The tables were decorated in green and white and the St. Patrick motif was stressed.

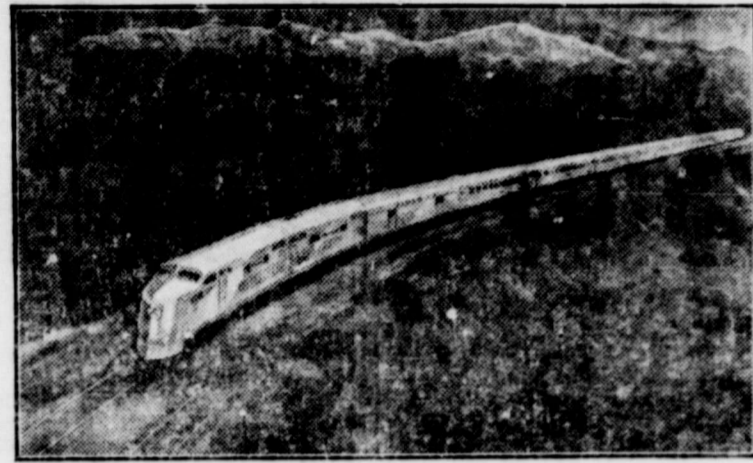
Refreshments of sandwiches, cake and punch were served, with a shamrock forming the center of the sandwiches.

New "Super-Chief" for Western Run



THIS gleaming train, of light-weight, stainless steel will become the famous "Super Chief" of the Santa Fe railroad when it goes into service early in the spring.

The train, nine cars in length, now is under construction by the Edward G. Budd Manufacturing Company of Philadelphia.

Traversing the picturesque lands of the Navajo, it will take over the weekly run between Chicago and Los Angeles—a distance of 2,225 miles—and will cover the route on a schedule of 39 hours, 45 minutes.

Through use of light-weight construction principles, the new train will weigh only half as much as the train it will supersede and will be a radical departure from the conventional design of railway equipment.

The train will be Diesel powered. Now features for comfort and convenience have been built into it and it will have a striking decorative design. The nine cars include five sleepers, cocktail and lounge car, baggage and postoffice car, dining car and an observation car.

Santa Fe Is Given Permission To Close Station At Christoval

Announcement received this week from the Railroad Commission states that the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railroad Co. were given permission to close their station at Christoval and place same in the hands of a caretaker.

The request was granted as a result of a hearing at the Cactus Hotel in San Angelo on February 24 at which Christoval was represented by only two persons.

The company, however, is to assume the charges of all long distance telephone calls that may be placed in ordering cars for shipping freight from the local station.

