The Chamber would like to invite everyone to come together as a community to make this a yearly event. Contact Chris for more information at (806)250-3491.



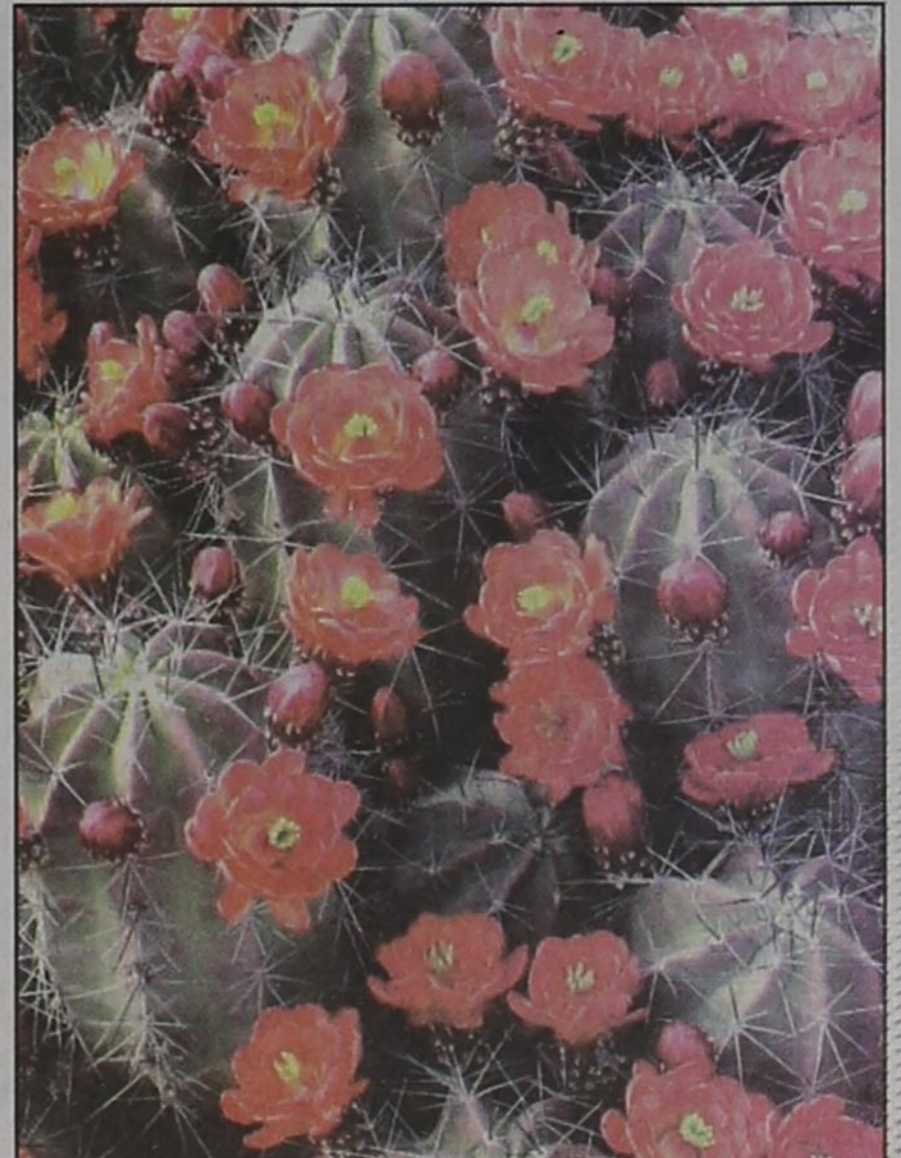

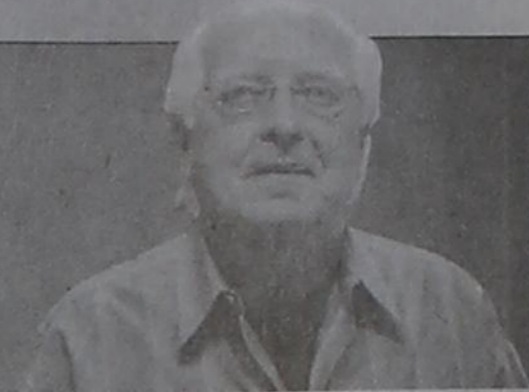

The Pentagon is holding a Pride Month event next week honoring gay and lesbian service members.

The City of Philadelphia is flying the transgender flag next to the American flag this month.

