THE TOYAH OIL FIELD.

Expert Pronounces it Greatest Oil Field in the World.

Big Springs, Texas, July 7.—A number of Big Springs citizens being interested in the Toyah oil field, secured the services of a noted geologist and oil expert for a 20 days' exploration of the field. In his report he refers to U. S. geological survey bulletin No. 260, series A. Economic Geology 53, pages 573 to 585, which can be secured in any public library, or at Washington. This survey shows that here is the greatest deposit of sulphur-gypsum and salt in all the known world, which he finds to be true.

First, he finds the anticline dips to the east and south, and examining the Cottonwood draw, he states he finds no evidence of a fault, and also that this draw is simply a channel worn by the waters it carries, a drain from a mountain range; that three shallow wells north of this draw find shallow oil at about the same depth as the 18 shallow wells that were drilled south of this draw. He cautions against comparison of the "log" of any two wells in the same vicinity, when the "log" of the first well has been kept secret. He also cautions to beware of any statement that oil is not found in paying quantities, if no attempt is made to "shoot" the well.

Continuing, the report says: "Draw an imaginary line three miles west of the present well in section 16 to a point two miles west of the Moody well. Note the many hills in the vicinity of

famous, with its production of 4,000,000 barrels of oil within 80 days. This fold, which is in block 70, is of a close-grain deposit of material that resembles a cement formation, and it has perfectly impounded this great body of oil in the three stratas that are known to exist. The fold was traced eastward for several miles, and there will be found the greatest bodies of oil and much gas.

"North of this fold and immediately along its north edge in sections 42, 43, 44 and 44, block 70, lying directly south of sections 44 and 45 in block 59, is property that you should secure, if the very best property is desired. Sections 8, 16 and 17 in block 59 are also in the oil basin and great quantities of oil will be found there.

"The oil sands being full to overflowing, but held back by this fold, the oil naturally backs up towards the north, as this 'fold' cuts off its avenue of escape to the south, and it may back up for many miles, as it has been many hundred years in forming this vast, magnificent deposit. This body of oil will last many years, as it derives its source from the huge deposits of sulphur-gypsum and salt.

"Relative to the value of section 8, block 59, every acre of land in this section is worth \$5,000. I find the oil is a lubricant grade and has been used by the T. & P. Railway company on several engines, and pronounced a fine grade of valve oil. When making this test on these engines, the oil was drawn direct

sections 44 and 45 in block 59 will be known as the center oil field, and around sections 42, 43, 44 and 45, in block 70, will be known as the lower oil field, and will be one of the wonders of the world."

"When drilling wells, use 12 inch casing," the report advises, "until the sulphur flow has been cut off; paint the outside of the casing with at least two coats of thick mineral paint, as this 600 feet is in permanently and the sulphur water that rises around the casing, more or less, is very destructive; go to the second oil sand at a depth of 1800 feet with eight inch casing, and if it is desired to go to the third oil sand, reduce the casing to six inch. All indications show that the third oil sand will be reached at depth of about 2200 feet, and the fourth, the fifth and the sixth oil sand may exist, for the head of this oil is simply marvelous.

"Work on the present well is being pushed day and night and will be capped the same as the last one. The rig will then be moved 1000 feet east or west, and further developments carried out."

The report also states that the story of the "well being securely tapped and supposed to contain a secret is laughable to an expert, for the drilling dump and slush were not removed, which proves the formation. The cap-rock was reached at a depth of 1860 feet and it was the intention to only slightly crack this cap-rock, but one blow too many was made with the heavy drill, and up rose the oil.

Burnt springs and Pettican springs. They are gas blow-outs. South of Pettican springs I find the fold that made the Lakeside gusher in California so