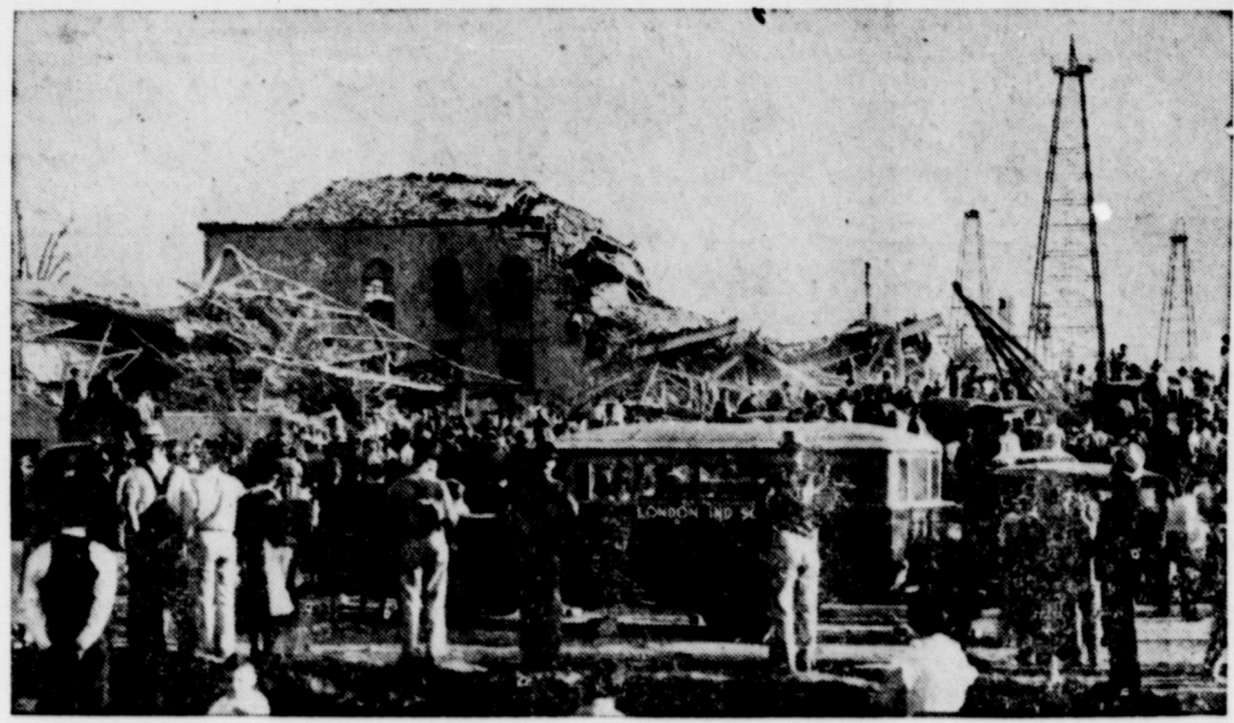

Explosion Destroys World's Largest Rural School



The building in which nearly 500 school children lost their lives in the explosion that wrecked the central portion of the \$1,000,000 plant.

NEW LONDON.—Death and destruction fell with terrific blast on this rural community when on Thursday afternoon a few minutes before time to dismiss the school, an explosive blew out the walls of the New London Rural School and the roof of the building falling on the entrapped pupils crushing and mangling to death nearly 500 pupils, including several teachers. The school, located in the East Texas oil field, is the largest and richest rural school in the world, with an enrollment of more than 1,000 pupils, drawn from a radius of 30 miles.

Oil field workers were running through the forests of derricks. Occasionally there was a faint cry and the shovels halted and hundreds of frenzied hands tore away at the bricks, each pair of hands belonging to a man whose child or children had been in the school until a still living child, though in almost every case, a dying child, was lifted out and sent in a waiting ambulance to a hospital.

cries, all in childish treble. Teachers came out of the opened wall of the auditorium to find headless bodies, armless bodies, bodies so dismembered and mangled that they were not recognizable as bodies. They found children drenched in their own blood running insanely round in circles, to collapse grotesquely.

Col. Clarence E. Parker, absolute ruler of the disaster scene under the authority of Gov. James V. Allred's proclamation of martial law, ordered a military board of inquiry to meet at noon.

Occasionally came a cry from the hundreds of men—huge powerful men, their shoulders heavy with muscles acquired in the toughest school of manual labor—that was not the cry of an injured child.

The basement through which the gas mains ran, had been closed and gas could accumulate there for days, according to C. F. Evans, 29-year-old chairman of the science department.

At the same time the military board meets members of the New London School Board, officials of the oil companies operating in the East Texas field and military authorities will inspect the ruins.

It had been part of a supply used for blasting out rock in clearing the athletic field and contributed not in the least to the disaster.

Long lines of workers formed, and hands rubbed raw and bled as jagged framework and torn bricks were passed along, hand-to-hand. Trucks hastily recruited from the oil field arrived within a few minutes, and cranes lifted tons of wreckage from the broken bodies of the dead and dying children.

Albert Evans, regional director of the Red Cross, arrived and set up relief headquarters at Henderson, five miles from the disaster scene.

Others that circulated during the horror-filled night were that living children and living teachers remained beneath the debris; that their piteous cries filtered up through the heaped brick and mortar.

Darkness fell, and floodlights, hastily installed, cast a ghastly white pall over the temporary tomb of the children.

The blaring of loud speakers, rumble of trucks, screaming of ambulance sirens and tramp of National Guardsmen was pierced occasionally by a scream, as some parent identified a child.

Col. Clarence E. Parker of the National Guard, a kindly greying man, was obviously under a frightful strain.

Executives from oil companies, who stopped operations in the nearby vast East Texas field to volunteer their men and machinery, conferred with Parker to formulate plans for speeding removal of the debris.

Several thousand spectators crowded at the guard lines, eager but helpless to aid.

Col. Clarence E. Parker of the National Guard, a kindly greying man, was obviously under a frightful strain.

The tragedy struck deep into the heart of the nation. From all sections offers of aid and condolences streamed in.

Many Are Maimed. Of the 1,100 students enrolled in the school, less than half escaped death or injury, and the dead far outnumbered the injured.

In Warm Springs President Roosevelt announced he had ordered the Red Cross and all other government agencies to "stand by and render every assistance to the little Texas community."

250 Thought Injured. Red Cross authorities, emergency nurses and doctors, who came from hundreds of miles around, believed that the final account would show the number of injured to be approximately 250.

The slow process of identification moved forward before dawn. Bodies were held in morgues and improvised morgues in a dozen towns. Injured, of which there was yet no accurate estimate, were equally as scattered.

Bond Street of London Named After Speculator

During the Seventeenth, and Eighteenth and the first half of the Nineteenth centuries the Bond street of London had a similar aspect—both were lined with the residences of the well-to-do. Here those of bankers and merchants, there the homes of the landed nobility. Later in both streets merchandising prevailed.

