Apparently, if you need a license, you will have to drive to Perryton or Borger.

After the regular meeting Monday evening, an executive session was called by Mayor Hackley to discuss city personnel.

1020 Students Enrolled Here

With the second day of school and enrollment in the finishing stages, Spearman school principals said Tuesday that 1,020 students are on the rolls for this new school term 1972-73.

Total enrollment is down 103 students from last year. This loss is accounted for in the elementary and grade schools. Elementary principal Allen Alford, who predicted last year a lower student count for 1972, dropped one first grade this year. He has 320 students enrolled now. In 1971 he had 384 and in 1970 there were 415.

Principal Eddie Clemmons enrolled Monday 350 in junior high. In 1971 these grades had 398 students, while there were only 375 in 1970.

High school has seemed to hold its own, enrollment wise, for the past three years. Monday 350 students enrolled. In 1971 there were 341 high school students and 350 in 1970.

Sixteen new students were enrolled in high school Monday, so many new faces are noted there.

Each principal said he expects a few more students to enroll yet, most of these after the Labor Day holiday September 4.

The loss of 112 students from the grades, and a gain of nine high school students, accounts for the 103 drop from last year. This much of a student drop does not mean that many families have moved away from Spearman. It does indicate that the years during which families had fewer number of children, are just now making a difference in lower-grade enrollment figures.

Mr. Patterson died Monday night from injuries he received in a car wreck Sunday afternoon near Springfield, Mo.

A native of Spearman Community, he had lived in Republic, Mo., for 24 years. He was a farmer.

Survivors include his wife, 2 sons and one daughter; 3 brothers: Otis, Medlin, and Sam Patterson all of Spearman and one sister, Mrs. Virginia Sparks also of Spearman.

Dr. D. E. Hackley informed the newspaper Tuesday of this week that he is filing suit for the right to be "granted equal staff privileges on the basis that I am licensed by the State of Texas for the practice of medicine and surgery in said state." This is the basis for the entire suit, stated Dr. Hackley.

Dr. Hackley wants to use the facilities at the local Hansford Hospital.

Dr. Hackley's last application to use the hospital facilities were filed in January of 1972. He said the application was never granted or denied. The letter that he received from the hospital, stated the action of the hospital staff, deferred action, referring to their by-laws-stating eligibility for staff privileges, was only to those "with MD degrees." Hackley stated that this has been held unconstitutional in higher courts.

A docket hearing on the case has been set for September 11th, and the legal interpretations and arguments have been set for September 15th. Presumably, the hearings will be held in Hansford County, in 84th district court.

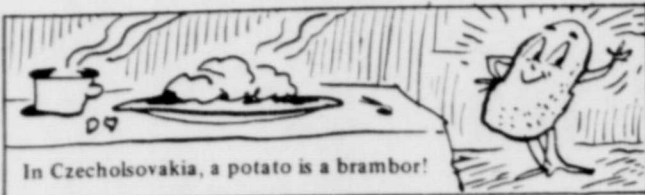

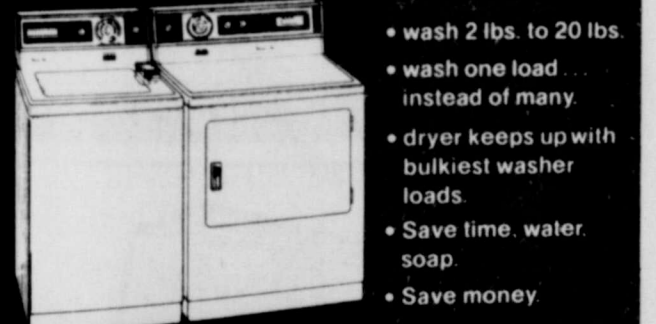

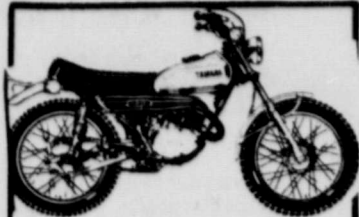

Hansford Co. Eligible For EDA Assistance

Price announced today that Economic Development Administration has today determined that the following North Texas area counties are statistically qualified as EDA development areas: Armstrong, Hansford, Lipscomb, Bailey, Tarrant, and Foard.

Official notification of this determination will be made to appropriate county officials in the form of letters which will be mailed by EDA.