June is LGBT Pride Month.

Transgender people can be straight, gay, lesbian, or bisexual plus a few other categories.

A website called boing boing has published a guide to correctly speaking and writing about transgender people. For example; it is disrespectful to refer to a person as a transgender. They should be called a transgender person. The website says transgender

is not a noun. The newest transgender person, Bruce Caitlyn Jenner got more than one million Twitter followers in four hours, a new record. What exactly will they be following?

Mr. Jenner, now Ms. Jenner, has gone from the Wheaties box as an Olympic champion to the cover of Vanity Fair as a different kind of champion, or something. Dr. Paul R. McHugh, former psychiatrist-in-chief at John Hopkins Hospital, wrote this: "Sex change is biologically impossible. People who undergo sex reassignment surgery do not change from men to women or vice versa. Rather, they be-

come feminized men or masculinized women. Claiming that this is a civil rights matter and encouraging surgical intervention is in reality to collaborate with and promote a mental disorder."

Having said all of that, I wonder what the brouhaha is about with Bruce Caitlyn Jenner. I never realized how many different sexual preferences there are. Over the years I have had gay friends and had gay employees in my travel agent days.

That was back when the word "gay" covered it all. When the gay community began to publicly emerge they were all called gay. I can recall sometime in the 70s there was a travel agency in Abilene named

Gay Travel. The owners' last name was Gay. Eventually they changed the name because folks thought they catered only to gay people and it affected their business.

My son Zac, who is 26 and lives in Austin, told me that many straight guys go to gay bars because a lot of straight

women go there since they know they will not be harassed by a bunch of drunk straight guys. I know, it is all pretty complicated and not an area I want to dwell on.

Through the years many classes of people have been harassed and discriminated against because of ethnicity, skin color, sexual preference, and a variety of other reasons. All of that is

now against the law.

I do feel that no power, including the church, can change LGBT people. They can preach fiery sermons and quote scripture all they want but it will not change the gay community. I would prefer they preach tolerance and get on with life.

What I really do not understand is why we have celebrations and flags and parades honoring the LGBT movement. Doesn't it seem odd that a bunch of folks promote themselves by having a sex parade? Why is it necessary and what does it accomplish?

It seems no one really knows and most of us do not really care.

I personally think he is fruitcake and does not need to be in public office. What are your thoughts?

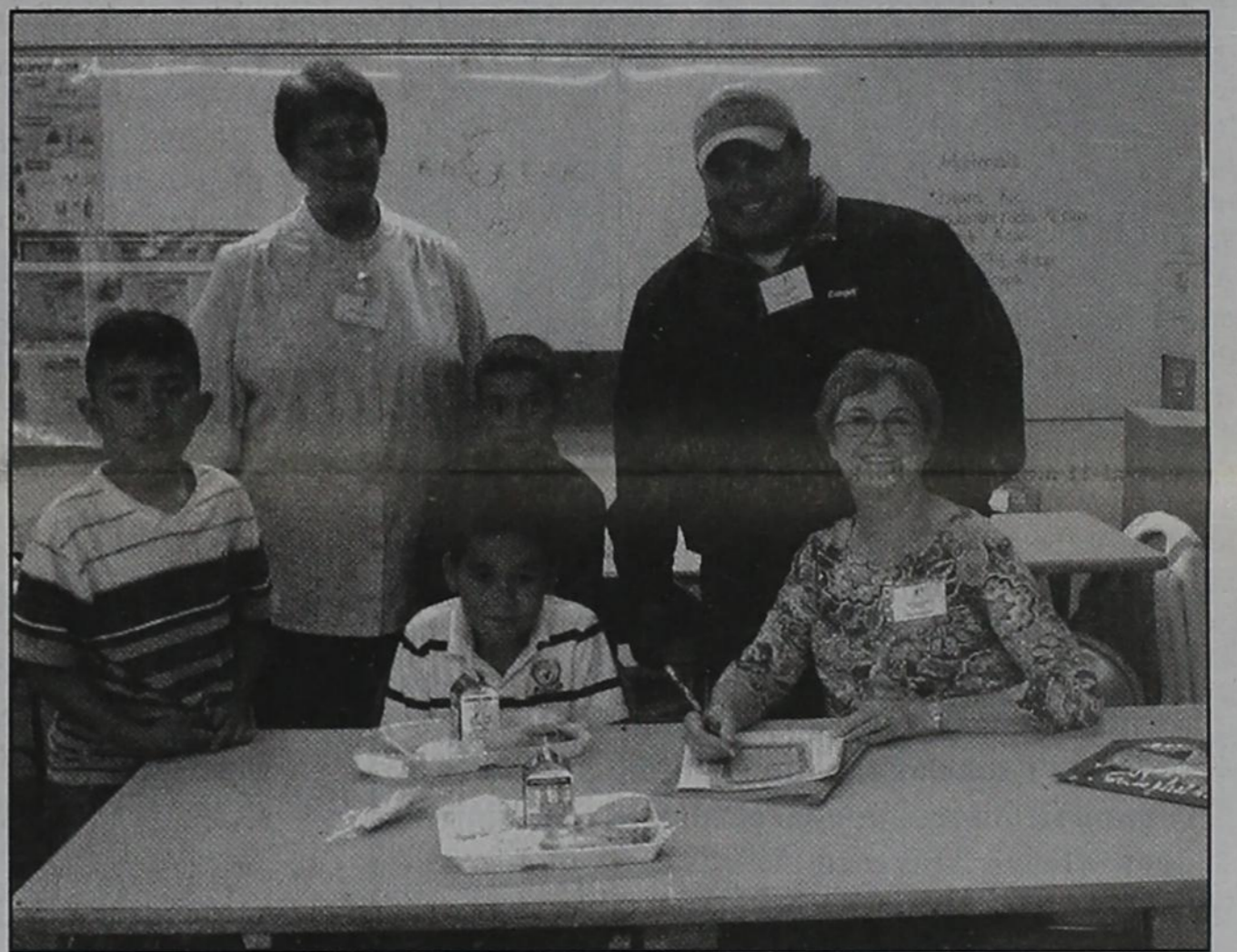
And finally from Shelby Township, Michigan: Shelby Township Police have had a wide variety of suspects in patrol cars but they had a first recently.

