Road Will Be Paved

Contract for highway construction in Hansford County has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

Ivan Dement, Inc. of Amarillo was awarded the contract. This low bid was \$171,475.47.

The work which is scheduled to begin next summer, will be under the supervision of District Engineer Charles W. Smith.

The contract calls for grading, structures, base and surfacing on 6.4 miles of Farm to Market road number 3214 in Hansford County. The project begins 2 miles East of the Panhandle-Eastern plant, then south and will connect with the paved road which runs north from the Spearman airport, providing an all-paved road to Hardesty, Okla.

Lewis R. Loyd of Perryton is the Highway Dept. engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 120 working days.

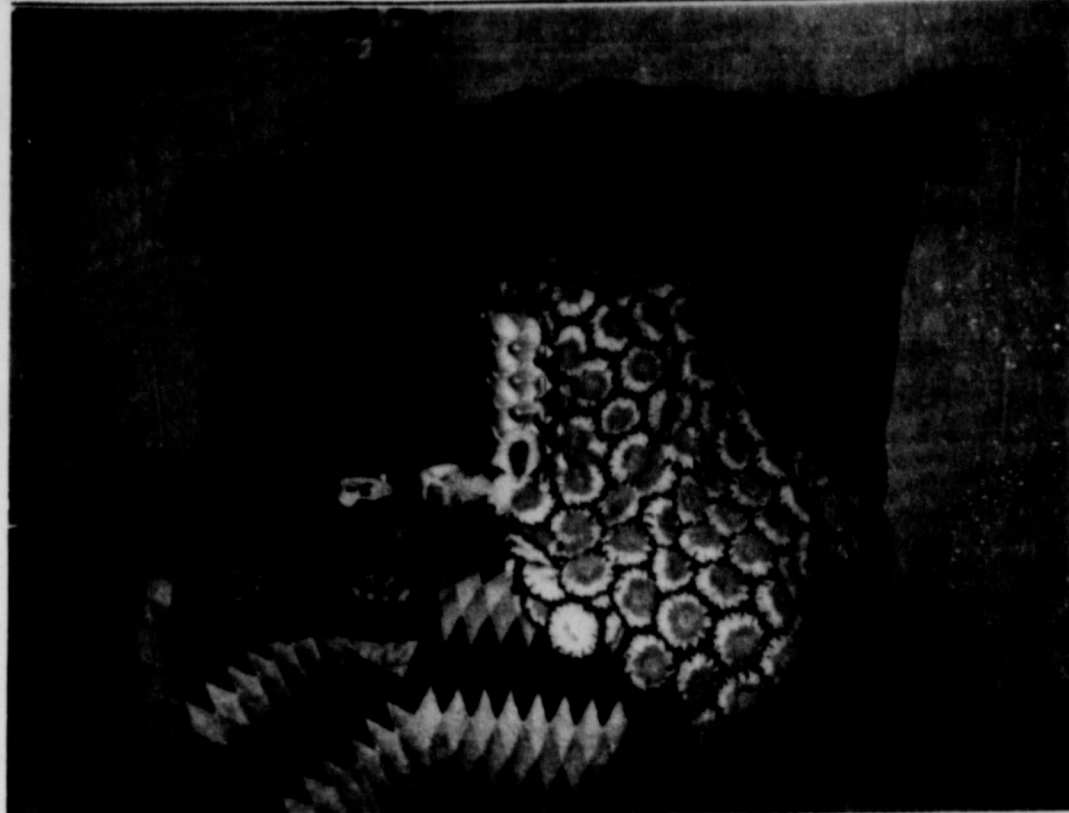
A native of Collin County, Mrs. Alexander moved with her family to Sherman County in 1901. She moved to Hansford County when she

