## City Meeting Held

The minutes of the October 23 and 29th meetings were read and approved at the regular city meeting Monday night. Bills were presented and approved.

The H and S Ambulance service reported a total of \$315.27 in bills accumulated for the month.

The general funds total bills payable for the month, was \$3,974.99. System funds bills payable, \$7,750.00.

The ambulance report for October totaled 9 runs: 5 to Amarillo, 2 in the county, and 2 in the city.

Court report for October, 84 cases filed in municipal court; total fines assessed \$935.50. Suspended fines \$278.00. Total paid, \$592.50. Those fines satisfied by themes, \$83.00.

POLICE REPORT: Traffic department reports that 102

tickets were issued by city police in October; plus 6 arrests. There were 12 accidents.

Animal control reports 44 animals picked up, and 24 paid out.

The Fire Dept. reported 2 drills, 3 county fires, plus 1 city fire.

The city council approved a turkey for Volunteer Fire Dept., and City employees. They also approved a \$50.00 Christmas bonus for all City employees who have worked 6 months or more with the City, and \$25.00 for those with less than 6 months.

Mr. Jack Yates, the assistant city manager, was appointed as the Municipal Court Judge.

The council approved the payment of \$3,000.00 in engineering fees with the State Parks and Wildlife

Board for the swimming pool. Ordinance No. 356, which was passed back in the summer, to pay for the interest on 3 years of swimming pool bonds, was repealed. This was made possible by the \$67,500.00 payment from the Texas Parks Wildlife board, (half of the cost of the pool.)

Paving liens on city property were discussed, and bids on a 1/2 ton pickup were called for.

Draperies for the Police Dept., and City Hall may be purchased in the future, but for the time being, no action was taken, and the old draperies will be cleaned.

A new Hansford County Airport, to be used jointly between Spearman and Gruver was discussed, but the city decided not to participate in this project at this time.

## Police Report

The attempted burglary and entry at 402 W. Second and the theft of a pickup from R. B. Masters was cleared here over the weekend by the arrest of James Starr, 17 years old of Henrietta, Okla.

Starr was charged with theft over \$50, released on an appearance bond. The case will be taken before the county grand jury at their next session.

## Ceremony To Focus Attention On 1200 Missing In Action

A ceremony will be held here Nov. 15 at 12 noon in support of "POW-MIA, Inc." part of the "AIM for MIA" (Americans In Motion for Missing In Action).

This ceremony is to focus attention on the 1200 American servicemen still unaccounted for in Southeast Asia. This event is occurring simultaneously in a majority of Texas cities and throughout the United States.

The flag will be taken from the city hall at 12 noon and carried to Hansford County Courthouse by Judge Johnnie Lee, symbolizing the journey of the flag to Austin. At the receipt of the flag at the courthouse telegrams will be sent immediately to Senator Lloyd Bentsen, Senator John Tower and Representative Bob Price.

The telegrams will read: "The citizens of Hansford County and Spearman, Texas have dispatched a United

States flag to be presented to Governor Dolph Briscoe of Texas on this date. With this flag we are demonstrating our deep concern that more than 1200 of our fellow Americans, many of them Texans, are still missing and have not been accounted for in the aftermath of the Vietnam conflict. Please use your good offices to urge the president and senators and representatives in Washington to find a solution to this problem--without delay. Any missing men who are alive should be repatriated; the bodies of men who have died should be speedily exhumed and returned to their families; and the U.S. teams seeking to uncover the fate of all other missing men should be given immediate authority to search areas where men were last known to be alive."

A U.S. flag has been mailed to Austin and will be carried in a ceremony there ex-

plaining the residents of Spearman's concern for the MIA's. The flag, representing Texas, will be dispatched to Washington with a tele-

gram to President Nixon. The City Council asks your support by attending the courthouse ceremonies and the "run" from south on Main from City Hall.

Sift together 4 c flour, 2 t baking powder, 2 t soda and 1 t salt. Add to cookie mixture, mix well. Store in covered container in refrigerator.

