Sheriff J. B. Cooke said today that he now has a deputy working nights due to a rash of thefts which have occurred in the immediate area the past week. "We are having a major theft nearly every night," he said.

During the past week the following thefts have been reported:

Six tires and wheels were taken off combine trailers parked in the shopping center mall Saturday night. Four of these belonged to Richard Lawrence and two of them to Leo Whitstone, custom combine men here for the harvest.

A butane regulator was removed from a tailwater engine belonging to Floyd Hull.

R. C. Thompson and Tom Foster, custom combine men from Nowana Okla., have their equipment parked at the Frank Davis farm. They report the loss of four 2-way radios which were in their combines and trucks, an AM-FM radio, and a television set. A tire and wheel was removed from the pickup belonging to Frank Davis. Sheriff Cooke said a complaint has been filed in this theft, but no arrests have been made as yet.

Doyle Barkley, a Gruver resident, reports the theft of two saddles, four bridles, a pair of chaps and some livestock vaccinating guns taken from his farm 4 miles south of Gruver.

Wesley Garnett lost a cutting torch and some gauges off a welding rig parked on his farm south of Spearman.

Each of the above reported thefts are being investigated by the Hansford County Sheriff's office.

The Parrish family are engaged in missionary work in Salvador, Brazil.

Jerry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Parrish of Spearman, is a graduate of Spearman High School. He attended the Sunset School of Preaching in Lubbock for two years. He spent six months in Valdes, North Carolina where he was minister for a Church of Christ congregation. From there he moved to Alamosa, Colo. where his family lived for four years and served the church there. This past summer Jerry worked with the Cresswell Street

Church of Christ at Shreveport, La. The congregation of this church is sponsoring the Parrish family in their missionary work in Brazil where they will be located for the next three years.

At present every member of Jerry's family is taking Portuguese language lessons, with the exception of the baby Gary who is only 2 years old.

His wife, Ann, the former Ann Die of Spearman, and all the children say they love their new home. The Portuguese people are very friendly, and though Ann does not yet converse with her neighbors, she has her ways of communication. She goes shopping with her next door neighbor and "gets along just fine."

With music by "The Faces" the dance will begin at 8:30 and conclude at 12 p. m. Saturday, Nov. 6.