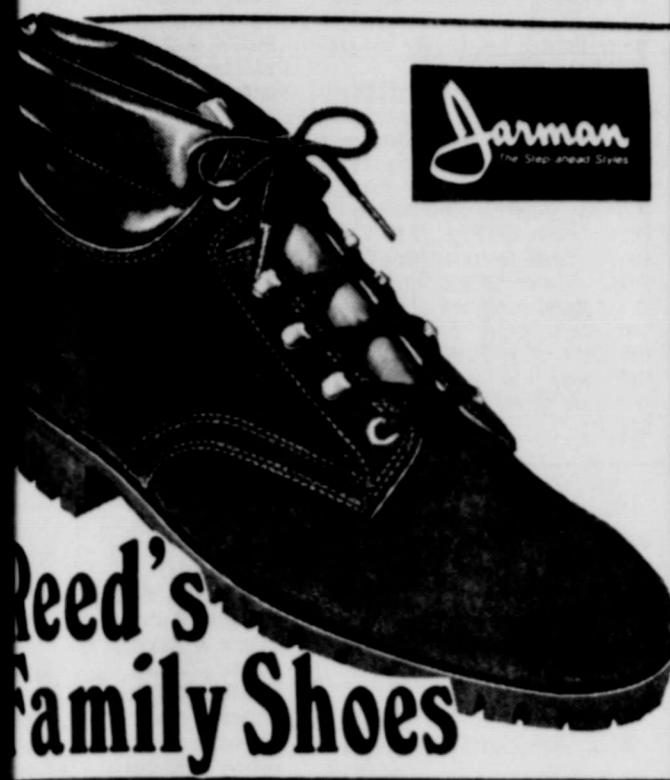

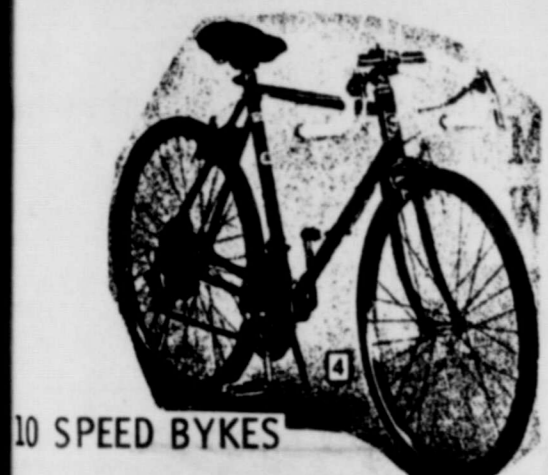

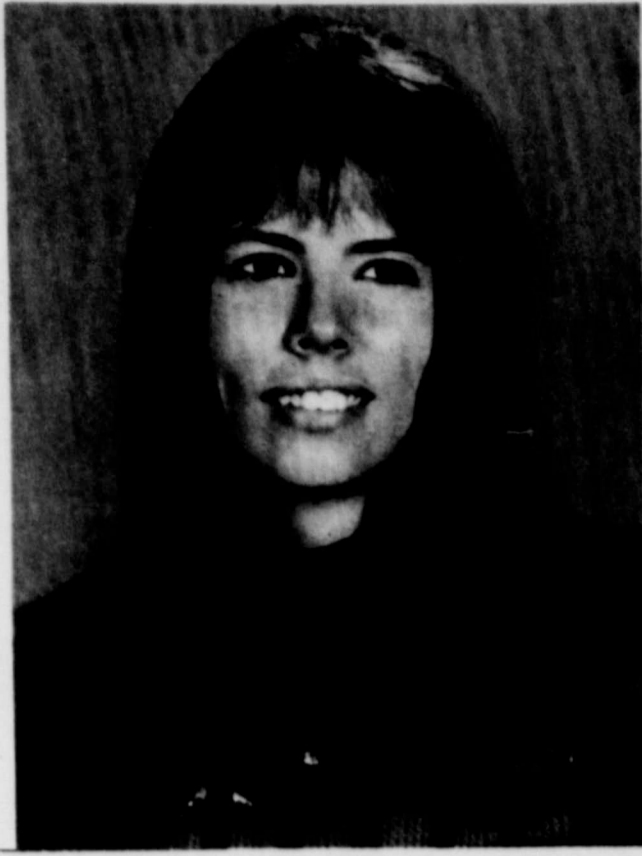

Both Mrs. Davis and I agreed Monday that these McGuffey school books need to be used in our schools today. What these early day books taught, is sadly lacking in our generation.

news from your HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

by Nelle Evans

As the holiday season approaches you are probably planning foods for the season. To help you we have available for 35¢ a very helpful bulletin "Christmas Time At Home" included are suggested menus for parties, buffets, open houses, etc.; suggestions for food gifts and how to wrap them; recipes for appetizers, beverages, breads, cakes, candies, confections, cookies, main dishes, pies, puddings and salads. There is also a page of helpful hints on management of holiday activities such as sending cards, gifts, entertainment, trips, decorating and financing. You will find this 31 page bulletin worth your 35¢ investment.

This is the time of year for apples. For variety why not make apple meat balls. Mix together 1 lb. ground beef, 1 cup fresh grated apple, 1 cup dry bread crumbs, 2 beaten eggs, 1 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Shape into 1 1/2 inch balls and place in casserole. Cover with a cup of tomato juice. Bake 1 hour

at 375F. Or use thinned cream of mushroom soup.

To help you determine if a knit fabric is a good buy take your ruler to the fabric shop. Determine the fabric stability by gripping the knit fabric and ruler in your left hand, four inches from the raw edge. Then stretch the fabric toward the right and measure how much it stretches.