Sound like interesting places to go, huh? These are some of the names of county roads in Oklahoma and Arkansas. Everything is so pretty and green from the Texas Panhandle and beyond due to our bountiful rainfall in May—indeed record historical totals.

Lots of wildlife was milling about also because of the rain and since it is springtime. We saw turtles, turtles and more turtles on our travels—even a snapping turtle, when was the last time you saw one of those?! Some of them were alive and traveling on and some of them did not make it very far on their journeys. There were also armies of armadillos, but most of them had perished in their battles with highway traffic.

Three deer, all does, appeared in the woods around Hopper, all of them quickly and silently disappearing into the thickness of the nearby woodlands. We also saw a wild turkey moseying along the highway on the road to Ft. Smith; he also disappeared quite quickly into the brush.

There were many eagles and hawks, pairs of cardinals and blue jays, as well as mockingbirds along with crowds of crows. A couple of squirrels and some rabbits appeared just for fun along with porcupines and skunks and even the masked bandit—a raccoon appeared nightly to see what secrets the day's garbage held. Every evening we heard a cacophony of sounds as frogs and toads, crickets and other critters joined in to the symphony of nature. It was awesome. Too rainy and cool for fireflies, I guess.

But a very special blessing in deed was seeing the vast native grasslands green again; they are so beautiful! It was so much different from just a few years ago when the same area was blackened as far as the eye could see from a wildfire caused by the extreme dryness and horrific winds. This, along with a vast array of wildflowers in bloom and blossoming bear grass produced a perfect picture of the area as it was meant to be—beautiful.