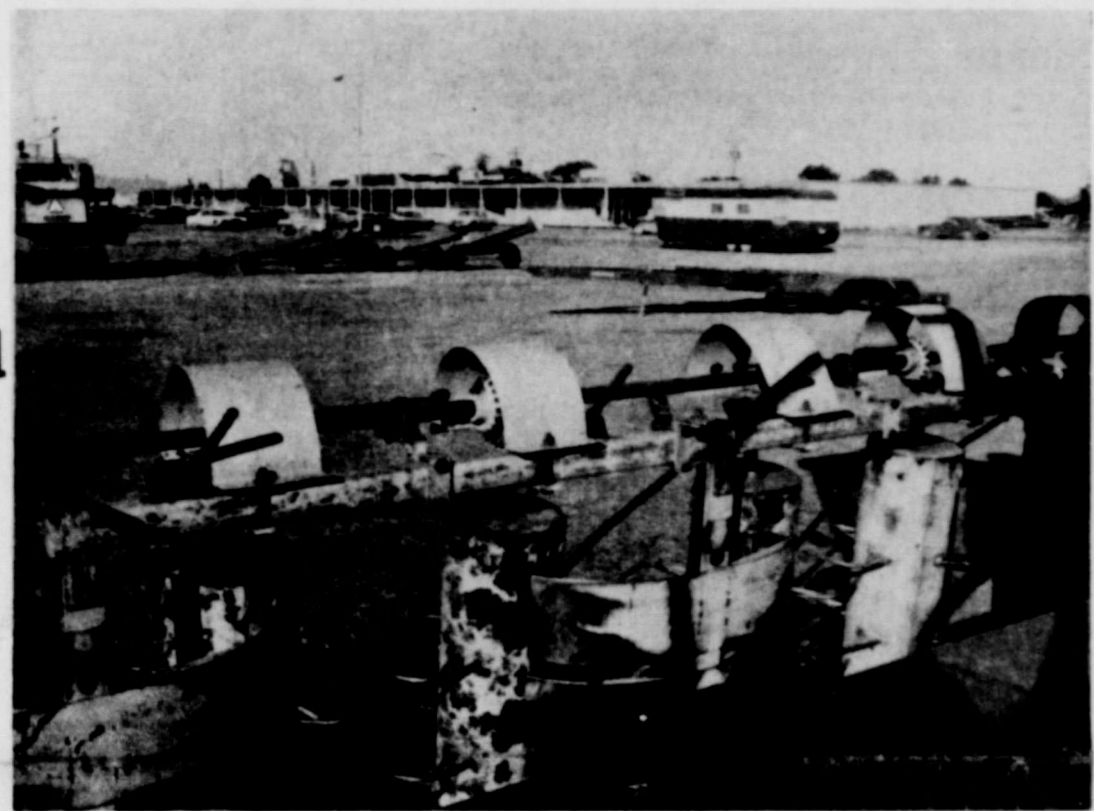

## MEMORIAL RITES HELD FOR MARION GLOVER

Funeral rites for a long-time Spearman resident, Mr. Marion Glover, were held at 2 p. m. Saturday in Abilene, Texas, where he had lived for the past year. He was 82 years old.

A special memorial service was held at 3 p. m. Sunday, Oct. 31 at the First Baptist Church in Evant, Texas where the Glovers had lived since 1958. Masonic graveside rites were conducted at the Evant cemetery following the funeral services.

Mr. Glover died suddenly Friday, Oct. 29 of a heart attack. Mr. and Mrs. Glover were starting on a trip to Oklahoma, and were backing out of the drive when he slumped over the steering wheel.

Mr. and Mrs. Glover moved to Spearman back in the early 1920's and lived here until they moved to Evant in 1958 where they had ranch land. They built a home in Abilene about a year ago and moved there to be near their son.

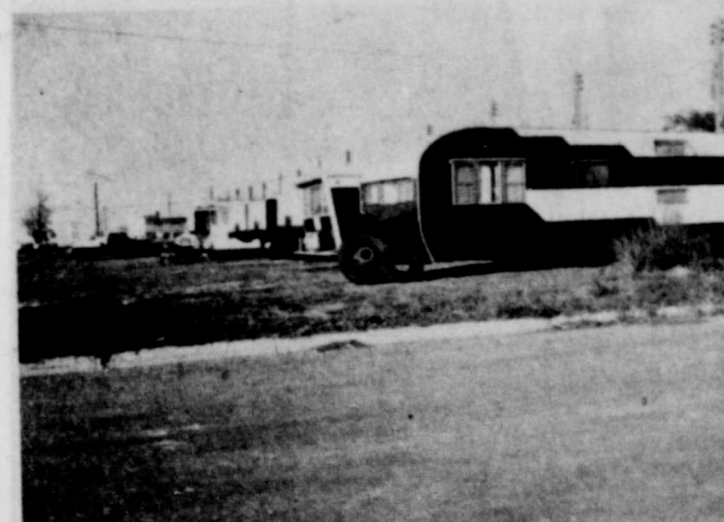
He was a farmer-rancher in Hansford County and owned extensive city property and rent buildings here at the time of his death. Mr. Glover was engaged in business here at various times through the years. He owned and operated the 66 Wholesale Oil Company, and later built the large brick building out on the highway which housed his Oldsmobile Agency for several years.

When the building boom started in Spearman and home sites were so badly needed, Mr. Glover divided into lots some of his farm land and had it annexed into the City of Spearman. The Glover addition is located in the south part of Spearman, from 9th street south.

Mr. and Mrs. Glover donated a 2-block plot of land located on Evans & Archer streets in this section as a city park several years ago, dedicating it to their deceased daughter.

Mrs. Glover is currently making her home in Abilene. Other survivors include one son, Billy Jack, 4 grandchildren and one sister.

