

Harry Stumpf Honored As 'Citizen of the Year'

The annual banquet of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce was attended Monday night by a crowd of 275 persons at the High School cafeteria.

A.L. Wilson Jr., a Lubbock, Texas businessman and former Spearman resident, acted as Master of Ceremonies for the banquet. The "Bank Notes" a musical group associated with the bank at Booker, Texas, presented outstanding entertainment for the evening.

The highlight of the banquet was the announcement of the 1972 "Citizen of the Year" which this year went to Harry Stumpf of Spearman. He was introduced by Dick Countiss who presented him with an engraved plaque.

Mr. Stumpf, 50, was recognized for his outstanding community & civic service to Spearman's youth of all ages. Harry moved to Spearman in 1959, coming here from Perryton where he had been headmaster for a Boy Scout troop for 15 years. In Perryton he worked with the Little League ball teams and was very active in completing the VFW building so the teenagers would have a place to meet. He is Past Commander of VFW Post 254.

In Spearman Harry has carried on his work with youth. He is scoutmaster of Troop 55 and has served his time in helping with youngsters in the Little League.

Harry loves children of all ages. He has helped many a lad go to summer Scout camp when the child's parents could not afford to send him. If he knows of a boy who is not financially able to purchase a uniform, he either finds him one or buys one. He helped a group of men fit the community hall for a Teen Town meeting place; he helped to secure a hot water heater and two air conditioning units for Scout Camp M. K. Brown. He donated some old furniture to the school so the youth could use it for their high school stage equipment.

Stumpf maintains a tarp repair shop at his home where he makes it his business to keep all the scout tents in fine shape, both for local troops as well as Cuyman, Okla. troops. He spends all his spare time entertaining groups of boys (and girls if they want to go) to skating & bowling parties, camping trips and special parties.

He conducts the annual sale of Christmas trees for Boy Scouts, and when the season has ended, he sees that trees are picked up and delivered to the country farm of Vera

Written where the trees are used as shelter for wildlife.

Stumpf has been an employee of Northern Natural Gas Company for 20 years. He has been a member of the National Guard this same number of years and holds the rank of Master Sergeant.

All of Harry's "kids" think he is the greatest man in the world, and Monday night the people of Spearman showed that they thought so too.

Also honored at the banquet Monday night was Lenzie L. Anderson, who was named "Employee Of The Year". Don Hergert, Rotary Club president, presented Anderson with a plaque. Hergert pointed out that this selection is made each year by a secret committee of the Rotary Club to recognize an employee for his loyalty, eagerness, honesty and dependability.

Lenzie, his wife Marilyn and their 5 children have lived in Spearman since 1963. He has worked with Hansford Implement Company for the past 8 years and now holds the position as Parts Manager. Anderson is recognized by the John Deere division office as the "top parts manager" for the entire Kansas City zone.

The banquet program had no formal speeches other than the presentations of the two awards, plus short speeches by Gene Cudd, retiring Chamber president, who thanked the town of Spearman for the support of this organization; and a short speech by incoming president Chunky Blackburn.

Blackburn complimented the board of directors for their work this year. Blackburn called for the continued cooperation of Chamber members and predicted that 1972 would again be a year of achievement.

The Chamber, working without a manager for several months, recognized Mrs. Mary Lou Wysong for an excellent job carrying on in the capacity as secretary. A bouquet of sweetheart roses was presented her.

Mr. Blackburn, a local attorney, introduced his new directors. These are: Gene Cudd, Elizey Vandenberg, Junior Lusby, Jack Oakes, L.D. Mea, Wesley Garnett Jr., R.C. Fisher, Roy L. McClellan and Jim Evans.

700 Tons Feed Destroyed

A spontaneous combustion in a stack of cubed alfalfa at the Frontier Feedlot in the northern part of Hansford County Monday, destroyed 700 tons of the expensive cattle feed. Loss in dollars ran close to \$40,000.00.

