Fruits, juices jazz up BBQ meat favorites

Fruit and fruit juices add delightful flavor accent to many barbecued meats, especially pork and ham. An alternate to fruit can be jams and preserves. Jellies can substitute for fruit juices. These can lend the sweet-sour flavor which pork and its smoked products take so kindly to.

Pineapple supplies the sweet-sour flavor for tangy ham grill. Jams and preserves flavor barbecued ribs, Oriental style and orange juice is an ingredient in barbecued pork steaks.

BARBECUED RIBS, ORIENTAL STYLE
4 pounds pork spareribs
1 1/2 cups jam or jelly sauce (recipes follow)

For easy handling during cooking, leave the ribs in one piece but have them partially cut through and cracked by the butcher for separation into single or 2-rib sections after cooking.

Brush ribs with selected jam or jelly sauce; place in a plastic bag and refrigerate several hours or overnight, turning occasionally. When ready to cook, brush sauce from ribs into saucpan and reserve.

Place ribs on a rack in a foil-

lined roasting pan and bake in a moderate oven (325 degrees) for 1 1/2 to 2 hours or until tender and meat is no longer pink, turning once. Or place ribs on a grill 6 or 7 inches from coals for 1 to 1 1/2 hours, turning frequently. During the last 30 minutes of cooking, brush ribs with reserved sauce. Makes four to six servings.

Sweet and Pungent Grape Sauce: In saucpan, combine 1 cup grape jelly, 1/4 cup tomato sauce; stir until blended. Add 1 teaspoon minced onion, 1/4 teaspoon allspice and a dash of garlic powder. Cook over low heat, stirring until jelly melts and begins to bubble. Makes about 1 1/2 cups.

Spicy Peach Sauce: In saucpan, combine 1 cup peach jam or preserves, 2 tablespoons corn syrup, 1/4 cup vinegar and 1/4 cup water; stir until blended. Add 1/8 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg and 1/4 teaspoon cloves. Cook over low heat, stirring until jam melts and sauce begins to bubble. Makes about 1 1/2 cups.

Ginger-Orange Sauce: In saucpan, combine 1 cup orange marmalade, 2 teaspoons prepared mustard, 1/4 cup lemon juice, 2 tablespoons soy sauce and 1/4 cup water or chicken stock; stir until blended. Add 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger and a dash of garlic powder. Cook over low heat, stirring until marmalade

melts and sauce begins to bubble. Makes about 1 1/2 cups.

TANGY HAM GRILL
2-pound ham slice
2 inches thick
1 can (1 pound, 4 oz.) sliced pineapple
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 tsp. Dijon-style mustard
3 tbsps. soy sauce

Score fatty edges of ham. Drain pineapple reserving third-cut syrup. Combine with brown sugar, mustard and soy sauce. Blend. Marinate pineapple while ham is grilling. Grill ham well with marinade on grill and cook 10 minutes each side. Brush marinade often. During minutes of cooking, pineapple and place on slice. Makes six servings.

BARBECUED PORK STEAKS
1 envelope (1-oz.) pizza sauce mix
1/2 cup orange juice
1/4 cup oil
4 to 6 pork steaks

Combine contents of envelope of sauce mix, orange juice and oil; blend. Pour over pork steaks in shallow pan; let stand 10 minutes, turning occasionally. Grill 8 to 10 inches above coals until done, 10 to 15 minutes, turning and brushing with marinade occasionally. Makes four to six servings.

Let Me See by Sybil...

Ahhh...this cool, nippy weather is more like it. With our temperatures over the weekend getting down as low as 40, Fall fell. The first day of fall, the third season of this year, is today, Sept. 23. The cold spell found us all with our thermostats down and gave everyone with fireplaces the first opportunity of the season to burn a few logs. Did you notice that good-wood smoke smelt in the air? Billy came home Saturday to watch the football game and yelled for a big mug of spiced tea. I rummaged in the cabinet for thirty minutes to find the left-over mixture from last winter. We drink tubs of that delicious stuff every winter.