## Weekend Art Show

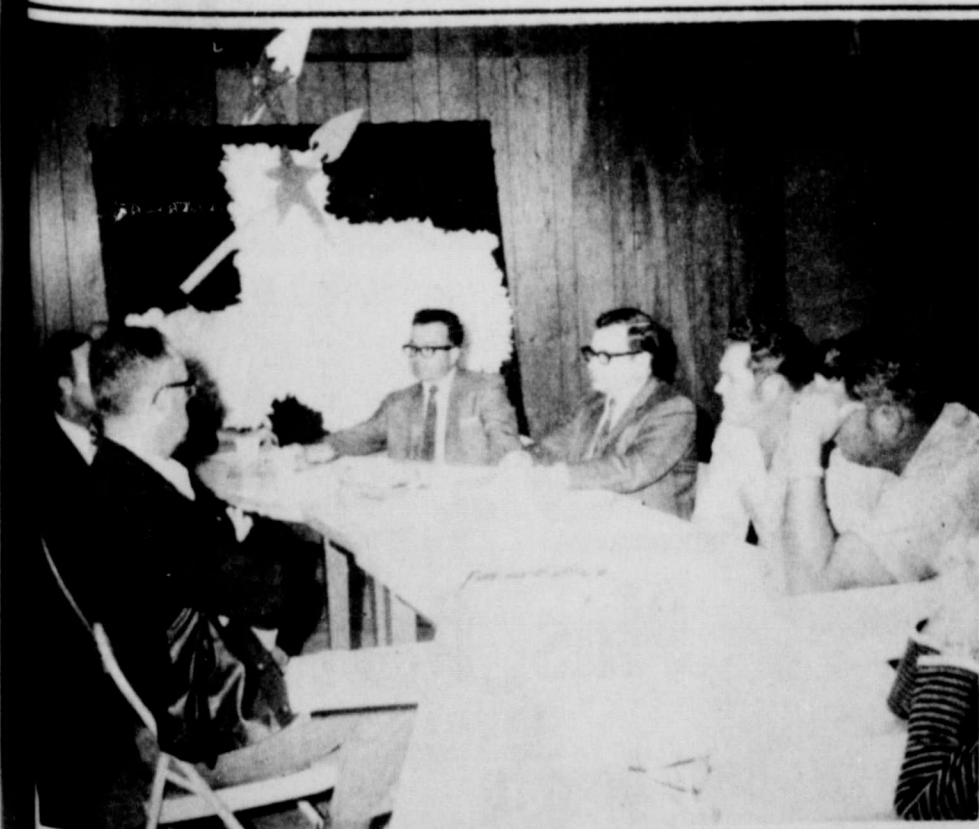

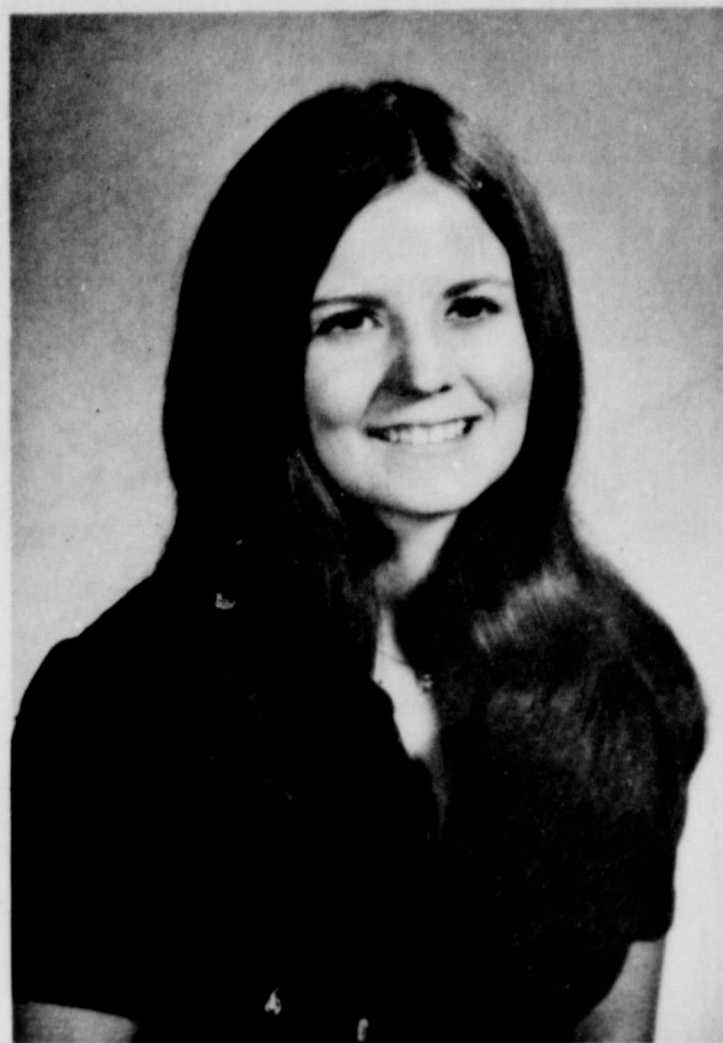

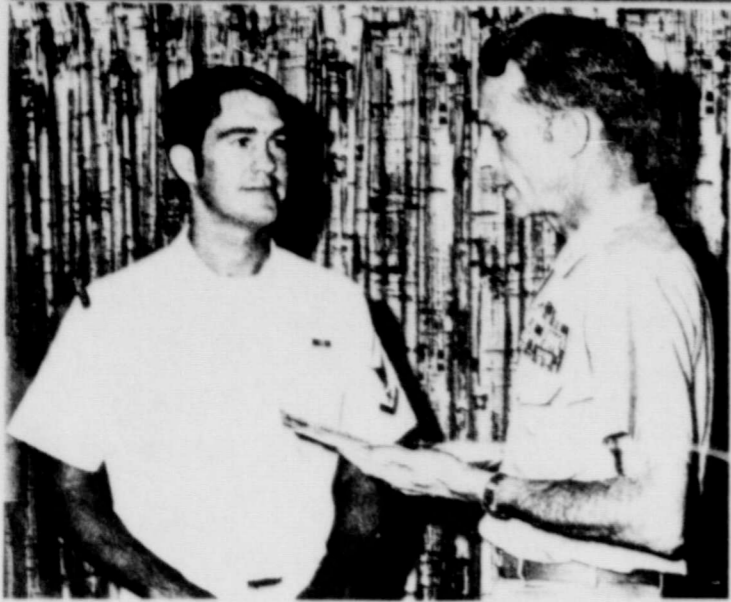

### CONGRESSMAN BOB PRICE 18TH DISTRICT—TEXAS

In view of the action of the United Nations in expelling Nationalist China last week, I am introducing a bill to terminate the United States membership in that organization.

Our Government, which pays more than one-third of the bills to keep the U. N. in business has been slapped in the face one too many times.

I will press for action on this bill, or at the very least for consideration of my bill to reduce the U. S. monetary contribution to the U. N. In addition, we must reassess our foreign aid contribution to those countries who joined in the disgraceful action of expelling Nationalist China.

Over the years we have heard much talk by U. N. supporters about its contributions to world peace—but I ask where was the U. N. when the United States move to

stop Communist aggression in Vietnam? The fact is that the power of the United States and not the United Nations, has preserved global peace since the end of World War II.

Now that the U. N. has expelled the law-abiding government of the Republic of China and replaced it with the government of Communist China which is constantly promoting world revolution, the time has certainly come for the United States to set an independent course for the good of our own national security.