The origin of the New York name is obvious; that of the London street came from Sir Thomas Bond, a Seventeenth century courtier attached to Queen Henrietta Maria, who was always persona grata at the Court of Whitehall in the reign of Charles II, to whom she is said to have advanced large sums of money.

According to Arthur Dasent, writing in the Daily Telegraph of London, toward the end of Charles' reign Sir Thomas began to speculate in London real estate, particularly in the West End, in the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Field. His first transaction as recorded in the local Rate Book was when he acquired in 1663 Clarendon House in Piccadilly from General Monk's son, the second Duke of Albemarle, pulled it down and laid out both Albemarle and Bond streets through the property before he rebuilt.

Oldest Monastery

The Egyptian Coptic church, the World's oldest Christian church, conducts the world's oldest monastery. It is St. Anthony's, founded in the Fourth century and located about 200 miles south of Suez near the Red Sea. From this church the "Abuna" or head of the Abyssinian church used to be chosen.

Georgia's Tobacco Road Does Not Cross Streams

Tobacco road is more than a fictional name. For more than a century before it became famous as the name of a novel it stretched its serpentine length for miles over Georgia's red-clay hilltops. It was constructed for the purpose of transporting tobacco from Georgia farms to the nearest and most accessible shipping point on the Savannah river, states a writer in the New York Times.

It is a sand-clay thoroughfare that carries a fair burden of traffic, although it is not one of the state's main highways. It extends from Northern Georgia to New Savannah, an old settlement and shipping point on the river a few miles below Augusta, which was established prior to 1803, since it is shown on maps published in that year. Its location was chosen because it is immediately below the shoals in Richmond county, which evidently were not always navigable at that time. Tobacco road was doubtless responsible in part for the settlement and certainly for its period of active existence.

Tobacco road passes through many fertile farms and wooded areas of slash pine, oaks and other native trees. One of its most striking peculiarities, which is a tribute to those who routed it and to the patience of those who used it, is that it never crosses a stream. It circuitously follows the highlands, and crosses Richmond county, of which Augusta is the seat, on a ridge almost midway between two creeks. Tobacco would have been ruined had it got wet. Construction of bridges in that day was almost prohibitively difficult and the only method of crossing streams was by fording in shallow places. The primitive way of transporting tobacco provided little or no protection against water. Therefore water was avoided.

Swam Strait Every Night to Visit His Sweetheart

Hero was a priestess of Venus. Leander, a youth of Abydos, a famous city on the Asiatic side of the strait of the Hellespont, nearly opposite the city of Sestos on the European coast, where he first saw Hero. It appears to have been a case of love at first sight, and an intensely ardent one at that, declares a writer in the Cleveland Plain Dealer. Hero's office as priestess, and the resolute opposition of her parents stood in the way of their union, cold and strong as the swift current of the Hellespont, which at its narrowest point is swift and deep and about one and one-fourth miles wide. Undaunted by all these obstacles, Leander swam across the strait every night to visit his beloved, who directed his course by holding a torch from the upper window of a tower on the shore. After many delightful meetings, the dauntless lover was drowned one stormy night, and his body was washed ashore at the foot of the tower where Hero stood, expecting him. Heartbroken at the sight, she flung herself from the tower into the sea, and passed with her lover into the immortality of art and song.

Discovery of Hot Springs

Pioneer trappers who first penetrated Arkansas found a series of mineral springs at what is now Hot Springs. They bathed in the waters and praised their medicinal value. Soon their fame reached the ears of President Jefferson, who sent Lewis and Clark to investigate. Another famous series of hot springs is at Rotorua, New Zealand. The springs cover an area of 680 square miles and vary in temperature from 60 degrees to the boiling point.

Caviar Roe of Sturgeon

Caviar is the roe of the sturgeon. The fish has a long snout with which it roots in the mud for worms. It is notable for its bony armor. It ascends rivers to lay its eggs and seems to prefer the Volga, in Russia. The eggs are gathered up and shipped to all parts of the world. During the reign of England's Edward II the sturgeon was declared a royal fish and has so remained.

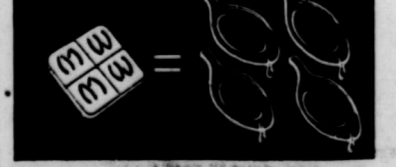

Walking Gracefully—

Learn to Move About With Youthful Step and Fine Poise

EVERY person would like to be graceful, and recoils from being considered awkward. This attribute of grace is held in such high esteem that children are frequently sent to dancing school just to acquire it although they may never become exceptionally fine or professional dancers. They are taught poise and rhythm of motion that gives them the ability to move about with ease of body and grace of action.

