Kent and his wife Glenda have two children Mark age six and Carrie Ann who is three years old.

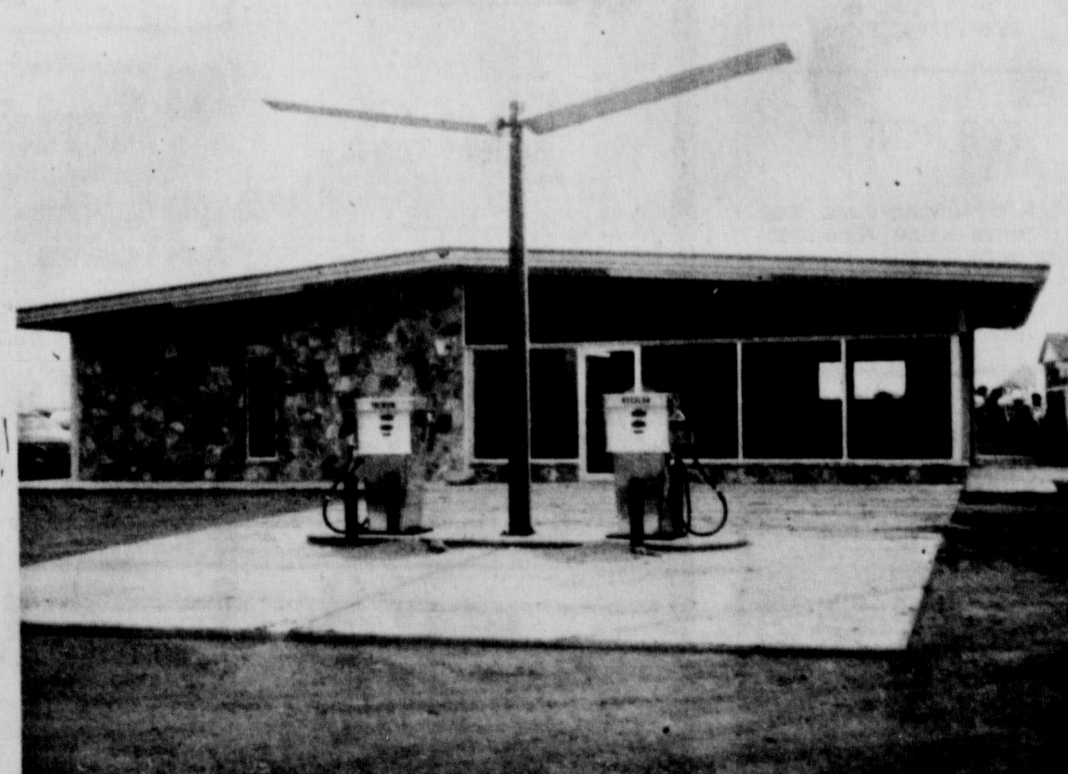
DEATH CLAIMS BUD BEESON

School Board Has Busy Meeting Monday Night!

The Spearman school board had another busy meeting Tuesday evening. All members were present. The school board made some changes in their hand book concerning their dress code for the coming year. "Hair styling of both boys and girls must be in keeping with good grooming. Boys bangs must be trimmed above the eyebrow. The girls cannot wear shorts to school but they may wear neat appearing slacks. Also, expectant mothers may attend school.

Also a change in policy, concerns the 4 years of English required in Spearman High school. It is now possible for a student to substitute speech-communications course in place of English 4, with the Principals approval.

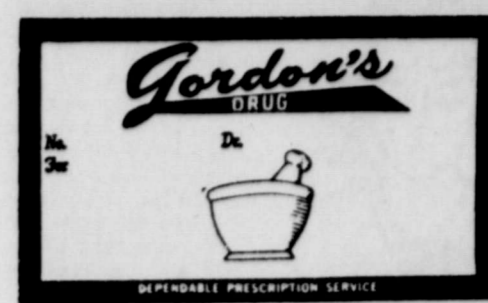

That dear old country landmark, I tramped around a bit, and in the lap of luxury my lot has been to sit. But ere I die, I'll eat the fruit of trees I robbed of yore, then seek the shanty where my name is carved upon the door. I ween the old familiar smell with soothe my jaded soul, I'm now a man, but none the less, I'll try the children's hole.

IF YOU GOT a merry chuckle out of this nostalgic little poem, written by James Whitcomb Riley, you are indebted to Mary Schumann, she is the one who passed it on to me.

