Seventeen-year old Ann Marie Steyn, a native of South Africa, will be Spearman's foreign exchange student for 1973-74. Arriving in New York July 20, and in Spearman about the 26th of July, she will make her home here with Mr. and Mrs. Ray Gressett and family. Ann Marie is from Graaff-Reinet, South Africa. She speaks English fluently, having studied it 12 years. She also speaks Afrikaans fluently. She was born in New Zealand but has lived in South Africa since 1958. Her family consists of her parents and one brother Konradt, 10 years of age. Mr. Steyn is a representative for the International Oil Company and her mother is secretary and travel agent for South Africa Airlines.

Her religious affiliation is Anglican. She is especially interested in music and drama. She loves to swim and has been in training to swim for her school and province. During the winter her main sport is hockey and she has participated on winning teams for the past three years. Graaff-Reinet is called "the gem of the Karoo" and the city lies in a horseshoe bend on the Sundays River--forming a veritable oasis in the heart of the arid Karoo. ANNUAL BORGER FISH FRY, June 2

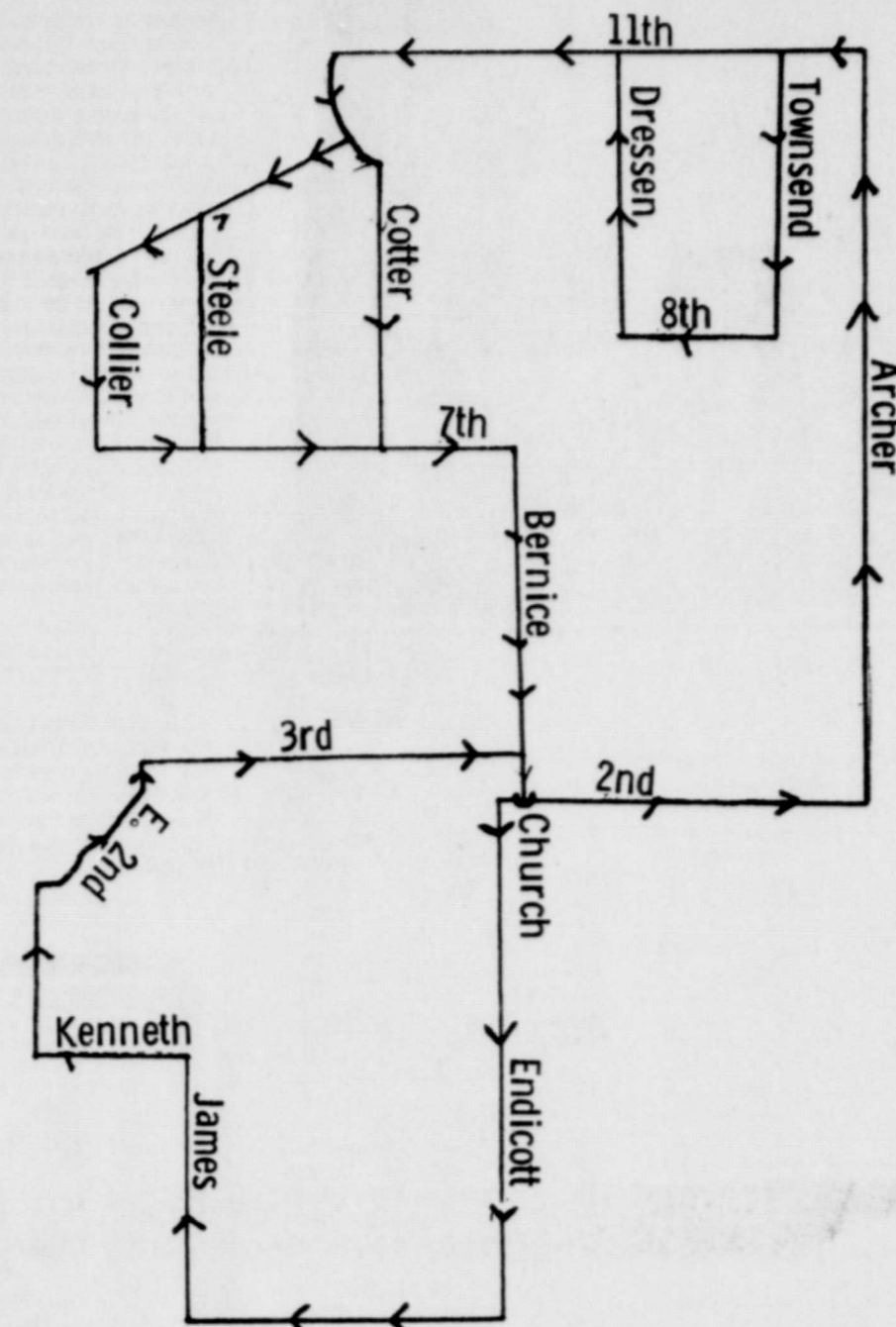
The Tenth Annual Borger Fish Fry... "The World's Largest Fish Fry".... will be held all day Saturday, June 2nd, in Borger's famous Aluminum Dome. Some 5,000 people attended the city-wide event last year. The Borger Chamber of Commerce annually sponsors the "World's Largest Fish Fry," giving local citizens and outside visitors an opportunity to enjoy a good meal of fish, french fries, cole slaw, relish, tartar sauce, bread coffee and lemonade for just \$1.25 per person for an advance ticket and \$1.75 at the door. Many Borger merchants give Fish Fry tickets as a gesture of good will. The "World's Largest Fish Fry" was started by local business men in 1964, in anticipation of completion of Lake Meredith, and has grown into an annual event so large the Chamber of Commerce was asked to take it over. Since the original Fry was held over 40,000 have tasted the delicious fish dinner prepared by some 125 local volunteers working each year as cooks, servers, greeters, clean up crew, and ticket sales people. The Commodore of the 1973 "World's Largest Fish Fry" is Leonard Riley of Borger, who served admirably in the same capacity last year. The entire City of Borger invites any and all to come to the Dome Saturday, June 2nd, between 11:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. to enjoy the best fish dinner ever at the tenth annual "World's Largest Fish Fry."

