LINK GETS IN THE CLEAR

Pecos, Texas, June 22, 1913. Messrs. Will P. Brady, President, and E. B. Kiser, Chief Pecos Volunteer Fire Department. Gentlemen:

Permit me herewith to hand you, in writing, my resignation from our organization, same to apply to my simple membership as well as to the position of second assistant chief with which I had been honored and which resignation I submitted, verbally, last Saturday afternoon before the assembled department. You will recall that at that time, the motion and vote were that the resignation be rejected and that I retain my membership. I hope that I shall never be convicted, however, of subscribing to any "rule or ruin" policy. I feel that the votes mentioned were quite enough in the way of an assurance of good-will toward me from the members of the organization; and, lest there should still be some, whose inquietude of mind has not subsided—and lest the usefulness and effectiveness of this organization (of which Pecos has in the past had such good reason to be proud) be impaired, permit me to insist that you accept this resignation.

I believe that the members of the department are tolerably well acquainted by this time with my attitude with reference to the matter about which some have seen fit to concern themselves so actively, and that there is no use of my going deeper into it in this communication. While my views have not changed, and while my conscience has not troubled me in that connection, there is not a member of the department who may not count me his friend, either at the present moment or hereafter; and to the judgment that will be ours in the after-days, I look to these few for a renewal of the old relations.

And now, lest some may receive a wrong impression from this letter, allow me to state that, while I am a resident here I will as any good citizen should do, give the department my consistent, cheerful, and whole-hearted support. Let me say more: While I am secretary of the Commercial Club I pledge my services in this capacity (or any other) for the wellbeing and the advancement of the best interests of the department. In the preparations that will be made for the entertainment of the Panhandle Firemen's Convention in September I wish to assure you that I shall work with you gentlemen as officials and individuals, or with any of the other members, as sincerely as (and even more industriously than) had this condition of affairs never arisen.

I trust that with this all of us will see the end of the matter; that there will be none with enough of malice or unwisdom in their make-ups to continue an agitation that can result but in bitterness, emptiness, and dissatisfaction; that there may soon be discovered a disposition on the part of all concerned to join hands again in the work that we have before us in the upbuilding of our town and country; and, finally, that you will feel free to count on me to the extent of my ability for anything that I may do for the members as individuals, or for the department as an organization.

EXPERIMENT STATION VISITED

AN OFFICIAL FROM COLLEGE STATION VISITS PECOS FARM.

Every nook and corner of the Pecos Experiment Station was given a careful inspection during the passing week. Mr. A. H. Leidigh, agronomist in charge of soil improvement and acting auditor of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations, arrived last Friday and busied himself with station affairs until late Wednesday, when he left by auto for Fort Stockton. At Fort Stockton Mr. Deidigh addressed the Pecos County Experiment Association.

Mr. Deidigh spoke very pleasing of the progress being made on the Pecos Experiment Station and especially mentioned the beautiful appearance of the cotton and cantaloupes. The station is testing some 56 varieties of cotton this season and several varieties of cantaloupes. The books of the station were carefully audited and plans for the next year gone over. Many new and badly needed improvements were arranged for, such as the planting of more shade trees, flowers and ornamental plants, the building of an attractive office and seed room, repainting of the station buildings, etc.

Mr. Deidigh is positive that much good will come from the station now that the land is all cleared and in cultivation and the necessary improvements having been provided for. He urges that western farmers use the station more by getting in touch with its doings. This can be done by visiting the station or by writing the station officials for information.

SAYS JUDGES IGNORE PRISON SENTENCE LAW

Austin, June 20.—District judges over the state were today addressed by Assistant Attorney General C. E. Lane on their failure to comply with the provisions of the indeterminate sentence law of the last legislature. General Lane points out that the law provides that in passing sentence in all cases where the party convicted is over 17 years old and where the jury fixes a term in the penitentiary, the sentence shall be for an indeterminate time, fixing the maximum punishment provided by law for the crime for which accused is convicted.

"The court of criminal appeals has had untold labors conferred upon it," says Lane, "by judges of our trial courts overlooking this law, as this court must reform each one of these sentences."

DALLAS LIQUOR DEALER IS FINED \$5,000—AND PAYS

Dallas, June 19.—L. Craddock, prominent wholesale liquor dealer of Dallas, was fined \$5000 in the federal court today on a charge of illicit liquor dealing.

It was charged whiskey was shipped into eastern Oklahoma in barrels labeled "floor sweep." Craddock paid the fine in court, tendering a certified check for the amount.