In case you have misplaced your recipe for this it's 1 C instant lemon flavored tea; 2 c Tang, 3 C sugar and a teaspoon each of cloves and cinnamon. Mix well and store in tight container. Use 2 tsp. mix per cup of hot water. And, for those of you who can afford the calories, you might like this instant hot chocolate mixture better. It is the best stuff you ever drank, but it is loaded. One 14-qt. box of Caration dry milk; 2 lb. box of Nestle Quick; one 20 oz. jar of Coffee Mate or Pream; one box of powdered sugar. Mix well. Add 2 pgs. dry Lipton chicken noodle soup mix, one can cream of mushroom soup, one C dry rice. Stir together and add 5 cups of boiling water. Bake a while at 350 degrees, then stir and add one more cup of boiling water. Bake a while longer and add another cup of boiling water (7 cups in all.) Bake just one hour. Stir often.

I didn't get any of this fixed over the weekend, but I did make up a big pot of stew-- Johanna Kleeberger style, and baked some of the new crop of sweet potatoes just coming to market.

Food researchers are working with bacteria that can turn cellulose--the most abundant organic substance on earth--to food. If the experiments are successful such bacteria might be able to convert a bag of household trash into a meal as healthy as a thick steak. The basis of these experiments is this: A cow eats grass, mostly cellulose, and it becomes protein and steak. Various scientists believe that bacteria, in controlled operations, may be able to do the same, thus supplying cheap virtually endless protein for the world's growing population.

National Aeronautics and Space Administration specialists are developing methods to make food from human breath! They hope to use this to supplement food supplies on long space voyages.

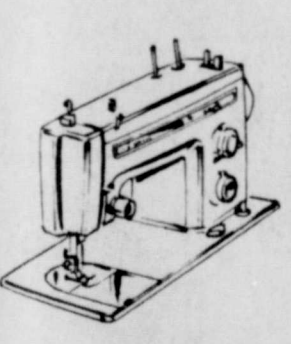


Close and Charlotte Ford helping Mrs. Kenneth Cunningham sign up in the membership drive for P-TA. Be counted with those who care. Have you signed up?

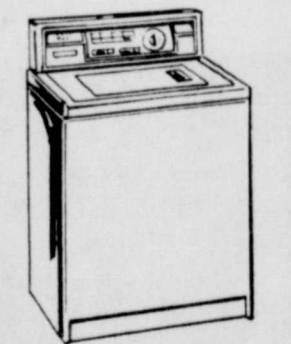

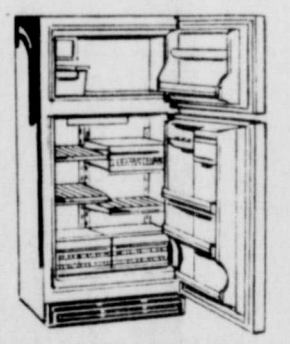

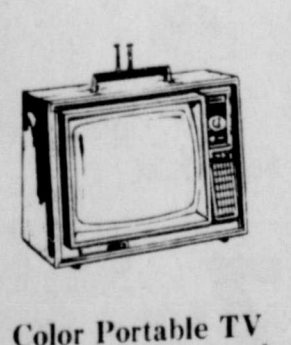

More Meat Consumed In Hansford County

Among residents of Hansford County, meat and potatoes rate tops as the favorite dinner dish.

Despite the fact that meat costs more than it did 10 years ago, it is in greater demand than it was then.

It is estimated that the annual consumption of meat in the local regional area has risen from approximately 144 pounds per capita in 1960 to around 167 pounds today, based upon figures obtained from the Department of Agriculture.

As for potatoes, the annual intake is now about 116 pounds per person as compared with 107 pounds 10 years ago.

To the economists, more frequent use of meat in the diet is a sign of a rising standard of living.

With the increase, it now takes some 546 tons of meat and close to 377 tons of potatoes per year to satisfy the appetite of the Hansford County population.

With respect to other staples in the diet, the national

figures show that Americans are eating 316 eggs per person and consuming 272 pounds of milk and cream annually.

Although the last two years were pretty much of a stand-off in the race between rising incomes and rising costs, most families in the local area appear to be in better shape, economically, than they were back in 1960, and able to live better than then.

This is to be seen by comparing how much can be bought with today's average paycheck and how much the 1960 one bought.

At the present scale of hours and wages, a working man doesn't have to toil for as long a time as he did before in order to provide for his family, according to figures from the Department of Labor and others.

For example, to purchase a combination of goods and services consisting of two quarts of milk, two pair of nylon stockings, a man's wool suit, three pounds of round steak and a house visit by a doctor requires about 27.1 hours of worktime on the part of the average Hans-

ford County wage earner.

This is considerable less time than would have been needed in 1960, because local incomes have risen 45 percent since then, much more than prices have risen.

