A slight change was made in the Electrical Ordinance, as recommended by the local building and electrical committee.

The commission discussed the need for land owners to clean their lots in town and dispose of all junked cars.

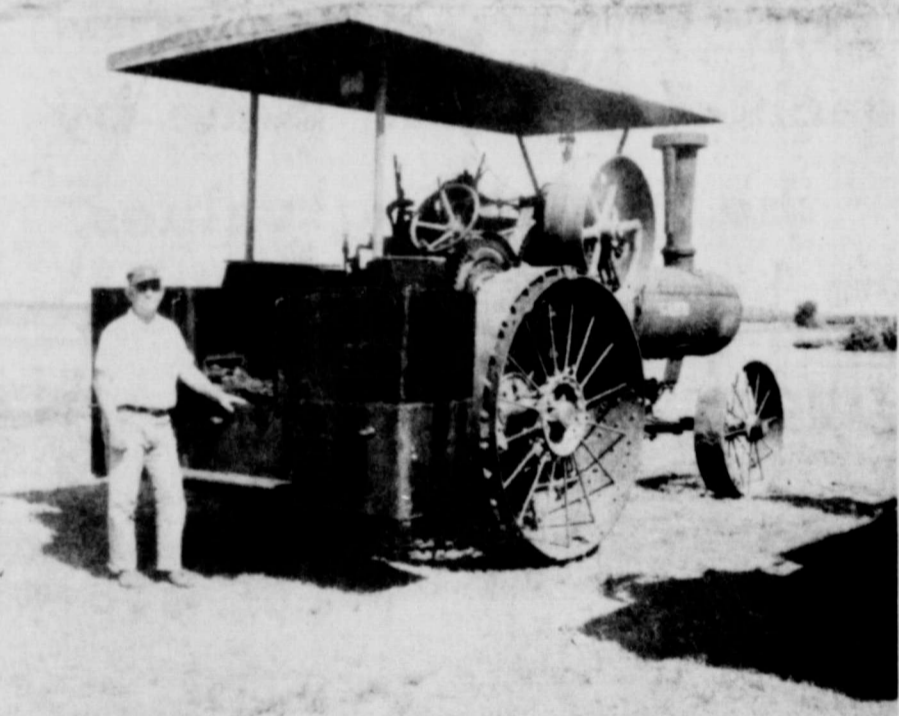

Wilbanks, who staged the wheat threshing demonstration last year using his old 1913 Model, 60 HP Case steam engine, found so many people interested in the event, he promised a repeat performance.

The Spearman farmer who lives some 4 miles east on FM 769, has around 2,300 wheat bundles loaded on wagons, and if the weather will cooperate, will begin threshing around one o'clock Sunday with "live steam." Everyone is invited to come out and watch the old steam engine Case chew up these bundles and spit out the grain.

Mr. and Mrs. Wilbanks, who are square dance enthusiasts (J.D. is a professional caller) have a big show planned for Saturday night when the Panhandle Camping Squares will be there. Mr. Jim Haden, who suffered a heart attack last week was transferred from Perryton Hospital a few days ago to St. Anthony Hospital in Amarillo. Mr. Haden, father of Billy Haden of Spearman, is in serious condition.

School Budget Set For Coming Year

The school board approved the 1972-73 budget at their regular meeting Tuesday night.

The total budget calls for an expenditure of \$1,214,647 for the coming school term, and an expected revenue of \$1,199,688.

The deficit will be absorbed by reserve funds on hand.

The new budget reflects an increase of some \$41,000 over last year's budget, primarily due to the increase in teacher salaries.

Anticipated expenses show payroll costs the major item, with a figure of \$782,261.00. Other items are: Services \$75,236.00; Supplies \$63,000.00; Others, (student activities, athletics, etc.) \$98,099.00; Debt \$151,034.00; Equipment \$44,507.00.

Expected revenue from local sources (taxes) for the coming school term, \$892,317.00. Expected revenue from the State, \$300,471.00.

