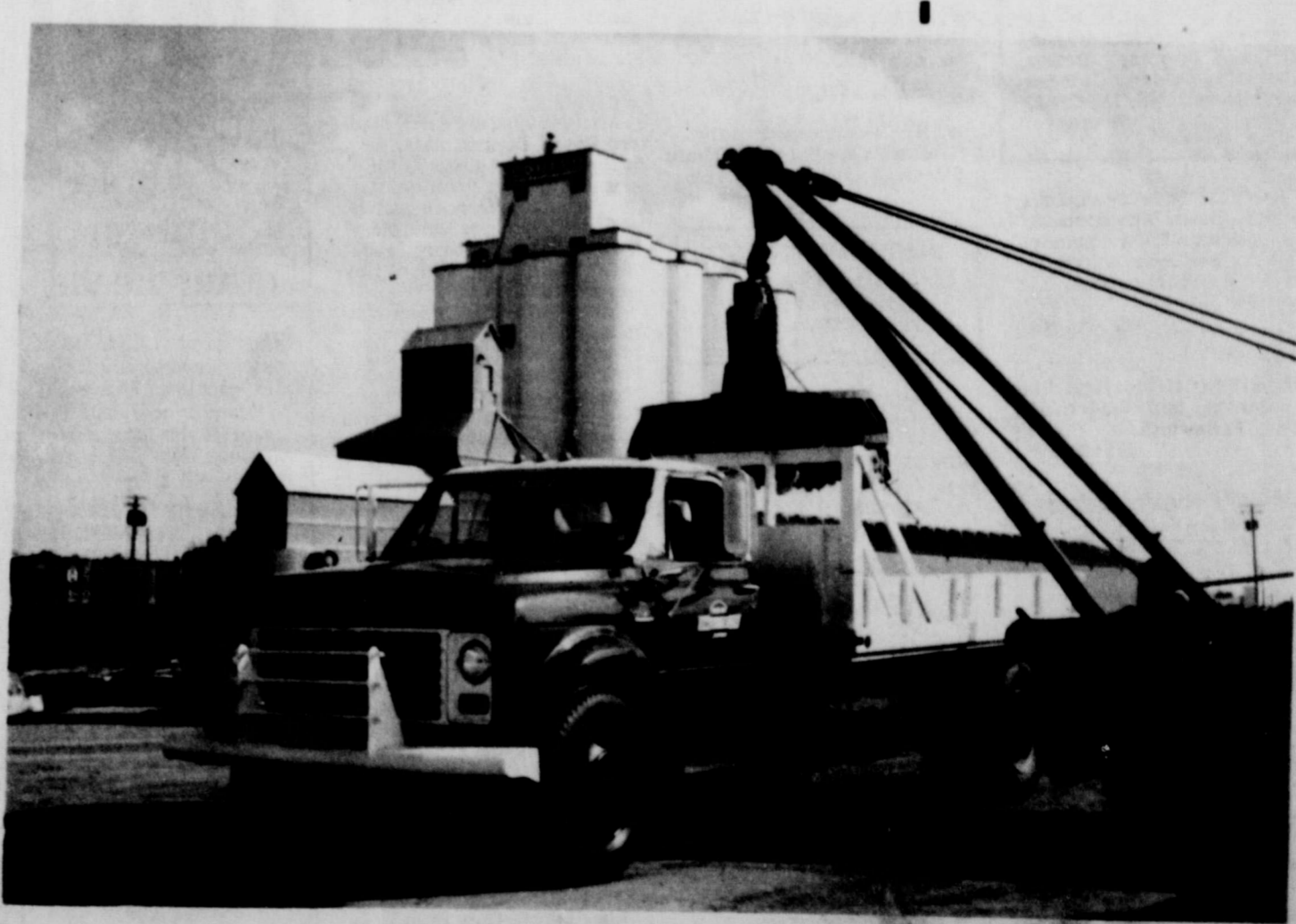

### WORKING CONDITIONS IN 1852

Although working conditions . . . have changed drastically in the . . . last 100 years, it is hard to . . . conceive of some of the regula- . . . tions of past years. The follow- . . . ing office staff notice, dated 1852, . . . was found recently in the ruins . . . of a London office building:

1. Godliness, cleanliness, and punctuality are the necessities of a good business.
2. This firm has reduced the hours of work, and the clerical staff will now only be present between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. weekdays.
3. Daily prayers will be held each morning in the main offices. The clerical staff will be present.
4. Clothing must be of a sober nature. The clerical staff will not disport themselves in raiment of bright colors, nor will they wear hose unless in good repair.
5. Overshoes and topcoats may not be worn in the office, but neck scarves and headwear may be worn in the office in inclement weather.
6. A stove is provided for the benefit of the clerical staff. Coal and wood must be kept in the locker. It is recommended that each member of the clerical staff bring four pounds of coal each day during the cold weather.
7. No member of the clerical staff may leave the room without permission from the supervisor.
8. No talking is allowed during business hours.
9. The craving for tobacco, wine, or spirits is a human weakness, and as such is forbidden to all members of the clerical staff.
10. Now that the hours of business have been drastically reduced the partaking of food is allowed between 11:30 and noon, but work will not on any account cease.
11. Members of the clerical staff will provide their own pens. A new sharpener is available on application to the supervisor.
12. The supervisor will nominate a senior clerk to be responsible for the cleanliness of the main office and private office. All boys and juniors will report and will remain after closing hours for similar work. Brushes, brooms, scrubbers, and soap are provided by the owners.
13. The owners recognize the generosity of the new labor laws, but will expect a great rise in output of work to compensate for these near-Utopian conditions.

A calm, quiet, unassuming little community such as Spearman produces very little news--of much public interest that is. This is good in many ways and speaks well for the town. But it makes it quite a chore to try and find something to fill a newspaper with, twice a week. This duty is even more difficult for the local radio operators who must try and give a news cast at least 3 times a day! So--small radio stations get the majority of their news from a wire service. This newspaper, to help fill its columns with something readable, subscribes to the Copley News Service. Once in a great while, we do run across something of local interest which Copley sends us. Last week in the "Dear Nana" columns of Copley, there was a letter from a woman seeking information on a "Mrs. Groves who published a book pertaining to repair of antique trunks. Several of our readers brought this to our attention, so I wrote to Copley and told them about Dorothy Groves being a Spearman resident and how she could be contacted. This is not the first time we have had opportunity to refer such inquiries to Mrs. Harold Groves. We have had several California families move to Spearman, and many of them don't quite know how to take all this friendliness exhibited by Texans. One man thought it was a little over-done! In fact he called it "being nosey" when one of our natives struck up a conversation with him. "I understand you own a lot of land in these parts," the native said in trying to chat with the Californian. "Yes I do," replied Mr. C. "I purchased a lot at the cemetery." tor and his family become part and parcel of our little country town! Our slogan here has sorta always been to treat you so many ways, you are bound to like some of them! Billy has already called on the new family and was very impressed! Especially with their long-haired Siamese cat. I am dying to meet the cat. I've read about them, but have never seen one. Speaking of Siamese cats, all day Sunday there was a beautiful Blue Point tom, complete with neck collar, in my yard. I fed him and petted him and admired him.
