City's Tax Share Told

The City of Spearman's share of revenue collected during the first quarter of 1971 has just been received and totaled \$1,890.66.

This is compared to the amount received for the same quarter last year which was \$1,006.18.

The first quarter tax revenue is usually the smallest, but city dads were surprised at the 1971 check was off so much from last year's quarter.

About the only logical way to figure this reduction in sales tax revenue is to say people just aren't buying, or the other hand, since last year there has been an invasion of more taxable items which to pay tax.

One prominent business moved last August out of Spearman's city limits and no longer has to collect city sales tax. This

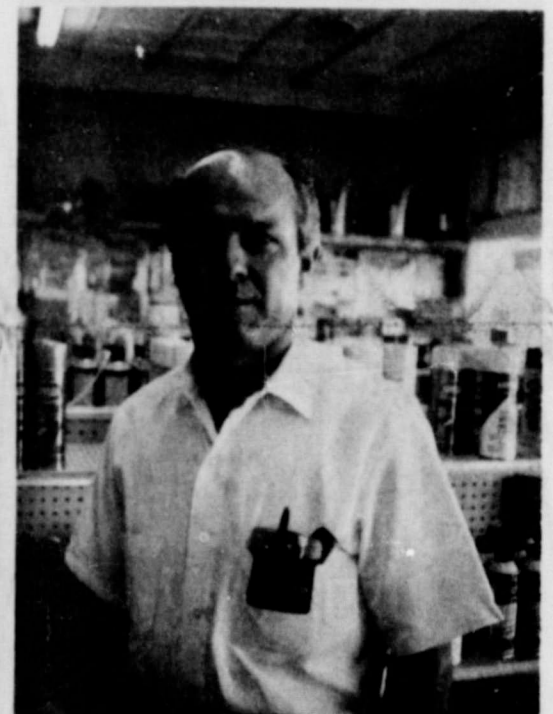
would definitely make a difference in the first-quarter revenue the city has just received, which was some two-thousand dollars lower than last year's.

On the other hand, Excel Chevrolet-Olds Company has been annexed into the city limits and has been paying sales tax, which this firm did not do last year.

Total city sales tax collected in 1970 was \$57,555.21. Projected revenue this year has been estimated at \$54,000.00 by city officials.

The amount of revenue collected during the year is estimated in the city's annual budget and is applied to all of the expenditures from the general fund.

Spearman's share of the revenue is part of a total of \$35.5 million collected by the state during the first quarter.

Three local teenagers were injured in a one-car accident which occurred about 2 a. m. Sunday 12 miles east of Spearman on highway 759.