Four evaporative air conditioners (21,000 cfm each) have been installed in the Junior High building this summer at a cost of \$4,000.00.

The Junior High Auditorium has been remodeled to provide better facilities for music classes. This cost was \$1,700.00.

A walk-in freezer, \$2,800.00 was installed at the Junior High Cafeteria so the lunchrooms can have a place to store the frozen commodities. In the past this food has been stored in a freezing unit in Borger, with trips having to be made twice a week to pick up lunchroom foods.

Other improvements made this summer at the Spearman public schools have included the usual painting, repairing and up-keep activities needed annually.

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis.

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Section 1-b, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: Section 1-b. (a) Three thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes.

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly inducted. He shall be at least thirty-five years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election.

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows: Section 2. (a) When the Legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The Legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission.

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article I of the Texas Constitution be amended by adding a new Section 3a, to read as follows: Section 3a. Equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin. This amendment is self-operative.

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40.

BICYCLE DEATHS GROWING CONCERN

Bicycling? "Ride on," say more and more Texans who have switched to the two-wheeled vehicle for cheap, clean and healthy transportation. It is a now solution to some of the state's social problems, but the bike-riding phenomenon is not without its own problems. The tremendous growth in the use of the bicycle has been accompanied by a similar increase in biking accidents and fatalities, says the Insurance Information Institute.

The problem could become far worse, warns the Institute. Bicycling is more than just a flourishing craze. It is clean recreation, good exercise, economic transportation and will reach new heights in popularity.

At present levels of popularity, the injury and death toll from cycling mishaps is high. Texas had 31 persons killed and 1,780 injured as a result of 1,855 bicycle accidents in 1971. Early figures show that 1972 cycling accidents and fatalities are likely to be even higher.

Statistics show that in most bicycle accidents the cyclist violates a traffic law. This inattention or failure to yield the right of way accounts for the largest number of mishaps, according to the Institute. In less than one-third of bike accidents, the motor vehicle driver violates a traffic rule or regulation.

Rural bicycling accidents generally are more severe. Though most accidents occur on city streets, more than 50 per cent of the fatalities and a large percentage of the serious injuries occur in rural areas. Bike riders should obey all the traffic laws and familiarize themselves with safety precautions of bicycling, the Institute suggests. At the same time, the Institute encourages motorists to watch out for the bike rider.

Local Citizens Well Insured

In most families, it is found, there is a direct relationship between their income and the amount of insurance they hold. The total carried by the average family in the state is equivalent to 25.9 months of income, after taxes.

Applies to Hansford County and to the average income reported for its area, the estimated life insurance locally is \$30,000 per family. This is about twice as much as most families had ten years ago and is well above the amount in many parts of the country.

It tops the \$21,800 per family elsewhere in the United States and the \$22,200 in the State of Texas. Of the grand total of \$63,580,000 carried by the local population, the bulk is in ordinary insurance. Group insurance, generally taken out by employers for the benefit of their employees, is in second place.

Americans, generally, have more financial safeguards than they did in earlier years. Insurance is but one of the steps they have been taking to protect their future. They have, at the same time, been increasing their cash savings and their investments.

Mail Service Not Dependable Says Senator Bentsen

Every day I become more disturbed by continuing reports to my office that the quality of mail service in Texas is deteriorating rapidly. And the same thing seems to be true in other parts of the country.

Constituents report that many smaller post offices--facilities that are vital as community centers as well as for their intended function--are being closed.

Tremendous reductions in work force are reported. And as the number of these dedicated, conscientious workers decreases, there is a resulting curtailment of mail service which seems particularly acute in rural areas.

And postal workers are caught in the middle; unhappy that they are not able to provide the service they have in the past. In Congressional testimony earlier this Summer, James H. Rademacher, President of the National Association of Letter Carriers, listed several specific instances of reductions in postal services.

CUTBACKS IN MAIL COLLECTION--For example, he said that the Postal Service today devotes 13,000 hours less daily to mail collection than it did five years ago.