**WELFARE**  
Earlier this year the House narrowly passed a welfare reform bill which provides for a guaranteed annual income of \$2,400 a year to welfare recipients. I voted against this bill and previous welfare bills. Since that time, I have been predicting that liberals in Congress will not be satisfied with that amount. Last week 18 Senators introduced an amendment which would set the guarantee at \$3,000, and four others proposed legislation that would set a floor of \$5,000.

Before the Congress acts on these outrageous proposals I hope reconsideration will be given to my bill. It would dismantle the giant Federal welfare bureaucracy and turn administration of welfare over to the states.

My bill also provides for incentives to individuals who work rather than merely providing a guaranteed annual income. I don't believe most people oppose assistance for the aged, the blind, and the disabled. They do oppose as I do, handing out tax dol-

lars to individuals who are able to work.

## 10-Yr. Tax Bite On Local Residents

# 11-12

How much richer would Hansford County residents be today if they had not had to pay taxes during the last 10 years?

How big a chunk was extracted from their pay envelopes in that period for Federal income and social security taxes? For those people who have often thought about their tax load and wondered how much of their income is shuttled off each year without their ever seeing it, the Tax Foundation has done some figuring and come up with some answers, based upon family averages.

Currently, it finds, the first 13 hours of worktime in any week go to pay Federal, state and local tax bills. In other words, a local worker has to put in all day Monday and part of Tuesday to earn enough for his taxes.