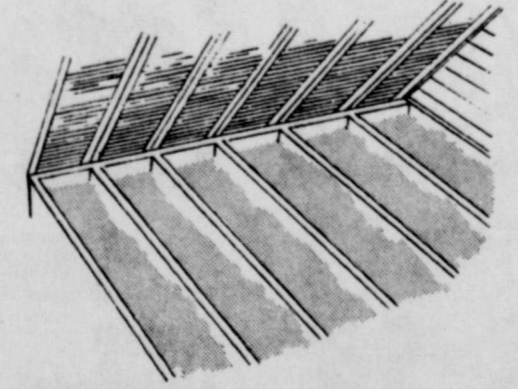

Certain clothing items--such as sweaters, vests, and knitted shirts--play dual roles. They add style and comfort while providing extra warmth for chilly mornings and evenings.
Select sweaters with buttons in the front--they're easier to put on and take off. Basic colors coordinate with other clothing--making them even more practical.
"With proper style, fabric, color and fit, the older man

mosquitoes at a minimum this spring and summer take measures now to destroy breeding places.
Crop Fertilization - Due to the late start on farming this year many farmers are considering sidedressing their fertilizer.
Sidedressing can be as effective as preplant application in most cases on High Plains soils. Most soils contain sufficient fertility to get the crop started. Nitrogen can be effectively applied as soon after stand is assured as possible when soil moisture conditions are favorable for cultivation. In all instances root pruning should be avoided. Remember that regardless of the carrier used, the nitrogen is soon changed to the mobile nitrate form soon after application. The root system expands rapidly and adequate assimilation will not be a problem.
For sandy soils and others having a rapid water intake rate split applications of nitrogen have long been recommended in sorghum and corn production. With high production potential it will be desirable to apply one-third to one-half the nitrogen as an early sidedress with the rest to follow in one or two additional applications.
Phosphate applied as a sidedress presents more of a problem because the phosphorus does not move appreciably from the point of application. If phosphate is applied after planting it should be placed three to four inches deep so that permanent roots will have a continuous supply. The earlier this application can be made the greater will be the chance for response. A rain or an irrigation will likely be necessary before it can be utilized. If your soil test shows adequate phosphorus this puts you ahead and indicates you can omit the phosphate which is in many localities in very short supply.

As the weather gets warmer we think of summer sleepwear. As children grow so rapidly they will probably need new garments. Since July of 1972 garments must be labeled as to flammability. If you find no such label the garment was probably made prior to that date. Some sleepwear items are labeled "Flammable", "Should not be worn near source of fire." Other garments carry labels indicating they're flame retardant and provide care instructions for keeping them that way.

After July of this year only flame retardant sleepwear will be allowed for size 0 through 6X. This means old stock (not flame retardant) may be on sale now to clear the way for the new product. Be sure to read the labels before buying any children's sleepwear and follow the suggestions for care. Though we hate to think about it fire is a hazard that may strike any home.

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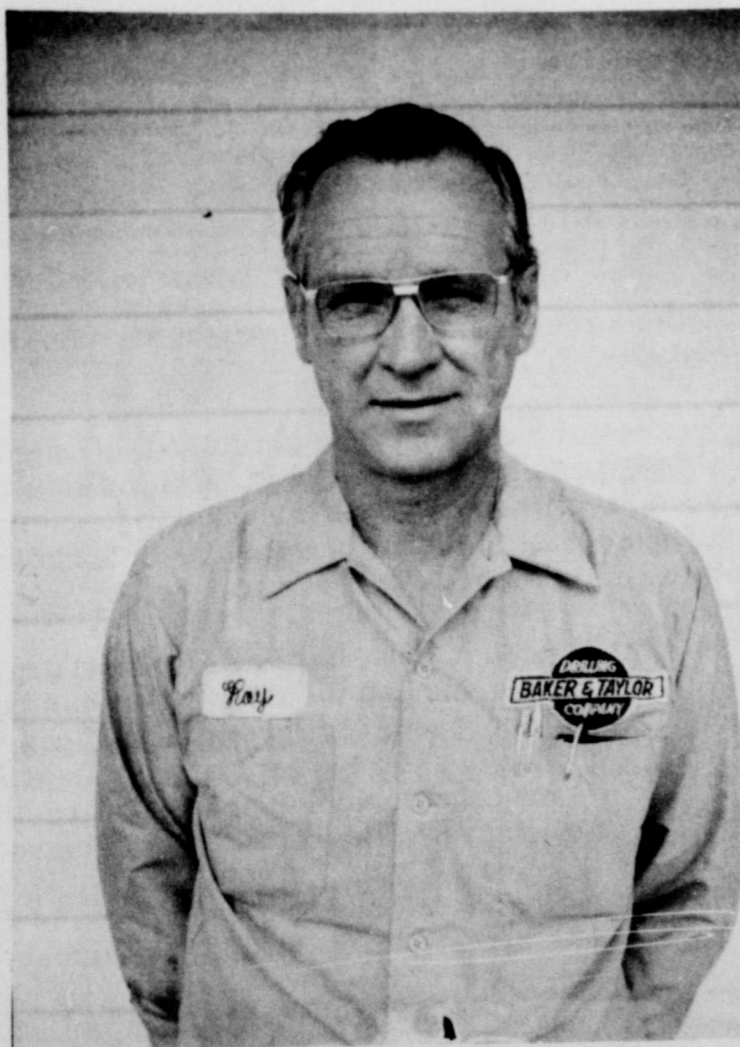

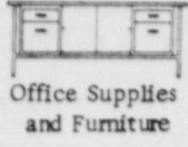

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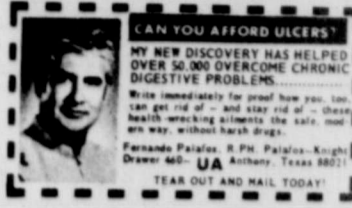

Benefit from Watergate?