To use for peanut butter cookies mix 2 c mix and 1/4 c maple flavored syrup. Shape into roll, chill thoroughly. Slice and bake at 350 F. for 10-12 minutes. (or save time by dropping dough on ungreased cookie sheet.)

For apple 'n spice peanut butter cookies toss together 1/2 chopped apple and 1/2t cinnamon. Add 2 c cookie mix and mix well. Shape into small balls, place on ungreased cookie sheet, flatten with fork. 350 F. for 10-12 minutes.

Hidden orange mounds use 1 c cut up jellied orange section candy wrapped with about 1 c cookie mix each. (Use 2 c mix.) Bake on ungreased cookie sheet for 10-12 minutes at 350 F.

If bar cookies are your favorite try midwest natural squares. Fat 2 c cookie mix

into a 10"x13" rectangle about 1/4" thick on a greased cookie sheet. Press 1 c crushed cereal flakes on top. Bake 350 F for 15 minutes. Cool slightly and cut into desired shapes.

The Continental Trailways Tours of Amarillo for "Mexico's Railroad in the Sky," met at Amarillo, Texas Holiday Inn 4-40 Tuesday October 30, 1973 at 7:30 A.M. for a nine day tour of Northern Mexico. Seventeen people present

for the tour were, Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Bonem of Tucuman, New Mexico, Mr. and Mrs. Ellis E. Buchanan, Mrs. Bess Bear, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Love, Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Chapman (Escorte) of Amarillo, Mrs. Pearl Coffee of Estes Park, Colorado, Mr. and Mrs. E.C. Barnes of Shattuck, Okla. Mrs. Ann Vaughan of Sherman, Texas, Mrs. Lucy Mundy, Addie Novak and Mildred Chamberlain of Spearman and Maude Rosson of the Holt Community. Bill Weigan of Amarillo was the bus driver to El Paso, Texas.

The group ate lunch Tuesday at the Lunch Room in Carlsbad Caverns, New Mexico, which is 150 miles east of El Paso, Texas. James Larkin White a young cowboy spent more than twenty years exploring, building trails, and escorting people through portions of the caverns that he had discovered. Additional land and caves were added in 1930 when it became a National Park. It is 754 feet by elevator from the lobby of the visitors center to the big Room of the Caverns. The Caverns temperature is about 56 degrees year around. The caverns are one of the wonders of the world, very different and beautiful.

Wednesday morning the group were transferred to a Mexican bus and had a Mexican escort, Hector O. Colmenero of Chihuahau, Mexico. He remained with the group on all the tour and back to El Paso. He is 29 years old, very active and always handy when needed. American citizens entering Mexico must have a tourist permit, which is free but necessary. The only acceptable documents to furnish proof of citizenship may be a birth certificate or voters registration card. The Mexican money rating is different to the American, a hundred peso bill is worth \$8.00 in American money. A box lunch was prepared for the tour group so it was enjoyable at a rest stop between Juarez and Chihuahau. The roads were good but mostly a desert country. After reaching Chihuahau checked in at the Victoria Hotel and in the afternoon took a sight seeing State Capitol, Cathedral, the home of Pancho Villa, Pancho Villa a popular leader, who terrorized the people Mexico, even crossed the border into the United States, and later was

led by his people. The group visited his home and his former wife, Senora Villa who is still living. She is friendly and loves to have her picture made with the tourist.

Chihuahau is one of the most important cities of Northern Mexico and is the capitol of the state of the same name. Near the city are large plants for smelting silver, gold, lead and zinc. The city is famous for the tiny short haired chihuahau dogs, which have been named for it and all the rest of the dogs that live there are called Chihuahau dogs.

