

Bailey Patterson Named All Around TSHA Cowboy



TRI-STATE RODEO ALL AROUND COWBOY Bailey Patterson of Spearman. Bailey won this honor in the finals held at Fair Park Coliseum in Amarillo Saturday evening with a score of 307 1/2 points. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Sonny Patterson of Spearman.

Spearman's own Bailey Patterson came from behind and defeated defending champion Buster Record of Dumas for All-Around Cowboy honors Saturday at Amarillo's Fair Park Coliseum to highlight finals of the annual Tri-State High School Rodeo Association Event.

Patterson won the honor with 307 1/2 points to 258 1/2 by Record, who led the field by 4 1/2 points at the days start.

Along with his All-Around title, Patterson ran away with the bull riding and bareback bronc riding, titles, and was second for the year in ribbon roping, third in chute dogging, and fifth in tie-down calf roping.

Some of the awards Bailey received at the Tri-State Finals in Amarillo were 3 saddles, 6 buckles, the sports-

manship trophy, a pair of boots, pants and shirts and a two year scholarship at Clarendon Junior College.

There were a total of 840 high school students participating in the area in the Tri-State Rodeo Association. One hundred and twenty five of these were entered in the Tri-State Finals in Amarillo last weekend.

Patterson and his sister, Cindy, were also given the Boys and Girls Sportsmanship Awards for the final rodeo. Their parents are Mr. and Mrs. Sonny Patterson of rural Spearman.

Bailey is a 1973 graduate of Spearman High School, and Cindy will be a sophomore this fall.

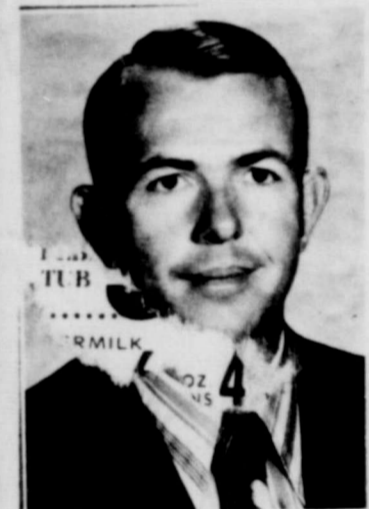


E. G. Snodgrass To Speak At Full Gospel Meet

In 1970 the church was completely refurbished at a cost of \$116,000 plus furnishings for the parlor, and this debt has now been paid.

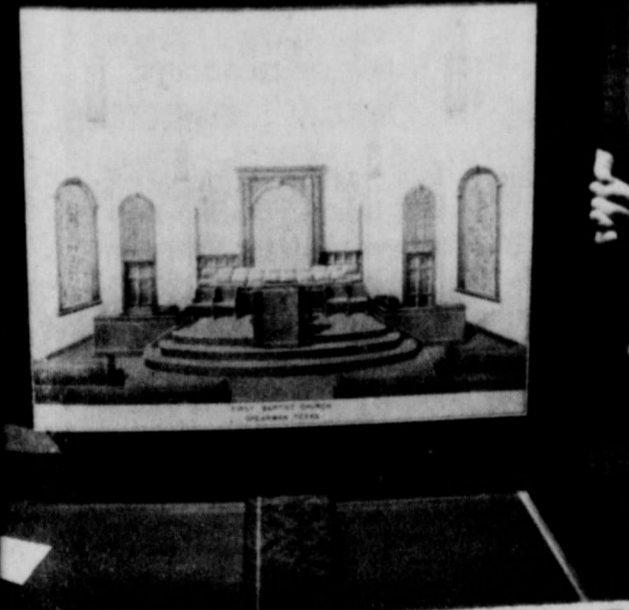
1970 was a big year for the local congregation in another way as they celebrated their fiftieth anniversary on Sunday, March 15, 1970.