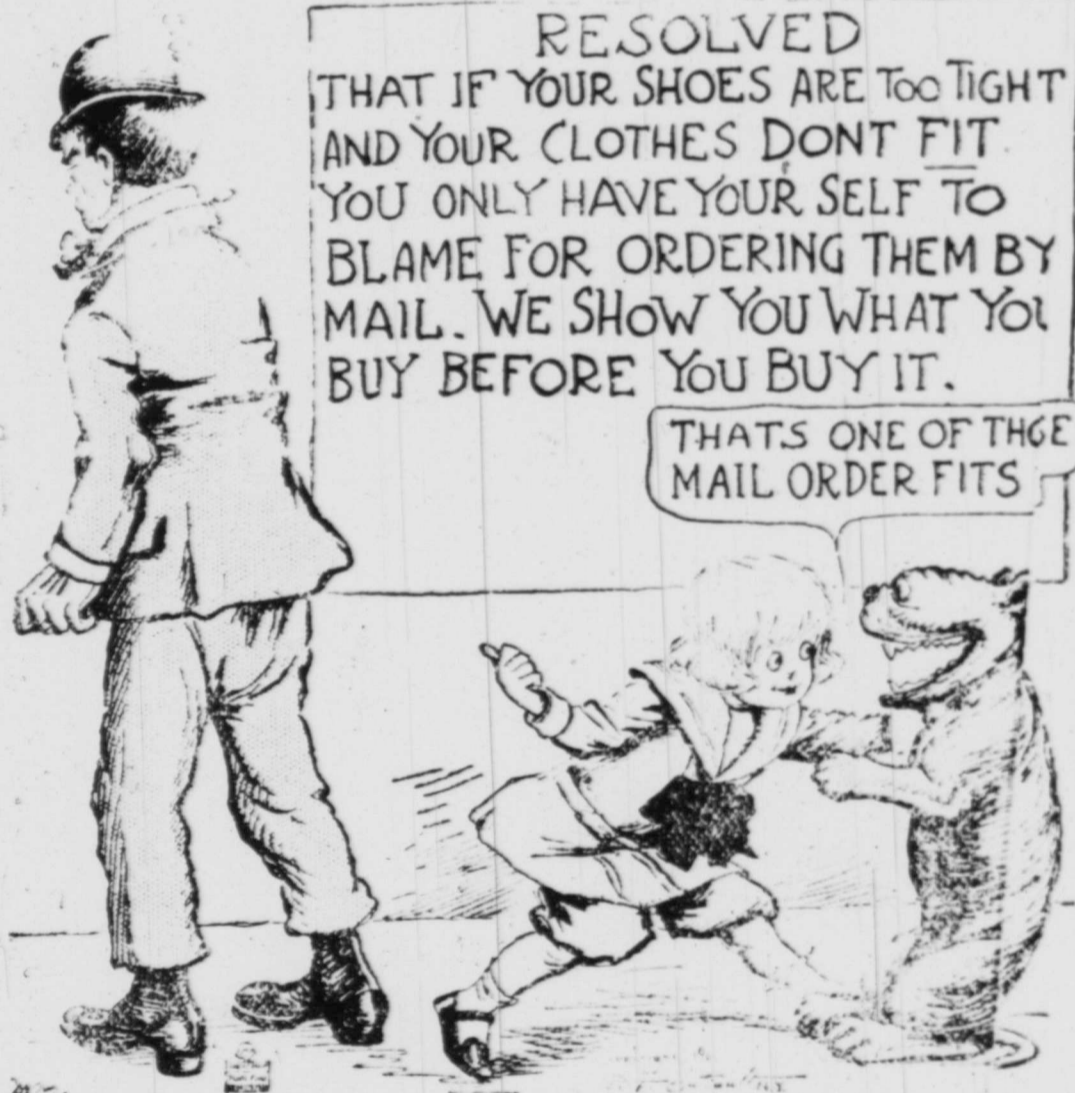
be quickly drawn out of the casing, the oil had risen some 800 feet on the rope. It can easily be determined that the oil must have been very near to the top

of the casing when the drill was withdrawn. A pointed plug was quickly driven into the casing and a cap securely screwed on. Then dirt and sand was piled on top of the cap to prevent the escape of too much of the gas. A small shot of nitro will make this well a "gusher."

"I really believe this is the full intention of the company now making developments there to put down a number of such wells, cap them and later shoot them, but not until it has secured every possible acre of land in the immediate vicinity.

The operating company knows the value of every acre in the upper field, and until another company puts in its own rigs and drills, the matter will be kept as quiet as possible. This is business. They may seal up an oil well, but to smother out the truth is altogether a different proposition.

