# Out -Of- State Cowboys Arriving

The news of Tex Martin's Rodeo School, beginning its second session here this week, is beginning to have far-reaching effects.

Cowboys checking in this week at the Spearman headquarters come from Australia, California, Arizona and Nebraska. Most of the boys said they read about the school in the Rodeo Cowboys of America sports newspaper.

Tom Hansen, 23-year old son of a fruit farmer at Hollister, California said he came to the Spearman Rodeo School to improve his riding skill. Hansen began to perform in Junior rodeos when he was 13, went on to amateur riding and finally obtained a "permit" to carry an RCA card. He cannot own his RCA card until he has earned \$1,000. He said he would like to become a professional, and he felt the best teacher he knew of was "Tex Martin", inetructor for the roed cheol

in Spearman. Hansen said he checked on Roedo schools everywhere and would like to have attended one a little closer to home, but all his informants advised him that the Spearman school, with nationally famous Tex Martin as instructor, was the best on the circuit at

Like the other would-be cowboys, Barry Martin of Tuscon, Ariz. read about the school in the RCA sports news. Martin (no relation to all the other Martins connected with the training school) said he had rode in various rodeos for the past three years. "But, I'm tired of just donating all my money to the cause -- and I'd like to improve enough to be

able to earn some for a change.

Barry says he has no plans to become a professional rider--he just simply en-

joys doing it.

The Martin Rodeo School is drawing other cowboys. Two more flew in from Scotts Bluff, Neb. Tuesday of this week, many of the local riders have enrolled to improve their riding techniques, or to iron out some of the wrinkles by practicing on the weaker points.

The school is open to everyone, whether you are a beginner anxious to learn the ropes from the very beginning, or an old pro eager

to improve your ride.
The Martin Rodeo School, offers 14-day sessions, with daily riding sessions staged p.m. at the Spearman Rodeo Arena. Each cowboy gets a chance to ride proven bucking stock to practice whatever he desires -- bare back brones, saddle brones or bulls.

James and Charles Martin furnish the stock, some 31 head of horses and as many bulls. This includes all types of stock from range Hereford bulls and gentle saddle horses to National Finals Rodeo stock. Some of the animals are plenty

Instructor Tex Martin, 7-times National finalist, says he is very pleased over the way the school is progressing and expects that the enrollment will pick up week-

ly, as the news travels. Every Sunday evening at 7 p.m. a Jack-pot riding event is staged in the arena. Cowboys from all over the Panhandle have been driving over for this. Last Sunday evening, Rusty Tooley from Boise City, Okla. took home the top money. This event is open to every rider who wishes to enter.



# Rodeo School Draws Cowboy From Sydney, Australia



# "would-be cowboy"

Sports News and read of the Martin Rodeo School being

too much for this young "city slicker" from down under, so he pooled all his the long trek to Texas.

He checked in Saturday at the Spearman Hotel and immediately registered with Tex Martin, instructor for the Martin Rodeo School in progress here.

The amiable young Australian had watched Tex Martin perform in Rodeos in that country back in 1967 and was so impressed by the Texas cowboy that he has kept up with him ever since. The desire to come to the

U.S. A. and to Texas in part icular, has been a life-long thing with Peter Hennessy. "Although I was born and reared in the city of Sydney. I have always longed to be a cowboy, " he said. "Not the kind of 'bushman' cowboys we have in Australia. but the kind I would see and read about from Texas, ' he continued.

"I read all the time about the unhappy young people in this country," Peter said. but if all the youths who burn their draft cards and the American Flag would bother to make a visit to Central America and see the living conditions there, they would all come back home

Peter said he was born with a cowboy hat on, but the other type of western wear affordable in Australia is not to his liking. He often orders western clothes from America because "its better made, it is cheaper and it just looks better" the would-be cowboy said. "Jeans there cost me \$9.00" The first thing Peter did when he got off the bus in Spearman Saturday, was to buy him

a pair of cowboy boots. Peter, the youngest child in a family of 5, said his father had been dead for many years. His mother. Margureta Mary Hennessy. aged 64. is moving from Sydney soon to live with a son who owns a trailer court.

Peter quit school when he was nearly 15 years old after finishing 8th grade ... which would be the 10th grade here. His only reason was, just didn't like school."

