To Executive Director Hansford County ASCS From W. M. Hott, Chief Production Adjustment Subject: Seasonal Grazing and Harvesting of Hay.

This is to advise that we have received a telex dated May 24, 1971, directed to the Chairman, Texas USDA Disaster Committee, from Acting DASCO, advising that the Assistant Secretary had authorized the above committee to permit seasonal grazing and harvest of hay through June 30, 1971, where applicable, on land retired from production under the Crop-land Adjustment Program.

This means that dryland farmers can graze set aside acres free through June 30th, by making application at the local ASCS OFFICE.

GRANTS TO LOCAL AREA, \$659,000

Comparing the amount of federal assistance going to Hansford County in the form of grants-in-aid with the amount the local area ahead of the state.

Of the \$23.5 billion distributed to communities throughout the country in the past fiscal year, how much was allocated for local needs and at what cost?

A state-by-state analysis of the grants-in-aid programs--of which there are about 500, according to a Senate subcommittee's findings--has been made by the Tax Foundation, a non-profit organization concerned with public taxation and spending.

It shows how the \$23.5 billion was apportioned, and, in each instance, what the cost was.

Communities in 30 states suffered by the exchange, getting back more than they put in. For the others, the price paid was greater than the amount of aid received.

A breakdown of the state figures, which are based upon Treasury Department reports, indicates that the cost of federal aid in Hansford County came to approximately \$659,000 in the year. The amount that was returned through grants, is estimated at \$659,000.

The state of Texas as a whole was also somewhat ahead on this basis. The portion of its income tax and excise tax payments that went into the federal aid programs amounted to more than \$1,146,000,000, the Tax Foundation reports.

The amount that came back to the state and its localities totaled \$1,153,000,000.

In effect, \$1 was received in the form of government aid for every 99 cents in cost. This is exclusive of matching

funds that must be provided in most cases by the state and local governments.

There was no attempt to match the grants on a dollar for dollar basis, it is pointed out. The aid, which was earmarked for such projects as urban improvement, job training, health and hospital care, school lunches, streets and highways, school construction, education and the like, went principally to areas that needed it most.

The aid program has been growing larger, year by year. In 1960, about \$7 billion came from Washington for such purposes, as compared with the \$23.5 billion in 1970.

Q--If a veteran arranges for his National Service Life Insurance to be paid in a lump sum, may his beneficiary select another method of payment?
A--Yes. The NSLI beneficiary can have all or part of the insurance paid in monthly installments over a period of years, or for life. But the beneficiary cannot select a lump sum payment if the insured designated monthly payments.

Greenbug Resistance Goal Of TGSPB Grant

Grain sorghum resistance to greenbugs is the goal of researchers beginning TGSPB-financed studies at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Lubbock. A \$13,133 grant from the TGSPB will finance operations at the center. Four specialists will seek to transfer greenbug resistance into agronomically desirable sorghum lines and evaluate other sorghum varieties for additional sources of resistance.

The greenbug has caused severe damage to High Plains sorghum crops in past years, according to GSPA Executive Director, Elbert Harp. Dr. J. W. Johnson, a plant breeding specialist, will direct the project at the Lubbock center, assisted by two co-workers. Also working on the project will be Dr. D. T. Rose, a plant breeding specialist, and Dr. G. L. Teetes, an entomologist. The group will study the inheritance of greenbug resistance in developing the new line. All findings will be published.

Massive application of insecticides for greenbug control could possibly be eliminated through development of a resistant hybrid milo. Not only are the applications expensive, but rapid build-up of other injurious insects may result. Greenbugs spread the damaging Maize Dwarf Mosaic Virus, and researchers speculate that this problem on the High Plains could be curbed with a decrease in greenbug population.

Texas A&M hopes to make the resistant sorghum hybrid available to the public sooner than expected due to the funds granted by TGSPB. Current grain sorghums reported resistant to greenbugs are agronomically unfit for commercial production. Over 10,000 entries have been submitted to the World Sorghum Collection, and each variety needs evaluation.

Breeding projects of this nature often require as much as eight years, but researchers hope to cut that time by one third or more through the use of greenhouse experimentation.

Procedure in the project entails crossing greenbug resistant lines with better sorghum varieties, using backcross and pedigree methods to transfer the resistance as rapidly as possible. Inheritance studies will utilize many crosses made in breeding work, in addition to studies of various sources of resistance to determine whether the resistance is controlled by the same gene or genes. Because of possible development of new types of greenbug, the identification of resistance controlled by different genes is of utmost importance.

