Subject: Seasonal Grazing and Harvesting of Hay.

This is to advise that we have received a telex dated May 24, 1971, directed to the Chairman, Texas USDA Disaster Committee, from Acting DASCO, advising that the Assistant Secretary had authorized the above committee to permit seasonal grazing and harvest of hay through June 30, 1971, where applicable, on land retired from production under the Cropland Adjustment Program.

This means that dryland farmers can graze set aside acres free through June 30th, by making application at the local ASCS OFFICE.

VA REQUESTS ATTENDANCE CARDS

"It's about that time again, Jack Coker, Veterans Administration Regional Office Director in Waco, reminded veterans, servicemen and dependents attending college under the G. bill.

That reminder was designed to induce veterans to return their certification of attendance cards to VA during the last full month of their current enrollment period. For most schools, this means the months of May or June. And there are two very

good reasons for jogging heir memories: (1) VA cannot prepare a

final check for the spring 970-71 school year until the agency has received the certification of attendance card from the student involved. (2) Returning the card at

the end of the current semester, lets the student automatically be enrolled under the GI Bill for the upcoming summer or fall semesters. Trainees attending school

below college level must also return their certification of attendance cards, but they must do so every month, VA explained.

Failure to complete and return the cards on the part of both college level and below college level trainees will make it necessary for the VA to automatically stop payments.

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PHONE CO. AND CWA GET TOGETHER

SAN ANGELO -- The first three days of contract negotiations between the Communications workers of America and General Telephone Company of the Southwest recessed in San Angelo Friday (May 21) after both presented proposals, according to a joint statement issued by the company and CWA.

Talks resumed at 9:30 a.m. Monday.

Union proposals, presented by T.O. Moses, international representative of CWA from Lubbock, were made Wednesday at the initial meeting held at Ramada Inn. Owen Rabourn. vice president-personnel of GTSW, made company proposals to union representatives Thursday afternoon. Included in the union pro-

posals were establishment of a one-year contract as compared to the present threeyear agreement that expires fune 27, increase in wages, shortening of intervals between pay riases in wage schedules, improvements in health care and related items, vacation time, holidays and over-

Also included in the union proposals were requests for increases in premium pay for those working certain hours, life insurance program im-

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provements, longer leaves of absence for union business, modifications in company use of contract labor, improvement in sickness disability plan, upgrading of pay for certain jobs and employees in towns classified as higher hying cost areas, modification of work schedules and a modified board and lodging proced-


The company proposals in-cluded exemption from the bargaining unit for certain employees, modification to board and lodging provisions, requiring more notice for absence due to union duties, modiffication of sickness disability benefits, and changes in classification of certain jobs and

The initial meetings also set guidelines for future sessions which are scheduled to be held weekdays at the Ramada Inn in San Angelo. It was also agreed that releases to the news media would be made jointly.

In other action, the company provided statistics and certain employee information to the union following their request.

CWA represents approximately 5, 200 GTSW employees in the five state area served by the company.









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

The aid, which was earmarked for such projects as urban improvement, job training, health and hospit-ak, school lunches, streets and highways, school con-struction, education and the like, went principally to areas that needed it most.

The aid program has been growing larger, year by year. In 1960, about \$7 billion came from Washington for such purposes, as compared with the \$23.5 billion in 1970.

Q--If a veteran arranges for his National Service Life Insurance to be paid in a lump sum, may his beneficiary select another method

of payment?
A--Yes. The NSLI beneficiary can have all or part of the insurance paid in monthly installments over a period of years, or for life. But the beneficiary cannot select a lump sum payment if the insured designated monthly payments.

Greenbug Resistance Goal Of TGSPB Grant

Grain sorghum resistance to greenbugs is the goal of researchers beginning TGSPBfinanced studies at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Lubbock. A \$13,133 grant from the TGSPB will finance operations at the center. Four specialists will seek to transfer greenbug resistance into agronomically desirable sorghum lines and evaluate other sorghum varieties for ad-

ditional sources of resistance. The greenbug has caused severe damage to High Plains sorghum crops in past years, according to GSPA Executive Director, Elbert Harp.

Dr. J. W. Johnson, a plant breeding specialist, will direct the project at the lubbock center, assisted by two co-work-ers. Also working on the project will be Dr. D.T. Rosenow, a plant breeding specialist, and Dr. G.L. Teetes, an entomologist. The group will study the inheritance of greenbug resistance in developing the new line. All findings will be published.

Massive application of in-secticides for greenbug con-trol could possibly be elimin-ated through development of a resistant hybrid milo. Not only are the applications expensive, but rapid build-up of other injurious insects may result. Greenbugs spread the damaging Maize Dwarf Mosaic Virus, and researchers speculat that this problem on the High Plains could be curbed with a decrease

in greenbug population. Texas A&M hopes to make the resistant sorghum hybrid available to the public sooner than expected due to the funds granted by TGSPB. Current grain sorghums reported resist= ant to greenbugs are agrono-mically unfit for commercial production. Over 10, 000 entries have been submitted to the World Sorghum Collection, and each variety needs evalua-

Breeding projects of this na-

ture often require as much as eight years, but researchers hope to cut that time by one third or more through the use of greenhouse experimenta-

Procedure in the project en-tails crossing greenbug resist-ant lines with better sorghum varieties, using backcross and pedigree methods to transfer the resistance as rapidly as possible. Inheritance studies will utilize many crosses made in breeding work, in addition to studies of various sources of resistance to determine wheth-

er the resistance is controlled by the same gene or genes. Because of possible development of new types of green-bug, the identification of resistance controlled by different genes is of utmost import-

To better chances of success, a team approach will be used on the project. The three man team at the Research Center will be assisted by other Lubbock research workers, as well as scientists from other locations aiding the development and evaluation of greenbug resistant sorghums.

Tax Contributions And The New Law

The rules on how much you

can deduct on your contributions to a charitable organization have been revised under the 1969 Tax Reform Act. Some exempt organizations that depend on charitable donations report that they are not getting as many contributions since the change in the tax law. They apparently feel that most of the difference in the amount of the contributions is due to a misunderstanding about the taxability of contributions and that some taxpayers feel that they will have to pay income taxes on the appreciated value of a gift that would have been subject to a capital gain if sold. There is no tax due on a gift under the new law, but the amount of the deduction has been reduced in some cases. However, if you have valuable property that you would like to donate to an exempt organization (church, museum, educational institution or other charitable organization approved by IRS) you can still get a substantial benefit on your income tax through the donation.