Who will benefit from Watergate? Several very diverse groups of people.

First, our international enemies. Taking advantage of the fact that the prestige of President Nixon has been impaired and his power inside our country diminished, they will press for concessions which he would not have made otherwise.

Second, President Nixon's political enemies. They will extract from the situation all political advantage for themselves that they can. This is natural and is to be expected. Within reasonable bounds, it is right and proper. When any political leader is found to be guilty of sins of commission or of omission, he must expect to suffer the consequences. If the President did not know of the dark deeds that were being done by men who were supposedly working on his behalf, he was guilty, at least, of failing to exercise proper control over his trusted subordinates. Maybe he trusted them too much -- but he must now pay the penalty. And his opponents will profit.

Will We Learn?

Third -- perhaps -- the American people. If it is now borne in on us that the current era of permissiveness has produced a generation of people who believe that "anything goes" -- legal or illegal, moral or immoral, ethical or unethical -- so long as "you can get away with it," and if we profit from this realization to the extent that we reverse our thinking on this subject, the results may be beneficial.

At the annual meeting of the American Association of University Professors held in St. Louis recently, a resolution was adopted referring to the Watergate scandal and expressing alarm "at the breakdown in law and order, the decay of public morality, and the excessive permissiveness of which this incident is symptomatic."

"That all the persons allegedly involved in this felonious... affront to freedom and fair play are graduates of American institutions of higher education," the resolution continues, "causes us to grieve that we failed in not helping them to overcome their character defects... while they were in our tutelage."

Moral Teaching Needed

If this resolution is implemented by the appropriate revision of our attitudes toward the inculcation of ethical and moral values in the classrooms of our educational institutions, it will in the end prove to have been a benefit.

There is a Book which has been largely ignored in our classrooms in recent years, a Book which says, "The integrity of the upright shall guide them, but the perverseness of treacherous men shall destroy them." Maybe this Book is right, after all!

Your State Representation Reports

PENAL CODE

Seven years of study--went into the formation of a new version of the state penal code.

This new penal code bill is under consideration by both houses of the Legislature this week. It is in essence a simplification of the current penal code as it takes away the special interest laws of the past. For example, under existing law it is a felony offense to steal "wool, mohair, or edible meat" -- even to shoplift a package of sliced luncheon meat should legally be considered a felony. Under the new penal code there would be no such special law. If you stole something you would be guilty of theft. If it was worth less than \$50.00 it would be a misdemeanor, if it was worth more than \$50.00 it would be a felony, no matter if it was meat or wool or anything.

This new penal code would be a much more workable and time enduring document when compared to the current code, as it deals in generalities rather than specific details. Of course, the current code was written over one-hundred years ago, no-telling what the Texas Legislature one-hundred years from now will say about this new penal code.

SCHOOL FINANCING

Overhauling the system of public school financing--was the product of 3 days of debate in the house last week. The bill's idea of assuring equality in education to every child in Texas, regardless of race, creed, color, or sex of school district, is great but the means by which it is to be financed remains my voting against it.

To start with, the bill would cost the state about a billion dollars, this of course would cause a meaningful increase. The state would change in its taxing power. The bill proposes that the money come from taxes on the Market Value of Real Estate and certain other taxable property, instead of Economic Index enacted in 1949, which was based on the Production Value of Real Estate. In the long run this would mean a heavy increase on the rural counties of Texas.