Thursday morning the group were transferred to the depot of the Chihuahau Al Pacifico Rail Road going across the Sierra Madre of Northern Mexico. It was finished in 1961 and cost \$1,044,600.00. It has 72 tunnels and 48 bridges. Traveling along came to the Tarahumara Indian Territory, which they are called the Road Runner. If they decide to get a wild animal, they start out at a pace and keep it up until the animal is run down and caught. This train travels about 30 miles an hour. This is a beautiful country all kinds of greenery, the climate is mild and get about 100 inches of rain a year. Including the stops it took thirteen hours to go from Chihuahau to Los Mochis, and the nite was spent at Santa Anita Hotel. Friday Morning took a sight seeing tour of the city, then that afternoon departed by bus to Mazatlan, which is 240 miles from Los Mochis, Mexico is a country of interesting and unusual contrasts. It is a land of modern cities, backward villages, many wealthy residences and poor mud houses.

The people are mainly small farmers and peasants, along both coasts there are narrow low lands and plains sometimes only a few miles wide, where the mountains hug the coast line. The low lands are very fertile in places, well watered and very hot. In parts of this low land country, more than a hundred inches of rain fall every year. This makes the land swampy and a breeding place for mosquitoes and other disease bearing insects, as a result a few people live on the coastal plains. Frost is rare except on high peaks so most of the people of Mexico live on the temperate land, which is about 5000 or 6000 feet above sea level, and the climate is always mild. Mexico is a rich country and also a country of poor people. Mountains and hills make it difficult to take products and materials to market and factories. The mexicans are talented in arts and crafts. They raise maize, corn, wheat, cotton, rice beans, coffee, sugar cane, bananas. Many other fruits, flowers and vegetables. It is very common to see stock grazing along the Highways. It was asked, why do cattle go across the roads, the answer because it is too far to go around.

Mexico has silver, copper, zinc and lead mines, also the oil industry is growing rapidly. The Market Place

is a happy experience for all Mexicans. They take what ever they have to trade or sell. The group arrived at Mazatlan in late evening, which is a resort city on the blue Pacific. An ocean front rooms were ready for all, at the Hotel DeCima, where four nites were spent.

Saturday morning the group enjoyed a bus sight seeing tour of the city. Sunday morning, all took a three hour Mazatlan Fiesta Cruise of the beautiful bay, the Luxury Cruisers, the largest Shrimp fishing fleet in Mexico, the Second Highest Natural Lighthouse of the World, the Fabulous sea solves and seals, The Three Islands, and the most Beautiful Beach. This cruise carries a hundred people.

Monday was a free day for all to enjoy personal activities, such as shopping, wading along the beach and re-packing to leave Tuesday. The Mexans have many different kinds of transportation, carriages which are pulled by horses, the burros, cars, buses, trains, airplanes, Spiders and bicycles. Thousands of schools have been built and more than half of the people of Mexico of school age or over can now read. Also have a National University in Mexico City which was founded in 1553. Most of the Mexicans are courteous, gracious friendly people and are understanding.

Tuesday morning the group left by Taxis from Hotel De Cima at Mazatlan at 5:15 a.m. for a ten to twelve mile drive to Aero Mexico Line. Breakfast was served on the plane. The group changed planes at Torre on and landed in Juarez a little after 12:00 and were transferred to a bus to travel to El Paso and spent the nite in the Holiday Inn. All enjoyed a Farewell Dinner Tuesday nite in the Charro Room at the Holiday Inn.

The bus arrived in Amarillo about 6:30 p.m. In nine days a group gets well acquainted and learn to love each other. It was a wonderful tour and becomes a part of our treasured memories. Wherever a person might go, there's no place like home so all were happy to return home.

### FARM AND RANCH NEWS

#### FEEDLOT MANURE FERTILIZER

Throughout recorded history the use of animal waste has made an important contribution to domestic agriculture. Within the last few decades commercial inorganic fertilizers have come into prominence as a source of plant nutrients. Without doubt commercial fertilizer will retain this position but since their price is increasing and inadequate supplies are in prospect it is time to take a new look at feedlot waste as a source of plant food.

The USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland has been studying the effects of feedlot waste since 1968. Their chemical analyses of material from 23 feedlots show that on an average 10 tons of manure contains 268 lbs. nitrogen, 244 lbs. P2O5 and 360 lbs. K2O. These values are much higher than those previously reported for barnyard manures. The material varied in nitrogen content with extremes being 226 and 392 lbs. N in 10 tons.

Their research indicates that about half of the nitrogen present in 10 tons of manure, or some 120 lbs. of nitrogen, is available to the first sorghum crop. Sixty lbs. of the remaining nitrogen will be available the second year and 30 lbs. nitrogen will be available the third year.

The rate at which phosphorus becomes available for plant use appears to be similar to that of nitrogen.

Potassium in the material is readily available. In consideration of lesser crop removal and the slower mobility of phosphorus and potassium when compared to nitrogen, it is highly probable that application rates sufficient to supply adequate nitrogen will be more than adequate to supply these elements even on soils known to be deficient.

Ten to 15 tons applied anytime after harvest and just ahead of cultivation is generally adequate for high yields of irrigated sorghum or corn. Additional commercial fertilizer is not likely to be needed.

The possibility of introducing weeds from seeds contained in the waste perhaps warrants consideration. Even distribution and good incorporation into the soil soon after application will insure best results.

#### STOCKERS NEED WORMING

Above average rainfall in East Texas and the states along the eastern seaboard, where the majority of stocker cattle for this area are obtained, has occurred for the past two years. These ideal conditions have caused a tremendous increase in internal parasites.

Parasitism in some cases are severe enough to cause death. The symptoms, in severe cases, are decreased appetite, weight loss and watery diarrhea. In all cases, even if symptoms are absent, this parasite load increases the cost of gain, or

in the case of wheat pasture, requires more forage than normal to be consumed to produce a pound of gain. Therefore, it is more important to worm your cattle than you are placing on wheat pasture this year than it has been in the past.

The normal cycle of an internal parasite is the larvae is ingested by the animal with grass. The larvae then invades the lining of the gut and undergoes further development. It finally emerges into the intestinal tract where they attain adulthood and begin laying eggs.

The medium stomach worm (Ostertagia) has been the primary offender in some cases where response to normal worm remedies has been ineffective. Under certain conditions, usually in the fall of the year, the larvae of the medium stomach worm does not continue its regular development on to adulthood but rather cease development and remain in the lining of the stomach many times thicker than normal.

This accumulation of fluid disrupts the acid producing cells in the stomach that are necessary for the digestion of protein. This is one of the reasons affected animals lose weight so rapidly. Much of the fluid collected in the tissues pass into the intestinal tract and this contributes to the watery diarrhea observed

in these animals. Response to treatment with most worm medicines is highly effective against the adult parasites found in the stomach or intestine; however, the larvae formations

tions in the lining of the gut are much more resistant to medication. In this case, for treatment to be successful on the larvae formation, it must be repeated at two-week intervals for as long as necessary.

Your veterinarian may wish to utilize other methods to reduce the fluid collection in the gut and to provide intravenous protein-type nutrients to the animal.

### Farm Bureau Has Gain In Members

WACO—(Sp1)—1973 has been a banner year in membership for the Texas Farm Bureau, reports TFB President J. T. (Red) Woodson. The organization scored its biggest membership gain in history, he said.

Total membership as of Oct. 31 (end of the organization's fiscal year) was 152,380 member families, a gain of 15,437 over last year, making the 21st straight year for the TFB to show an increase in members. Tabulations were completed Nov. 6.

All of the 209 organized county Farm Bureaus registered an increase in membership, Woodson said.

The five largest counties in membership size are (1) Harris—2,541; (2) Ellis—2,302; (3) McLennan—2,253; (4) Fort Bend—2,117; and (5) Fayette—2,000.

Woodson said farmers and ranchers have enjoyed the most favorable prices for their products this year that they have received in a long time.

"But they have felt themselves under fire by intermittent threats of price controls on raw farm products and embargoes on farm exports," he explained. "These fears have caused them to rally behind an organization which could effectively speak for them against such threats," he added.