Its a fact if you are old enough to remember the old out house, you are too old for the draft! I certainly remember ours. It wasn't fancy, with a half-moon window, but it did have two-sized holes. The chicken house jutted out from the out house and made a perfect place for us kids to build a play house. We gathered up all the boards in the neighborhood and built this hide-away smack up against the toilet. Funny thing, we never seemed to notice the odor either! My grandmother had a sister, an old maid I think, and she was meaner than heck. For spite, we made a peek-hole to spy on Aunt Abigale. But I guarantee SHE never knew it. We were scared to death of her! It has always been a mystery to me why half the people in this country didn't die of black widow spider bites. Every toilet hole I ever looked down into in my life was filled with those hateful things! We kept a special stick there, just to clear the seat of spider webs. Ours was rather crowded, I remember, for there is where mother and grandma kept all the extra fruit jars, stacked in boxes until needed.

One thing for sure, we NEVER had plumbing problems!

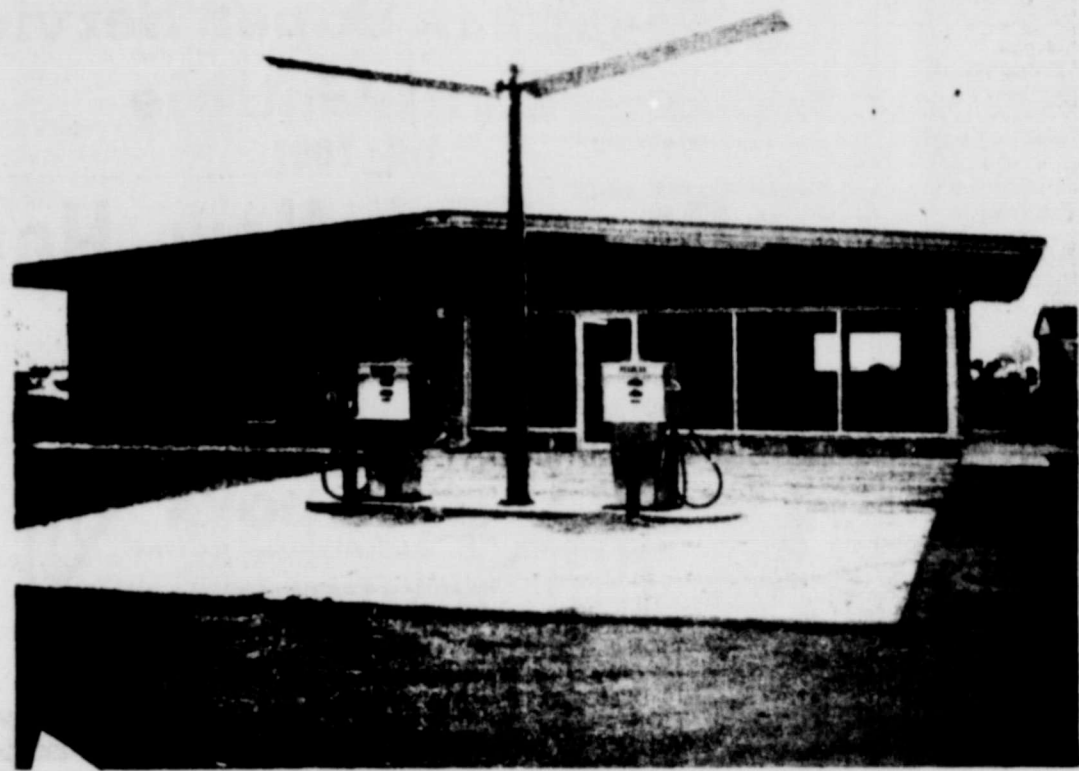

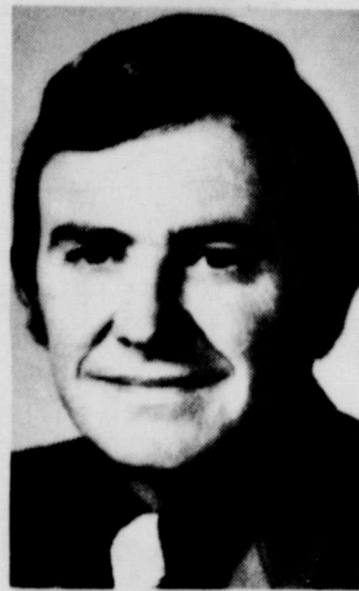

HEADS POWERFUL NEWSPAPER ORGANIZATION

Don Coppedge, publisher of the Waxahachie Daily Light, was elected new chief executive of the Texas Press Association at its annual summer convention held recently in Corpus Christi.

