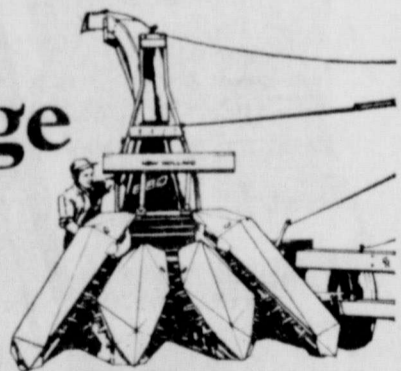

Almost daily we read where experts have come up with new ideas of making something useful out of discarded junk, waste materials, etc. Now they reclaim discarded bottles, grind them up, melt the glass down, make more bottles. The same is true with tin and aluminum containers. Not long ago where shredded newspapers were used for insulation, they were now carrying a story about a California cattle man who thought up this splendid idea of what to do with those tons of manure in feed lot. He says his

20,000 steers provide some 80 tons of waste daily. California cattle feeders must not furnish much food for their cattle, for in Texas we are told that 10,000 cattle in a feedlot can produce some 260 tons of solid waste daily. But, you know Texas! Bigger, better, probably even more malodorous!

Anyway, this California man had a problem of what to do with all this stuff. It was costing him \$40 a day to haul it off. So he took his dung problem to USCA engineers and their collaboration has resulted in a new product. Optimists say this "end" product could revolutionize the construction industry and strike a blow for cleaner environment. By mixing treated dung with recycled glass and then heating it, the stuff turns into bricks. The ceramic-like product won't burn, can be painted, drilled and sawed. It's suitable for roofing, structural blocks, water pipes, acoustical tiles and walls. (They swear it is completely odorless.) The feedlot operator is planning a \$750,000 factory on his property which can turn out bricks for 5 cents each. Comparable bricks now sell for 17 cents each on the open market.

Who knows, we might turn all this waste accumulation from Hansford county cattle into the sweet smell of success.

Home Demonstration Agent

It was a delightful week in the mountains of New Mexico for the 52 people who attended county 4-H camp last week. There was rain but not for long. Just made it cooler so the fireplaces were more popular. Everyone really enjoyed the crafts taught by Claudine Clark. Ask some of the 4-Hers who went to show you their "rocks" and candles they made. All are quite lovely and will recall many memories in the future.

One of the favorite summer foods for many people are watermelons. Some prefer the very popular red meat melon while others would rather have yellow melons. Regardless of meat color watermelon is low in calories. (this a treat for dieters a good source of potassium and phosphorus, some B vitamins vitamin C and vitamin A.

If you are tired of serving watermelon slices or wedges try balls or cubes for variety. Or make a salad of watermelon, cantaloupe, and honey dew melon balls. You might even add a few blueberries and peaches for a different taste.

One of my favorite water-

melon treats that I recall from childhood is watermelon rind pickles. Here is a recipe if you wish to make some.

4 Quarts prepared watermelon rind (trim dark skin and pink flesh from thick rind and cut into 1" pieces or as desired).

1 cup salt or lime, 2 quarts cold water, 2 Table spoons whole cloves, 3 sticks cinnamon 2 pieces gingerroot, 1 lemon, 8 cups sugar, 1 quart white vinegar, 1 quart water.

Dissolve lime or salt in 2 quarts cold water; Pour over rind. Add more water, if needed to cover rind. Let stand 2 hours if lime is used or 6 hours if salt is used. Drain, rinse and cover rind with cold water. Cook until tender; drain. The spices in a thin cloth bag, add other ingredients and simmer 10 minutes. Add watermelon rind and simmer until clear. Add boiling water if syrup becomes too thick before rind is clear. Remove spice bag. Pack boiling 'soiling into hot jars, leaving 1" head space; close. Process in boiling water bath 5 minutes. Start to count processing time when water returns to boil. Makes 6 pints.

