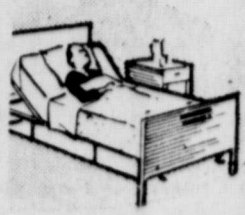

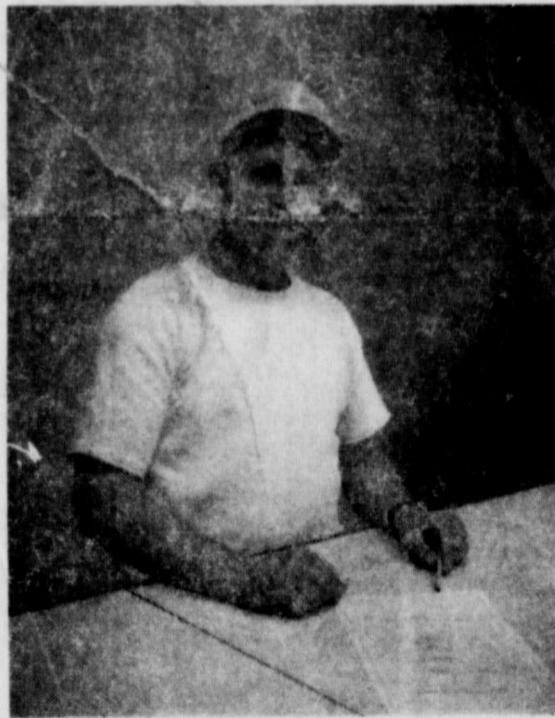

TOKLAT - Showing Here Sunday

Spearman's Lyric Theatre has scheduled the show TOKLAT for 4 showings here Sunday, March 5. The movie can be seen at 3:00, 5:00, 7:00 or 9:00 p.m.

Take a thousand-pound grizzly and put him in one of the few remaining wilderness areas of the country, the high Uintah Mountains of Utah; then add about twenty other North American wild animals, a fine performance by Leon Ames,

and you have TOKLAT, an extraordinary new family film. TOKLAT has been in the making for over five years, and required 125,000 feet of footage to come up with the right 4000 feet necessary for the picture. Now in 35mm Technicolor, it's ready for release.

The film is about a gigantic grizzly bear (whose name, TOKLAT, is derived from an Indian tongue meaning ferocious).

And a grizzly, one of the world's largest land-dwelling carnivores, is an amazing animal indeed.

The film follows the development of TOKLAT from a cub to a giant, during which time one enjoys rare glimpses of a grizzly living, thriving, surviving, in a natural mountain wilderness.

Enter Leon Ames, a mountain man, whose respect and understanding of animals, especially TOKLAT, is based on a lifetime's experience in the wilderness. His heart-rending task of seeking out the bear for the crime of self-defense, is a social statement on man's way and nature's way.

Ames' commentary is amusing, educational and poignant as he describes how he witnessed TOKLAT's growth for the years he knew him.

The picture also gorgeously captures the natural beauty of the wilderness and its changing seasons.

The picture was a labor of love, its gentle plea to consider the possibility that wild animals have an inalienable right to the wilderness is well made.

It is important as a family film, because its message is important to everyone.

by seven with a minute left to play.

But the Lynxettes refused to accept defeat and came back with six points in that final minute to snatch victory from certain defeat.

Down by 49-42 at the 60-second mark, Miss Patterson fired in a field goal then 32 seconds later Miss Schell meshed one from the baseline. With nine seconds left to play, Leann Shieldknight converted a pair of foul tosses for the Lynxettes and on the out of bounds play following the score Miss Patterson stole the ball, tossed it to her little buddy 15 feet away from victory and the tiny gal did her thing as pandemonium erupted among the West Texas continent on hand.

Prior to the game ending heroics, the only time Spearman had been ahead was with 5:32 left to play in the first period. After that, however, things went downhill for the Lynxettes until

at halftime they were trailing by nine points at 29-20.

At the start of the third period the Lynxettes put on one of their patented surges, and closed to 32-31 with 2:32 left in the third quarter. Again, however, Robinson pulled away and hiked its lead to 36-31 at the three-quarter break.

That lead was increased to 39-31 a minute deep into the fourth period, but then Spearman again went on the attack and finally caught up at 40-40 with 3:55 to play. Robinson quickly opened up a seven-point lead, however, and it appeared the defending champions were headed for home without another title to go with previous crowns won in 1966 and 1971.

