### Shrine Uniform Bodies Make Free Trip Possible.

One of the most unique and unusual projects ever to be conducted in Texas will soon be in "working order" for the citizens of Christoval and the surrounding area.

The Western, Union, Grayhound, Bowen transportation systems and local fraternal members have been notified that the Shrine Stamp Committee will make its appearance shortly. This newspaper will give official announcement when the plan is in operation among the local merchants—through whom the Centennial Thrift Stamps are issued to the public.

### "An Empire on Parade."

Dallas, Oct. 8. — "We invite our fellow Texans, our fellow Americans, and our fellow citizens of the world to a land rich in background and rich in promise—we invite you to an Empire on Parade."

With these inspiring words Dr. George B. Dealey, president and publisher of the Dallas Morning News, and the News, which was founded in Galveston while Texas was still a republic, devoted its program to honoring the hundredth anniversary of Texas independence. It was the second time within a week that the story of the Texas Centennial had been carried to the American people over a nation-wide hook-up. On the preceding Sunday, Major Bowe's Amateur Hour had been dedicated to the Centennial observance.

Following a musical program by the Dallas Symphony Orchestra, Dr. Dealey delivered his brief address. Its text follows: "Fellow Texans and fellow countrymen, Texas will be 100 years old next year. It was just a century ago that a pitifully small army of men took up arms to fight, and many to die, to gain freedom for themselves and for the vast territory they had made their home. Previously the flags of three nations had flown over these hundreds of thousands of square miles. Now there rose a fourth banner, the Lone Star flag of the Republic of Texas. It rose from the ruins of the Alamo, a peaceful mission turned overnight into a shambles; from the trampled loam of Goliad and Gonzales; from the graves of San Jacinto. This achievement, this victory of spirit over incredible physical odds, now inspires Texas and six million Texans to the celebrations of 1936.

"Texas, we are not ashamed to say, is no longer a sovereign republic. She is a State of the mighty Union, proud of her position but also proud to remember the fierce struggle by which statehood in the Union was ultimately attained. During our Centennial year the hallowed episodes of 'The Birth of Texas' will be re-enacted. These historical sites—San Antonio and the Alamo, Houston and San Jacinto, Nacogdoches, Gonzales, Huntsville, and scores of others—will be memorialized. Here in Dallas, central city of the State-wide celebration, a great exposition will be staged starting in June, 1936. Fifteen million dollars are being expended to make the Texas Central Exposition at Dallas a world fair in all of the best meaning of the term.

"Here will be displayed the powers and resources of Texas, the evidence of its economic and cultural importance. Here will be shown the native, indigenous things by which Texas preserves her individuality; here will be shown the priceless monuments of contemporary development by which Texas stands with any other region of the globe. The exposition will be beautiful to behold, instructive and entertaining. And it is to this that we invite you in June, 1936. We invite our fellow Texans, our fellow Americans, and our fellow citizens of the world to a land rich in background and rich in promise—we invite you to an Empire on Parade."

### On Texas Farms.

Cover crops to improve his land are a part of the agricultural faith of Henry W. Meyer of Realitos, Duval county. Mr. Meyer bases his faith on works, having in 1924 planted 25 acres of land to cowpeas which were grazed and then turned under. This land produced eight and a third bales of cotton in 1935, a yield well above the county average.

Louis Young of Katy, Harris county, has a baby beef which has made gains of approximately three pounds daily. The calf is now on a ration composed of 76 per cent corn, 20 per cent rolled oats and 10 per cent pea sized cotton seed meal. Louis who is a 4-H club boy, is planning to show the calf at Houston.

To J. E. McDaniel, out in the Slidell community, goes the distinction of digging the first trench silo in Wise county. This trench, which is 10 feet wide at the top by 8 feet wide at the bottom and 7 feet deep by 90 ft. long has a capacity of about 90 tons of silage and will provide sufficient feed, so far as roughage is concerned, for the entire winter and well into the spring for his dairy cattle.

He was closely followed by L. L. Birres, just out of Decatur, who has completed another silo, 8 feet wide at the top by 6 feet wide at the bottom and 7 feet deep by 70 feet long, with a capacity of about 50 tons of silage.

## IMPROVED UNIFORM INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL Lesson

### Lesson for October 13 THE STORY OF JEREMIAH

LESSON TEXT—Jeremiah 1:6-10; 2:3-12.  
GOLDEN TEXT—Thou shalt go to all that I send thee, and whatsoever I command thee thou shalt speak. Jeremiah 1:7.  
PRIMARY TOPIC—The Story of Jeremiah.  
JUNIOR TOPIC—The Story of Jeremiah.  
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Taking a Stand for God.  
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Attacking Entrenched Evils.

I. Jeremiah's Call (1:1-10).  
1. It was pre-natal (v. 4, 5). Before Jeremiah was born God ordained him a prophet to the nations.  
2. His diffidence (v. 6). This seems to have grown out of his youth and inexperience.  
3. His hesitancy overcome (v. 7, 8). God graciously appeared to him and made clear that he should go where sent, speak as commanded, and to be not afraid of the faces of his enemies. This was accompanied by the assurance of the divine presence. It matters little as to the strength of the foe if the presence of God is with the messenger.  
4. The divine message given (v. 9). The very words were put into the prophet's mouth, not merely the thoughts but the proper words to express the thoughts.  
5. The nature of his ministry (v. 10). It was to be wider than that of prophesying. Six words were given as descriptive thereof. The first four are destructive in their implication: "root out," "pull down," "destroy," and "throw down." The last two are constructive: "build" and "plant." The destructive precedes the constructive.

