Reconstruction Finance Corpo ration Loan Repayments Show Banks Lead Procession in Recovery Movement

Indicating a rapid return on the part of the banks to a normal self-sustaining the difficulties of the past two years have been repaid by them, it is shown in a recent official report.


The R. F. C. report, issued on March 6. says that the Corporation since it began operations in February, 1932, had made aggregate cash advances to railroads, agricultural and home loan agencies, insurance companies and various other institutions in the amoua of \$4,786,410,000. Of this sum banks and trust companies, to the number of 5,783, received actual cash advances of \$1,520,540,000, but have already paid back \$820,260,000, or 54 per cent. These figures are exclusive of \$376,390,000 in loans authorized but withdrawn or not availed of by the banks.

Non-banking borrowers received R. F. C. advances in the amount of \$3,265,-870,000, and made repayments of \$377,-830,000, or less than 12 per cent. Among other classes of financial institutions reported as making high ratios of repayments are building and loan associations which had received \$114,020,-000 and have repaid \$53,880,000, or over 47 per cent, and insurance companies. whose borrowings totalled \$88,590,000 and repayments \$34,340,000, or nearly 30 per cent. None of the major nongovernmental financial groups showed so high a ratio of repayments as the banks and trust companies as a group.

il tay for that nurnose Several hundred suits to enjoin collection of the processing taxes have been filed in Federal courts by processors. If they pay the taxes and the act is held unconstitutional by the Supreme court, they will not be able to recover, under a provision of the pending amendments prohibiting recovery suits against the government.

DROPPING all their rebellious indignation, the Democrats of the house did everything the administration wished in considering the social security bill as altered by the senate. The conferees had settled all differences after two weeks of hard work. but one of the amendments they accepted was that permitting private pension systems to function under the measure. #### SMALL NEED YET TO WORRY ABOUT ICE RECESSION

It appears that our refrigerating plant is breaking down. The matter of the receding polar ice cap has for a long time engaged the attention of scientists. Within recent times the recession of the cap has been of such proportions that evidence of it has been observed within the span of only a few decades.

For instance, the Russian Arctic expert, N. G. Datsky, in re-examining areas surveyed 40 years before, found that in Siberia, where his predecessor, Professor Shrenk, found eternal frost at the depth of two meters, there was now no frost at any depth, not even in the marshes. In other localities, where Professor Shrenk found only shrubless tundra, Mr. Datsky saw new growths of timber!

Only recently, Prof. R. T. Belknap of the University of Michigan came upon a pyramid of rocks and a note originally placed at the foot of the Cornell glacier by the late Professor Tarr. The note was dated 1896. In the time intervening, the glacier had moved back three-quarters of a mile from the marker,

R. F. Griggs of the University of Nashington tells us that in the Alaskan tundra country the forest line is advancing at the rate of a mile a century. Trees are now growing on land which had been barren for 100,000 years,

If this keeps on, you say, Hudson bay will eventually become a subtropical body of water, Well, what of it? It has been several times before, and, if geological evidence is anything to draw conclusions from, it will be again.

According to W. J. Humphries of the United States weather bureau, if all the ice of the polar caps melted. the ocean levels would be raised 151 feet! And that's something else to try out on the slide rule.-Earl Chapin in Forum and Century.

#### "EMBALMING" LOGS

Logs are preserved for use as telegraph and telephone poles by forcing a fluid into the grain of the wood by air pressure. The sap is forced out of the log by the pressure of 15 pounds and a rubber cap is clamped on the butt. #### EXPERT EXPLAINS HEAVY RAINFALL IN CLOUDBURST

Why a "cloudburst" may yield many times as much rain as all the water in the cloud when the rain begins is explained by Charles F. Talman, well-known meteorologist of the United States weather bureau, in an account for the American Nature association of Washing ton, says the Baltimore Sun.