He went to work in a car repair shop, and has held down various jobs since. His love for cattle and horses kept him close to Rodeo clubs and often times he would rake up enough courage to ride a steer now and then. "But I'm not a cowboy, I just dress like one" the polite Aussey remarked.

He picked up a few books on Saddle Making some years ago. After reading the books. he tore up an old saddle, drew off patterns from it and 'went into the business." My business didn't pan out so well though and I got discouraged and quit.

Things weren't going so well for Peter after his business flopped, until one day he ran across a copy of a book written by Dale Carnegie. Peter said he read the book "Stop Worrying and Start Living" and it inspired him to such an extent that he claims it changed his outlook and eventually his whole life. Peter says he is a walking "Dale Carnegie success story

After reading the book, he re-opened his leather shop with great enthusiasm to "make good." His selftaught business became a success. He sold on an average of 400 hand-made belts per month and from one-to -two saddles a month. Peter's renewed courage enabled him to "quit doing the things I knew were not good for me, like drinking beer and

come to America he had to have a "sponsor." It wasn't hard for this good-natured witty young man to find one. His sponsor is Mr. Bob Schild owner of the B-Bar-B Leather Shop in Blackfoot, Idaho. Mr. Schild agreed to sponsor Peter for his two-year stay in America and to teach him the art of Saddlery. "Maybe I can rodeo some on the side" Hennessy said.

After his two-weeks rodeo schooling in Spearman, Pete will go immediately to

Blackfoot, Idaho. Peter is through wasting time in his life and although professional rodeo performer he said "If Tex Martin advises me to go on with Rodeo, I will, but if he says I am not good enough, I'll stick to my leather trade.

Later, Peter would love to become an American citizen but he thinks the tests might

be a little hard for him. He is very impressed with Texans -- "They are the best people I've ever met. They should build a great

big mote around Texas, and float it way out into the Gulf, over close to Australia -- my chances for staying here might then be improved the likable young man concluded.

Not often do you meet a person as friendly, polite and ambitious as this young Australian seems to be. It is great to have hime for a guest in Spearman for the next two weeks.

He and his other out-oftown rodeo pals are making the Spearman Hotel their home while here. Go by and meet them. They are all delightful young men.

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

# County Agents Join VEE Fight

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has assumed a vital cooperative role alongside other agencies in the intensifying battle against Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelities (VEE)

At the request of the USDA and the Texas Animal Health Commission, Extension personnel are helping to perform two major tasks, according to B.F. Yeates, Extension horse specialist. They are making a daily dead horse count and a daily sick horse count, reporting to officials at different locations. Their second job is to organize a county plan to assure that all horses are vaccinated as quickly and efficiently as possible.

Since the on-premise quarantine has been removed, this means that in many instances county agents will have to help to set up vaccination clinics and help arrange for horseowners to bring their animals in so that the veterinarians can quickly complete vaccinations in their counties.

This involves having owners available to sign a release when the horses are vaccinated and identifying owners of horses left unattended in the county. Yeates pointed out that these absentee owners can cause delays in the vaccination of

a large number of horses. County Extension personnel have been developing organizations in olving yeterinari ans, public health officials, and others through groups which were already functioning. 

# "Living Alone" On Rise In Co.

taken place in Hansford County in recent years in the number of single people who are living alone and main-

taining their own households. These men and women-some young and some old -who would have been living with relatives or others in former years, are now able to swing it financially, by themselves. And, it appears they are getting great satis-faction out of their ability to do so.

In Hansford County, according to a study of data compiled in connection with the recent Census of Housing, no less than 15.4 percent of all dwelling units are now occupied by singles.

Throughout the United States as a whole, the percentage is 17.6. It is 16.7 percent in the West South Central States and 16.3 percent in the State of Texas.

Included in the "singles category are people who have never married as well as divorced and widowed persons who have not remarried.

The extent of the change in the local area is to be seen by looking at comparable figures gathered 10 years ago. At that time only 7.2 percent of the units were

occupied by singles. In most other parts of the country, similarly, there have been big increases in the number of one-person households.