A major part of it represents the amount Uncle Sam withholds from paychecks for his two biggest taxes--income and social security. This combination more than doubled in the last 10 years, due partly to higher earnings.

In Hansford County, as in most parts of the country, gross income rose sharply in that period.

All told, the average family in the local area earned a grand total, prior to taxes, of about \$112,500 in the past 10

years, the statistics show. A considerable part of it, approximately \$14,600, was skimmed off, before they ever got hold of it, to cover Federal income and social security tax deductions.

Nationally, by way of comparison, incomes averaged \$74,870 and taxes, \$10,070.

This is only part of the tax burden, however. It is the visible part. There are, in addition, the so-called "hidden" taxes, such as the Federal excise taxes on automobiles, gasoline, liquor, telephones, tobacco, transportation and the like.

The Tax Foundation estimates that if these and the other levies passed on to consumers were included, it would be found that the government collects another \$74 in such taxes for every \$100 it receives via income and social security taxes.

Applied to Hansford County,

the figures indicate that the local population paid an estimated \$10,800 per family in hidden taxes in the 10 years.

Check the number of the sticker on your windshield. It is red, and reads 10 or 12. Have your motor vehicle inspected today.

Use 1 TBS. to the person. Boil 15 minutes. This will have a beautiful color and excellent flavor.

To make coffee from browned split peas, brown and grind as you would real coffee beans. But the very best coffee substitute is said to be made from 2 qts wheat bran, 1 pt. corn meal, 3 beaten eggs, 1 large cup New Orleans molasses. Brown in oven and stir often, as "herein lies the chief secret of having good coffee." Use a handful for 2 persons. I must admit, these old recipes sound right good. Might try some of them one of these days.

This old cook book I have is an ancient thing. So brown & brittle you can't turn the pages. Some of the "receipts" are very tempting but hard to figure out. Like how much is a "bowlfull," or as many "hand fuls as you may determine". Most of the cake recipes call for pulverized sugar.

Here are a couple I hope someone will try. I don't have the nerve:

**Nob Hill Pudding:** 1 pt. thick cream, sweetened & beaten till stiff. Dissolve 4 sheets Isinglass in 4 tablesp. hot water. Pour this mixture into cream very fast. Pour in mold and let set. Isinglass is that stuff which protected the flame on our old coal-oil burners. My mother used to threaten my life if I touched it. It shattered very easily.

Or—you might try this recipe for Pfeffernuesse, said to be good, but rich: 1 lb. sugar, 1 lb. butter, 2 lbs. flour, 1/4 lb. almonds, one-quarter ounce of Ammonia added to 4 beaten eggs. Let stand 1/2 hour, roll out and cut in squares. Bake quickly.

Ammonia? I can't believe it. If anyone ever used Ammonia in cooking, let me know why—and what for.

Or maybe you need to cure your whooping cough—just mix sweet oil, oil of cloves and oil of amber, and rub across the base of the brain and the loins—as called for by severe coughing. Home Demonstration Agent

After Halloween it seems like no time at all until Thanksgiving and Christmas. Thus it behooves us to begin seriously thinking about our Christmas shopping and how we'll decorate our homes for the holidays.

To help you prepare your home for Christmas a "Christmas decorations workshop" will be held on Tuesday, November 9 a.m.-3 p.m. in the Home Demonstration Clubroom in Spearman. Everyone should plan to bring a sack lunch and be prepared to work all day.

Items for the workshop include the making of Christmas cards as well as all types of felt decorations. Many of these would be appropriate for gifts as well.

To be prepared to work you will need to bring construction paper, glue, scissors, felt tip

pens, glitter & sequins for making Christmas cards. In addition you will need blocks of felt in Christmas colors plus other colors you like, beading needles, thread, beads, sequins, and other trim as desired. If you wish to make the nativity wall hanging you will need to bring 1/2 yard of blue felt for the background. For the large stuffed Santa doll you will need 1/2 yard of red felt and 3 yards of ball fringe.

Items will be shown with patterns available for tablecloths, wall hangings, door knob ornaments, napkin rings, light switch plate covers & Christmas card holders.

We do hope many of you will make plans to work with us that day while adding beautiful items to your holiday decor.