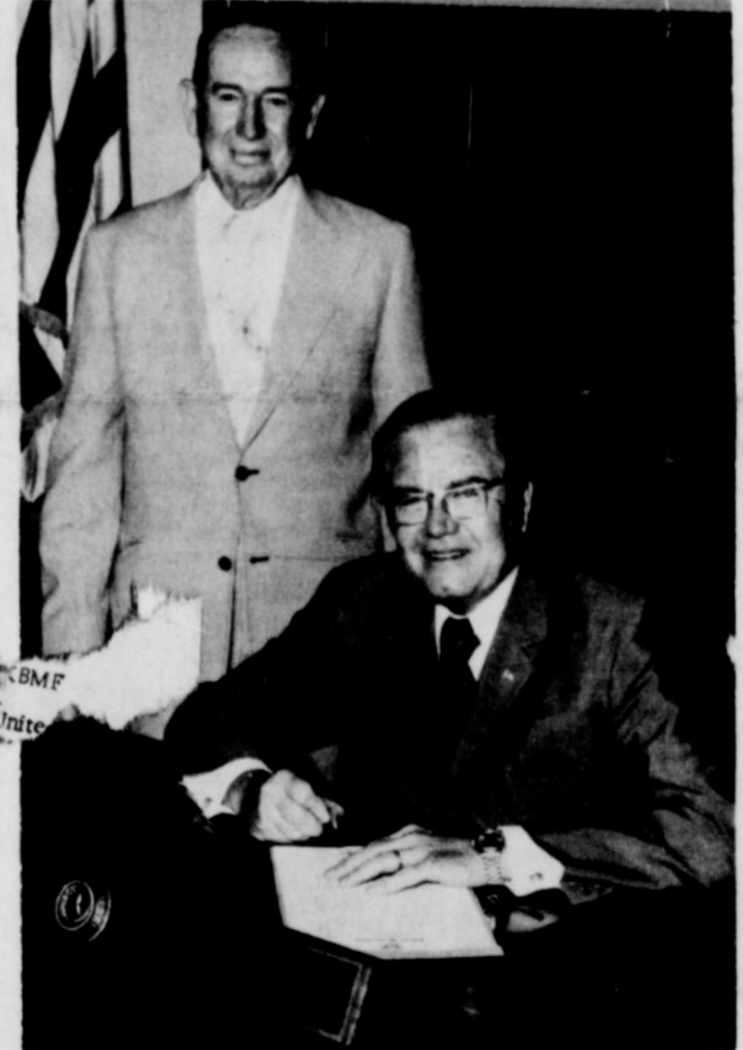

And at such a good time for ice cream etc. A recent report states that in 1972 lowfat milk and cheese increased in sales more than any other dairy products! Cheese consumption is up 9% to over 13 pounds per person while lowfat milk consumption is also up 9% to 32 quarts per person. Cottage cheese and ice cream consumption also increased. Overall the milk going into all dairy products in 1972 is up 5 lbs. per person more than the year before. This was the first time since 1955 that per capita milk consump-

tion increased.

**Vernon Registers
As Market Agency**

WASHINGTON, --Johnny P. Vernon, of Spearman, Tex. has been ordered to stop violating bonding requirements under the Packers and Stockyards Act, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) said today.

Mr. Vernon is now registered as a market agency to buy livestock on a commission basis. When the complaint was issued, he was registered as a dealer. He operates in the Texas Panhandle, and parts of northwestern Oklahoma and northeastern New Mexico. Mr. Vernon consented to

issuance of the order. He waived oral hearings. He neither admitted nor denied the charges contained in an administrative complaint filed by USDA's Packers and Stockyards Administration. USDA Judicial Officer Donald A. Campbell ordered Mr. Vernon to cease and desist from operating as a market agency or dealer without filing and maintaining a reasonable bond.

He has now filed an acceptable bond and is in compliance with P & S bonding requirements. The cease and desist order--was issued to insure future compliance with the P & S Act.

Dealers and market agencies are required--under the P&S Act--to provide bonds as a measure of financial protection for the sellers of livestock.

The P&S Act is a fair trade practices law. It promotes and maintains fair and open competition in the marketing of livestock, poultry, and meat. The Act is administered on a nondiscriminatory basis.