As a result of this develop-ment, the average household is smaller than before. It declined from a median of 3.0 persons per unit to to

In Hansford County, the latest figures show, the number of one-person households is now 308, as compared with the 1960 total of 132. Analysts offer a variety

of explanations for these changes. They point to the rise in job opportunities for women, which has made them more self-sufficient economi-

Many more women are in the unattached state because of the rise in the number of widows and divorcees in the last decade. However, a bigger proportion of them have become self-supporting because of job availability, social security, pensions and other resources.

The living alone trend is growing rapidly, also, among young unmarried people, especially in the larger cities. More than a million of them now have their own places.



# Mail Costs To Hit \$91,160

duals and business firms in Spearman being affected by recent increase in postal rates How much will it add to their costs in the present fiscal

It is estimated, on the basis of the latest figures on postal receipts in the local area, released by the government, that they will have to pony up an additional \$15,820 a year. That is approximately 21 per cent more than in the past fiscal

year.
The increase went into effect on May 16th, despite court proceedings brought by newspaper and magazine publishers and others whose costs will be considerably higher as a result.

Under the rate rises announced by the new Postal Service its revenues will go up by \$1.45 billion in the current fiscal year.

The rate increases are the first to be put into effect since Congress voted to change the money-losing Post Office Department into an independent corporation, free of its

A major part of the \$1.45 billion, it is expected, will have to go for increased wages to the 750,000 postal workers in the service.

As far as the average Spearman resident is concerned, the principal effect of the rate changes is that now he has to put 8-cent stamps on letters instead of f cents, 11 cents on air mail letters rather than 10 cents and 6 cents on postcards, instead of 5 cents.

If he mails just one letter a day throughout the year his postal costs will be \$7,30 more than they were in 1970.

Also hit by the higher rates are local businesses that use other classes of mail service. For second class, which applies chiefly to magazines

and news apers, the present rise amounts to 20 percent. The bulk rate in third class and the rate for books and records, which come under fourth class, have also been advanced.

In Spearman, the cost of stamps and other postal services has been 875, 340 a year, according to the latest annual



The speaker noted that the Feed Yard presently employs forty two employees. On the subject of taxes he reported the school tax is

about five cents per head per month and County tax is 30 per head monthly. He further stated that school taxes were paid at the rate of approximate ly \$5,000.00 yearly.

Archer asserted that the lot purchases everything possible within the county.

He mentioned a number of

packing houses that are currently buying feef from the lot. These buyers included Missouti and Iowa beef, Swift High Plains and Wilson.

Carl went into some detail as to the reception and care of Cattle after arrival. He noted that new animals were constantly watched for the first thirty days on the lot.

Dr. Garnett who is D. V. M. for the lot asserted that all new arrivals were wormed and put through a dipping vat. He also stated that a nutritionist makes a constant check on all feeds in order to insure a properly balanced diet.

Archer passed out a number of copies of "Beef Extra" a publication of Farm Journal Inc. The issue contained a very interesting story about the formation and operation of the Feed lot.

During the question and answer session, the speaker explained that it was possible for a group of men to pool feed a pen or several pens of cattle.

He explained that the stockholders grow most of the grain and have adequate storage capacity due to the fact that both Fresident Archer and Vice President Jack Hart both

are elevator owners. Silage, he stated is a little harder to get in the area inasmuch 50,000 ton quantities

are needed at a time. In reply to a request from Mayor Hackley for a one cent per head city tax, Archer replied he would gladly com-ply provided the city would take over all the pollution problems of the lot.

TECH STUDENTS MUST HAVE DIPHTHERIA SHOT

Texas Tech University officials announced Friday (July 23) that new legislation requiring specific immunizations for students will mean a change in polic at the University.
Students enrolling for the

fall semester will be allowed to enter with the provision that immunizations are begun before Jan. 1, 1972, and all are completed as soon after that date as medically Effective with the spring

1972 semester, and continuing thereafter, new enrollees (those not previously enrolled in the summer or fall 1971 semesters) who have not completed the required immunizations at time of enrollment, must complete them as soon as is medically feasible.

Students in institutions of higher education must have had a minimum of three injections of diptheria and tetanus with the last dose within 10 years and one small pox vaccination withing the past 10 years. At least three doses of oral polio vaccine are required for students who have not reached their nineteenth birthday.

Recommended implementation procedures and an outline of current regulations were recently provided to the State's colleges and universities by the Texas State Department of Health and the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.