Three men charged as conspirators in the same transaction were sentenced to a year and a day at Leavenworth.



Isaacs, who is Manager of Judge Smith's campaign in your District, for certain telegrams sent by me to the Appellate Court and Governor of Texas. Like all West Texans, your sense of justice and a square deal to everyone, will cause you to read with an unprejudiced mind the real facts. Martinez was sent to the Abilene jail by the Governor of Texas for safe keeping. I thus became responsible for his safety. The daily press stated that a writ of habeas corpus had been granted by an El Paso Judge. The next day while busy holding court, I was advised by my Sheriff that Martinez would be taken to El Paso, and plans had been made to take him off the train at Pecos. If with this information, I had let this Mexican leave Abilene without notifying the Governor, I would have deserved being removed from office. The following is my communication to the governor, which embraces my telegram to the Appellate Court:

Abilene, Texas, Sept. 2, 1911.
Hon. O. B. Colquitt,
Governor of Texas, Austin.
Dear Sir:

I have just sent the Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals the following telegram, which is self-explanatory, viz:

"Mexican boy, Leon Martinez, is in custody of T. C. Weir, Sheriff Taylor County, in jail Abilene, Texas. Martinez represents to me that when being tried in District Court at Pecos that jury was charged at twelve o'clock noon, and when Court met at one-thirty, returned verdict assessing death: that within two hours thereafter, after already having given notice of appeal, and without his knowledge or consent, his attorney waived appeal, many citizens threatening attorney with serious violence if he did not do so, and that Court thereupon passed sentence of death upon him within four hours after jury received charge. He appeals to me that he is innocent, that he is sixteen years of age, that he wants an appeal, and has never waived same. The above are merely his representations and may be false. From appearances, he might be under seventeen. I learn that habeas corpus has been granted by El Paso Court. Sheriff Weir advises that Pecos citizen, claiming to be venireman in case, told him it is morning that Mexican would never reach El Paso alive. Premises considered, and for present safety of Mexican, and that a proper investigation of representations may be had, I pray you to grant writ of habeas corpus immediately by wire returnable to Austin."

If it were not for the fact that I already have notice through the daily press that a writ of habeas corpus has been granted by the El Paso court, I would grant this party a writ myself, but I do not deem it proper to interfere with the jurisdiction of another Court, hence have suggested the situation to the Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeal, believing that under Articles 154, 166 and 167 Code of Criminal Procedure, they might see fit to take affirmative action themselves, in order to afford present protection to this Mexican, it being one of such extraordinary cases contemplated by the Statute.

This Mexican may be guilty of the most heinous crime imaginable, and might deserve hanging a dozen times, yet if he did not knowingly agree to waiving an appeal, without coercion, he should not be hung without an appeal. Our law provides that even in the most ordinary felony case, neither the defendant nor his lawyer can waive a trial by jury, and that his counsel cannot waive the defendant's presence in Court, and if the representations of this Mexican are true, he would be entitled to have the matter investigated.

These suggestions are meant in no way to reflect upon the Judge who tried this Mexican, or his lawyer, or any party connected therewith, for I have the highest regard for Judge Isaacs, and do not know what the real facts are, but I have such profound respect for the laws of my State, which place such a value upon human life, even that of the most despicable and villainous criminal, that I do not like to see a too hurried hanging in any way accelerated by public sentiment. I fear that this Mexican can never reach El Paso alive, from what the Sheriff here tells me, and the general rumor, and therefore I hope that you will take adequate steps to protect him in his lawful rights.

It is my belief that every criminal should be punished, and that too many escape, and I stand for the strictest enforcement of the law, and all laws, but at the same time, all criminals should be punished legally, and strictly according to law.

The Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals wired me to appoint an attorney for Martinez, which I did. Other than the above, I had no connection with the case. I could not have done less under my oath.

In 1909 Tom Barnett was tried in my Court for murder, and upon circumstantial evidence, the jury gave him a life sentence. Some time after a mob broke into the jail and shot him to death. I received threatening anonymous letters demanding that I take no action. I promptly called a special term of Court and empaneled a special grand jury to investigate it. The following letter from Judge Isaacs shows that the change in his opinion of me has taken place since 1909, viz:

"Midland, Texas, Sept. 3, 1909.
Mr. W. H. Graham, Court Stenographer, Abilene, Texas.

Dear Mr. Graham:

I have received the copy of the Abilene Reporter, containing Judge Blanton's very pointed charge to the Grand Jury, for which I thank you very much.

I have never had the pleasure of meeting Judge Blanton, but from what I know of him I am sure that he is a man of very high character, absolutely fearless and of sterling integrity.