For this reason, I'm against the bill, even though I support basic reform in needed in the public schools, I don't believe in placing the burden of financing these reforms on the shoulders of the rural communities of Texas.

This will be the last column which I will do for the regular session. I do a follow up column after the 63rd Regular Session adjourns. Again, I want to thank the newspaper for carrying the column each week, and especially you, the readers, for the response it has received. I hope to be visiting with many of you personally in weeks ahead.

24% Of Local Income From Government Sources

NEW YORK, May 19--To what extent do government programs--Federal, state and local--figure in the financial picture of Hansford County residents?

What proportion of the local population receives some part of its income from government sources?

With public payrolls on the rise and social security and other benefits expanding, government funds have become increasingly important.

Based upon a state-by-state analysis of data released by the U.S. Office of Business Economics, about 24.0 percent of each dollar of personal income locally is from public funds. It amounts to approximately \$7,064,000 a year, after taxes.

Taken into account in the analysis, which was made by the Tax Foundation, a non-profit organization here, were payments to people on government payrolls, the amounts going to those who are receiving social security benefits and the

outlays for unemployment compensation, pensions, interest and public assistance.

In the case of Hansford County, applying the state average locally, the 24.0 cents of the income dollar consists of 15.4 cents received from the Federal government and 8.6 cents from state and local agencies.

Throughout the United States as a whole, 24.3 cents of every dollar of personal income comes in the form of government checks, the Tax Foundation finds. In the West South Central States the average is 25.2 cents.

Nationally, the total amount paid out to individuals during the year by governmental bodies, via payrolls, pensions and the like, came to \$209 billion.

Of this sum, nearly \$122 billion was from Washington and the other \$87 billion from state and local governments.

Considerable differences are noted between various sections of the country in the extent to which government

funds contribute to personal income.

It runs high in areas that have heavy concentrations of civil employees and in areas with large proportions of retired people receiving pensions.

In the District of Columbia, consequently, because of the large number of Federal workers there, no less than 51.8 percent of income is from public funds. Connecticut, with 18.3 percent, is at the other extreme.

You can blame this on Dr. Bruce Foster, a member of the physics faculty at North Texas State University who has come up with a new constellation called Ophiuchus, which is located somewhere between Scorpius and Sagittarius, wherever they are. He says that for thousands of years horoscopes have been inaccurate because astrologers haven't been paying attention to Ophiuchus. This means you have been shuffled out of that Zodiac sign you have depended on daily to tell you whether to take a trip, find a new love, or simply stay in bed. If you want to know your new "sign", contact Dr. Foster for a Zodiac chart.

Or, just chuck the whole idea of heavenly bodies to help you predict your future, and turn yourself over to Hermann Swoboda and he'll cue you in on a brand new theory called "biorhythm." He will make you a chart which takes in all the ups and downs of day-to-day living. Advocates of biorhythm believe that these charts make it possible to help people become more successful, live more happily and avoid self-induced accidents.

This new, fancy form of fortune telling, is quite different from horoscopes. Reading the chart is more complicated, but it offers more--physically, emotionally and intellectually.

According to the biorhythm theory, from the moment of birth you start on three separate cycles--physical, emotional and intellectual. The "physical" cycle has a 23-day period and is believed to be influenced by the muscular cells and fibers of your body. It affects man's physical strength, energy, resistance and confidence. Next on your chart comes a 28-day period and the "emotional" cycle, influenced by the cells of man's feminine inheritance which has to do with creative enterprise, feel-

ings, love, cooperation--all connected with the nervous system.

Then you have a 33-day "intellectual" cycle which apparently originates in the brain cells and has to do with thyroid gland secretions. During this cycle you can think more clearly, the memory functions well and mental response is most spontaneous.

NOW, for the bad part, you will have at least 6 days per month when you are just "not yourself". These are the days you must watch. In fact these days you should be very worried about yourself and take special precaution--like not speeding, or skating, or getting sick.
