An old land advertising agent who places the business of many mail order advertisers tells me that he has known of direct results being received from advertisements inserted as long as ten years ago.

I am today receiving replies from advertisements inserted in newspaper as far back as 1902. I do not believe there is an investment of any kind that begins to pay the dividends that the right kind of advertising does.

Certainly the good will of the business obtained partially by advertising is worth considerably moreathan a business obtained without it. Do not look for results too soon. Do not decide that an advertisement has been a failure for at least five years.

The colored citizens of Grapeland met at St. John's school house Sunday evening, October 15, in order to discuss the crimes such as murder, assaults, rapes and other outrageous deeds perpetrated by the worthless species of our race upon white and colored women. Reports show that many homes have been made desolute and sad by his diabolical, fiendish, brutish and bloodthirsty outrages. recognizing that these not only bring punishment on the fiends who perpetrate the crime, but brings reproach, pubsentiment and calamity against the intelligent negro who knows and acts in a negro's place. 