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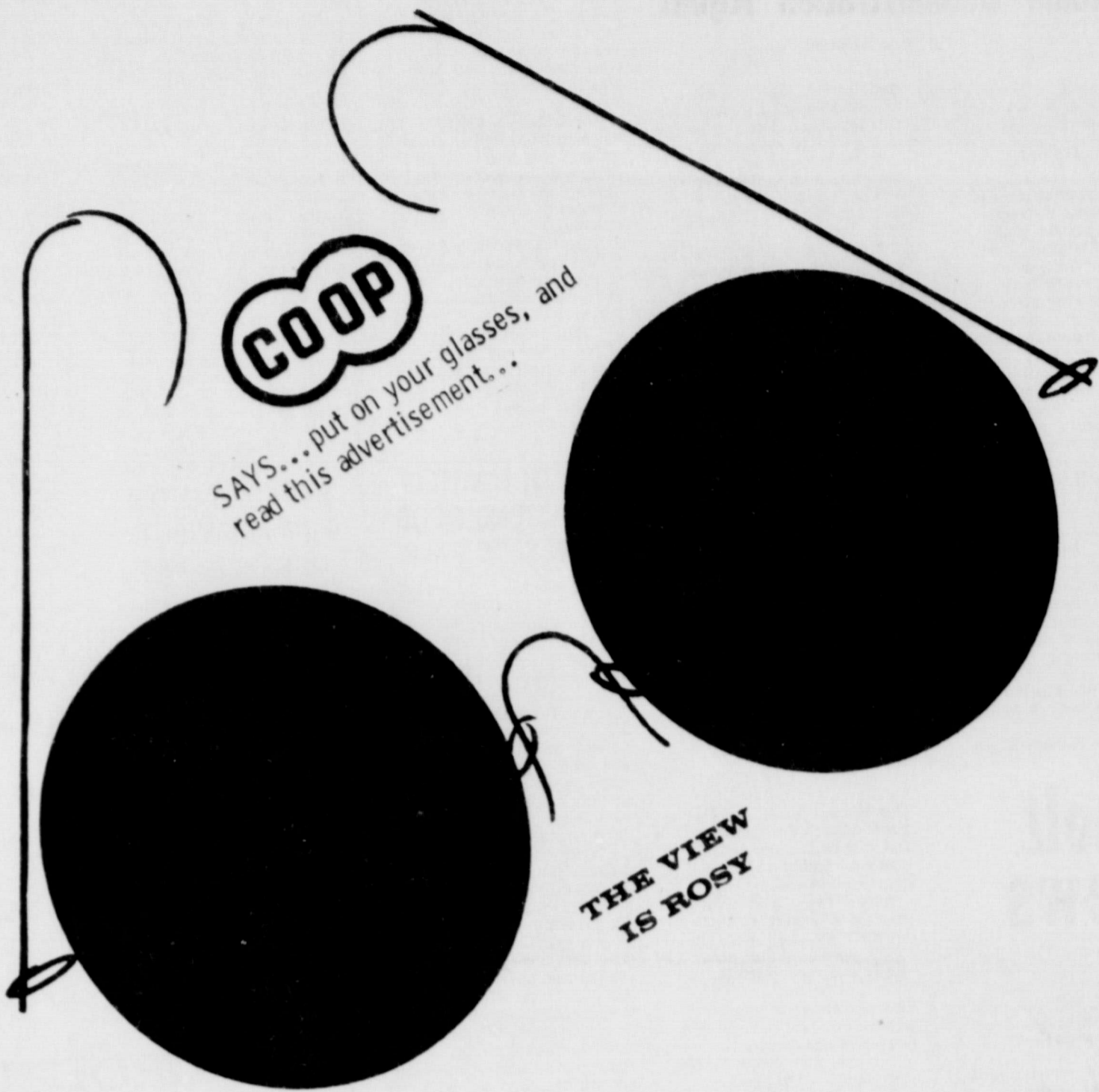

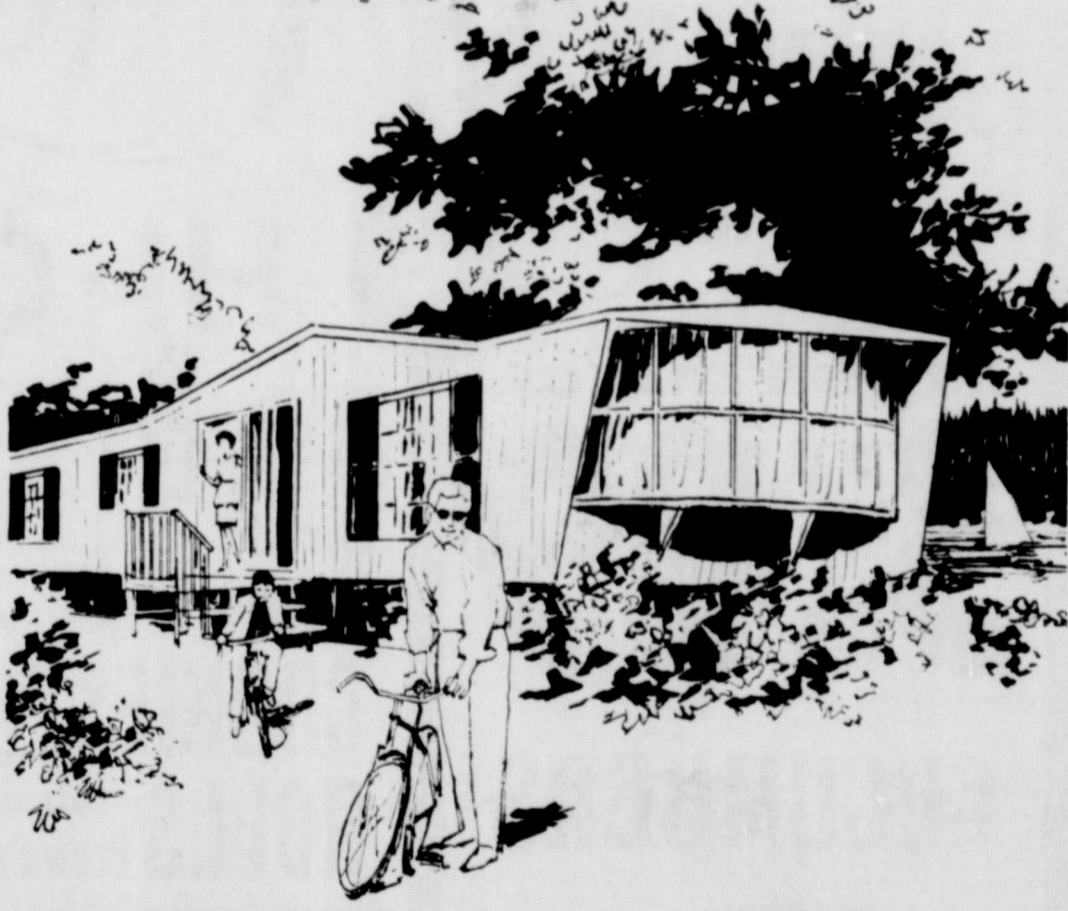

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
