April 26.-On account of so much rain crop prospects are a little gloomy at this writing. We are almost drowned out, and the way the wind is blowing from the north it looks like it will frost. But we always have some kind of weather in old Texas.

The commissioners were called together to make an annual settlement with the tax collector. We have worked five days and it will take us about five dave more. If it takes us ten days it will only cost the county \$150.00, and that will be a lot cheaper than the job that cost the county \$802.16. It took sixty days for one man to do that job. Now if it takes five men ten days that would equal one man fifty days, so you will see we will save ten days and you can easily see what we saye in the price. You all can see it is more economical for us to do the work than to hire costly laborers. We have decided to repair the courthouse. We think while we have the money on hand now is the time to repair it. We have awarded the contract to Mr. Nerris, his bid being \$330.60. We thought that was excessive, but had no way of getting at the cott of the material. We had to use our own judgement. There was a part of the specification that Mr. Harrelson and I voted to cut out, such as taking up the flooring in different offices, but were willing to put new flooring in the hall, and cut out the cement walk from the steps to the basement, but they out voted us and we submitted. Everything passed off nicely.

After we get through with Mr. Goolsby's books I will let the people know how he came out. but I am sure it will be all right.

As to that government road, if they build it we will get to travel it. I fayor good roads as much as anybody, but we have to crawl before we can walk. I wish we were able to have good roads all over the county.

The Battle of Flowers.

San Antonin's Gala Day.

San Antonio, Texas, has one of the most picturesque spring festivals of any city in America. On the 21st day og pAril every year, the anniversary of the victory of San Jacinto, which won Texas Independence from Mexico, a procession of gaily decked vehicles file back and forth in front of the Alamo chapel, and the beauty and chivalry of the great Southwest pelt each other with flowers and confetti. This odd and fanciful Battle of Flowers, with the grim old bloodstained chapel, where the Texas patriots gave their lives as a background, is a unique festival.

During this season sunny Southwest Texas is a land of flowers; the hills and valleys are brilliant with every hue and tint from the delicate white of the lilies to the flaring yellow of the myriad coriopis, which the children call "Mexican Blankets," so there is no lack of ammunition of peace, and the flower strewn streets, liberally besprinkled also with confetti, are thronged with merry, pleasure-loving crowds. The Latin-American element has leavened the whole lump and at tihs time the old world Spanish atmosphere of San Antonio makes a true Carnival spirit.

The Spring Carnival, as it is called, generally lasts a week; this year it begins on Monday, April 20, and lasts until Saturday, the 25th. At this season crowds flock into San Antonio from all over Texas and patriotism and flowers are rampant. There are from one to two parades every day, civic parades, labor parades, uniformed orders and amalgamated brothers of every kind mar h back and forth. One organization in particular, the Knights of (mala (which is Alamo spelled backwards), introduces the conic and grotesque elements, as well as ihstoric, and their false faces and gorgeous costuems make one of the features. Bands play on every plaza, and about every tenth block in San Antonio is a plaza filled with pomegranate, lilac bushes, Yucca palms, mulberry or banana trees. Youths and maidens go arm in arm and confetti and flowers are thrown promiscuously, and when the before we can dispatch our adblaring bands cease and the moon rides high one hears along the shadowy side of the streets a tinkle of banjo and guitar. singing and laughter, the perennial melody of youth and love.

Conspicuous in the crowds giving the Latin spirit of abandon to the festival are the Mex-icans; whether it be that these people have become so thoroughly Americanized as to rejoice in the victory that wrested an Empire from their Mother country, or whether the inherent Latin love of a festival makes them glad to participate in any kind of a fandango, even to a celebration of their own defeat, they are the most enthusiastic and hilarious. It is tihs Latin element, with its love of gay colors, which gives the Battle of Flowers a touch suggestive of Venice or the festivals of Spain.