II. Jeremiah's Grief (9:1).  
The unbelief of the people made him feel that his efforts were fruitless. Seeing so clearly the awful doom which awaited this people, he wept sorely. The true prophet of God takes to heart the seriousness of his ministry and sorely grieves over the wicked unbelief of the people.

III. Jeremiah's Prophecy in the Temple Court (20:1-24).

1. Jeremiah's solemn warning to Judah (vv. 1-7). The Lord commanded him to stand in a conspicuous place in the Temple and proclaim the judgment which was about to fall upon them. The object was to provoke them to repentance. If they did not repent, God would make the Temple as Shiloh, Shiloh was once the dwelling place of God; now it had fallen into decay. So will it be with the Temple. Jeremiah was sent to speak the words which his Lord had told him and not to diminish a word.  
2. Jeremiah on trial (vv. 8-11).  
a. Cause of arrest. He was arrested for speaking all that the Lord had commanded.  
b. The charge (vv. 8, 9). They charged him with a capital crime, which involved pretending to speak for God and speaking against the Temple and the city. This would make him to be guilty of blasphemy and sacrilege, both of which were to be punished by death (Deut. 18:20; Lev. 24:16).  
c. The princes sit in judgment (vv. 10, 11). We thus see that matters of state were not entirely in the hands of priests, but in part were controlled by members of the royal family.

3. Jeremiah's defense (vv. 12-15). Threats of death did not deter him from preaching, but only inspired him to repeat his message with clearness and tenderness.  
a. Reiterated the divine commission.  
b. He urged them to amend their ways and to obey God and thus avert the divine judgment (v. 13).  
c. He gave himself up (v. 14). He did not resist the powers of government. Knowing that God had sent him, he was content to trust God for deliverance.  
d. Warns of fatal consequences. He frankly told them that God had sent him and if they killed him they would be guilty of defying God.

4. Jeremiah saved (vv. 16-24).  
a. The princes pronounce him not guilty (v. 16). They were convinced that Jeremiah was speaking the truth.  
b. The elders plead for Jeremiah (vv. 17-23). They cited two cases: Meshach (vv. 18, 19) and Uriah (vv. 20-23). They argued that killing God's prophets did not turn aside his judgment but intensified it. The only way to avert the judgment is to turn from their sins.  
c. Jeremiah rescued by Ahikam (v. 24). He was a man of such influence that he was able to interfere at such a critical time.

Cenie Crawford McCarty passed away in Christoval at the home of Mrs. Kate Mims on October 4th, 1935.

She was born January 5, 1850, in Geny County, Missouri. She was an alumnus of the University of Missouri.

In 1865 she was married to David Quincy McCarty of California, where she resided until 1881. In that year she and her husband came to Texas, first settling on a ranch in the section known as the Bismark farm. She experienced the Ben Ficklin flood of 1882. She united with the Presbyterian Church at a very tender age, and was a charter member of the Presbyterian Church at Christoval and a member of the U. S. A. Presbyterian Church of San Angelo, Texas.

### Again—The People Speak

An event of unusual import to those who would tinker with the United States Constitution has occurred recently in Pennsylvania—the state wherein our National Charter of Liberties was conceived and written.

There, for the first time since recent efforts to remould our Federal Constitution along the lines of the newer political philosophy gained national prominence, the people themselves were given opportunity to say what they thought of that sort of thing.

Emphatically they rejected the idea. Dominated by the vote from rural districts and the smaller cities, they decided that this was no time to risk the possible writing into fundamental law of various unproven theories now being urged throughout America as a substitute for crystallized experience.

The people of Pennsylvania, of course, voted only on the question of retaining their own state constitution. But fundamentally—and despite whatever political spokesmen on either side may claim—some of the principles involved were comparable to those brought into prominence by the nation-wide efforts of certain groups to remould our Federal Constitution into a form more readily influenced by passing fears and passions.

In the response may be read a heartening message of encouragement to all who oppose efforts to scrap certain essential elements of our American system of government in favor of new and untried theories. It is:

"That the great body of the people—the men and women who constitute the backbone of America—are not at this time in sympathy with a policy of sudden changes. They realize that while it was the Declaration of Independence that proclaimed personal liberty, it is the Federal Constitution that assures it. They do not intend to surrender that guarantee.

Again—the People speak.

### Wooden Flywheel.

After an accident to the flywheel in a large European electric station the superintendent designed and had constructed a flywheel of wood which has a diameter of 65 feet and a rim width of ten feet. The thickness of the rim is about 12 inches and it is made up of 44 thicknesses of beech planks with staggered joints. The boards were glued together and then bolted. The inside consists of a double wheel, the 24 spokes of which are fastened to two hubs. Spokes and hubs are operated at 75 revolutions a minute, which corresponds to a peripheral speed of the rim of 129 feet a second.