To better chances of success, a team approach will be used on the project. The three man team at the Research Center will be assisted by other Lubbock research workers, as well as scientists from other locations aiding the development and evaluation of greenbug resistant sorghums.

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More Drought Funds For Scorched Texas

Emergency loan funds are available, applications are being taken, and more money has been requested to combat the serious effects of the drought which grips Texas, Lynn Futch, State Director of Farmers Home Administration, said today. President Nixon has asked the Congress to add \$65 million to the fund from which FHA finances its nationwide emergency farm loan program, Mr. Futch said.

The Farmers Home Administration has already made 1503 emergency loans totaling \$15 million to farmers and ranchers in Texas to help them overcome the disastrous effects of the drought which has scorched parts of the state since the spring of 1970.

Emergency loans are made to enable farmers and ranchers to continue normal operations which have been disrupted by natural disasters. These loans previously were available in 53 Texas counties, and last month, the Secretary of Agriculture increased the number to 235 counties.

The impact of the drought has centered primarily in Texas and Oklahoma, but Mr. Futch said that emergency loans may be made outside of designated areas to eligible applicants who have suffered severe losses as a result of the drought.

Current interest rates on emergency loans are 4 7/8 percent, repayable as soon as possible consistent with the financial ability of borrowers, Mr. Futch said.

Application for loans should be made at county offices of Farmers Home Administration. The local FHA office is located at 408 S. Amherst in Perryton, servicing farmers in Hansford, Hutchinson, Lipscomb and Ochiltree counties.

Loans To Farmers

An economic boost toward the development of rural Texas was announced last week by J. Lynn Futch, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration in Temple.

Futch pointed out that an additional \$12,600,000,000 has been released for the current fiscal year, through June 30, for rural water and sewer system loans in Texas. He emphasized the need for rural residents desiring water and sewer system loans to move quickly. The State Office of Farmers Home Administration must have completed loan applications for review and approval before June 15, 1971. Mr. Futch also said that more money would be available for the new fiscal year of 1972 than was available in this present fiscal year of 1971.

Jerry Johnson of Nacogdoches, President of the Texas Association of Rural Water Corporations, urged existing systems to take advantage of the current supply of loan money. "Many systems that have been operating for several years now need additional loan money to provide new consumer service and now is the time to take advantage of the \$12.6 million allocation for our state," commented Johnson.

Rural residents desiring additional information concerning the loan funds should contact their county Farmers Home Administration supervisor or the Texas Association of Rural Water Corporations in Austin.

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
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

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Tax Contributions And The New Law

The rules on how much you can deduct on your contributions to a charitable organization have been revised under the 1969 Tax Reform Act. Some exempt organizations that depend on charitable donations report that they are not getting as many contributions since the change in the tax law. They apparently feel that most of the difference in the amount of the contributions is due to a misunderstanding about the taxability of contributions and that some taxpayers feel that they will have to pay income taxes on the appreciated value of a gift that would have been subject to a capital gain if sold. There is no tax due on a gift under the new law, but the amount of the deduction has been reduced in some cases. However, if you have valuable property that you would like to donate to an exempt organization (church, museum, educational institution or other charitable organization approved by IRS) you can still get a substantial benefit on your income tax through the donation.

This week I ran across the May 30, 1930 issue of THE LYNX, a monthly publication by the students in Spearman High School. This particular issue covered all the news concerning the 1930 graduating class and since this is the "grad" season I thought

it might be fun to go back 40 years and see how it was done then!

Mathilde Reimer was valedictorian of the class of 1930 with a grade average of 95.75. She is now Mrs. Entreklin and is currently one of the first grade teachers in Spearman Elementary schools.

Salutatorian of the class was Thelma Maize, with a 91.75 average. Thelma is now Mrs. Blevins, and is at present the anesthetist at Hansford Hospital.

Other class members were Amrine Easley, Donald Bennett, Agnes Wilmet, Raymond Kirk, Emma Reaves, Marga Chamness, Ross Oldham, Lucille Buchanan, Mary McMurry, Willie Helen Lamb, John Walker, W.R. Greever, Greta Wilbanks, Grace Mitts, Floness Myers, Martin Sheets, Floness Mae Cecil, Waneeta Tackitt, Chloe Gill, Susie James, Obera Darnell, Juanita Wilmet and Bill Burran.

The class had to pay for their own graduation and expenses were met by staging plays in the Lyric Theatre throughout the year. Caps & gowns were worn for the first time at graduation that year, and the costumes were so becoming it was hoped the tra-

dition would be carried on for classes to follow.

