Director's Precinct No. 3-- Territory within the District which is situated in each of the following counties: SHERMAN Luther Browder

III. Upon each of the ballots used at said election shall be placed the names of the candidates for County Committeemen to be elected for certain counties included in the District, as follows: LIPSCOMB COUNTY Chris Miller, Jr. Gene Born OCHILTREE COUNTY Dan Manning Edgar Cooke Dean Slaughter HANSFORD COUNTY Dee Jackson Robert Ferguson Everett Vanderburg HUTCHINSON COUNTY Buster Kirk Thane McCloy Noble Watson SHERMAN COUNTY Duane Schafer H. IV. Blank spaces shall be left in order that the names of other persons may be written in. Each person (Voter) residing in Directors' Precincts Nos. 1, 2, and 3, as set forth above, shall vote for only one Director, namely the Director for the Director's Precinct in which the Voter resides. All voters may vote for the candidate of their choice by placing an "X" in the square beside the name or by scratching or marking out all other names in that race and leaving the name of such Director or on the ballot. All voters desiring to cast a vote for a candidate whose name is not on the ballot may do so by writing the name of the person in the blank space provided on the ballot and by placing an "X" in the square beside the name, or by scratching or marking out all other candidates appearing on the ballot for Precinct Director. Each person residing in the counties composing the District, as set forth above, shall vote for three (3) County Committeemen for the county in which the voter resides. Each person may vote for the candidates of his choice by placing an "X" in the square beside the name, or by scratching or marking out all other names in that race

and leaving the name of the County Committeemen on the ballot. All persons desiring to cast a vote for a candidate whose name is not on the ballot, may do so by writing the name of that person in the blank space provided on the ballot and by placing an "X" in the square beside the name, or by scratching or marking out all but three (3) candidates appearing or written in on the ballot.

V. The area comprising the District is hereby divided into the following election precincts, to include all or that part of the county designated which lies within the District, such election to be held at the polling places indicated and conducted by the following election officers:

FARM & RANCH NEWS

County Agricultural Agent

The All Farm Products Index of Prices received by farmers and ranchers for the month that ended November 15 decreased 1 1/2 percent during the preceding month, while the overall farm prices

were declining the price of input items purchased by farmers went up 2/3 percent for the same month. Commercial production of red meat in the 48 states totaled 3,223 million pounds

In October, 2 percent less than a year earlier but 22 percent more than September 73. Commercial meat production includes slaughter in Federally inspected and other slaughter plants, but excludes animals slaughtered on farms.

Beef production was 1,994 million pounds, 1 percent less than October 1972. Cattle kill totaled 3,147,200 head, down 1 percent from a year earlier. Live weight per head was 1,048 pounds, 5 pounds more than 1972, and 2 pounds above September 73. The production of red meat

in the U.S. for the first 10 months (January-October) of this year is down 8 percent overall from last year's level, which includes slaughter of cattle, calves, hogs, sheep and lambs.

For cattle, the slaughter count this year from January through October is 2 million head less than the same period last year. This has resulted in 7 percent less live weight of cattle to be slaughtered for the corresponding period. Calf slaughter is a small amount of the total meat picture, but it is off 34 percent from year earlier levels. Hog live weight slaughter is running 10 percent below levels for the first 10 months of the year. Sheep and lamb slaughter weight is off 4 percent.

These figures tend to make you think that there is a big supply of stocker and feeder calves around the country because our calf crop is supposedly increasing each year lately. Unless fed beef prices start increasing soon, the beef industry may be on a collision course. With feedyard placements this fall down some from year earlier levels, maybe sometime this winter or spring, beef demand will surpass beef cattle available for slaughter and price of slaughter cattle will rise to profitable levels.

Swine producers in Northwest Texas will have an opportunity to consider a mandatory check-off on market

hogs during a series of educational meetings in Lamesa, Canyon, Pampa, and Vernon in December.

According to County Extension Agent Joe Van Zandt, the Texas Pork Producers Association (TPPA) may conduct a state-wide referendum and election if producers view as favorable the mandatory check-off program.

Educational meetings already have been held in Llano, Brenham and Lubbock says VanZandt.