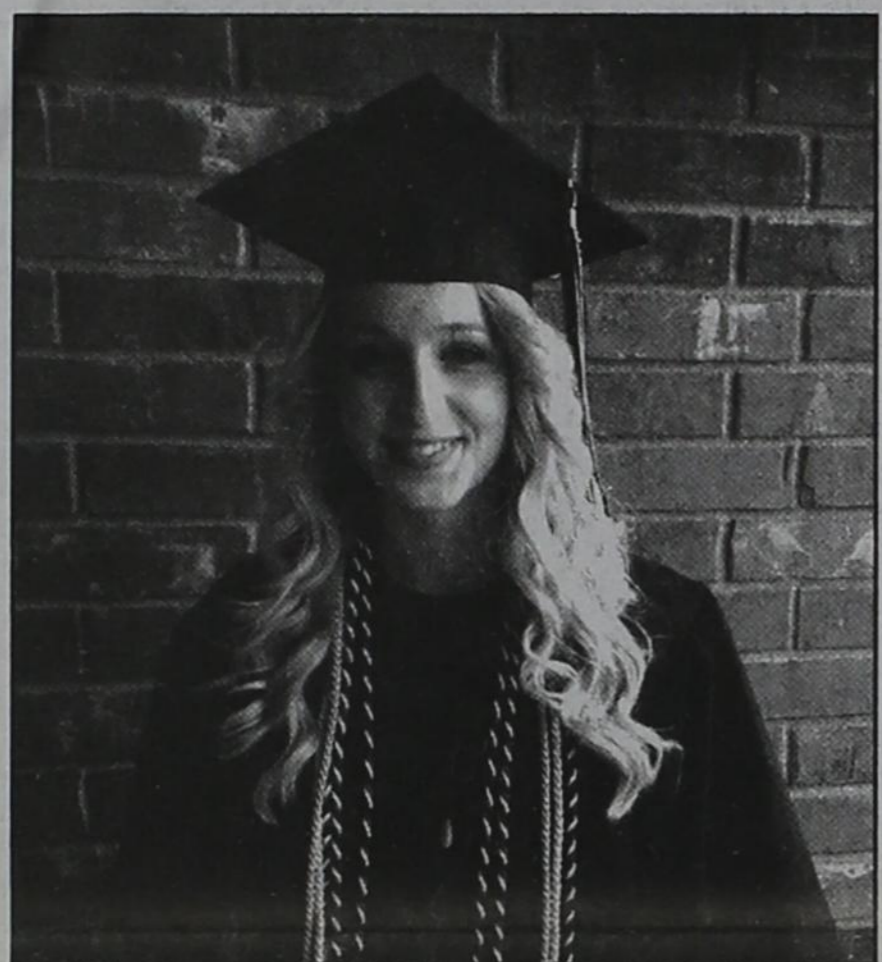

Mike Prather, I.T. Director at Parmer County Medical Center, informed the group about the new Chronic Care Clinic.

"We have worked for three years to get funded under the new health programs," he said. "This program is to help uninsured or Medicaid people in our community."

Prather explained that medical costs have risen and the idea behind the chronic care clinic is to help patients care for themselves.

"The clinics will focus on diabetic patients. Each will have blood sugar tests and medical treatment. There will be one-on-one care with a specialist," he said.

The one-on-one care is with a social worker, a pharmacist, a therapist, a dietitian and a nurse practitioner. Currently, seven people are in the program, which lasts three months with weekly meetings.

Mrs. Rhonda Sanders, director of Blue Bonnet Home Health and Hospice Care, explained that diabetes complicates one life. She mentioned that social life in our society often centers on food and eating.

"Diabetics must learn that self care is important. They need family support. Our team at the Chronic Care Clinic has made a big impact on these patients lives," she said. "They learn how to care for their own health."