Spearman fire department answered the call along with Hansford County Sheriff's officers. This kind of fire is virtually impossible to extinguish. Sheriff's officers remained through the day and night at the huge cattle feeding facility to watch and see that it didn't get out of control. At one time, blowing sparks almost started a prairie fire. One spokesman said "this will burn for a long time."

The cubed alfalfa is used as a mixture with other feeds & grains.

Voters To Have Big Poll Year

If Hansford County residents wish to cast ballots at elections during 1972, they must register at the county tax assessor-collector's office in the county courthouse.

These have been some confusion relating to registration deadlines under the new registration system imposed by Senate Bill 51. REGISTRATION NEVER CLOSSES.

It will NOT cease on January 31, as it has in past years. Those persons who have registered by that time will appear on the Initial List of registered voters.

Those persons registering after January 31 will appear on supplemental lists, which will be prepared 20 days prior to any election. Every person who submits an application to the tax office at least 30 DAYS PRIOR TO AN ELECTION, will appear on either the original or supplemental lists which will be sent to the polls.

Every person who registers as of April 5, 1972, will be eligible to vote in the May 6 primary; likewise, every person who registers by Oct. 6, 1972, will be permitted to vote in the November 7 General Election.

Voters in Hansford county will cast ballots in elections ranging from school board to president during 1972, and there may be one or more special purpose elections.

The first Primary will be May 6, the Second Primary on June 3 and the General Election, November 7.

County offices which will be filled at the elections include County Tax Assessor-Collector and Sheriff, now held by J. B. Cooke, who has announced as candidate for re-election; County Attorney, a position now held by T. D. Sansing. Candidates for this office thus far are Chunky Blackburn & Britt Jarvis.

Precinct offices include Commissioner Precinct One, held by Joe Day, and Com. Precinct 3 held by B. W. Renner. Both have filed for re-election.

Auto Tags Available

More than 5,000 Hansford County vehicle owners will be performing the annual ritual of purchasing license tags within the next few weeks.

New license plates which went on sale Tuesday of this week are green on white. Hansford County prefix letters are BTR, BTS and BTT.

These tags must be purchased by midnight, April 1 to avoid paying a 20 percent penalty.

Every vehicle owner should have in his possession now a vehicle registration form mailed out by the State Highway Department. Using this form, owners need not take their certificate of title or the previous years registration receipt when purchasing new tags.

By using the registration form, clerks at the tax office will need only to receive the fee, affix to the application a sticker showing the registration number and other data, and hand over the 1972 license plates.

Persons who have changed vehicles during the past year should check the registration form mailed by the state, to make sure the renewal notice is for the new vehicle. If it is not for the car currently owned, you are asked to destroy the form, as it will do you no good.

If you do not have the correct renewal notice, vehicle owners are then asked to bring in their title and last year's license receipt when purchasing their 1972 tags.

It happens every year. For about the past three years, the Lynx and Rattlers have battled to a stale-mate, at Stinnett, and Tuesday night was no exception. Spearman won the game 50-41, exactly as predicted by many fans. Each game, each year gets even better for the fans, and this one Tuesday night was the best of all. The win put the Lynx a game ahead of Stinnett, but the Lynx must beat Parham and Ross Ranch away from home and beat Phillips here next Tuesday night. The Lynx cannot let up or they will once again end up in a tie with Stinnett.

The Lynxmen looked great, as usual, as they smothered the Stinnett girls team 79-14. Parham had a big night, as she hit 30 points. Stinnett hit 11, Schell 7, Evans 5, and Boone 1. Fans were in "shock" at this point. Randy Reedy, of Stinnett hit a free throw, to put Rattlers ahead 49-50 with 2:00 left in game. The Lynx called a time out with 1:47 left in the game. Coach Simpson settled the boys down for the final minute of the game. DeLoach hit a jumper, with score 51-50, Stinnett leading, with 1:30 left in game, and Lynx must get the ball if they expect to win. Stinnett missed a shot, Lynx got the ball, and Floyd hit a 20 footer, to put the Lynx ahead 53-50, with 11 seconds left in game. Rattlers call time out with 10 seconds left. Floyd fouls Randy Reedy of Stinnett with 6 seconds left in game, Reedy shooting 1 and 1, but misses and DeLoach comes out to re-bound, and passes to Head, who is immediately fouled with 2 seconds left in the game, the Lynx leading 53-50. Head misses free throw, and Stinnett calls time out, with 1 second left in game. They get to throw the ball in at mid-court, but with only 1 second, they are unable to score, and Lynx win 53-51. Morse Men Measure 26 Angus Cattle In National Program