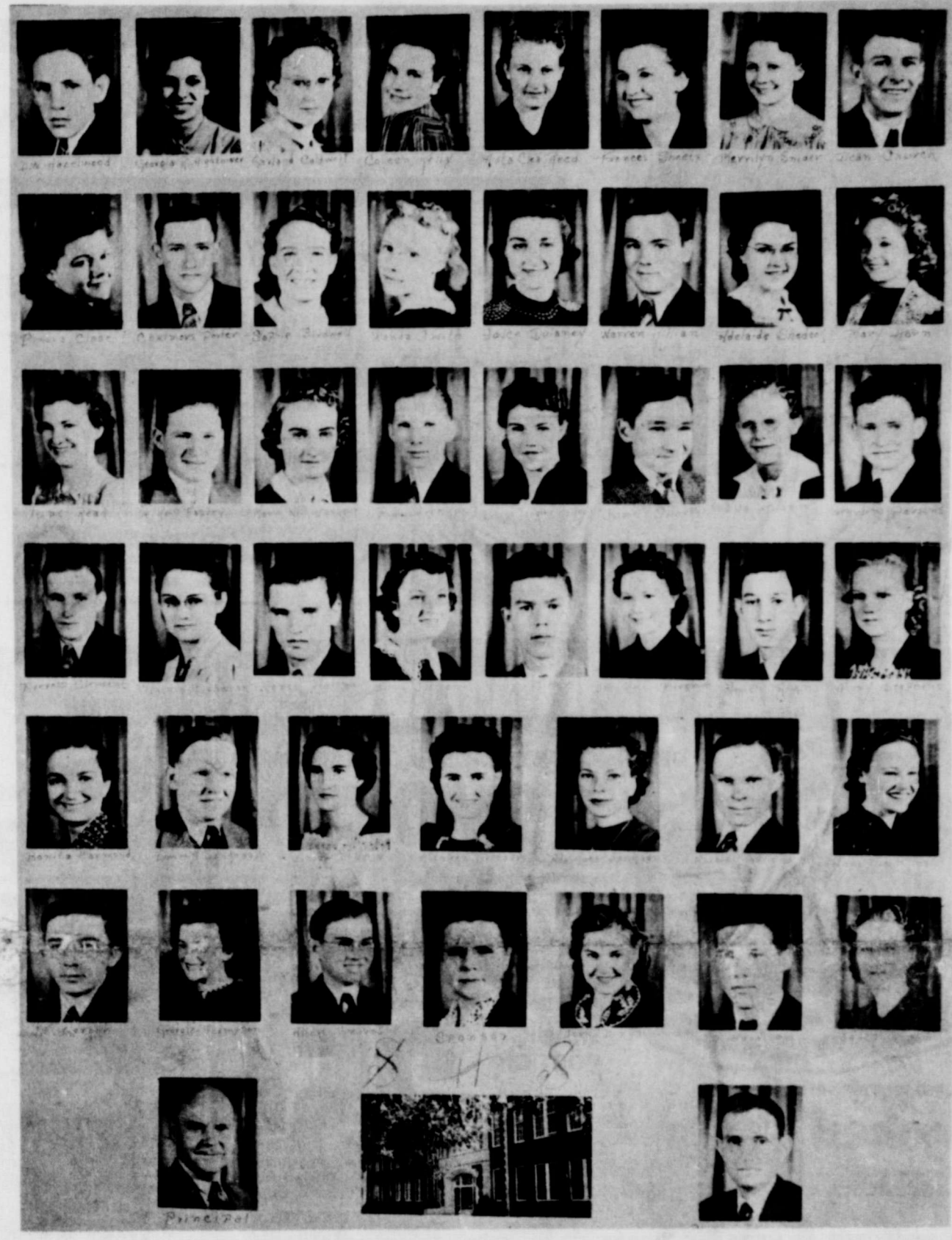
According to investigating

Cattle Killed In Wreck

A semi-trailer truck loaded with 40 head of fat cattle, collided with a pickup early Monday morning in the northern part of Hansford County.

Drivers of the vehicles were not injured, but damage to the trucks was quite extensive, according to Sheriff's Deputy Tom Messer.

The accident occurred 30 miles north on FM 1261, near the Panhandle Eastern Gas Plant.

The trailer truck hit the pickup, careened off the road and into a creek. Sixteen of the 40 cattle were killed. The truck driver said he was hauling the cattle to Emporia, Kansas.

Shattuck Hospital To Be Developed Into Regional Med Center

The Newman Memorial Hospital was this week named by the Oklahoma State Department of Health as a facility around which to develop a regional medical center.

Elwood Riley, administrator of the local hospital, was notified of the action of the State Department of Health in a letter from W. Howard Miles, chief, health facilities services, of the state department.

His letter informing Mr. Riley of the decision to recognize the local medical institution with this designation said: "It is with pleasure that we notify you of the action taken by the State Hospital Planning Advisory Council in naming Newman Memorial hospital as a facility around which to develop a regional medical center. The scope of services presently rendered and the progressive attitudes and actions of your Medical Staff, Board of Trustees, and hospital staff have indicated your hospital as the logical place from which to plan health services for Ellis, Harper, Texas, Beaver and Cimarron counties. It is hoped that inter-state coordination and co-operation can be developed which will permit Shattuck to serve contiguous counties in Kansas and Texas, and perhaps also Colorado and New Mexico."

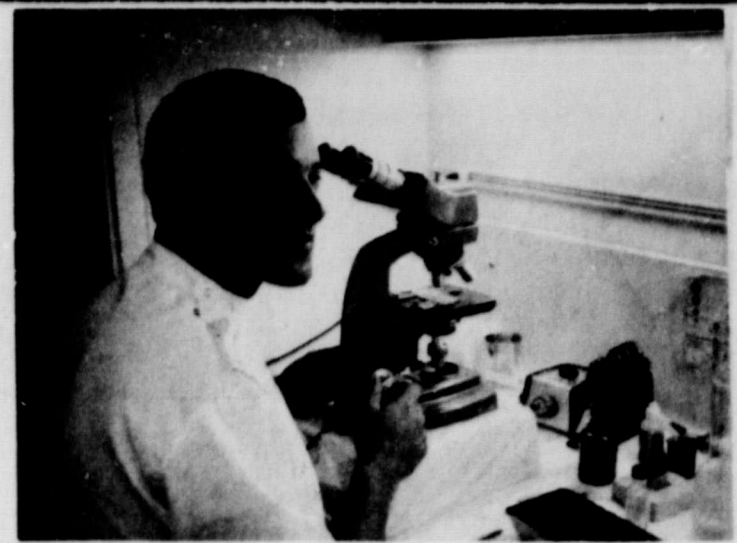
Mr. Riley stated: "This hospital is highly honored at being selected to develop as a regional medical center. Its purpose in being a regional medical center will be to deliver the best possible medical care to patients seeking its services and to assist area hospitals, if possible, when assistance is needed and requested, as the area hospitals strive to deliver better medical care to their patients."