The win served as a double dose of revenge for the Lynxettes as they avenged a loss to the Rockettes in the 1970 championship game, but more important they wiped out the memory of an 84-69 loss to Robinson in the Duncanville Tournament at midseason . . . the only blot on a 34-1 season record.

Robinson closed out with a 36-3 record, other defeats being administered during the regular season by Class A champion Claude and by Rivercrest of Bogota.

Misses Patterson and Shieldknight shared scoring honors for the winners, each collecting 19 points while Miss Schell's overall contribution was a dozen markers. Suzie Snider, Robinson's 6-1 junior, led all scorers with 26 points for the Rockettes.

Spearman's forecourt trio hit 17 of 30 field goal attempts for a nifty 56.7 per cent while Robinson ripped the cords with 46.8 per cent accuracy on 17 hits on 32 attempts.

Spearman also dominated the backboards with 20 rebounds to 15 for the Rockettes. Liz Roberts and Patricia Schnell led the Lynxette rebounders with seven and six, respectively, while Dicque Lucenay was credited with five retrieves for Robinson.

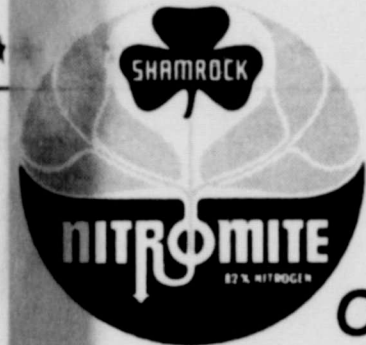

Waste Disposal Is City Council Topic

City Aldermen met Monday night for the last meeting of February and set March meeting dates for the 13th & 27th.

Topics discussed Monday included the study of some sort of retirement system for city employees. The council is continuing to look into this matter and hope to come up with some plan soon.

The sewer plant, and its electrical motor problems was discussed. The manager said some of the repairs have been made, but one of the motors at the plant is still out.

Councilmen talked over the requirements the city will have to meet before too long one of two methods will have to be used for dumping trash, an incinerator or sanitary land fill. The land fill method would mean the city would have to acquire more property to take care of the necessary trenches in which to bury the city's trash.