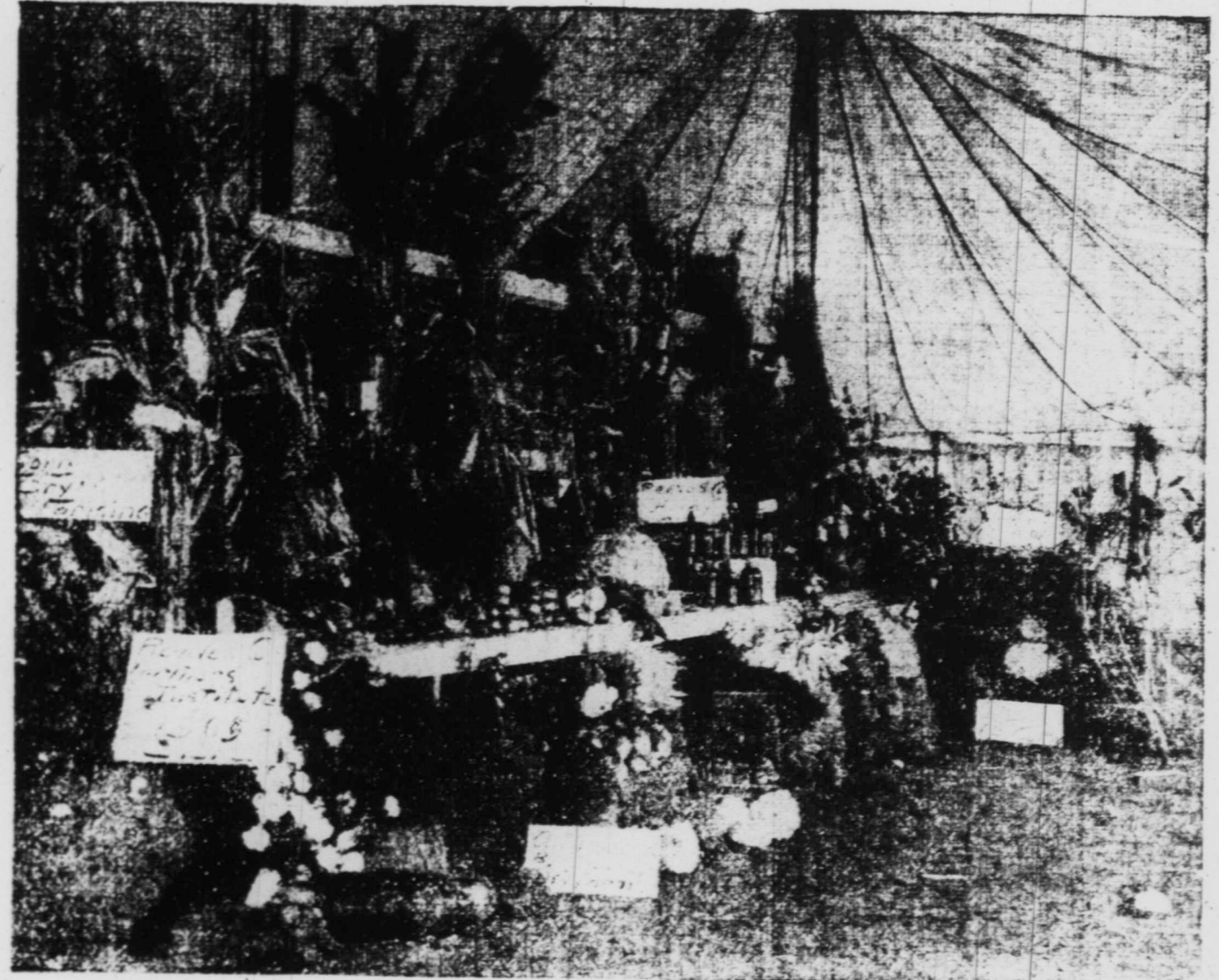

Charity: Love.

Dear Editor Pecos Times:

With your kind permission I wish to speak to the readers of your noble paper, and thanking God that I have the Bible before me, will give out my interpretation on this great word "Charity," regardless of what anyone may think or say, as I feel myself able to do so in a scriptural way.

Liberality may signify "Charity," but "Charity" does not always mean liberality, because liberality may be practiced by hate, but "Charity" only by love. If a man does a real good, he must be first good himself, otherwise he cannot do a real heavenly good. Now listen at Paul, who says, "And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor; and though I give my body to be burned, and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing." See 1st Cor. 13.

When we go down deep with Paul to the mystery of this word, and know that the good works getting very popular now-days, and spoken very highly by our best people, and so on, no doubt, expect to be saved by them, it makes us shudder think of their sad disappointment in the end.

Jesus says himself, "Many will unto me in that day (I suppose the Judgment Day) 'Lord, have we not prophesied thy name, and in thy name have cast out devils; and in name done many wonderful works?' And then I will depart from me, ye that winniquity." See Matt. 7:22-23

If Jesus denounced in such mighty works as stated, and tells those righteous people, "I never saw you," what can we expect receive for our good works? will accept nothing but a humble heart.

When it was fair to be saved, good works at the end when weighed in the balance we would find wanting and be lost. I believe that most of us do not have had than good. Don't think so brother? Paul says again, "For by grace ye are saved through faith, and that of yourselves, it is the gift of God; not of works, lest any man should boast." See Gal. 2:8-9.

We must acknowledge, although with shame, that the world is sometimes more liberal

than the Church, but if we stop here, and give in to human reason only, it would be a puzzle, and look hard for the world to do so much for the poor, and yet get no reward from Him who pities the poor, but the Bible and good sense makes this all plain to me, as I know that sometimes worldly love and popularity leads us to do some good things for which God has never promised any reward.

If self-righteousness, well seasoned with vain pride, and backed up with a good bank account, is not dangerous for pure religion to mix with, I cannot tell you what is.

Some people say that heaven is full of degrees, but I have never been there to see, and don't think that they have, either, but I suspect that they mean by this that the high-toned, the great and wise, will have missions fitted and suited for themselves, but this is neither wise nor scriptural, but I cannot decide this.

But old Abraham says to the rich man, after he died and lifted up his eyes in hell, "Son, remember that thou, in thy life time, receivedest thy good things and likewise Lazarus evil things, but now he is comforted and thou art tormented." See Luke 16:25.

Well, brethren, I thank God that I am willing to live with the poor, die with the poor, to get my riches in heaven as the poor will.

Paul makes two of the strongest propositions in 1st Cor. 13:3, that can be made by man, he puts in all of his goods and his body to be burned, and says, without "Charity" it profiteth me nothing.

I have proven every proposition I have made by the scriptures, and it seems plain enough to me that any one can understand that the word "Charity" always means pure love, and that good works alone will never save the soul. Do I submit this essay for the criticism of one and all.

