

Lynx Meet Canyon In Buffalo Bowl, Friday

The Spearman Lynx will meet the district 1-AAA defending champions at Canyon Friday evening, 8 p.m. The game is rated as one of the best in the area for the week. Coaches report that the Eagles are big and although they don't have as much speed as the Lynx, they make it up on power. Last year the Lynx almost upset the big Canyon team, losing in a disputed call. The Lynx claimed to have scored on an off-tackle play, when Latham dashed into the end zone, but it was ruled as his forward motion was stopped by the Eagles. Coach Mires and his charges worked hard for the opening game this year. In their opening scrimmage with Guyana, Spearman outscored the boys very impressively. In a game with Texhoma Saturday evening, the teams almost tied on even terms, with the Lynx finally outscoring the Red 16-0; the Lynx B team also beat the Texhoma B's in the statistics department, both teams were rather impressive. The Lynx made 10 downs, and Texhoma made 11 first downs. Spearman was very, very impressive with passing, completing 3 out


of 5 for 66 yards; Texhoma completed 5 out of 9 for 63 yards; and had one intercepted. Texhoma lost the ball on fumbles 2 times and the Lynx 1 time. Coach Mires will pursue this opening game with vigor. He is ready, and he knows that the biggest crowd of the year will be on hand to get their first look at the two teams. Mires and his men are in good shape, physically for this game, barring any team injuries this week. Fans who attend the game at Canyon Friday will get to see two of the finest bands in the land perform at half-time. "BAGGIES" FOR MEN

"Baggies" invading the pant scene in men's fashions mark the biggest change in the bottom half of menswear since flares flooded the market during the 60's, according to one fashion expert. Through their influence is widespread, its appearance in menswear is the big news. Mrs. Becky Culp, Texas Agricultural Extension Service clothing specialist, described the new fashion in detail and viewed its impact. "A baggie is a pant that fits snugly over the seat and falls free to bottom hem widths averaging 24-28 inches. Cuffs two to three inches wide, pleats and a waistline higher than that of conventional hip-hugging jeans are other major component parts of the look," she said. Currently, most widely accepted by youth, baggies coordinate with skinny-rib tops and layered looks. Also it's having a strong impact on women's pant fashions, the Texas A&M University specialist noted of the new design. "Perhaps most important, baggies bring back the pleat and wide cuff to pants. For the more sophisticated and mature consumer--male or female--the fuller pant leg makes a more flattering, dressier and less teenage look. "Baggies provide one look among many from which the customer can choose--their introduction doesn't necessarily mean other pant styles, such as flares and straight legs, are no longer fashionable," Mrs. Culp pointed out. Turning to cost factor of the new fashion look, the specialist eyed the consumer role in "absorbing expenses." "As new fashions are introduced, the consumer absorbs added manufacturing, designing and styling expenses. Baggies are no exception. "Retail prices average 15 per cent higher for jeans and 20 per cent for slacks. Consumers generally are more willing to pay 'a little extra' for current and new fashions, Mrs. Culp added. "Baggies didn't just happen, the specialist said citing three factors in their creation. First, pant styling had reached a standstill with the wide-reaching acceptance of the flare. Second, a nostalgic influence from the 40's and 50's had penetrated other major fashion looks for both men and women, and third, the baggie is a more attractive and becoming fashion look for the majority of people. "Major manufacturers, retailers and designers are staking baggies as the look for today's fashion scene, but actual consumer purchases in dollar votes will determine the fashion life and significance of baggies," Mrs. Culp predicted. "One fact is certain--baggies have already made an impact."

Glover President Choral Directors

B. Jack Glover, choral director at Cooper High, has been appointed president of the Southwestern Division of the American Choral Directors Association. An article appearing in the May issue of the official publication of the ACDA, "The Choral Journal," announces Glover's appointment to the post. Glover said in an interview last week that the duties of the position are "the usual chores of the president of any organization." "Duties this year will include coordinating plans of our Southwestern Division with that of the other ACDA divisions in the United States in planning our national convention in Kansas City in March of 1973," he said. "It also will include making plans for the divisional convention which is scheduled for 1974 in Dallas," he added. The choral directors' association sponsors a yearly workshop in Europe in conjunction with its European counterpart. It also provides commissions for composers who are writing new choral works, Glover said, and provides funds for research projects in the field of music education. THE ASSOCIATION publishes the journal which serves both as a source of news of interest to choral directors in the nation and also publishes scholarly works about choral art, Glover said. The Southwestern Division of the association includes Texas, Arkansas, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado and New Mexico. Glover's immediate past president of the Texas Choral Directors Association, immediate past president of the Texas branch of the American Choral Directors Association, and has previously been second vice-president of TCDA and managing editor of the "Texas Choralmaster," the official magazine of TCDA. Glover also holds membership in the Texas Music Educators Association, the Music Educators National Conference, the National Association of Teachers of Singing and is an alumnus of Phi Mu Alpha, Sinfonia.

