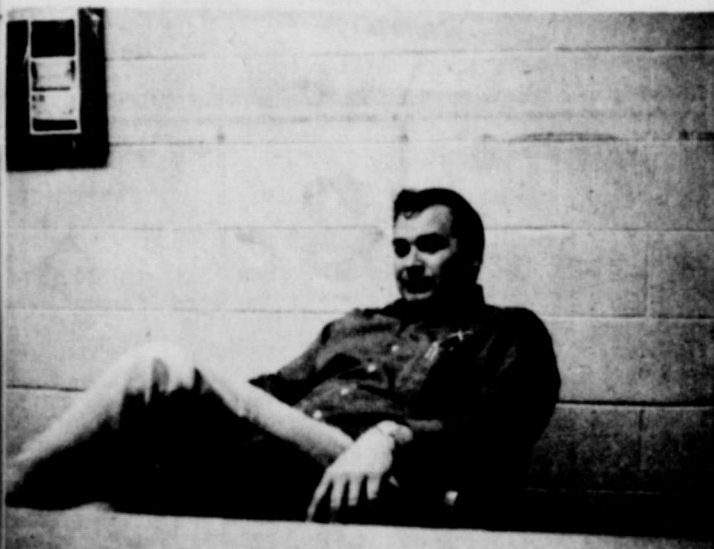

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State, of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any amendment, the said amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 15) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. (1) The State Ethics Commission is created as an agency of the State. The commission consists of nine members. Three members shall be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas with the advice and consent of the Associate Justices serving on the Court, three members shall be appointed by the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas with the advice and consent of the other Judges serving on the Court, and three members shall be appointed by the Chairman of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission with the advice and consent of the other members of the commission, of each group of three appointees no more than two shall be attorneys engaged in the active practice of law. In addition thereto there shall be two ex officio members, one from the House of Representatives and one from the Senate to be elected on the first day of each Regular Session of the Legislature by a majority of the membership of each House for a term ending on the first day of the next Regular Session. (2) With the exception of the initial appointees, each member shall hold office for a term of six (6) years and until his successor is appointed and has qualified. In making the initial appointments, each appointing officer shall designate one (1) appointee to serve a term of two (2) years, one (1) appointee to serve a term of four (4) years, and one (1) appointee to serve a term of six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. The membership shall designate one of its members to serve as chairman for a period of two (2) years. (3) The members of the commission shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. (4) The commission shall recommend the compensation, per diem, and mileage allowance of members of the Legislature, and may recommend the salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor

proved before that day by resolution of either House of the Legislature. (b) All rates of compensation, mileage allowances or per diem rates and all changes and recommendations made by the commission thereof shall not take effect until approved section by section by resolution of both Houses of the Legislature. "All votes on these resolutions or parts thereof shall show the individual votes in the respective journals of both Houses. (8) The commission shall investigate any alleged violation of any rule of ethics promulgated by it and report its findings to the appropriate State agency, official, legislative body, grand jury or district attorney. (9) Until otherwise provided by the commission, each member of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury an annual salary of Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and per diem not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first 120 days only of each Regular Session and for 30 days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than 140 days. In addition to the per diem, the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after adjournment of the Regular or Called session. (10) The commission is further authorized to recommend to each Legislature changes which will improve, and effect economy in the legislative process. Sec 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 18th day of May, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, State officers and legislative officers, to investigate violations thereof, and to recommend compensation for members of the Legislature and the Lieutenant Governor and recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process."

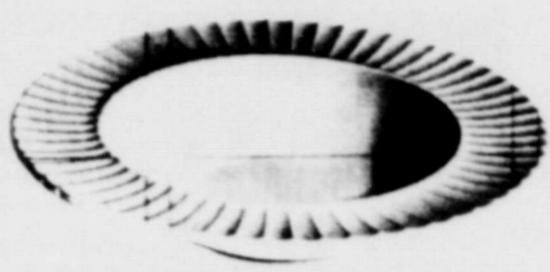