The Newman Memorial Hospital has announced the completion and opening of a five bed Intensive Care Unit to complement the facilities available to patients seeking the services of the hospital. The Intensive Care Unit is a new service for the care of the critically ill patient. Here, too, stroke and coronary patients receive constant intensified care by a specially

trained staff of nurses and doctors. The project cost was \$113,530.00 and was financed by hospital funds and a grant from the federal Hill Burton hospital construction agency. Shorly's Electric Company of Guymon, Oklahoma was the contractor and the construction superintendent was Kenneth Wilson of Shattuck.

M.H. Newman, M.D., Chief of Staff of the hospital, announced the appointment of W.H. Dersch, Jr., M.D. to serve as the Director of the Intensive Care Unit and L.A. Myers, M.D. to serve as Assistant Director.

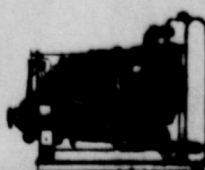

NEWS FROM YOUR Home Demonstration Agent

By Nellie Albrecht

Recently I had the opportunity to hear Irvie Berry, Extension Housing and Home Furnishing specialist tell of her trip to High Point, North Carolina in April to the furniture market. Though it would be interesting to tell you the trends in new furniture that we are seeing and will be seeing more of in the future.

There is an increased use of prints and plastics. This is for upholstery as well as case goods. Many case goods are veneered with plastic printed to look like wood. Watch for this if you are buying case goods but do not want plastic as it is hard to recognize in some instances. Many pieces of furniture are designed to solve contemporary problems such as multiple piece units, stack storage units and smaller scale pieces. More accent pieces are being seen which are often multiple use pieces as well. An example are storage cubes which often are painted bright colors. More painted furniture is also one of the trends we will be seeing in all types of case goods and upholstered furniture. See through and shiny pieces are also quite numerous. For small areas see through furniture is helpful as a room will not appear as crowded. Many of the shiny looks are enameled black

and colors as well as the look of chrome. The shape of furniture is also changing to be more curved and less traditional. This is in keeping with the more informal way of today's living. And finally there are more and more molded plastic components. Many case goods which have elaborate carved front pieces often seen in Mediterranean and Spanish styles are molded plastic. Again often this is hard to identify as plastic but you must take it in consideration especially if you expect to refinish a piece of furniture in the future sometime.

It was also interesting to learn what styles of furniture are selling best. So here's the run down for case goods: Spanish and Mediterranean-32%; Colonial and Early American-20%; Italian Provincial-8%; Contemporary-8%; followed by French Provincial, Traditional and Modern. Figures for upholstered

furniture show traditional leading with 62% of sales; Early American 16%; Contemporary 12%; followed by Spanish, Mediterranean and French Provincial.