The 41-year-old publisher and general manager of the Waxahachie Daily Light was elevated from first vice-president to president of the Austin-based state newspaper organization.

One of the chief pleasures in newspapering, according to Coppedge, is that you become personally acquainted with heads of state and leading politicians in your state and community... "and you are included in most of their plans, one way or another." He says the wheels of the community rarely turn without the newspaper, and the publisher is usually the first to know.

He says the most interesting thing about it all, however, is "to see your community grow or change by newspaper influence. The newspaper's role as community builder is fascinating..."

As the world, our society, continues to change, and our way of life "become increasingly complex, and as I complete each day in it, I become more aware of the heavy

responsibility of the community newspaper to inform, explain, instruct, illustrate each segment of a day or week to its readers."

SELECTING REDWOOD FURNITURE

College Station--Sturdy redwood furniture, popular for its rugged, weather-resistant qualities for outdoor use, has stepped inside. Mrs. Jane Berry, area housing and home furnishings specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reported.

"Today, indoor furniture construction methods render redwood furniture equally as suitable for use indoors in recreation and family rooms," Mrs. Berry said.

If shopping for redwood furniture, Mrs. Berry pointed out that the Summer and Casual Furniture Manufacturers Association lists six important considerations.

Redwood should be a deep red color that penetrates far into the wood.

Seating pieces should be free of knots or bark-like material.

Knots should be tight and hard if they appear on barbecue tables and benches.

No knots should appear on edges or end boards.

All edges should be rounded and sanded smooth.

Table tops that are screwed on rather than nailed are a mark of higher quality.

"Both redwood and hardwood furniture are easy to maintain," the Texas A&M University specialist said. "Store hardwood swings, benches and seats during the winter. In summer, hose down the furniture and wax occasionally with past auto wax."

Ford redwood, hose and wash with soap in summer. Then add a coat of penetrating sealer before returning the furniture to the family room.

Varnish or shellac should not be used on redwood furniture pieces, she said.

New Symbol Signs Replace Highway Markers

Austin--A straight line isn't the shortest distance between two points -- if it's painted white or yellow and it's on a Texas highway.

New "symbol" signs and pavement markings have been adopted by the Texas Highway Commission from the revised "Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices" released by the Federal Highway Administration.

In many cases, symbols, shapes and colors have been substituted for words. It is hoped that this will give the message to motorists at a glance and remove language barriers.

The new symbol signs that will replace the old word signs are pretty self-explanatory. For example, the new school sign will be shaped like a schoolhouse and will contain black silhouettes of two children on a yellow background.

The new pavement markings are not as dramatic looking, but are equally important.

There is an easy way to remember them:

Yellow lines will be the only color used for centerline markings on two-way highways--for separating traffic flows in opposite directions. Yellow centerlines have proven to be more visible in for than white stripes.

White will remain on multiple-lane highways -- for separating traffic flows in the same direction as well as on one-way streets.

Red will be used on raised reflective pavement markers and will denote wrong-way movement. IF YOU SEE RED YOU ARE GOING THE WRONG WAY.

All broken (dashed) lines will be permissive in character while the solid lines will be restrictive. The combination of broken and solid yellow stripes will indicate to the motorist what is permitted.

A dashed yellow centerline

will be used where passing is permitted. Two yellow lines, one solid and one dashed, will mark sections where passing is permitted in one direction (the solid yellow line will be on the side restricting passing.)

Two solid yellow lines will be used where passing is prohibited in both directions.

With yellow as the only centerline color on two-way roads and streets drivers will have a continuing color reminder that they should expect traffic in the opposite direction.

Other uses of yellow will include the marking of obstructions and islands which must be passed on the right. Additional uses of white will include the marking of crosswalks and the edge lining of Interstate highways and other types of roads.

City Hires Firm To Study Pool Needs

All Aldermen and City officials were present for the July 10 meeting of the Council. Guests present were Mrs. Brad Beedy, Fred Genthe and Clarence Pettitt.

Mr. Genthe, a swimming pool engineer with the firm of Pascal P. Paddock out of Oklahoma City was present to show pool sketches, filtering systems and talk about different types of pools in what was only a preliminary report to City Councilmen.

The need for a new swimming pool was placed before

the Council two weeks ago when the City Park Board met and recommended a new facility be constructed soon.

After hearing Mr. Genthe's remarks, the Council retained his firm to make a detailed study of what type of swimming pool, what size, location, etc. best suited for Spearman's population. When the Oklahoma firm has all the needed information, Mr. Genthe will present the findings to the Council which will then make some decision.