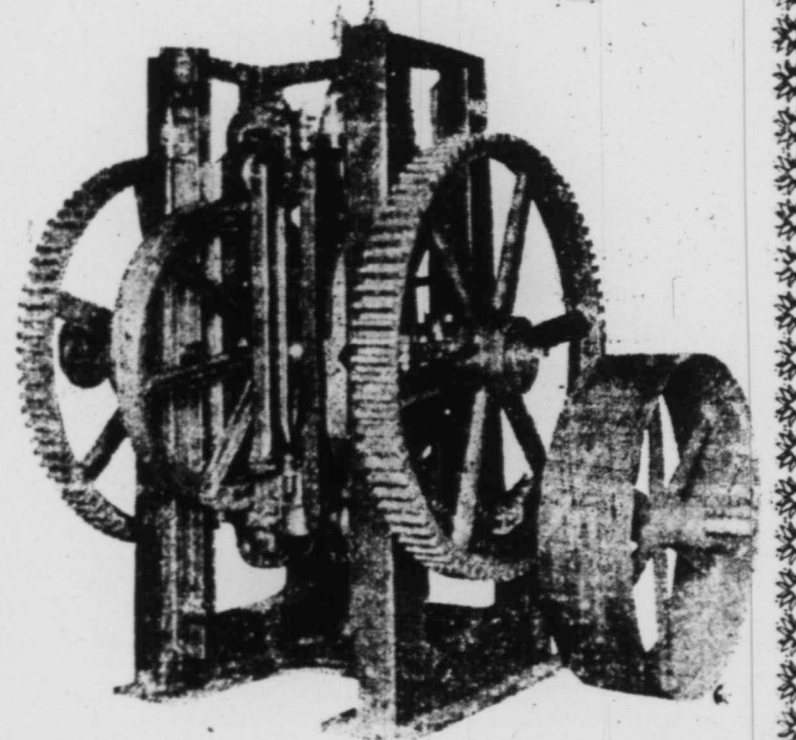

He that neglects or votes to sustain the saloons in Texas is, to use a legal phrase, particeps criminis, or morally responsible for all the lawlessness, crime, woes, sorrows, heart-rendings engendered by the saloon or the public sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage. Mr. Bryan, the great commoner, has said no government can prosper morally that upholds and issues license for the public sale of intoxicating liquors.

The time has come to elect men to office who are solid on this question. No man who voted at the last term of the legislature against submission and the positive instructions of the democratic party in convention should be trusted.

Judge Ross, our candidate for representative for this district, is outspoken on that issue, and assures the people he will use his combined influence to have the submission issue submitted to popular vote and should that fail to vote for a statutory prohibition law; whereas, his opponent, Mr. Turney, used his influence and vote against submission at the last term of the legislature. The time has come for every man to exercise his conscientious duty and by his vote not allow this dark demon of destruction to prostitute our boys and young men, break the hearts of mothers and children. According to criminal statistics 95 per cent of crime and lawlessness is traced to the saloon and public sale of intoxicating liquors. How any man with a proper judgment of right and wrong can cast his vote for the saloon is beyond conception. After a careful survey of the merits of the candidates for governor, I believe Cone Johnson is the only real prohibition candidate in the field.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Establishment of a Home for Wives and Widows of Confederate Soldiers and Sailors

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 7.
Joint Resolution to amend Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropriation.
Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows: Article 3. Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880, and who were married to such

soldiers or sailors anterior to March 1, 1880; provided, said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month, and provided further, that no appropriations shall ever be made for the purpose hereinbefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law; provided, the grant to aid said home shall not exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said homes shall be entitled to any other aid from the state; the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home; and provided further, that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of public calamity.

SEC. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the regular election of State officers, in November, 1910.

The sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this Resolution.