If the stretch is no more than half an inch, the fabric is stable; 1 1/2 inches means its moderately stretchy; and more than 1 1/4 inches means it is very stretchy.

After determining stability check the back of the pattern envelope to see if the fabric is suitable for the chosen style.

While checking the fabric stability you can also check its recovery ability. If it springs back to its original shape as soon as you let it go it has good recovery ability and won't "grow" during construction. If it doesn't snap right back you must use special care in sewing and handling it.

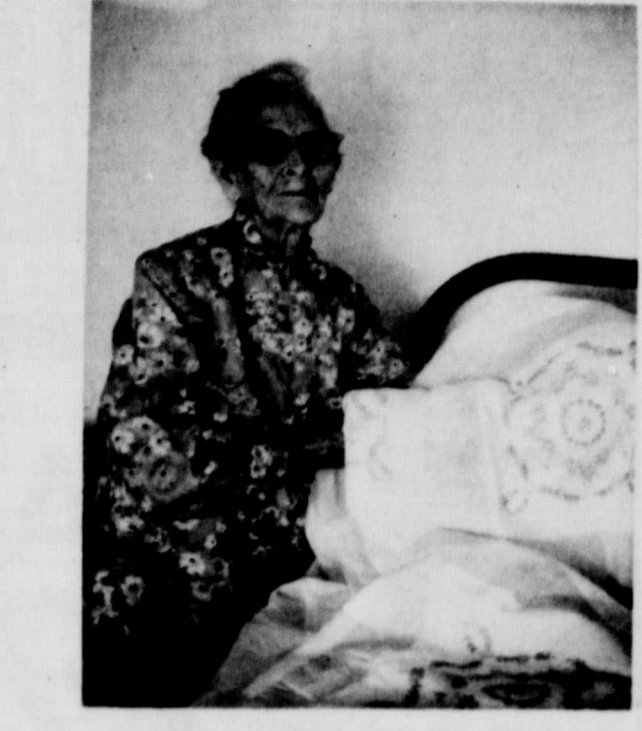

Nonagenarian Leads Busy Active Life

In the year 1876 the United States of America was observing its 100th year anniversary of the nation's founding.

On November 6th of that year Mrs. Hettie Davis was born. Monday of this week this little little Spearman woman celebrated her 96th birthday.

When this reporter walked into her sparkling, neat, clean little home at 308 South Archer street Monday, the delicious aroma of turnip greens and baking bread filled the air. She had stopped her quilting long enough to prepare herself a "bite to eat."

Her husband, Walter Davis, died in 1966. She has lived alone since that time. She might admit that at times she has been lonely, but she has never been idle. She does all her own house work. In her spare time she embroiders quilt blocks, but these together into a beautiful bed cover and mounts it in the quilting frame which has its permanent place in her sunny back room. Monday she was quilting one which was about half finished. Each spring she puts in a large garden. She grows enough squash, tomatoes, okra, butter beans and turnips to give her family and has enough to can. When her fruit trees in the orchard bear she cans this! This year she said she had several apples but "only 4 peaches." It just wasn't a fruit year.

The mail man brought Mrs. Davis a package Monday afternoon. It was a package of quilt scraps from some of her relatives in Little Rock. She was very proud to get them.

Mrs. Davis--Hettie to all who know her--was born in Ashley County, Arkansas. She had three brothers and three sisters. The family lived in a log house, built by her father. The home consisted of two big rooms (a living room and the bedroom) and a side room which was where they cooked and ate. This kitchen area had a large, walk-in fireplace where they did all their cooking in iron pots which hung from a rod over the fire. Their baking was done in iron ovens. These 3-legged baking chambers stood on the hearth. The fire was always made from hickory logs, for these provided the best coals for the baking ovens.

Her mother carded cotton and wool into thread, then wove it into cloth. Some of this she dyed brown with oak bark. The dye was "set" by washing the cloth in warm alum water. "So everything we wore was brown... brown stockings, brown bonnets, brown dresses." Shoes were very hard to come by. They went to a shoe cobbler for their foot wear. He measured their foot, then made them high-topped, laced shoes, using 3-ply of leather for the sole. "We really took care of our shoes. Once a month when a preacher came to our school house to hold services, we walked barefoot until we got to church, then we put on our shoes. When church was over, we pulled them off again and carried them home." Shoe leather was soft, and didn't last long. But the cobbler put a brass toe plate on each one, so that the toes would not wear through so soon.

Hettie was 25 years old when she married Walter Davis. He was 26. They were married by the County Clerk in Mist, Ark. on June 9, 1902. They lived in Knowles, Oklahoma until 1923 when they moved to Spearman. Walter opened up a wholesale oil business, at the exact site where the Davis Oil Company is located now. He retired after 45 years, and turned over the business to his son Jimmy who operated this business until just two years ago. Jimmy's grandsons now manage the oil company.