In an official action Monday night, the Council asked that a letter of condolence be written to the family of Bud Beeson, who died Sunday July 9. The Council asked that this letter be also placed in the official City Minutes. Mr. Beeson served as the Corporate City Judge here for several years.

Aldermen approved James Brown and Terry Pittman to attend the annual Texas A&M Fire School at College Station. Pittman will take a special Fire Marshall course. Mr. Brown will be teaching a course in pump maintenance.

New homes are now being constructed on Linn Drive, located on land between the Blodgett-Linn addition and Glover addition, so water and sewer lines will have to be extended to that area.

The Council approved this extension and asked Mr. Darce Foshee to pursue this plan by getting contractors, estimates, etc. There is gas lines down the alley in that area, but no sewer and water lines.

The following departmental reports for the month of June were heard:

Ambulance--10 runs; 3 in county, 3 to Amarillo, 3 in City and one to Perryton. Court--40 cases were filed. Fines assessed \$466.00.

This was paid with \$5,000 being suspended, \$90,000 jail time, \$16,500 student traffic safety fines, for a total of \$345,500 in money paid.

Police--41 traffic tickets were issued. Made 3 arrests

and investigated 9 vehicle accidents.

Animal Control--picked up 24 animals, destroyed 10 2 were held from May, 14 paid out and 2 held for July.

Fire--2 regular drills were held. Firemen answered 4 city fires, one County fire and were called to the scene of 2 motor vehicle accidents.

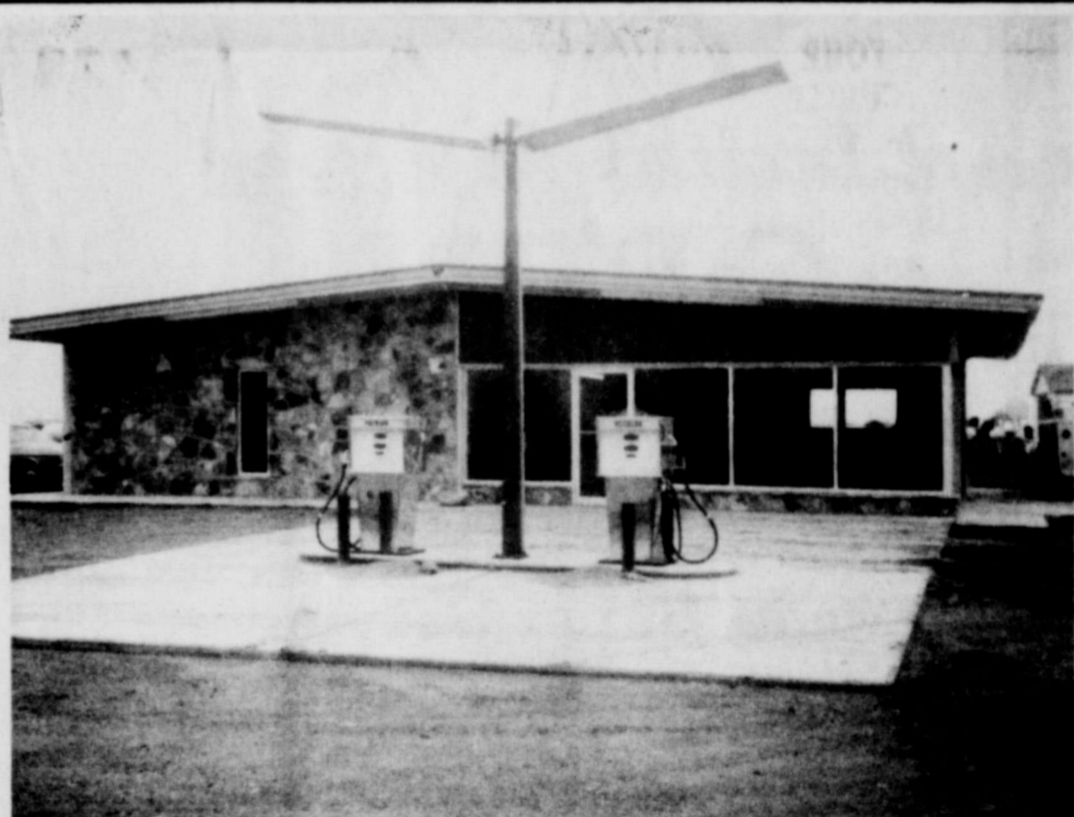