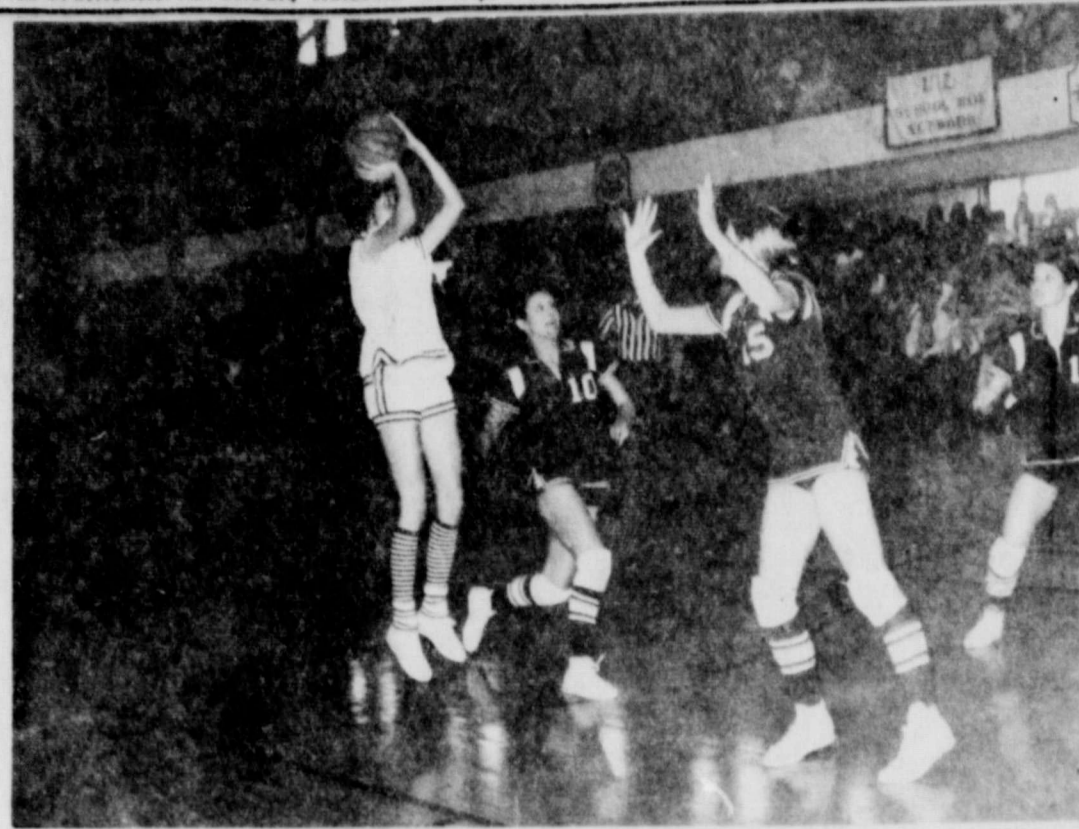

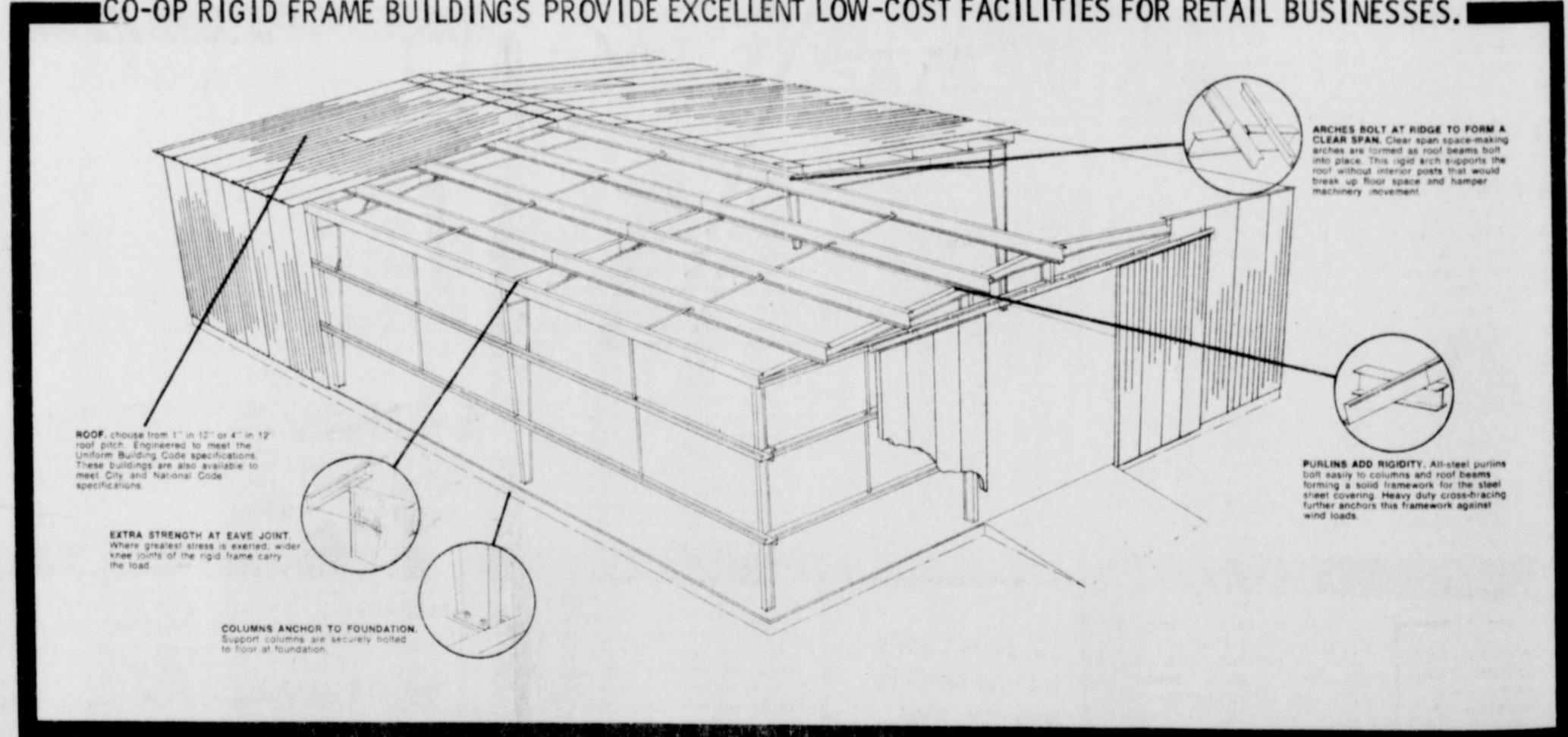