Here, too, from many a mounatin ranch come Englishmen and Scotchmen, tall, fair-haired, broad-shouldered, enjoying with stoic placidity the whole blooming row, willing enough to pledge Texas Independence, or even American Independence, anything or everything except the bloody Beef Trust. One met also dapper Frenchmen and wandered perhaps into one of a hlaf dozen cafes where the wines of Texas served as a substitute for the vintage of old France. Swarthy Polacks, too, from their settlement of the Medina River, and big, tow-headed Swedes mingle in the procession. Then, too, was grinning Sambo, of ebony hue, with his high white collar and rolling eyes, and many a dusky damsel, clad in an array of color that would put Solomon's glory to shame.

The dominant factor, however, in this cosmopolitan fete is the Anglo-Saxon, and to him it is essentially an historical celebration. "Remember the Alamo" is blazoned in flowers by day and electric lights by nights. The little chapel of the Alamo, all that is now left of the famous mission of San Antonio De Valero, is the shrine to which his pilgrimage is made, for here was enacted one of the bloodiest and most heroic of all the events of American history.

Col. William B. Travis, with 176 Americans, among whom were the celebrated Col. James Bowie, inventor of the Bowie knife, and David Crockett, the frontier philosopher, were besieged in that little stone chapel by an army of Mexicans variously estimated at from five to seven thousand. But a week before the Mexican commander, General Santa Anna, had sanctioned the murder of a band of Americans acptured at Goliad. And now Colonel Travis and his men knew only too well that to surrender or retreat meant complete annihilation. Gathering his men into the nave of the chapel, Colonel Travis explained to them the gravity of the situation. "If we surrender," he said, "we will be shot without taking the life of a single Mexican. If we try to escape through the Mexican lines we shall be butchered versaries. iet, to every man i give permission to surrender or escape. My desire and decision is to remain in the fort and fight as long as breath remains in my body. But, do as you think best, each of you, and those who consent to remain with me to the end will give me joy unspeak-

Then, amid a solemn and oppressive silence, he stepped back and drew a line with his sword's point across the dirt floor of the chapel. "Those who will remain with me and fight till we die, step across this line."







Austin-The Colorado River has reached the danger point, being 18 feet above the normal. This is the greatest rise since the breaking of the dam 8 years ago tihs month.

CONE ON NEGROES.

Brands Bairey's Utterance as Willful Slander. Other Proof.

In his speech at Corsicana, Hon. Cone Johnson, candidate for delegate at large opposing Senator Bailey, handed out the following:-

"I have been handed a note which says that Joe Bailey stated in his speech over here the other day that I advocated and was in favor of having white women to teach negro schools. I can't imagine, for the sake of my life how or where or when any man could ever find any excuse to utter such a deliberate and willful siander as that is. (Wild cheering) On the contrary, the only speech that I have made on that subject was made in a church in my county by invitation of the best pastor there. I talked about education. I said I thought we were wrong to a great extent in the character of education that we are giving to our children. I said that I thought we ought to teach morality, honesty, integrity good citizenship fair dealing charity, love and kindness, and that we could have a textbook that all people of all faiths, and even those of no faith, would all of us agree on that would teach our children these underlying and eyerlasting virtues. (Cheers) And then I said Joe Bailey had made a speech at a college in Ft. Worth in which he said that he was in favor of never spending another dollar in Texas to educate the negro. I said that Joe Bailey was wrong, and that the idea of educating the negro was right; that I would rather have an intelligent negro than an ignorant one, just as I would rather bave a trained horse than a broncho right from the ranch. (Cheers.)

"But I said the trouble is that we haven't give the negro the right kind of education. I said that while he was a slave he had police protection and police restraint around him, and this made his conduct to conform in a large degree to moral standards, but that when we took slavery away we took away the only restraining influence for morality that the negro had, and that we turned him loose without a moral foundation, and that building up education on these conditions was like building a house on a foundation of sand-the heavier it was the deeper the foundation sunk into the mud. I therefore advocated a change in the cirriculum for the negro. I wanted to make it one-third morality. one-third manual training and one-third book learning, and that would make them as good
