Confederate Battle Flag is the Official Flag.

The following resolutions was adopted at the 46th Annual Reunion of the United Confederate Veterans held at Shreveport La., June 11, 1936:

"Whereas, the official flag of the Confederate States of America was established by act of Congress of the Confederate States of America, under date of March 4, 1865, which flag is described as follows:

"The field to be white, the length double the width of the flag the outer half of the fly beyond the canton a red vertical stripe; with the Union (now used as a battle flag), to be of a square of two thirds the width of the flag having the ground red, thereon a broad saltire of blue bordered with white and emblazoned with mullets or five-pointed stars, corresponding in number to that of the Confederate States, and

"Whereas, the hereinbefore described flag, together with the battle flag referred to, was at the end of the Confederacy the official flag of the Confederate States of America, and formerly established flags (automatically became obsolete, and

"Whereas, for more than seventy years two flags have been used by the Confederate Veterans and the Sons of Veterans, and have always been used at all reunions of Confederate soldiers and in ceremonies and memorials honoring the Confederate dead, and

"Whereas, those two flags have been memorialized in song and story and have been perpetuated in our history for more than seventy years and this flag of the Confederacy has been consistently referred to as the Stars and Bars, now

"Therefore, be it resolved that the flag of the Confederate States of America established March 4, 1865, together with the battle flag was and is the established and official flag of the Confederate States of America (whether this reference be due to fact or usage covering a long period of time) and

"Be it further resolved that we recognize no other flag design as our emblem and that we authorize and direct Sons of Confederate Veterans, Daughters of the Confederacy and Children of the Confederacy, or any other organization claiming to perpetuate the history and ideals of the Confederacy and to the memory of those who gave all to those ideals, to use the design of the flag established March 4, 1865, or the battle flag design only, and none other, as their official emblem."

Stovall Asks Second Term as County Judge.

Jim W. Stovall went into the office of County Judge of this county January 1, 1935, and in making his announcement for re-election to that office, asks for a second term upon the basis of his record in that office and his ability.

He pledges himself to serve for the benefits of the citizens of the county as a whole.

New laws have brought new responsibilities to that office and he has consistently worked to take care of such responsibilities, Mr. Stovall says:

"In announcing my candidacy for re-election for a second term of County Judge of Tom Green county I desire to thank the citizenship of this county for honoring me with the office and for their support and cooperation during the time I have served them as their County Judge.

"In my announcement for the office two years ago I promised 'honest service in the performance of the duties of the office of County Judge.' That is the only campaign promise I made. I have to the best of my ability determined the duties of a County Judge under the law and have done everything within my power to perform such duties efficiently, fairly and impartially. The cooperation of the citizenship of this county has been such as to enable me to, in at least a fair measure, to succeed. Knowledge obtained from experience in the office will enable me to perform the duties of the office more efficiently."

"The work of the office is varied and affects the people in many different ways too numerous to mention. I have attempted at all times to render all of the service possible and will continue to do so for whatever time remain in office and offer myself as a candidate for a second term upon such basis, and I respectfully solicit the support of the citizenship of this county.

"I have been a licensed attorney for eight years and practiced law in San Angelo six years before entering office as county judge. Your careful investigation of my official record and consideration of my qualifications will be appreciated."

Commission to Continue Investigating Applications.

Austin, June 15.—This is the fourth of a series of questions asked by citizens of this State and answered by Orville S. Carpenter, executive director of the Texas Old Age Assistance Commission:

Q—Did the United States government have any part in drafting the Texas law?

A—Texas Legislature drafted the Texas Old Age Assistance Law in such form as to enable Federal co-operation. In preparing the bill the Legislative Committee had the assistance and advice of a representative of the National Social Security Board.

Q—How many applications for assistance have been received?

A—About 190,000.

Q—How many applications do you believe will be approved by July 1?

A—Approximately 40,000.

Q—What about the payments to these old people whose applications have not been approved July 1?

A—The Commission will continue investigating applications for assistance, and as each application is approved, the applicant will receive a check for all payments beginning July 1. Aged applicants who are found to be eligible after July 1 will receive back payments. This, of course concerns those who applied before July 1 and are subsequently found eligible.

Q—Payments will be based upon need as required by law?

A—Yes. Payments will not only be based upon need, but upon the amount of need. Old people who need more money will receive larger grants than those whose needs require less.

Q—Is it true that after the first job of investigating the 190,000 applications the operating expenses of the Commission will be paid by the Federal government?

Yes. We believe that a large part, if not all, of the actual costs of operation—after the 190,000 applications have been investigated—will be paid by the U. S. government. The 5 per cent expense allotment allowed Texas by the Social Security Board will be sufficient; we believe, to cover the ordinary running expenses of the Commission.

The Mexican Prisoner's Lament.