The same market basket of goods and services would require more worktime, 30.2 hours, elsewhere in the United States.

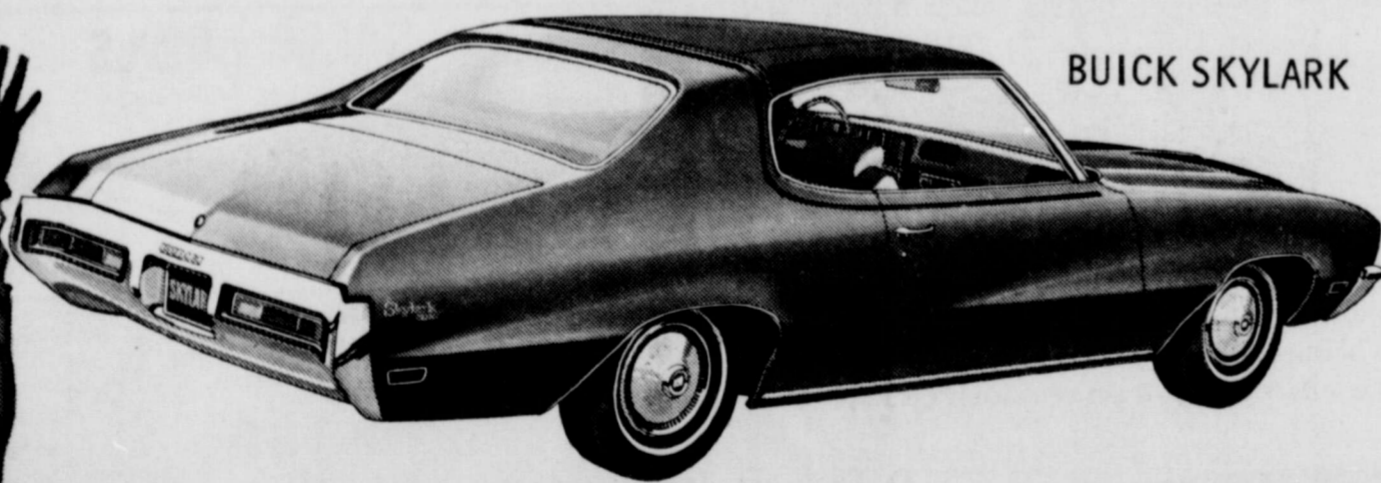

Research Team Puts Water Back Into Ogallala Strata

LUBBOCK--By giving it an extra push at the well head, two Texas Tech University petroleum engineers and a crew of student researchers are putting more lake water back into the Ogallala formation than ever before artificially.

From five sites in Lubbock, Crosby and Hockley counties they have pumped 65 acre feet of playa lake water into the underground supply this summer at the rate of 1,000 to 1,600 gallons per minute by applying pressure up to 80 pounds per square inch at the well head.

Petroleum engineering Profs. Duane Crawford and Philip Johnson head up the research expanded this summer through the financial support of the International Center for Arid and Semi-Arid Land Studies (ICASALS).

As principal investigators for the project, they supervise work done by students from the departments of Petroleum Engineering, Agricultural Engineering, Chemical Engineering, Geosciences and Biology.

Dr. Frank B. Conselman, director of ICASALS, said the application of pressure at the well head, if as successful as sponsors have reason to hope, could have far-reaching beneficial results.

The research could lead to the successful underground storage of water not only from lakes, but also from future projects which may bring water from the Mississippi River or Canada or any other source.

He said it could help in flood modification or abatement and in beneficial draining of lakes on or near airports

which attract migrating fowl hazardous to aircraft.

"The most successful site," Crawford said, "is on the Fullingim farm 12 miles north of Lorenzo, where 45 acre feet of water were returned at an average rate of 1,500 gallons per minute to the underground formation during a continuous period of operation."

The Fullingim site has been the best from a research point of view, Crawford and Johnson said, because it is the only one of the sites with adequate water for good testing. At all other sites the entire supplies were pumped into the Ogallala in short periods of time.

"All of the sites have successfully taken water," Johnson said.

This summer's experiments were designed to determine if the principle of applying additional pressure at the well head would increase the rate of return of water into the Ogallala through recharge wells and do it economically and at commercial rates.

It had worked successfully in 1969 at a dual purpose well near the Canyon Gin on the Acuff Road east of Lubbock, so Johnson and Crawford expanded the project this summer to learn if it would work in other wells in this area.