Baccalaureate services were at 11 a.m. May 25, 1930. Rev. J.H. Nichols gave the invocation, Elma Gunn sang a bass solo and the Rev. H.A. Nichols preached the sermon. E.L. Schneider, Fred Hoskins, P.A. Lyon and Walter Beck made up the quartet which sang "My Task."

Miss Ethel Deakin was the class sponsor, Billy Jarvis was the basketball coach and the 1930 team won the district championship. Team members included Harrell Colliard, Cloyd Windom, Orville Rippey, Walter Broadhurst, W.R. Greever, Carl Owens, Noel Womble, Ikey Vernon, John Walker, R.B. Archer, Claude Owens, and Earl Riley. Earl was the captain. Mr. J.E. Gunn assisted Jarvis in coaching duties.

The track team went to Austin for the state meet that year. Cloyd Windom tied for 3rd place in high jump. He and 3 boys were presented letters in track: John Walker, Ikey Vernon and W.R. Greever.

The seniors of 1930 met the long-felt need for a drinking fountain on the school campus. The fountain was

placed near the tennis courts where it answered a double purpose by furnishing water to sprinkle the dirt courts as well as to satisfy the thirst of the players.

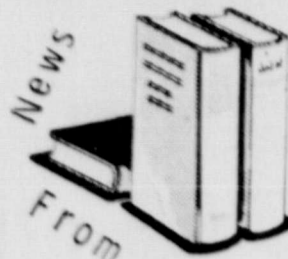
Miss Troas Ellioe, the music teacher evidently, furnished all the music, both piano and vocal, for all school functions. She, according to Mr. J.E. Gunn, is the person who REALLY did write the school song... which is what SHS students still sing.

In 1930 the Future Farmers Club was made up of members Pat Bennett, Robert Newcomb, Garland Thome, Eddie McCauley, Homer Beck, Gilbert Donovan, Milton Neilson, Freeman Barkley, Henry Davis, Amrine Easley, Buster Kirk, Roy Wilmet, Albert Thorne, Elbert Kesler and Fendorf Schubert. This club was responsible for a number of school ground improvements: constructing the tennis backstops, playground swings and football machines for the Lynx squad.

That was the year citizenry of Spearman Independent School district voted one hundred thousand dollars in bonds to build a new high school.

A.H. Word was principal, R.L. Snider was superintendent.

Ads appearing in this particular issue of the Lynx school paper featured "ice cream & cold drinks plus curb service" at Hoss Berner's. The town's physician, Dr. Cowser, had offices in the Reporter building, and Smith Variety Store's advertisement directed to the students said: "start your vacation right by buying a long cane fishing pole."

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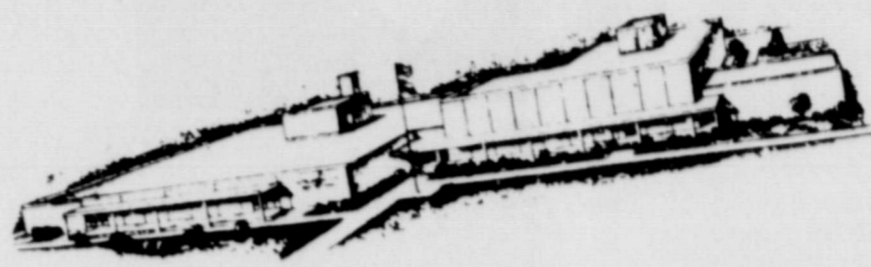

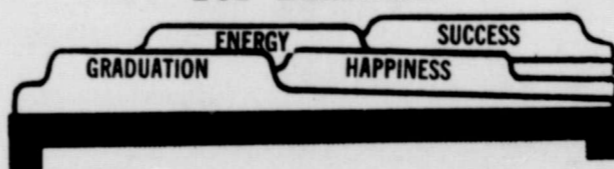

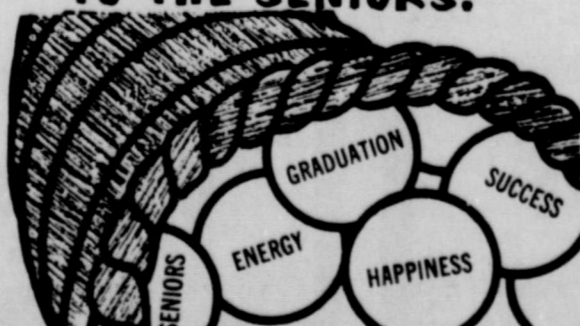