The record in this case is open to the public. Copies of this order, P&S Docket 4711, may be obtained from the Information Officer, Packers and Stockyards Administration, USDA, Washington, D.C. 20250.

FARM & RANCH NEWS

County Agricultural Agent

With summer slowly arriving finally we find the usual build-up of insect populations. During recent weeks alfalfa weevils have been identified from several fields in Hansford County. This is the first time these weevils have been identified in this local vicinity. Our area Extension Entomologist, Dr. Bill Clymer, plans to be up here next Monday, June 11, to review the current general insect situation with me. If anyone is having a particular insect problem, please give me a call at 659-2136 or 659-3059 and we will try to get by and assist you with your insect problem next Monday.

1973 Wheat Outlook--The following are a few selected comments from a recent release by Roland Smith, Extension Grain Marketing Specialist on the outlook for wheat this year.

U.S. wheat carryover is now anticipated near 400 million bushels on July 1--less than half that of last year. This relatively low carryover may encourage millers and export buyers to buy further ahead to insure adequate supplies. As buyers partially replenish stocks drawn to the minimum last year, the current wheat market could maintain some of the present strength, even during harvest. Early indications are that wheat prices should be well above last year for most of Texas' wheat.

Transportation will continue to be a problem throughout harvest and the remainder of the year. With current year exports lagging, no let-up is in sight for the transportation situation. There could be price differentials at country points based solely on transportation availability. The wheat market will likely continue to fluctuate from now through next fall based on continuing reports of world grain needs and projected supplies here and abroad. Those involved in the wheat industry should keep abreast of these reports and other price information in selecting marketing alternatives.

Red Meat Production--Despite the boycotters attempt to lower beef prices, when you have lower production, you will usually have stronger demands for the product, especially if it is something that is desired by our modern American economy.

Commercial production of red meat in the 48 states totaled 2,576 million pounds in April, down 12 percent from a year earlier.

Beef production was 1,480 million pounds, 14 percent less than the 1,717 million pounds produced in April 1972. The lower output was caused by an 8-pound decrease in the average weight, coupled with a 13-percent decrease in head slaughtered. Cattle killed totaled 2,402,700 head, compared with 2,761,900 a year earlier. Live weight per head was 1,031 pounds, 8 pounds less than April 1972 and 6 pounds less than March 1973.

This to me points up the fact that the best way to lower the price of anything in great demand is to increase production. Maybe the boycotters will learn someday that they don't encourage livestock producers to increase production by staging a nationwide boycott. This tends to have the reverse effect on most producers. It certainly looks like the good demand for beef will keep cattle prices on the strong side over the near term.

Easter Seal Society Services Listed

The Texas Easter Seal Society can provide the following services for handicapped persons who cannot afford to pay all or part of the costs involved * and who are not eligible for help from any other resource - public or private. Freeman Barkley is the Hansford County representative.

1. Assistance in paying for physical, occupational, and speech therapy when it is prescribed by a medical doctor.
2. Pay for special diagnostic evaluation (such as orthopedic, audiological, language and psychological).
3. Purchase orthopedic equipment such as wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, braces, etc., when prescribed by a medical doctor. (There is a \$200 limit placed on artificial limbs. This \$200 is to be used as "seed money" and hopefully will be matched by local resources such as individuals, service clubs, sororities, foundations, etc.).
4. Help to defray transportation costs * for treatment or evaluation when the family is unable to meet these costs. This is determined by paying 30¢ per gallon - based on 10 miles per gallon, figured on a round trip basis - or by purchasing round trip bus tickets.
5. Assist families and individuals to reach the right person or agency to obtain help the Easter Seal Society of Texas cannot provide. People are often eligible for services from public or private agencies but do not know the person, eligibility requirements, or place to obtain the services needed. PERHAPS WE DO.

* A limit of \$150 per client per year for therapy and \$150 for transportation has been set except in unusual cases requiring special attention. This limit can be exceeded only with the permission of the Treatment and Service Committee of the State Board.