Henderson & Paris, with headquarters at Moore, Texas, measured the weaning and yearling weights and grades on 26 head of registered Angus cattle during 1971. Lloyd D. Miller, executive secretary of the American Angus Association reports.

The records which will help Henderson & Paris to breed faster gaining more efficient cattle were recorded in conjunction with the Association's Angus Head Improvement Records (AHIR) program. They were processed on the Association's modern computer data processing equipment at St. Joseph, Missouri.

The AHIR program is designed to help cattlemen do a professional, scientific job of cattle breeding by measuring the economically important traits of a beef cattle herd. After cattle are weighed and graded on the farm the information is sent to the Association office. Special reports are prepared and sent regularly to each Angus breeder enrolled in the program. This gives the breeder the weaning and yearling weight and grade record of each animal in his herd as well as the

lifetime progeny record of sires and dams.

The AHIR program is the fastest growing department in the American Angus Association. Last year there were 71,899 weight records recorded by Angus breeders, an increase of some 20% over a year earlier.

Howard Smithson, Dimmitt, Texas has been named state champion in the 1971 Project: 200 national corn growing contest sponsored by The Producers of Funk's G-Hybrids. His winning average of 187.7 bushels per acre was made on 5.7 acres with Funk's G-4646.

Smithson's yield was the second highest within the southern region and was topped only by regional champion Raymond Walker of Gruver, Texas with a yield of 193.0 bushels per acre.

California, with a yield of 255.9 bushels per acre from 8.11 acres of G-4444; William and Clarence Hutter, Spring Green, Wisconsin, 246.4 bushels per acre average from 2.4 acres of G-4444; Frank Michael, Rockville, Indiana, who average 282.5 bushels per acre from 2.1 acres of G-4646 and Raymond Walker who made his 193.0 bushels per acre average with a Funk's high oil hybrid...H-24382... on two full acres.

The five 1971 national and regional Funk's-G Project: 200 winners averaged 253.54 bushels per acre. Twenty-six state winners averaged 196.75 bushels per acre and the average for the 31 state, regional and national winners was 206.07 bushels. Over-all average for the 5,500 growers who entered the 1971 contest was 146.5 bushels per acre.

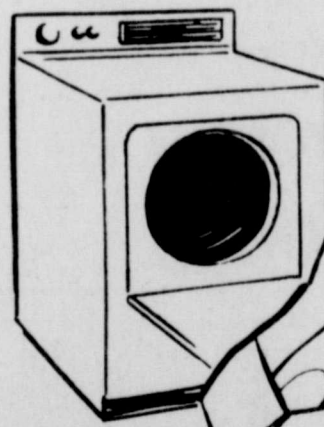

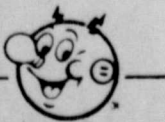

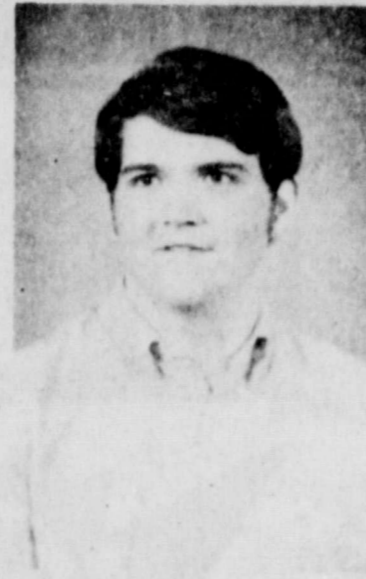