Let Me See
by Sybil...

For the first time in 25 years we took a Labor Day holiday here at the newspaper. Monday holidays have never been observed in our business for this leaves only Tuesday to get news, set it up, compose all the ads and have this all done by 5 p. m. since we print early Wednesday morning. I don't know but what it was a blessing instead. Busy people are happy people. Hard work never hurt anyone. One of the most pleasant feelings we can experience is that of accomplishment... via toil.

Both the Bible and history put a premium on work. It is one of God's commandments... "six days shalt thou labor..." Following this he said we could rest ONE day. In the New Testament we read Paul's commandment "If any would not work, neither should he eat."

These are strange words for today's welfare-slanted society. But if you would take a look at all the people who ever achieved a great deal in life, you would find their secret was "hard work."

Henry Ford built a multi-million dollar business on this philosophy "I do not believe that man can ever leave his business. He ought to think of it by day and dream of it at night... thinking men know that work is the salvation of the race, morally, physically, socially. Work does more than get us a living; it gets us a life."

There is no substitute for work. If one is to be happy and successful at anything, he must work at it. Catherine Marie Cox made a study of 300 great people. She states that in the average high school there are students who match the native intelligence of Lincoln, Washington, Luther, Cromwell, and many others. Why then do so few stand out and achieve later in life? She answers: "Youth who achieve eminence are characterized not only by high intellectual traits, but also by persistence and hard work."

Too much is said today about "overwork" and not enough about "underwork." Today labor is yelling continually about too much work and not enough pay. They have reduced God's six days down to as few as 4 days a week in many labor plants. This is giving the people more idle time, to spend more money, to go into debt more deeply, to yell the more loudly for more money to meet the ever rising cost of living placed on us all by those who put in too few hours of work!

In the early days of our nation, school books taught the consequences of idleness thusly: "he was despised by every one, and became a poor wanderer, without money and without friends. Such are the wages of idleness."

As compared to the advantages of the industrious person, an early McGuffey school reader points out this lesson: "Charles studied hard and graduated at the top of his class. Many situations of usefulness and profit were opened to him. He was universally respected. He is still a useful and happy man. He has a cheerful home and is esteemed by all who know him. Such are the rewards of industry. How strange it is that any person should be willing to

live in idleness when it will certainly make him unhappy! The idle boy is almost invariably poor and miserable; and the industrious boy is happy and prosperous.

"But perhaps some child who reads this asks 'does God notice little children in school?' He certainly does. And if he is not diligent in the improvement of your time, it is one of the surest evidences that your heart is not right with God. You are placed in this world to improve your time. In youth you must be preparing for future usefulness. And if you do not improve the advantages you enjoy, you sin against your maker."

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

HANSFORD COUNTY IS REDEVELOPMENT AREA

Washington, D.C. -- Senator Lloyd Bentsen acted today to expedite Federal assistance to 18 Texas counties that experienced decreases in both population and employment during the 1960's.

"Because of the decreases," Bentsen explained, "these counties are eligible to be designated as 'redevelopment areas' which would entitle them to receive grants, loans and loan guarantees under the Public Works and Economic

Development Act."

"I am working to speed up the process."

Counties affected in Texas are Armstrong, Bailey, Cochran, Dawson, Edwards, Fisher, Floyd, Foard, Hansford, Hudspeth, Lipscomb, Lynn, Menard, Motley, Presidio, Reeves, Stephens and Terrell.

Senator Bentsen has contacted directors of the State Planning Regions in which each of these counties are located, asking them to coordinate efforts to obtain 'redevelop-

ment area' designation.

"I have asked the Individual Planning Region directors to arrange meetings between county officials and representatives of the federal government's Economic Development Administration," Bentsen said.

"I have also offered the services of my office for any assistance that may be required. In this way we can hopefully speed up the designation process and make additional aid available more quickly than otherwise."

1/2 cup coarsely chopped nuts
1/4 teaspoon almond extract
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
Melt chocolate and 3 tablespoons butter over very low heat, stirring constantly. Cool. Cream remaining butter with the cream cheese until softened. Gradually add 1/4 cup sugar creaming until light and fluffy. Stir in 1 egg, 1 tablespoon flour, and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla until blended.

Beat remaining eggs until fluffy and light in color. Gradually add remaining 3/4 cup sugar, beating until thickened. Fold in baking powder, salt, and remaining 1/2 cup flour. Blend in cooled chocolate mixture. Stir in nuts, almond extract and remaining 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Measure 1 cup chocolate batter and set aside. Spread remaining chocolate batter in a greased 9-inch square pan. Pour cheese mixture over the top. Drop measured chocolate batter from tablespoon onto the cheese mixture; swirl the mixtures together with a spatula just to marble. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 35 to 40 minutes. Cool. Cut in squares or bars. Cover and store in the refrigerator. Makes about 20 brownies.