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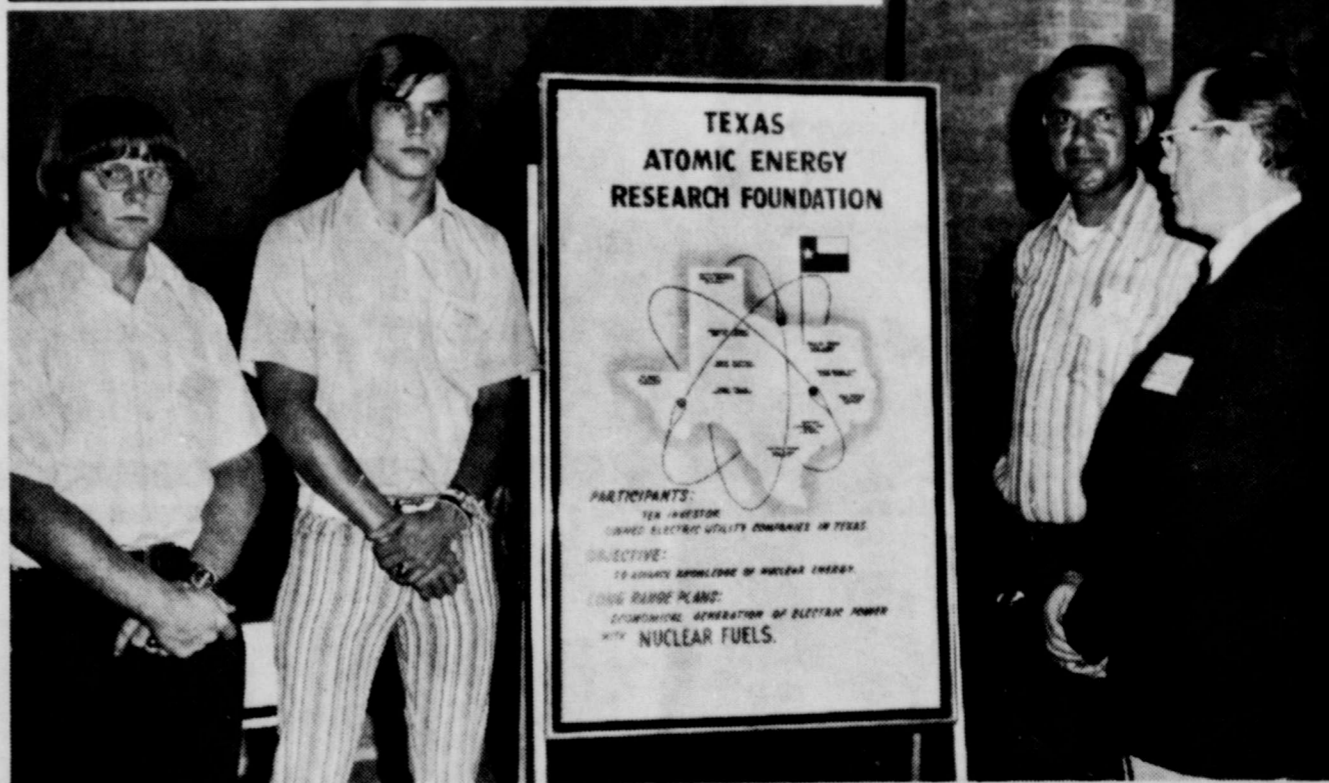

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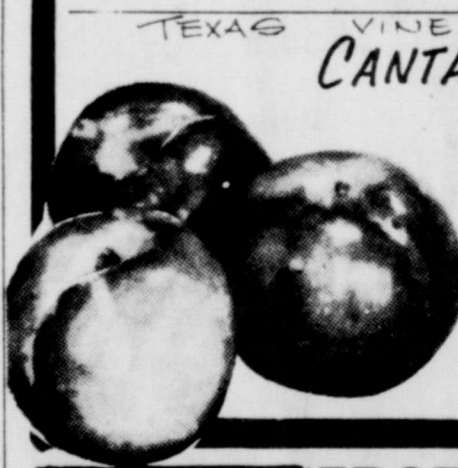
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