He also pointed out that many Americans are complaining about cutbacks in services offered at postal windows. And he said one of the results is that the U.S. Postal Service is losing out in competition for the parcel post business.

Rademacher noted that, in 1967, the Post Office Department delivered twice the number of parcels that were delivered by its strongest competitor, the privately-owned United Parcel Service.

Last year, though--for the first time in history--United Parcel delivered more parcels than the U.S. Postal Service. And it delivered them at a profit of more than \$30 million.

In addition to apparent reductions in service, I am also receiving disturbing reports about starting slowdowns in delivery time for first-class mail.

Real County Judge W.B. Sansom of Leakey, Texas, informs my office that today it takes 10 hours longer for a letter mailed from Leakey to reach Uvalde than it did in 1964.

Judge Sansom explains the reason is that mail for Uvalde--41 miles from Leakey--doesn't go direct. It is routed, instead, through San Antonio, a distance of more than 200 miles. And the situation in Leakey is likely to get worse, according to Judge Sansom.

His town's post office lost all of its postal clerks in a cutback as of June 30, leaving only the postmaster to handle all the mail. Another Texas constituent has described a situation in which a lady in his town mailed a check to pay her laundry bill. The check was mailed on a Friday, but didn't arrive at the laundry--a few blocks away--until the following Tuesday.

The apparent reason for this is that the letter was sent to a regional processing center, in a city some distance away, then returned to her town for delivery. MAIL DELIVERY NOT DEPENDABLE--Mail service in Texas also seems to have become very undependable, with letters arriving in a single day in some instances, but requiring three, four or more days at other times. A District Judge has told

No Funds Available For Texas Elections

1972 primary elections," said Bullock. "But, we have flat run out of money before all the costs have been paid."

"This has put many local county chairmen between a rock and a hard place. A lot of election workers, not to mention printers and other supplies, have yet to be paid for their work."

Bullock said about \$325,000 is needed to cover the remaining costs statewide. "We believe the only fair way to disburse the remaining monies is on a pro-rata basis. This means that each county chairman who still has an outstanding expense for the primaries will receive a disbursement which amounts to 26.66 per cent of their remaining bills."

"When we have paid all the county chairmen, we will not have one cent remaining of the \$2,150,000 appropriated to pay for conducting the 1972 primary elections," Bullock said.

Bullock said that the remaining expenses "apparently will have to ride" until the 63rd Legislature, which meets in January, can take action on the situation. "I can find no other source of funds available at this time."