Ungainly Gaits. Knowing all this, it is odd that youths of today frequently have ungainly walks. This is instanced in girls especially. Older folk regret it when they themselves do not walk gracefully, and so eventually the young girls will also.

Promenades In Foreign Lands. The art of walking gracefully is a matter of especial attention in some countries. In Italy and many other foreign lands, the afternoon promenade is a function. Not to have a graceful gait is to mark one as awkward and conspicuous. The women from such countries are noted for their erect poise and fine carriage.

Acquiring Grace. A graceful walk can be acquired by anyone who really wishes to be graceful on her feet, unless

she has some pedal affliction. Ungainly gaits may be the result of heedlessness, badly fitting shoes or stockings, actual maladies of the feet, or poor poise. Once you know what is the hindrance to graceful walking, you can set about the task of overcoming it, gracefully.

Some Hints. Throw the shoulders back, hold the head high, watch where you are going without keeping your eyes glued to the ground. Do not ape the stride of men, for their long steps are awkward for women. Learn to flex the knees slightly, not enough to cause you to bob up and down, but just enough to provide that springiness which is an indication of the suppleness of youth.

A Suggestion to Remember. Do not throw the torso first into one hip socket and then the other. This is ungainly and is said to increase the size of the hips. The hint of a "swinging gait" with its buoyancy is desirable but, when exaggerated, this becomes a rolling walk, which is to be avoided. © Bell Syndicate.—WNU Service.

3 tablespoons top cream

1-4 teaspoon dry mustard
1-8 teaspoon paprika
Crisp whole wheat crackers

Combine the cheese, cream, and seasonings; spread on whole wheat crackers. Toast over a low flame until browned.

(2) Spinach and eggs en casserole:

3 cups well drained chopped cooked spinach
1 cup medium white sauce
1 small onion minced
2 sliced hard-cooked eggs
3 tablespoons buttered dry crumbs.

Combine the spinach with the cream sauce and minced onion. Arrange half the mixture in a well greased baking dish or casserole. Put in the hard-cooked eggs, cover with the remaining spinach and sprinkle with the crumbs. Bake in a moderate oven for twenty minutes until brown on top. Serve as a main course.

(3) French Fried Tomatoes:

4 firm tomatoes
1 teaspoon salt
1-8 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon sugar
1 egg slightly beaten
1-4 cup milk
Fine dry crumbs

Wash the tomatoes and cut them in inch slices. Do not peel. Dust with the salt, pepper, and sugar. Dip in the egg slightly beaten and mixed with the milk. Roll the sliced tomato in the crumbs. Place in a frying basket and fry in deep fat, hot enough to brown a bit of

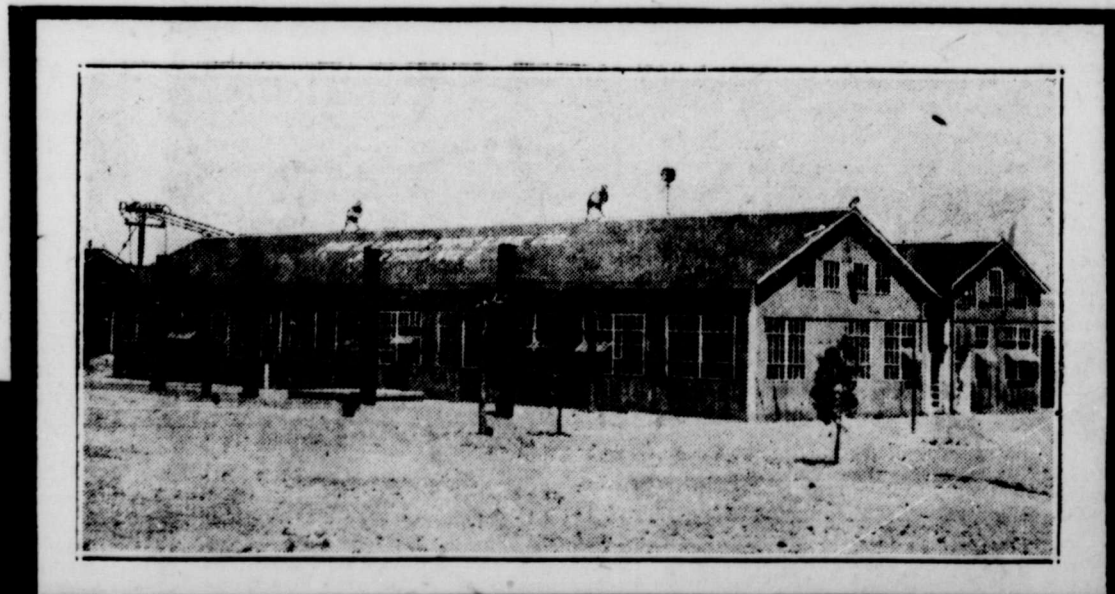