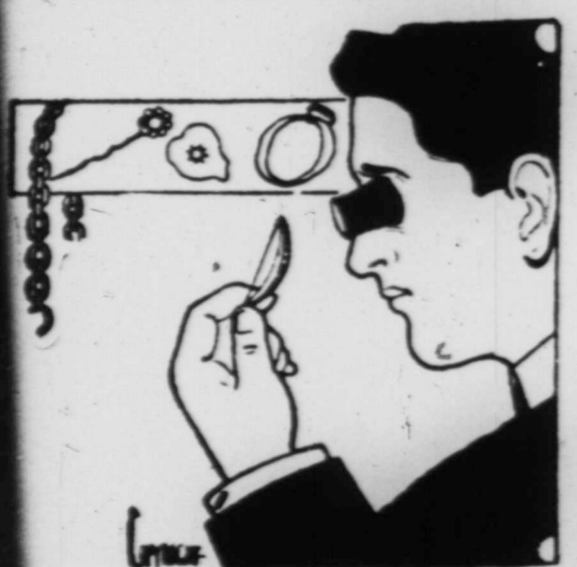

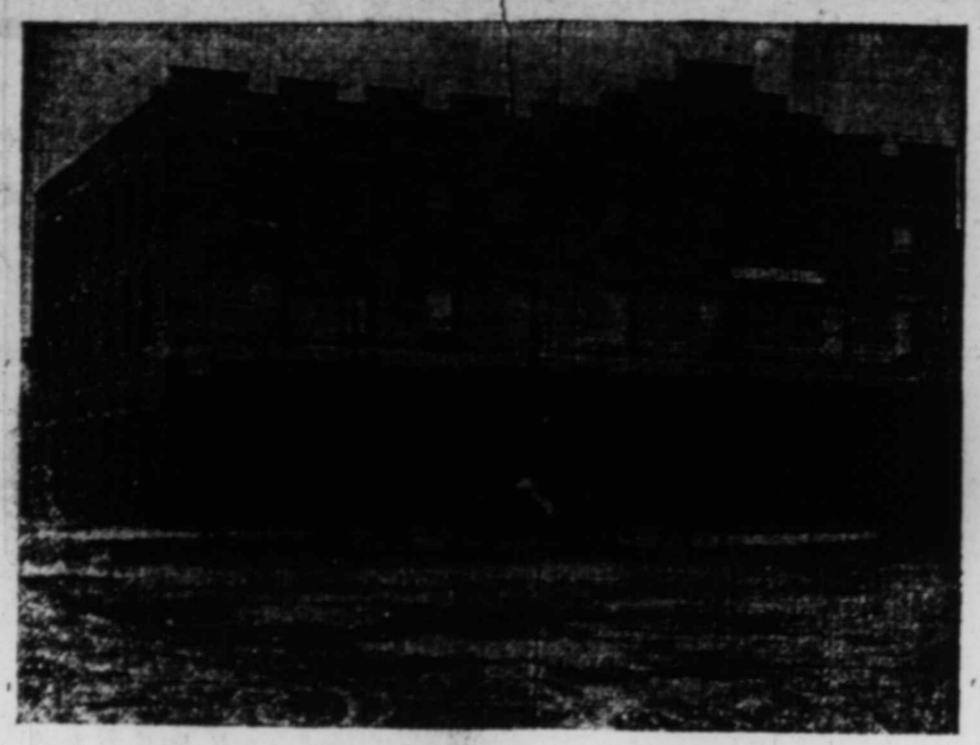

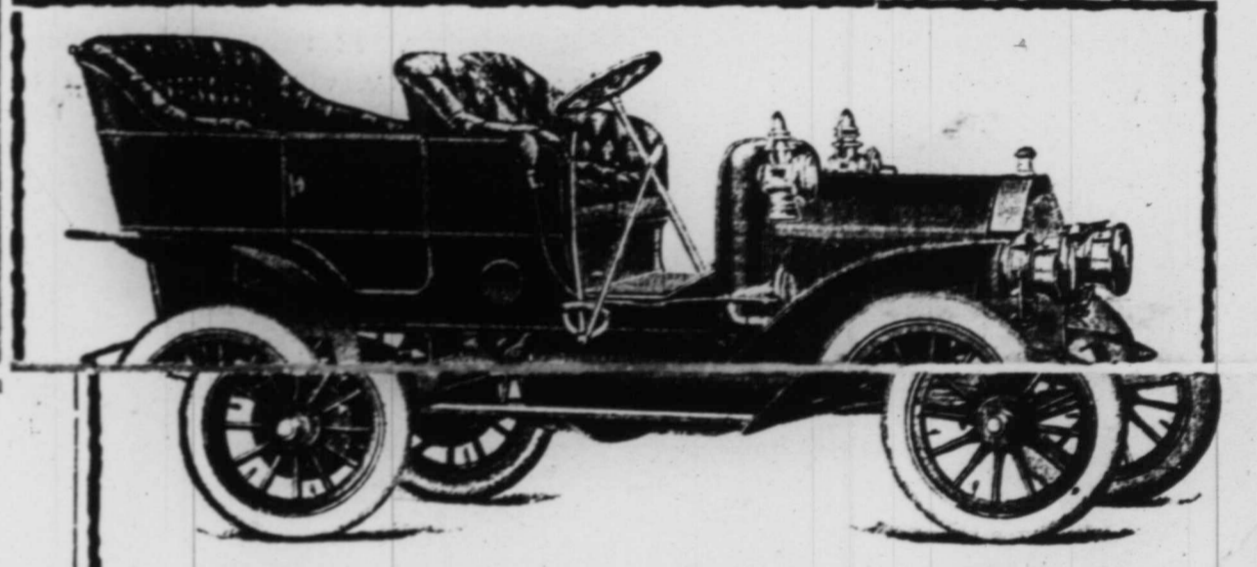

Only a short time back The Times called attention to the present sanitary condition of our city. The following clipping from the Dallas News needs no comment:

It would seem as if the perfection of the sewerage system were the logical place of beginning in any city planning work. For of what avail is it that a city become beautiful without getting clean? Adequate water supply and adequate sewerage must be foundations if the development of a city is to be both strong and beautiful. Of the two, sewerage is the thing that has been more neglected by Texas towns and cities. The town in Texas that has what might be called even adequate sewerage system has therein a signal distinction. If all things else about it defy adverse criticism, inquire into its sewerage system with confidence. There you are apt to find something to censure. We in Texas have formed the habit of treating sewerage merely as a convenience of urban life, whereas, of course, it is one of the necessary, indispensable things to the right conception, surpassed by nothing in point of importance, and equaled if at all only by the matter of a city's water supply. But, counting it as a convenience only, Texas towns have been content to have their sewerage systems the mere patch work of men who have but the most superficial knowledge of the problem. The proposal to hire an expert and pay the price of real experience has usually evoked the cry of extravagance, and authorities, yielding to it, have been content to spend only the odd change to

be found in a city's surplus revenue. So long as we act in accordance with this low conception of the importance of sewerage, of course we shall never have a system worthy of the name.

Del Rio Bars Illiterate Voters.