Johnson said that approximately 20 acre feet of water had been injected into the Ogallala since 1966 in the Canyon Gin site, 16 acre feet of it in one continuous pumping session during 1969.

The recharge into the well had proved non-commercial until a centrifugal pump had been used to apply moderate surface pressure. With the added pressure, lake water

was returned through the well at a rate of 2,000 gallons per minute.

The early portions of the summer were devoted to surveying and examining sites and purchasing equipment. Four sites, in addition to the Canyon Gin site, have been drilled and have been used successfully. Three more have been chosen but not completely developed.

Site No. 2 is on the Dunlap Wolforth Farms north and west of Wolforth No 3 Melonie Park-South in the Lubbock city limits; No. 4 in the Lorenzo Country Club grounds; and No. 5, the Fullingim site.

At all these sites the recharge wells have been surrounded by observation wells, also completed.

Three observation wells have been drilled at each site so that researchers can check the effects of the recharge on the water levels and monitor the chemical and biological quality of the water.

The recharge wells are 20-inch holes with 10 3/4 inch casing. Lower portions of the well are gravel packed with upper portions cased in cement to surface level to permit water recharge by pressure applied at the casing head.

At recharge intervals the casing is mill slotted. The observation wells are 4 1/2 inch holes with 2-inch galvanized pipe casing.

Three additional sites in different phases of development are on the Ray Kitten farm 10 miles south of Posey; the Loyd Hood farm in Hockley County near Whitharral and at Reese Air Force Base.

Crawford said from the ob-

servations wells, it had been learned that the water returned to the underground formation moves out radially through the more permeable sections and mounds at least temporarily around the recharge well.

An acre foot of water is the equivalent of one foot of water covering an acre, or 43,560 square feet of water one foot deep.

Tech's engineering professors are using two lake pumps and two centrifugal pumps, all butane operated and completely mobile. Eight-inch lines are used in the experiments.

The research program, expected to continue three to five more years is sponsored by ICASALS which provided funds, in cooperation with land owners and Texas Tech. The sites were selected to give project investigators a random sampling of the area.

The project may be expanded as needed to include a larger area of the Plains region.

AMINO ACID ANALYZER IS BOOST TO W-T

Canyon, Tex.--Research at West Texas State University has received a boost with acquisition of a \$19,000 amino acid analyzer.

The vital instrument actually cost the university only \$1,600 because of the generosity of an American company and a \$10,000 grant by the National Science Foundation.

"The amino acid analyzer will analyze the kinds and

quantities of amino acids in feeds, tissues or body fluids," said Dr. Marlon A. Guidry, professor of biology and chemistry and coordinator of life science research at the Killgore Research Center on campus.

"It can do eight analysis in a 24-hour period," he said. "Manually these same analyses would take 72 hours per analyses."

The amino acids are considered the building blocks of life and evidence of their existence on celestial bodies has been discovered.

Dr. Guidry said that Dr. H.F. Smith, head of the Instruments Division of Perkin Elmer Corp., convinced the company of the potential for research at West Texas State.

Perkin Elmer reduced the price of its latest model analyzer to \$1,600 to the university. Perkin Elmer is the American distributor for Hitachi of Japan the manufacturer.

The instrument will be used by faculty members of the School of Agriculture in research projects involving efficiency of protein utilization in processed grains, milk replacers for dairy calves, and the production of wheat hybrid with a higher quality protein content.

The departments of biology and chemistry have faculty members researching the formation of cell mitochondria, immunizations for cancer, and the nutritional requirements of the earthworm.

Analyses by the amino acid analyzer will help researchers complete the projects.

WELL LOGS PRESENTED TO WTSU

Canyon, Tex.--Cities Service Oil Co. of Oklahoma City has presented to West Texas State University 46 cartons of well logs.

"These samples represent hundreds of wells drilled by the company in the Panhandle

region over many years," said Dr. Robert Burton, head of the WTSU Geology Department.

The well logs will be indexed and stored at the Killgore Research Center on campus, where they will be available to students, faculty and the public for reference and study.

"Study of such samples provides information which is useful in reconstructing the geologic history of our region,"

Burton said. "Further, the search for oil and other mineral wealth is aided," he added.

"Cities Service Oil Co. performed a great public service by arranging that valuable materials be preserved and made available for continuing study," Burton said.

The logs are continuous graphs made by a writing instrument from information received from a probe into a well hole.