In my opinion the greatest boon to civilization and to democratic government is a judge who has the ability to administer the law, who has the integrity, the backbone and the moral courage to administer it fairly and impartially, and who has the courage to stand by the law and the right, regardless of the consequences.

It may be that the murderers of Tom Barnett and their friends and sympathizers are strong enough in the 42nd Judicial District to defeat Judge Blanton when he shall again stand for re-election, but I do not believe it. However, should they be, and he should go down in defeat, his reward in a consciousness of having done his whole duty will be a greater one in my opinion, than an election bought about by a compromise of the right.

Justice is slow but sure. Judge Isaacs should always be faithful that this case was reviewed and received the sanction of the Appellate Court. Otherwise, punishment inflicted would have been open to criticism for a few more years. There is not a Judge in Texas who stands stronger for strict law enforcement and dispatch of business than I am, and there is not another Abilene, Texas with cleaner dockets than mine. Treat me with West Texas fairness, and see that I get a square deal.

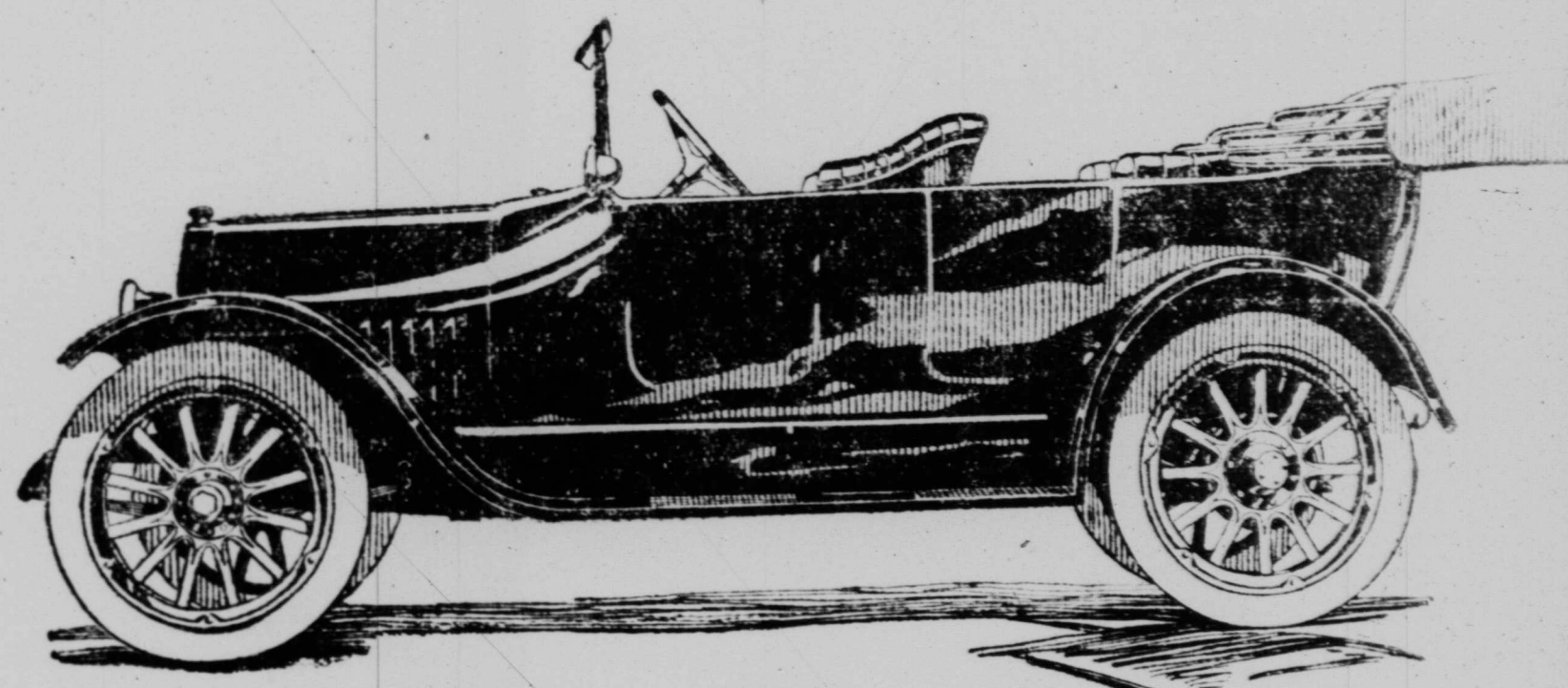