Del Rio, Tex., July 25.—This city is likely to get itself very much talked about because of the action of the election commissioners at the recent Democratic primary in carrying out a resolution adopted unanimously by the Democratic executive committee.

Ever since elections have been held in this border town a distinct and large so-called purchasable vote has been brought to the polls and no doubt many times controlled the situation. The representative people of the city have long sickened of such a method and have attempted time after time to bring about a more healthy condition, but until the recent primary no decisive action was ever taken. The Democratic executive committee in preparing for the primary adopted unanimously a resolution against permitting anybody to vote who "could not read and write the English language." Sentiment from all sides complimented the committee and not a voice of protest from a single representative citizen went up against the resolution.

At the primary the election commissioners carried out the resolution to the letter, but protests from those who are most active in local politics were numerous; rulings were flashed on the commissioners declaring the action illegal, and pressure in other ways brought to bear. The commissioners were firm and carried out their instructions and for the first time in the history of Del Rio, the purchasable, illiterate, indigent Mexican vote failed to control the situation.

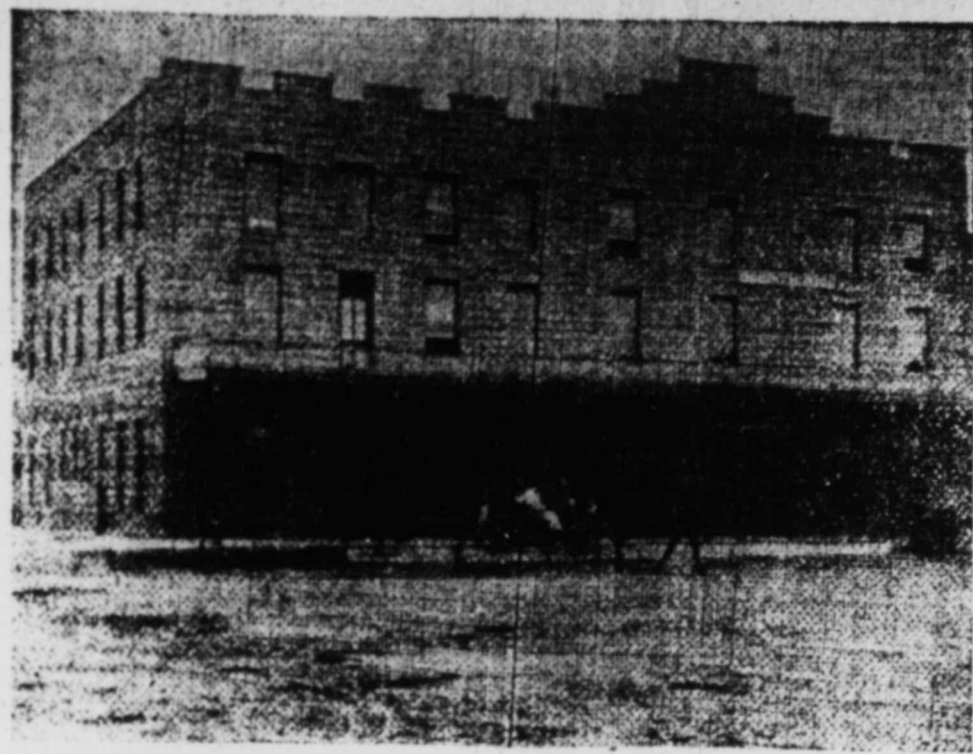

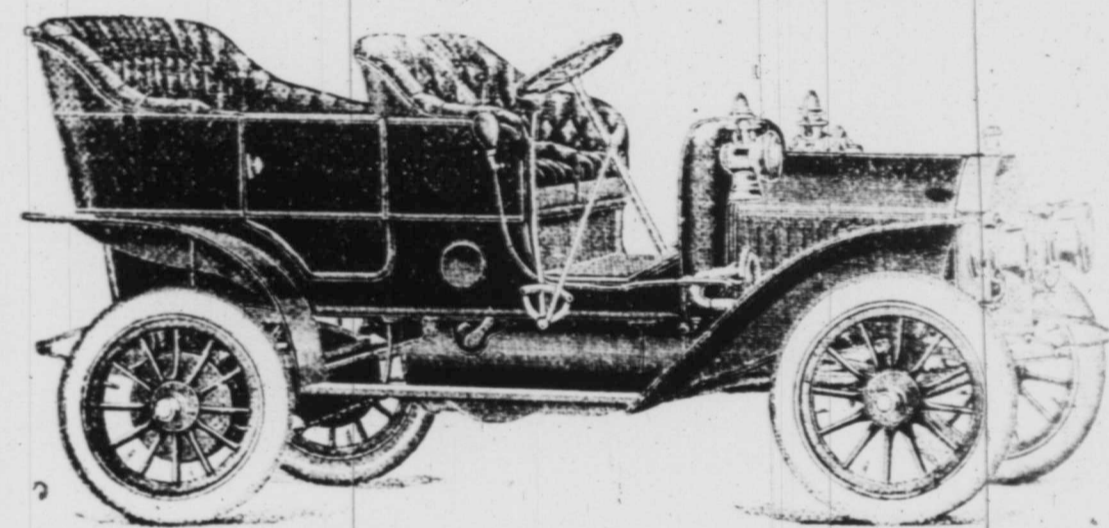

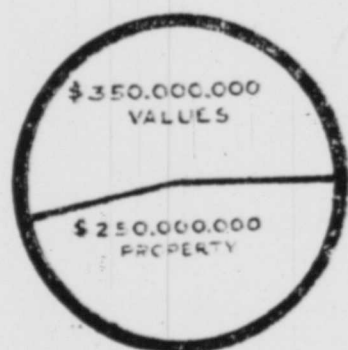

PLEASED WITH BALMORHEA

Party of Northern Prospectors Delighted With the Beautiful Toyah Valley.