Meetings scheduled for the West Texas area are as follows: Canyon, December 19, 7:30 p.m., at the Randall County Farm Bureau Building, 1714 5th Avenue; and Pampa, December 20, 7:30 p.m., at the Courthouse Annex, 1/4 mile east of Pampa City limits on Miami Hwy.

Swine producers in this area are encouraged to attend one of these meetings, since the referendum would affect any swine producer regardless of the number of hogs he markets.

Participants in the meetings will include Marvin Sartin, area economist-management, Gilfert R. Hollis, area swine specialist, both with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock, John Fair, executive vice-president, TPPA, and Bob Gray of the Texas Department of Agri-

culture. If the mandatory check-off program is viewed favorably by most producers, the TPPA will petition the Commissioner of Agriculture for certification to conduct the state-wide referendum and election.

The balloting would result in the election of 15 directors, from as many areas of the state, who will administer funding for research, education, promotion, and disease and insect control. By this system money taken from mandatory check-off on market hogs will be used to improve the production and marketing of swine, says VanZandt.

All swine producers, he added, will be affected by the outcome of these meetings. It will be to their benefit to share their concerns, both pro and con, with other producers at these meetings.

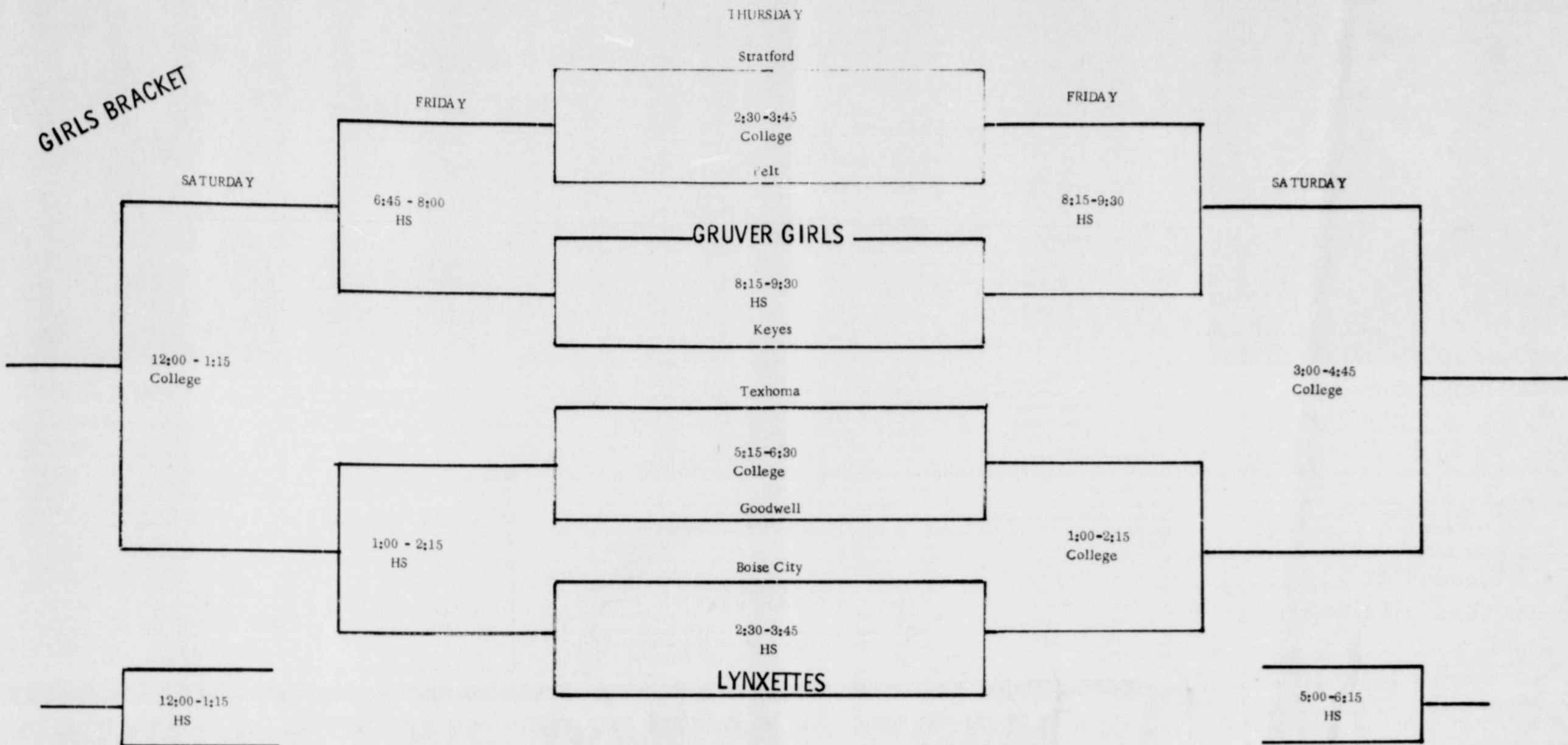

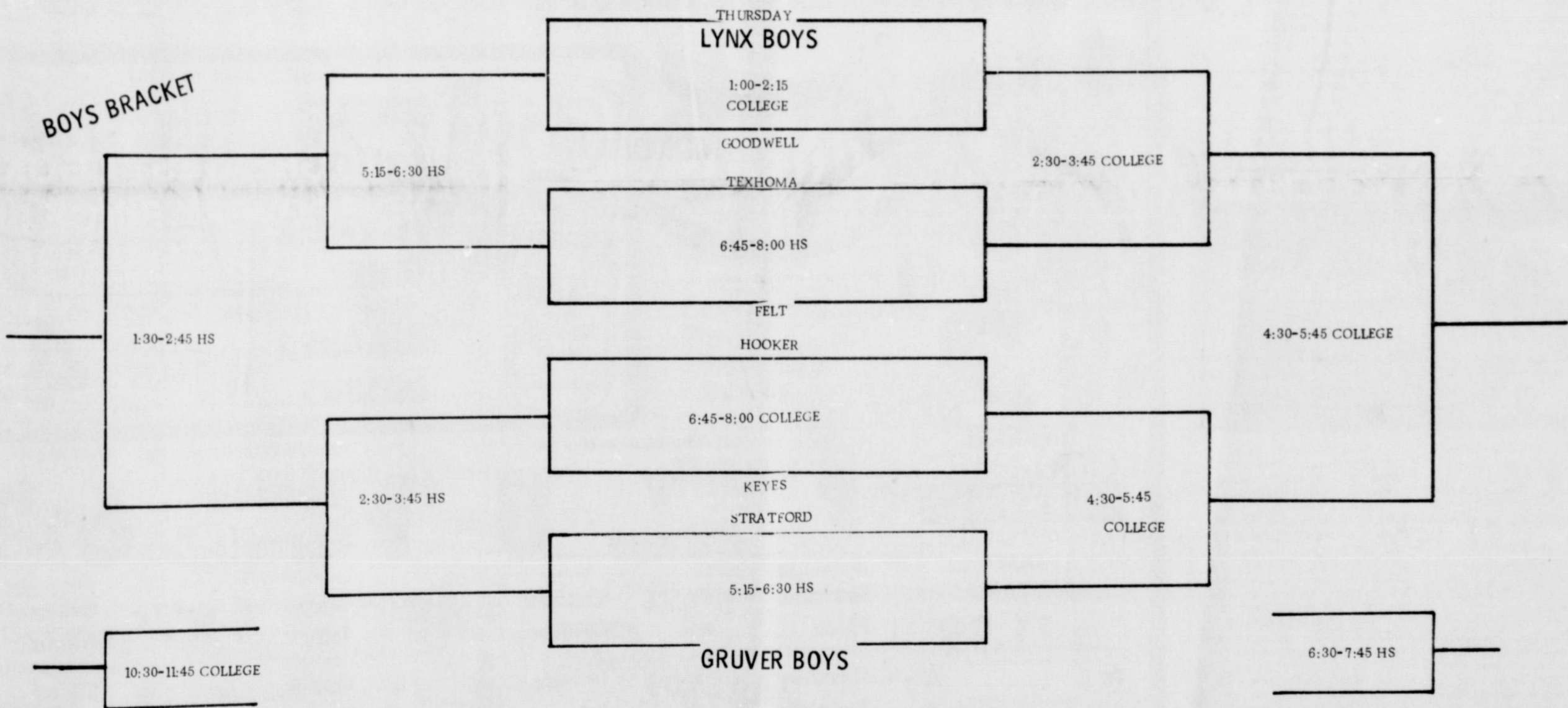
