Champions Are Named In Junior Livestock Show

Hansford County 4-H young men and women and Future Farmer chapters Spearman and Gruver exhibited 176 head of animals in the annual junior livestock show held here Monday. Hundred and fourteen animals were sold in the auction evening to local buyers for a total of \$5,181.

Of the show this year in Penney, Professor of Husbandry, Oklahoma State University, named a Hereford steer exhibited by Jerry Etheredge, Spearman FFA, as the Grand Champion. Seth Ralston, Spearman FFA, exhibited the Champion Hampshire Barrow and John Armes, Gruver FFA, showed the Hampshire Reserve Champion Lamb. The Grand Champion was shown by Joe Bob Spearman FFA. Steve Gruver FFA, exhibit the Reserve Champion Barrow and Dahl, Gruver 4-H the Reserve champion.

The Grocery of Spearman was the grand champion at \$1,10 per lb. \$1,072.50. Mrs. Truck & Impl. of Hansford purchased the champion at \$1.31 per lb. and the grand champion was purchased by Hansford Implement Co., 97¢ per lb. \$9.50.

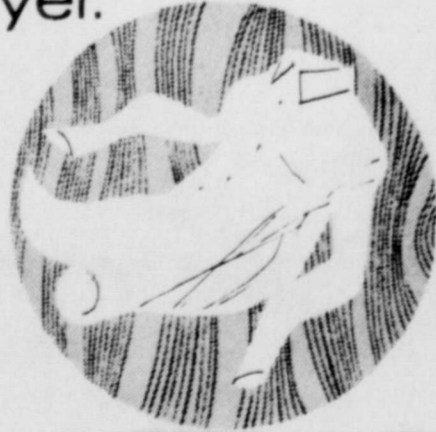

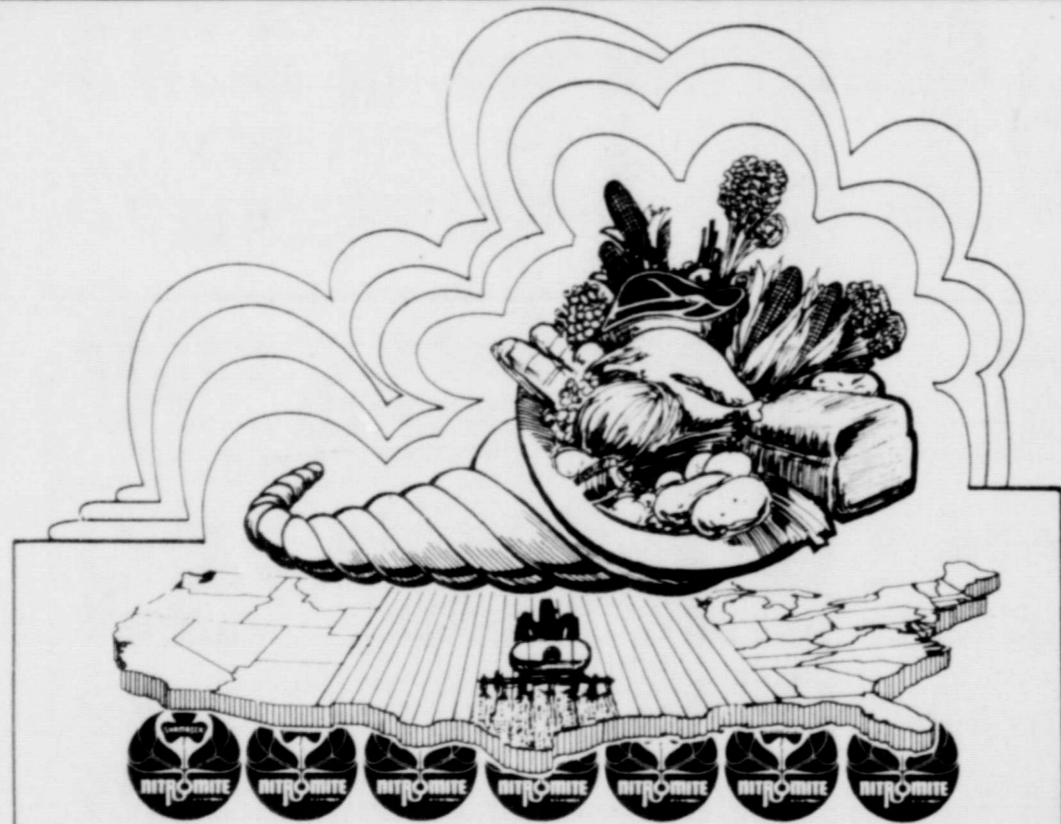

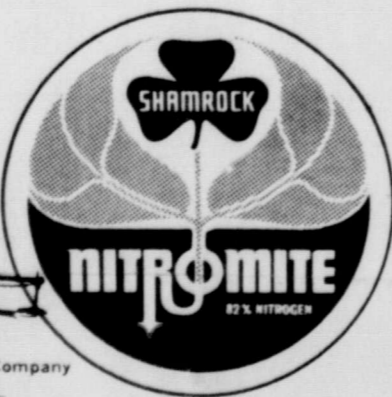

The referendum and election will be held in each county by personal balloting. Polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. on the date of the election. The polling places for all counties will be at the County Courthouse. Voting will be conducted on May 11, 1971. Any person within the area described above engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced, wheat for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed. Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for election to the proposed commodity producers board by written application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date. Any person who wishes to vote absentee may obtain a ballot at his local County Agent's office on or before April 27, 1971. Such ballots must be completed and returned to the Texas Wheat Producers Association at the above listed address prior to midnight on the election date.

Let Me See by Sybil...

The calendar told us Sunday was the first day of Spring... starting about 8 minutes after 2 o'clock I think. Sunday was a pretty day, too. For a chance we could see the sky (no dust) and the wind was calm. A few days last week we had so much dust blowing around I was beginning to wonder if I would ever see the color of my floors again, much less the sky itself! One good thing about it, we know it wasn't OUR dust. We'll blame it on Kansas & Oklahoma, but as strong as the wind was blowing it could have come from Canada. It didn't seem much like Spring as I came to work Monday morning in temperatures still below the 30 degree mark. We all know our weather won't begin to warm up until after Easter. This is always so, and probably would be if Easter fell in June.

The only thing heralding Spring around my house is the pesky Elm Leaf beetle. I have been sweeping them up off the floor for the past 2 weeks at least. For the past two years they had riddled my elm hedge and the one elm tree I need so badly at my

back door. I am quite sure the hedge is dead; last year I had to clip it only once. First it was attacked by "mealy bugs" which bury up in the bark, and three spraying with insecticide didn't phase them. Next year the beetles made quick work of what was left. The only reason I haven't put up a wooden fence is because I know the termites would have it chewed down before I had it paid for. They eat up my wood pile faster than I can burn it.