Immigration from the northern and eastern states into Toyah Valley has commenced with new vigor, after the comparatively dull season of the past few months. The farming communities in other states have been so extremely busy with their crops that they have not had time to investigate this, the foremost of all agricultural states in the Union.

No better evidence of the ingress into Toyah Valley is shown than by the exceptionally large party of prospective buyers which the Swenson Land Company brought into the Valley on their last excursion. There were two carloads of them, one car coming from Kansas, and the other direct from Chicago. Both cars were taken out over the new railroad, which is being built from Pecos to Balmorhea, and which at the time of the excursion mentioned, was built out about twenty miles from Pecos, or within a very short distance of the Valley. The writer had the pleasure of accompanying the Swenson Land Company's cars, and it is unnecessary to state that the vast difference between the former method of reaching Balmorhea by automobile, over rough, dusty roads, presents a wide contrast to the up-to-date method of traveling this distance by rail. This railroad is being rapidly pushed to completion, and unless some unforeseen event happens, will enter the Valley within two or three weeks from this date.

The Swenson Land Company state that this last excursion was by far the largest they have had for a number of months, and that they are well pleased with the results of the trip. The prospectors were highly gratified to find such a beautiful little valley,

nestled here in the mountains, after having ridden over such a vast waste of desolate country; and they all with one accord voiced the same sentiments, to the effect that nowhere else can be found such an ideal combination of climate, soil, water and general conditions as in the Toyah Valley.

One of the best evidences of health and general vitality of the inhabitants of Balmorhea and the Toyah Valley, is the vigorous interest which they manifest in sports of all kinds. We mentioned in a former issue of this paper that a large, substantial grand stand is to be built at once on the baseball field at Balmorhea. The need of this has been very great for some time past, for Balmorhea has a baseball nine in this section of the country. Every Saturday afternoon the baseball diamond is brought into use, except on frequent occasions of course, when the Balmorhea nine leaves the city to play a visiting game. Last Saturday, July 23, the baseball nine from Barstow, made the trip of over forty-five miles to Balmorhea, only to suffer defeat at the hands of the Balmorhea boys, with a score of 14 to 4. While the Barstow boys, of course, have our sympathies for their defeat, it is very natural for us to congratulate our own boys on their splendid playing, which made such an uneven score possible.

One of the amusing features of the game is that the Barstow boys, seeing defeat inevitable in the eighth inning, quit the game at that point, one of them making the remark: "What's the use of playing any longer, we simply can't beat them. They live on Toyah Valley atmosphere and alfalfa; that's why they are so healthy and athletic."

Next Saturday our boys hope to have the pleasure of crossing bats with the Pecos nine, which

is considered to be quite a champion team in this section of the country; but we have no fears as to the outcome, owing to the superior quality, as the Barstow boys so fittingly stated, of our Toyah Valley atmosphere and alfalfa.

Mr. White, who purchased the Morris Addition to Pecos, has closed a deal with Morris & Kex local contractors, to plant out a double row of trees along the streets in this addition. These trees are of the beautiful valley poplar variety, which are noted for their beauty. They are somewhat similar to the cottonwood but a quicker growth. With the two artesian wells that are already in this addition there is no doubt about getting these trees to take root. It is estimated that it will require about 400 trees to set out and beautify this already beautiful plot of ground. When Mr. White gets these trees all out and growing it will be one of the prettiest and most desirable residence parts of town.

Texas Dry Farming Congress.

Mexico is manifesting a lively interest in the coming Texas Dry Farming Congress to be held in Eagle Pass on August 17, 18 and 19. Sr. Zeferino Dominguez, Prof. of Agriculture, Hacienda de Santa Maria, Coahuila, has written the officers of the league that the Mexican authorities are taking a deep interest in the convention. The Mexican state of Coahuila will not only send delegates, of which Sr. Dominguez will be the head, but will also make an exhibit at the congress of products raised in Mexico under dry farming conditions. Dr. Dominguez has made a deep study of the important problem of seed selection; he will bring a seed tester to the congress and has asked that 21 ears of the finest grown Maverick county corn be secured so he can demonstrate his method of seed testing during the address he will deliver before the convention.

Prof. J. D. Tinsley of the New Mexico Agricultural College has accepted an invitation to address the congress, and many of the most distinguished authorities on dry farming and agricultural development in the state will be on the program. Among them are

Prof. H. S. Hastings of the U. S. department of agriculture, San Antonio; Prof. J. L. Quicksall of the department at Waco, and the Hon. Ed R. Kone, State Commissioner of Agriculture.

The Mexican International Railway has consented to make an extremely low rate from Eagle Pass to Monterey at the close of the congress, so those wishing to make a short but delightful trip into old Mexico will have an opportunity to do so very cheaply.