The 96-year old Mrs. Davis says she has lived a good, happy and healthy life. "I feel good and keep in shape because I work hard and ask the Lord to bless me," was her explanation. Her eyesight is perfect and so is her hearing. She says she has not been ill since 1938 when physicians found she was suffering from anemia. Since that time she

has had monthly "liver shots and B-12 shots and this keeps me going." The only time in her life she has been hospitalized was about 3 years ago when she fell and broke her arm. It healed quickly. She went to the polls and voted Tuesday.

"I am a Republican, because all my family were Republicans," she remarked. Mrs. Davis has two sons: Jimmy and Willard, both of Spearman; three daughters: Cornelia Phillips of Denver, Zella Close of Van Nuys, Calif., and Earlene Mack of Amarillo.

The five generations of her family include 17 grandchildren, 36 great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren.

In 1976, this Nation will celebrate its Bicentennial of the American Revolution, the 200th anniversary of this country's founding. That year Hettie Davis will be 100 years old. It will also be another presidential election year. She plans to go to the polls and vote her Republican convictions, and help celebrate America's 200th birthday.

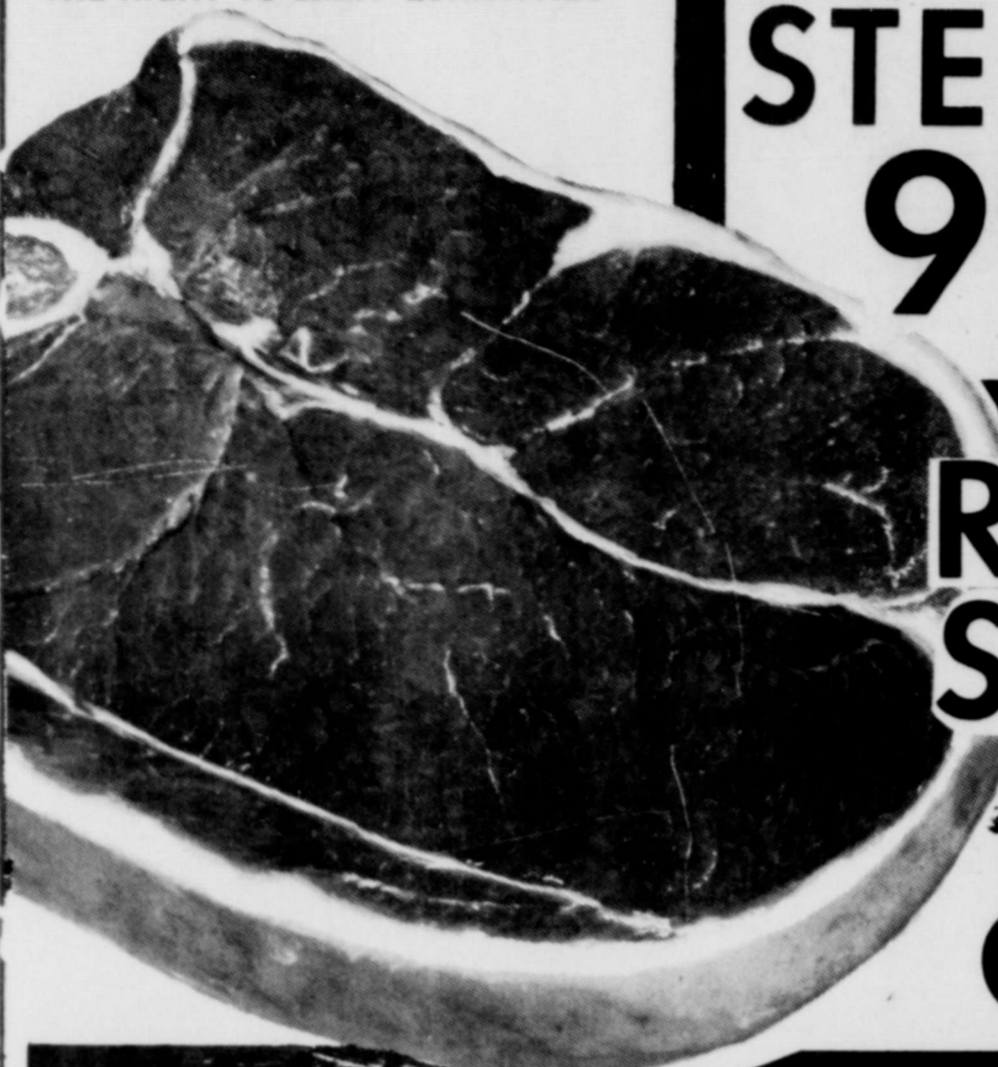