After the Battle of San Jacinto the spoils of war included about 400 Mexican mules. Among the 700 Mexican prisoners captured and kept under guard near the battleground was a colonel by the name of Delgado. He wrote in his diary the following lament:

"It is amusing to see the Texas soldiers put saddles on these wicked mules and ride them. They adorn the mule with gay-colored cords taken from our uniforms and fasten the caps of our grenadiers on the ears of these mules. They would also bedeck the wild mules with the epaulets of four officers. They delighted in covering the beasts with all sorts of trappings and colors after the fashion of our bullfighting clowns. One young fellow mounted a mule thus bedecked and the surcingle broke and he and all the trappings were scattered over the field. How strange and undignified these fellows are. They act like wild Comanches."

Current Events in Review

New French Premier Helps Labor Win All Demands. STRIKING workers who paralyzed the industrial life of France at the moment when the "popular front" socialist majority was taking over the reins of the government, won complete victory with the aid of Leon Blum, new premier, as the general strike was settled, a disquieting note was added by a walkout of 150,000 coal miners and textile workers in northern France.

1. Wage increases from 7 to 15 per cent. 2. Recognition of workers' rights to organize in unions. 3. A forty-hour work week. 4. Vacations with pay. 5. Collective bargaining contracts.

Settling of the strike marked a significant victory for the new government which assumed extraordinary powers to devise France's financial system and revitalize national defenses.

Leon Blum. Blum gained support from conservative forces with his announcement that "The People's Front is and will remain hostile to devaluation of the currency."

Texas Opens Its Great Centennial Exposition. TEXAS celebrated the one-hundredth anniversary of its independence by opening a \$25,000,000 centennial exposition in Dallas.

Other buildings and their erection cost include: United States building, \$925,000, largest federal building ever erected at a world's fair; Negro Life building, \$100,000, also erected by government funds.

Speaker Byrns of House Is Taken by Death. DEATH, sudden and unexpected, came to Joseph Wellington Byrns, speaker of the house of representatives, and put an end to a notable career.

Sir Samuel Hoare Back in British Cabinet. CALLED back to the British cabinet, which he left some months ago as a political scapegoat, Sir Samuel Hoare was made first lord of the admiralty, to succeed Viscount Montell.

Industrial Mobilization Plan Is Condemned. THE so-called industrial mobilization plan of the War department, providing for a military dictatorship over labor, capital and industry, as well as censorship of the press in wartime, was severely condemned in a report to the senate by the munitions committee.

Senate Passes Its Own Tax Revenue Measure. THE senate passed the \$820,000,000 compromise revenue measure by a vote of 38 to 24. The bill then went to conference with the house of representatives which had enacted a revenue measure carrying out tax proposals made by President Roosevelt.

Chester Davis Appointed to Reserve Board. AGRICULTURE was given representation on the federal reserve board through the appointment by President Roosevelt of Chester C. Davis, administrator of the AAA to that body.

Doctor Tolley. Mr. Davis was born on a farm in Iowa, was graduated from Grinnell college and later owned and operated a farm. For some years he was a newspaper publisher and then became editor of the Montana Farmer.

File Plan Urges Ban on Unfair Trade Practices. IN A report just made public the business advisory council proposes a simplified basis for industrial self-regulation through the medium of voluntary joint agreements on unfair trade practices enforceable by the federal trade commission.

Outstanding among the committee's proposals were suggestions that each branch of an industry, such as wholesale, retail, and manufacturing, police the activities of each other through confidential reports to the federal trade commission and that no attempt be made to include trade practice and labor provisions in the same agreements.

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All Around the House

When making cinnamon toast cut bananas in thin slices, arrange on toast, sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon and brown under the broiler.

If cherries or berries are rolled in flour before putting them into the pie crust the juice will be thickened and will not run out.

Squeeze into a tumbler the juice of half a lemon and fill with grape juice. Served cold this makes a delicious drink.

If lattices for rose bushes and vines that grow on the house are put on hinges it will be easy to lay them on the ground when painting your house.

The ribs of an old umbrella may be used as stakes to tie plants to. They are not conspicuous in a garden.

To remove mildew from a leather bag, rub with petroleum ointment and allow it to remain on bag until mildew comes off easily.

Rub the electric iron once a week with paraffin applied on a soft cloth. This will keep iron clean and smooth.

A tablespoon of lemon juice added to the egg in which fish is dipped before frying gives it a delicious flavor.

Before polishing mahogany furniture wash well with warm water and white soap and dry thoroughly.

Rhubarb may be dried, put in covered baking pans, sprinkled with sugar and cooked in a moderate oven until done. Cooked in this way its color is retained.

Fruit juices and ginger ale may be frozen into cubes in a mechanical refrigerator and used for feed drinks.