The Burning Issue.

Flashed over the wires, and news reports, comes the news that Colquitt is elected governor. Personal ambition has thwarted the will of the majority. The vote on submission proves that fact. It is a fact beyond argument that a large majority in Texas favor state-wide prohibition. A division of the pro vote supporting Poindexter and Johnson and the injection of Baileyism has permitted an anti governor to ride into office. The object of good government is the greatest good for the greatest number. But the beer and the liquor guzzling element backed by the saloons and brewers and men for the sake of money and office have no regard for the moral welfare of our country and would prostitute and wreck our sons and daughters to gratify beastly appetites.

The plea by Mr. Colquitt that it is not right to force prohibition into localities where a majority oppose it is a fallacious argument. All law is prohibition. Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Establishment of a Home for Wives and Widows of Confederate Soldiers and Sailors

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7.
Joint Resolution to amend Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropriation.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3. Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1,

1880; provided, said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month, and provided further, that no appropriations shall ever be made for the purpose hereinbefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law; provided, the grant to aid said home shall not exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said homes shall be entitled to any other aid from the state; the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home; and provided further, that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of public calamity.

SEC. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the regular election of State officers, in November, 1910.

The sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this Resolution.

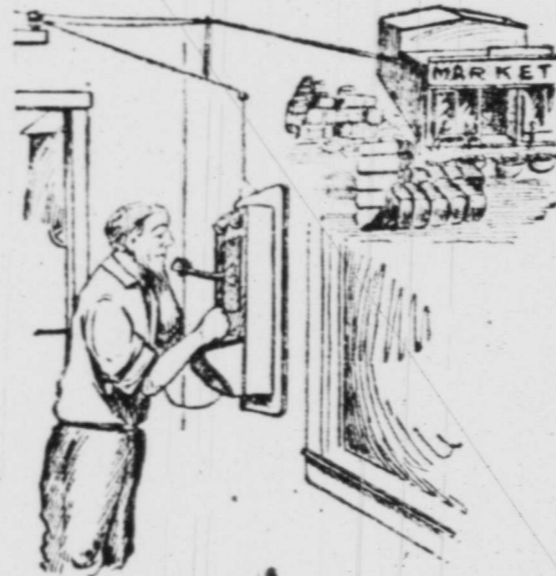
A protracted meeting by the people of the Christian church at Coyonosa will begin on August 13 and last one week. Everybody invited.

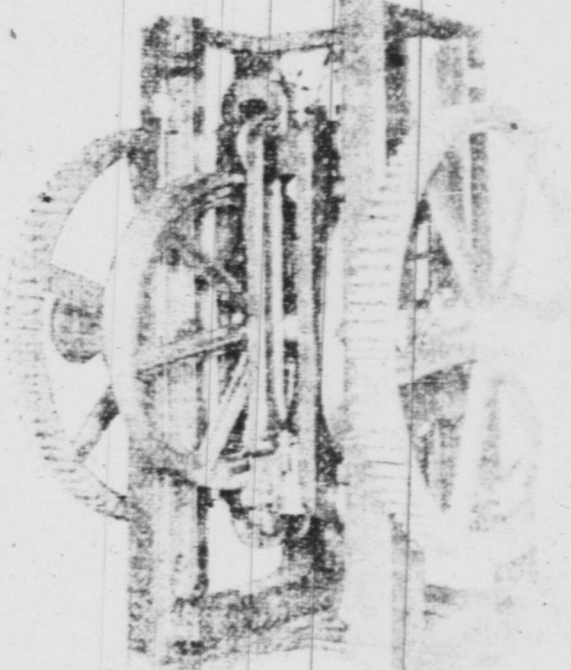

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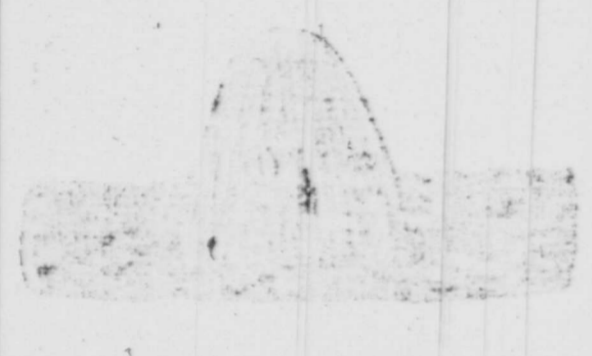

of endeavor.

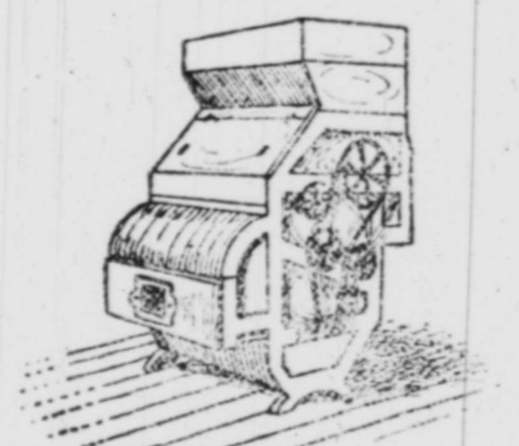


Plowing and Planning.