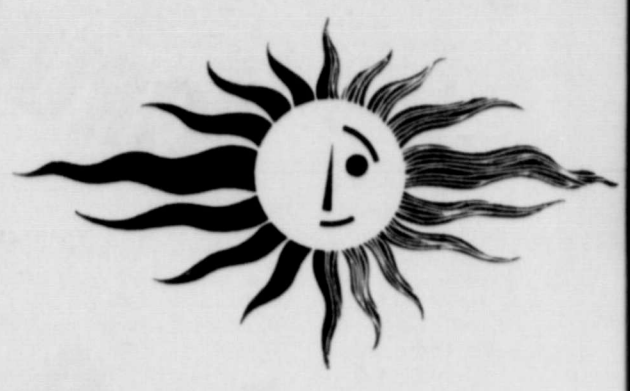

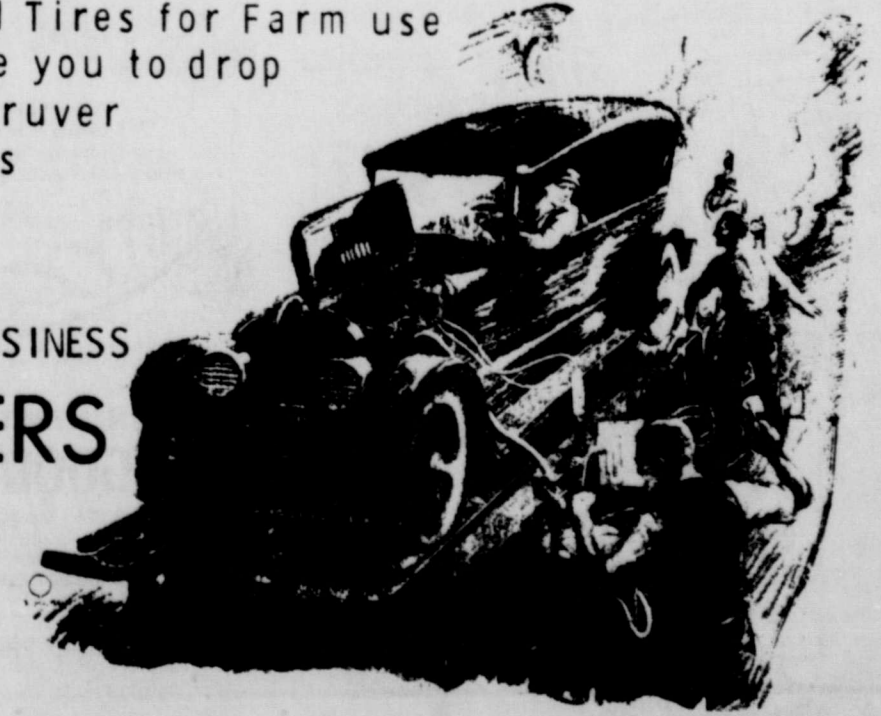

Don Piatt Speaks To Rotary Club

The Monday noon meeting of the Spearman Rotary Club was presided over by the new president, Don Hergert.

Program chairman Chunky Blackburn presented his final program in his tenure of that office.

The speaker for the occasion was Don Piatt, field representative of the North Plains Water Conservation District.

Don noted that the water level in this area has dropped more in the past year than in the previous year. He did say however that the report was subject to debate due to the fact that some of the wells he had measured were pumped to within ten days of his measurement.

He stated that a well may require thirty, sixty or even ninety days before it re-levels itself after pumping operations.

The speaker left little doubt as to the fact that water is becoming scarcer year by year and it will be a matter of just a few years before the importation of water becomes a must for the area.

He mentioned specific cases where the water supply had already become exhausted.

The Rotarians asked numerous questions at the end of his talk and Don took pains to answer each question in detail.

Don Hergert, at the end of the session, announced there would be no meeting on Monday July 5th due to the observance of July 4th.

48 Texans Will Die July 4th

AUSTIN--Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today estimated that traffic accidents over the long July 4th holiday weekend will claim 48 lives in the Lone Star State.

In addition, Speir said it appears that between 6 p.m. Friday, July 2 and mid-night Monday, July 5--the official holiday weekend--these same collisions could result in hundreds, perhaps a thousand or more injuries, and a monetary loss running into the millions of dollars.

The DPS director, in a special appeal, said, "We urge Texans to reduce the toll by obeying the laws of safety, driving defensively, avoiding fatigue while driving, and, above all, by not drinking while driving. The ultimate solution to lessening the toll

obviously lies in the hands of each driver.

Speir said as many DPS patrolmen would be on duty as possible, including some from uniformed services other than the Highway Patrol. He noted that many local law enforcement agencies will place similar special emphasis during the holiday period.

The Department of Public Safety will also conduct its "Operation Motorcade" program during the holiday which, in cooperation with local police agencies and the news media of Texas, attempts to focus public attention on accident hazards through the rapid compilation and release of information on fatal traffic mishaps during the period.

"We are hopeful," Speir said, "that all street and highway users will make the slogan 'Drive Friendly' a reality during the July 4th weekend."

PATRICIA SCHNELL TELLS IMPRESSION OF GIRLS STATE

The 1971 Session of Bluebonnet Girls' State was a truly great experience; one never to be forgotten. It seems almost miraculous that something so wonderful could come from collecting 486 girls from all parts of the state and throwing them together in less than ideal circumstances for 10 days. Each day began at about 6:45 a.m. with the raising of the flag, singing and a few "exercises". After breakfast there were lectures on city, county, and state government in the gym. There was usually another such lecture in the afternoon.

At 6:45 p.m. we had a flag lowering ceremony. Free entry, guest speakers came and talked about government, leadership etc. One of the highlights of the session was the visit of U.S. Senator John Tower. We had a question and answer period and he provided candid answers to all our questions.

The legislative meetings were a favorite with nearly everyone. The debates were interesting and sometimes a little heated.

Some of the bills which passed both the House and the Senate are: One by representative Baggerly to set up recycling machinery in all industries contributing to pollution, one to provide for a system of reservoirs to provide water for farmers & cattle ranchers in time of serious drought; one requiring blood types on Drivers' Licenses; one requiring all schools to allow pregnant girls, married or single, to attend school if they have their doctor's permission; one to revise the penal code of the state; one to legalize therapeutic abortion, one to make smoking marijuana a misdemeanor on the first offense.

The county officials were sworn in by former governor Price Danfels in the House of Representatives and the State officials were inaugurated in the Rotunda. This ceremony was very impressive with most of the actual state officials being present.

It is hard to relate the feeling of pride, patriotism, and love that was present during

the entire session. With like this year's girls state citizens as the leaders of the State of Texas is secure. The American Legion should be very proud of the part they have in shaping this future thru their sponsorship of the girls' and boys' state programs.