The one nice tree I had left was a redbud, one of the first trees I set out when we moved here... more years ago than I can remember. It was perfectly shaped, blooms so pretty, and the one thing growing in my yard the beetles and bugs left alone. Last week during one of those strong wind gusts, our TV tower decided to give up the ghost, and wouldn't you know it! It fell right in the top of the redbud tree. The only green thing alive on our lot is a good crop of weeds in the backyard. Soon as the weather warms up enough for cement to set, I intend to pave the whole worthless mess. Lot-to-lot cement. Not a bad idea really. Give the termites something to sharpen their teeth on.

I WISH THE City of Spearman, or the County Commissioners could find it in their hearts to buy the old Brandt store building, repair it and

preserve it in its original state for posterity. It would make an ideal city- or county museum. It grieves me to think of this old landmark being torn down. I don't know that it will be, but the store and all its contents will go on the auction block April 10th. Most every little hamlet and community (that has any foresight at all) has one old building restored and preserved. And this building would be an ideal one to save. It is the only structure on Main Street which was moved here from Old Hansford in 1919. And it remains in its original state.

The building was built at Old Hansford by the father of Edgar Dillow, for P. M. Maize. Mr. Maize had owned a general merchandise store in Old Hansford for years and when the town was moved to the present site of Spearman he had the new store built and moved here. His old store was also moved and stood just in back of the present building and was used as a warehouse. It has been gone for years.

P. M. Maize & Co. store was owned by Mode Maize and H. C. Brandt of Chapel Hill, Texas who had stores there and elsewhere. He and Mr. Maize were in business until Brandt's death in 1908. At this time, Mr. Fred Brandt moved to Old Hansford and was in charge of his father's interest in the company

until 1928. This was the year Fred's father died and he bought the store from Mode Maize. Fred continued to operate the store, stocking groceries and a line of general merchandise, until 1955. He began to "sell out the goods" without restocking so he could devote his time to the care of his son, Billy Brandt, who was severely injured in a car wreck. Mr. Brand died in 1962 and Billy just moved the old store fixtures and what merchandise was left to the back, and turned the store into a TV and Radio repair shop.

Come April 10, the building, the lot, and all the contents will be sold at public auction. Wouldn't it be nice if we could keep it, repair and stock it with relics of by-gone years. It would make an excellent tourist attraction... and every town needs one...

But, more important even than this, we need to preserve some things for future space-age generations to view. Just think--they could wander through this old country store and see how part of the "establishment" made a living... back in the good old days!