Information regarding this determination was incorrectly and unofficially released early in August at a time when final determination for eligibility had not yet been made.

"I have been working closely with EDA officials in an attempt to expedite progress in the processing of these certifications, and I am personally contacting the counties involved to advise them of this official determination," the Congressman commented.

Once notified of eligibility, affected counties will be allowed to formulate an overall economic development plan which upon approval by the EDA qualifies the counties for

official EDA designation for assistance.

This newspaper received the following information via long distance telephone from the office of Senator John Tower Monday, August 28.

The Economic Development Administration has informed Senator John Tower that 18 Texas counties not now participating in EDA programs, are statistically eligible for assistance upon application by local officials.

Hansford County is among these 18 counties.

EDA, an arm of U. S. Department of Commerce, obtained authority under an amendment earlier in this Congress to the Public Works and Economic Development Act to qualify for designation as "redevelopment areas" any county which has suffered a decline in the population of employed persons of more than 1.2% over the 10-year period covered by the 1970 census.

Upon designation the counties would be eligible to receive EDA assistance designed to bolster local economy.

Census Department figures made available to EDA showed Hansford County to

be statistically eligible under the new law for designation as a redevelopment area.

EDA informed Senator Tower it would be sending a representative to meet with local officials in Hansford County to fully explain available EDA assistance.

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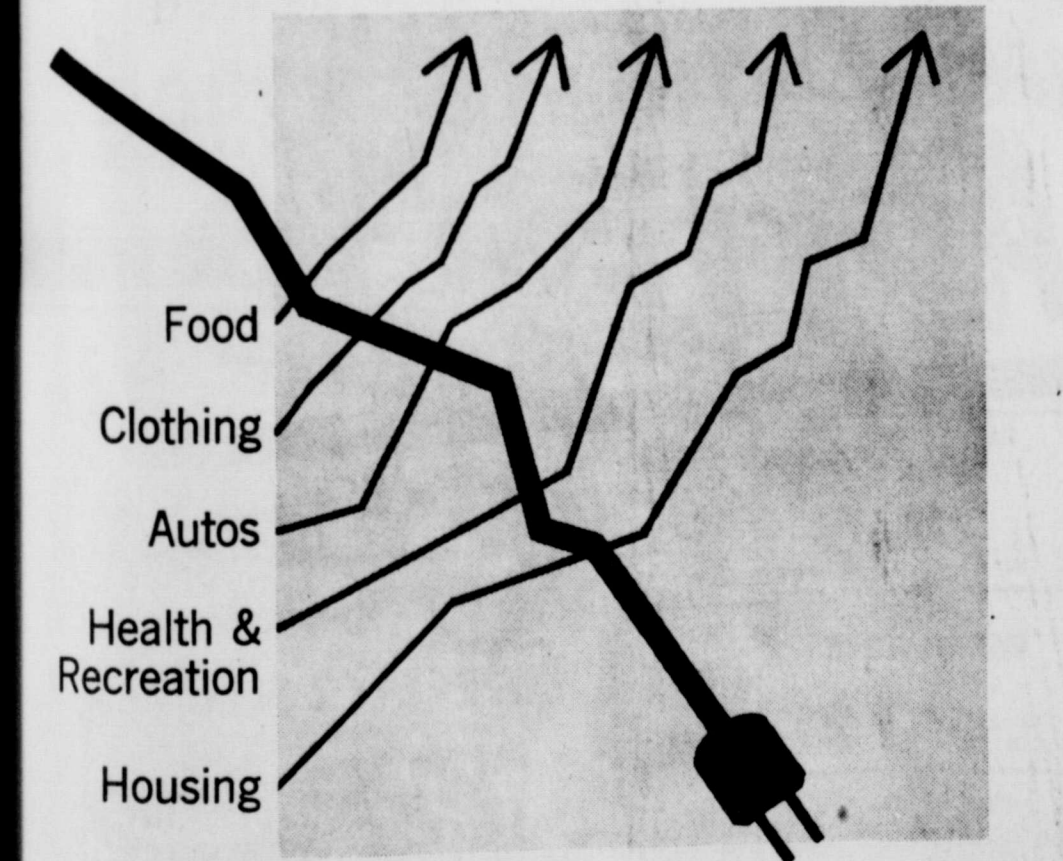