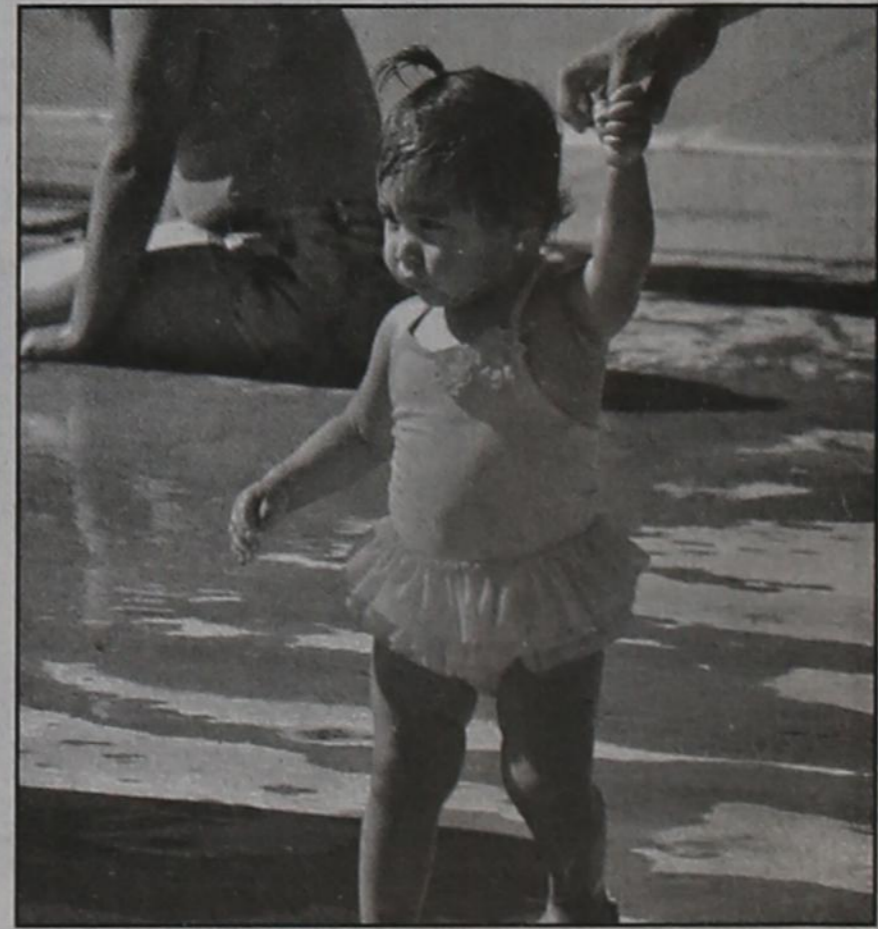

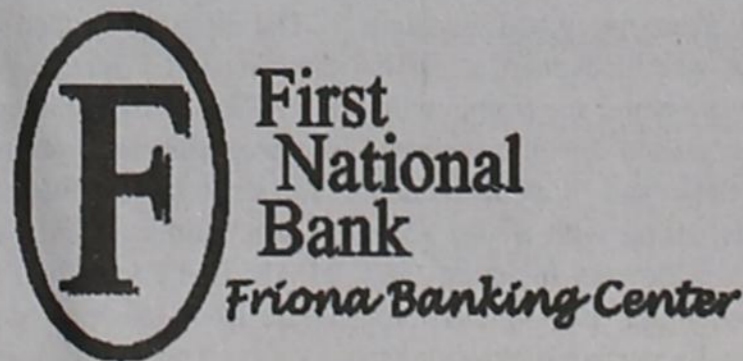
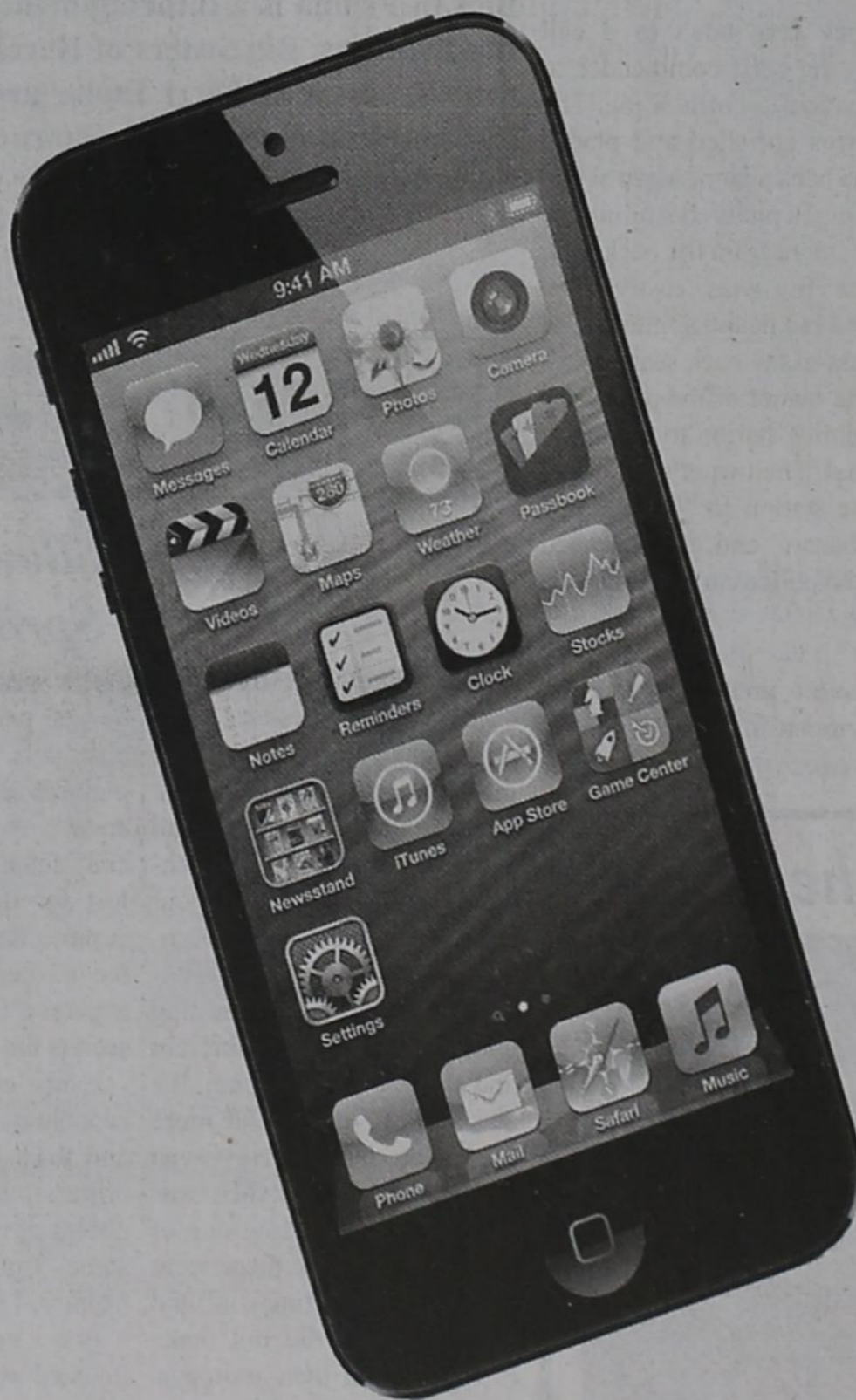