Even the densest clouds never contain more than about one part of water to 30,000 parts of air, which is far much less than the water in many so-called cloudbursts, which have been observed and measured, even if every bit of cloud condensed and fell as rain at the same instant. It is a usual experience, also, that the clouds do not vanish during a cloudburst, but are apparently just as thick and dense afterward as be


Mr. Talman explains that a cloudburst really is an especially sudden and violent thunder storm, in which great currents of warm, moist air from close to the ground rush rapidly a mile or more up into the atmosphere, are cooled suddenly by this rise and give up their load of moisture in the form of raindrops.

The rapid up-currents of air may keep most of these raindrops aloft for a while, but presently the upward air currents slacken and billions of the suspended droplets fall as a violent rain.

The water in one of these sudden falls may have been drawn from the low air for many square miles around the spot where the cloudburst happens. What may have been the world's record cloudburst is described as 24 inches of rain falling in less than five minutes, but Mr. Talman is skeptical. The maximum acceptable record is one of about an inch of rain in a minute, which fell in California in 1926.

Swords Made History

Two historic swords have been made national treasures in Japan. The first is that worn by the late Fleet Admiral Togo at the Battle of the Japan sea, originally the gift of the late Emperor Taisho when his majesty was crown prince. The second is a samural sword called "Bizen Fukuoka Ichimonji," which was presented to Viscount Chokei Okabe formal feudal lord of Kishiwada by the city of Kishiwada. Both will be displayed in museums in Tokyo.



Ayres Tells Banking Groups.

Inflation a Slow Process if inflation does come it will be a low process, he said, pointing out that Germany, France, Belgium and Italy took about five years to develop fro

ered upon the policy of financing larg deral securities mainly to banks rather than to private investors.

"The method that we are following is the one that proved disastrous in Europe for in all those countries inluding Germany, the increasing issues of money that caused the inflations were not mere printing press issues of fint currency, but were secured by government bonds and notes discount ed at the banks. Nevertheless, the process is inherently a slow one.

Among the clearest lessons taught by the European experience, Colone Ayres asserted, is that there are "no good hedges against inflation." He

Did Not Lighten Debt Burdens One of the strange facts about thes inflations is that while they destroye the values of most existing debts, they ild not succeed in lightening the deb ourdens of either the people as whole, or of the corporations.

"Inflation destroys the value of bond nomic difficulties that these share and equity holders are at once forced to incur new indebteduess so that when tabilization comes the problems of debt are about as troublesome as they were before, or even more so."

The five requisites of inflation were listed by Colonel Ayres as first, a pe and, a rising stock market; third, rea credit expansion; fourth, greater out flow of gold "than we can tolerate which would force us to cut our currency entirely free from gold"; and fifth, continued large budget deficits in

## AND THE BANKS

By F. N. SHEPHERD Executive Manager American Bankers Association WHILE banking today appears in a wholly distorted light in the eyes of some, the more reasoning elements



in our population undoubtedly have a less jaundiced view than would appear from certain irresponsible orators, often posing as spokesmen for that indefinite quantity called "the mass" of our people. Anti-social act

on the part of some bankers for have bee the subject of speciacular exposures, but I can say without reservation that they were in no way typical of the acts and attitudes of the vast majority of their fellow bankers. The public mind was shocked into the belief that these untypical instances were far more representative than they really were, and this belief has been encouraged by political and demagogic elements.

The Bankers Today The bankers who are in charge of our banks today represent men who withstood the temptations and avoided the economic pitfalls of the great boom. If they had not they would not be there, or their banks would not have been able to survive the rack and ruin of the economic hurricane, by which even many banks and bankers, whose conduct was above reproach, have been destroyed. The other types of bankers, those that fell below the high standards of professional ethics and business prudence that characterized those that remain, have passed out of the picture. But they have left for those that remain a difficult heritage of suspicion and ill will.

How irrational this is, when we reflect that not more than three or four per cent of our entire population suffered personal loss because of what any banker did or neglected to do. whereas literally millions of bank depositors did no lose a single cent as a result of banking difficulties and really owe a vote of confidence and thanks to their own bankers who were true to the highest conceptions of their stewardship and brought their institutions and their customers safely through the greatest business disaster the world has ever seen. It has been a pseuliar feature of the psychological distortion of the times that many who owe nothing but gratitude to their bankers joined in blaming the banker far out of proportion with any rational consideration of the facts.