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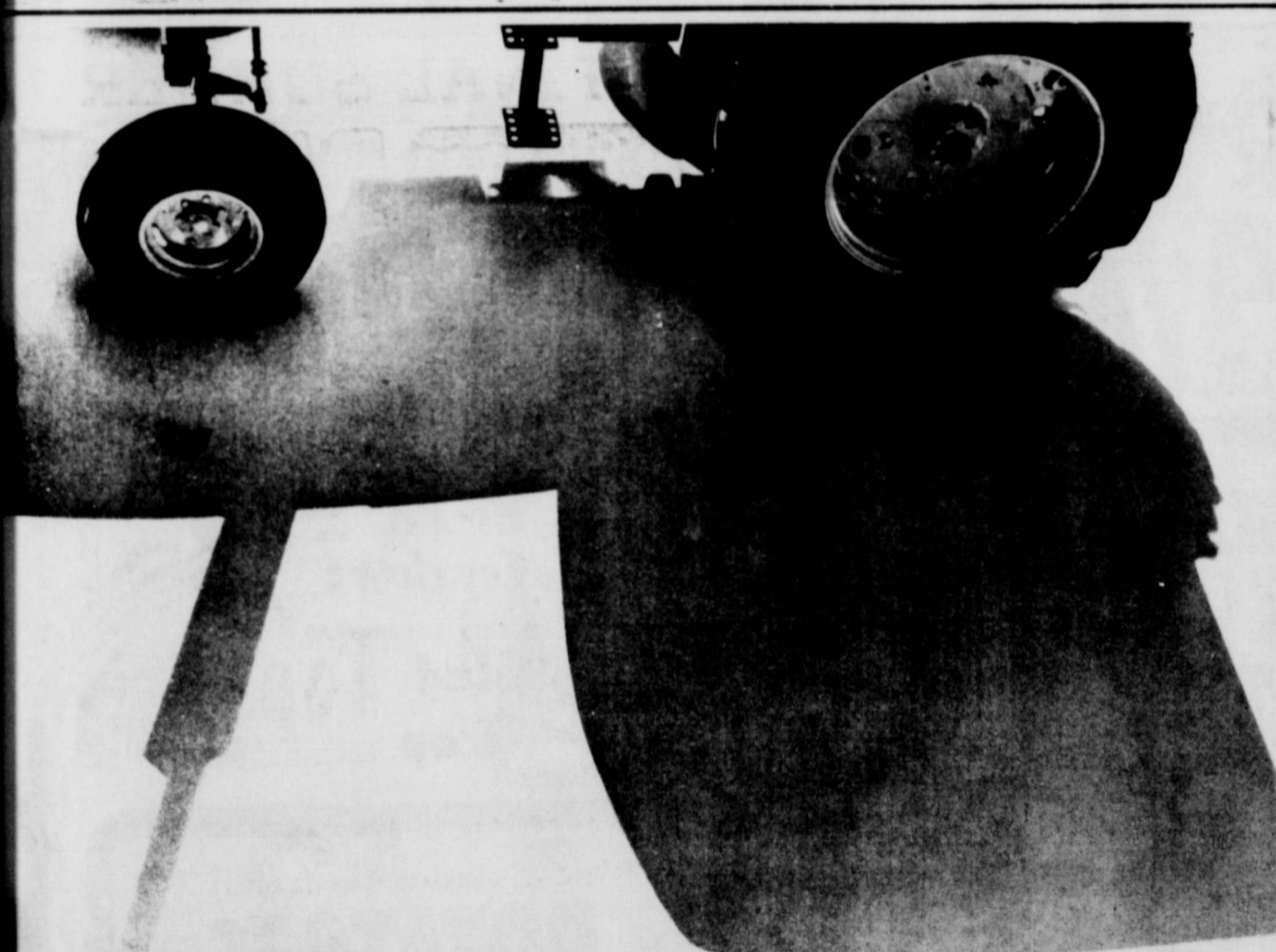

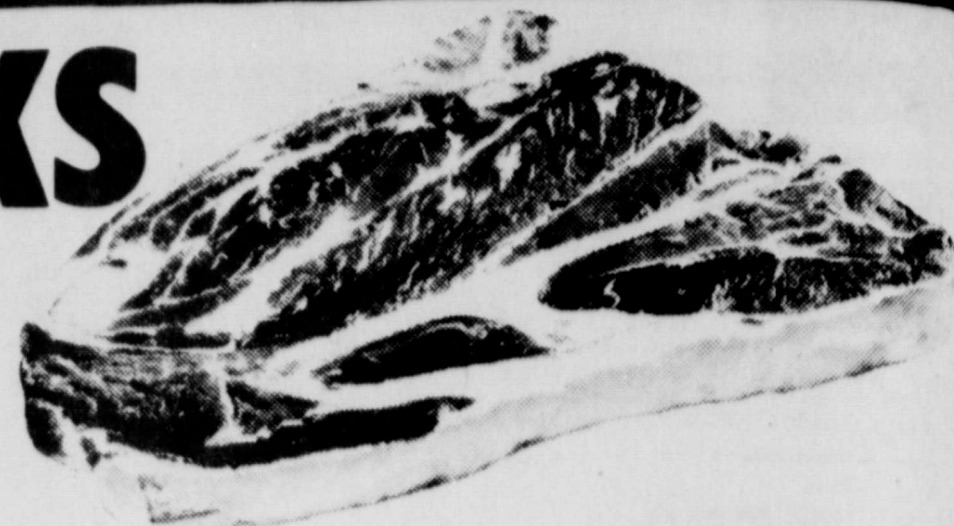