Social Security announces expansion of online service

The Social Security Administration introduced the expansion of online services available through its 'my Social Security' portal available at www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount. Carolyn W. Colvin, Acting Commissioner of Social Security, announced that Medicare beneficiaries can now obtain a replacement card if they have lost, damaged, or simply need to replace it online using a my Social Security account.

"I'm excited about this newest online feature to the agency's 'my Social Security' portal and the added convenience we're providing Medicare beneficiaries," Acting Commissioner Colvin said. "Any 'my Social Security' account holder who misplaces their Medicare card will be able to request a replacement card using their online my Social Security account."

Requesting a replacement card through 'my Social Security' account is a convenient, cost-effective and secure way to ensure Medicare beneficiaries have a critical piece of identification available when required by medical providers as proof of Medicare coverage. Simply access your online my Social Security account at www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount and select the "Replacement Documents" tab. Then select "Mail my replacement Medicare card." After you request a card, it will arrive in the mail in approximately 30 days. 'my Social Security' is a secure, online hub for doing business with Social Security, and more than 19 million people have created a personal account. Current Social Security beneficiaries can manage their account—change an address, adjust direct deposit, obtain a benefit verification letter, or request a replacement SSA-1099. Account holders still in the workforce can verify their earnings, and obtain estimates of future benefits. In addition to those existing services, Medicare beneficiaries will now be able to request a replacement Medicare card without waiting for a replacement form in the mail.

Parmer County History with the copyright listed as 1974 gives details of the trails of Parmer County. The census of 1880 was zero. Politicians drawing three straight lines on the Panhandle map created the county.

Running Water Draw had been used as a major way for the moving of large herds of cattle across the area. It was spoken of as the Comanche Trail to Santa Fe. This Draw seldom had any running water, only after big rains that

would fill the brakes above it. It had no head but came from Eastern New Mexico near Melrose.

Frio Draw heads in Eastern New Mexico and crosses west of Bovina to join Tierra Blanco or Tule Creek.

The recent drought emphasizes the critical need for water in the Parmer County area. If you are interested in the county history, you will find much information in the first history book, which is still available.

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service offices in Parmer and Bailey counties will conduct a Barley Crops Tour on June 5 near Muleshoe.

To get to the barley trial, drive 9 miles east of Muleshoe on U.S. Highway 70; then go north on Farm-to-Market Road 2910 for 4 miles; turn west and go 1.5 miles on County Road 40. The site will be on the north side of the road.

"This is one of the best small grains trials we've had in our counties for quite some time," said Curtis Preston, AgriLife Extension agent in Bailey County. "We urge anyone interested in barley production to make a point to attend this program as it's really worth viewing."

Preston said the speaker will be Dr. Calvin Trostle, AgriLife Extension agronomist from Lubbock.

Trostle will discuss area barley agronomics and will be comparing them to that of wheat.
